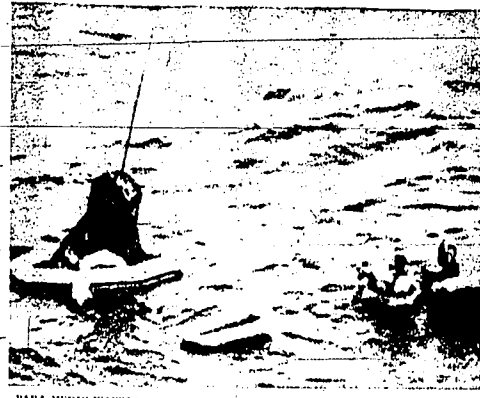

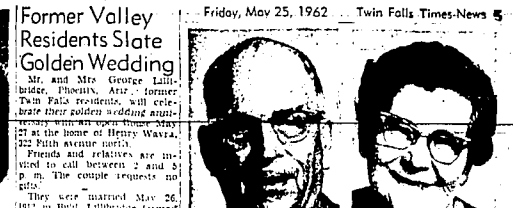

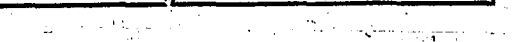

Fiscal Report Shows Pet Milk Growth up; Earnings Down

ST. LOUIS, May 25.—The sales of Pet Milk company for the fiscal year ended March 31, showed further growth over the record achieved a year ago, but the company's earnings were somewhat below the record results of last year primarily because of expense and market conditions which are not expected to recur in the current year, President Theodore R. Gambie announced in a preliminary year-end report to stockholders.

The report followed a meeting of directors at which the board declared regular quarterly dividends of 25 cents per share of common stock and \$1.25 per share of preferred stock, both payable July 1 to stockholders of record June 1.

Consolidated net sales for fiscal 1962 were \$227,800,000 as compared with \$258,000,000 a year ago, and net income was \$4,422,000 as compared with \$4,964,000. After preferred dividends, earnings per share of common stock were \$1.21 as compared with \$2.20.

Sales and earnings for both years include the O. H. Musselman company and the R. P. Munster company which were acquired by Pet in fiscal 1961 on a "pooling-of-interests" basis.

"We believe the past year was a period of sound progress for Pet Milk company," Gambie said in his letter to stockholders. Farm Groups Will Study World Areas

WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—Four groups of agricultural extension workers will leave next month to explore the problems of expanding markets for American farm products overseas.

The extension teams will visit four major areas, one going to Western Europe, a second to Africa and the Middle East, a third to Southern Asia and the fourth to the Caribbean area. The four teams will leave about June 15th and return about July 25. Their goal will be to help give American farmers and processors a better understanding of the food and fiber needs of foreign countries, and some of the problems of modern export sales.

The teams will be drawn from state extension services all across the nation. A total of 21 extension economists will be included in the groups. They will represent state land grant colleges from California to Vermont and from Minnesota to Florida. Each of the teams will also be accompanied by agriculture department experts in the areas to be visited.

When the teams return, they will develop discussion materials for use in alerting farm people all across the nation to the particular needs of the export markets.

Rainfall Can Fool Farmers

BOISE, May 25—Dorrell Larsen, irrigation specialist, University of Idaho, said at an advisory southern Idaho farmers using irrigation water and water drawn from deep wells to moisture content of their soil.

While the southern part of the state has been blessed with some abundant rainfall, many farmers wait too long to begin irrigation of some crops. A large rainfall, such as the recent one, soaks the entire field. Hence, the entire field can dry out at once. Larsen advised area farmers to begin light irrigation about seven to 10 days after the rain ceases. To determine how much the first irrigation should be, farmers should check their sub-soil moisture. Chances are many areas has surface soil moisture and sub-soil moisture meeting. This, of course, would be ideal conditions. Many farmers are frequently misled by abundant rain and inspection of soil conditions will aid in getting crops started.

Grain Report Would Alter Subsidy Plan

WASHINGTON, May 25—The agriculture department has announced a study of the possible effect of new types of grain export subsidy program.

The study would grant export subsidies under a so-called "pay-in-kind" program, that is, the government would take grain from the market stocks. The subsidy would differ from the current American and world market.

The study report said that the current subsidy would be government handling for wheat and rice, but for corn. The report also said government surplus stocks could be cut faster if the agriculture department adopted a plan of making all exports government stocks. But a program, the study said, would reduce farm income.

The study was compiled by a committee set up by Agriculture Secretary Freeman Foxworth. The release of the study is expected to be made in the next few days as the government is preparing to say government grain subsidies.

FARM CENSUS BEY

Twin Falls County Gets Brucellosis Clean Bill

Twin Falls county has been recertified as a brucellosis free area. The certificate was presented recently by Dr. E. H. Beard, U.S. department of agriculture animal disease eradicator district supervisor, to the Twin Falls county commissioners.

All of the counties making up Idaho are now classified as moderate brucellosis areas. Twin Falls county was first certified three years ago and the presentation amounted to recertification of the county. The recertification is a real milestone in disease eradication, said Dr. Beard.

Commenting on the recertification, Dr. Beard noted that the job of hard work by cattlemen and veterinarians in the county resulted in keeping the county classified as a moderate area. There are 1,607 herds of cattle in Twin Falls county including 31,271 breeding cows. Or the estimated 100,000 cattle in the county, 88,881 are considered breeding stock and the rest are steers, calves and feeder cattle.

Some 100,000 head of cattle are being recertified and 1,182 tested negative. Milk is tested to determine trace of brucellosis and some 120 range herds were blood tested.

Winter Potato Crop Acreage Down From Last Year Total

BOISE, May 25—According to figures released by the U.S. department of agriculture, statistics for the winter potato crop in 1962 are estimated at 4,267,000 acres, or 15 per cent less than the March 1 estimate.

The crop is 15 per cent less than the 4,267,000 produced in 1961. The reduction in the production estimate occurred in Florida, Arizona, both acreage and yield per acre declined. Nearly 10 per cent of the Florida acreage was unharvested on April 1. Heavy rains covered part of the county in March and April but didn't materially affect the harvest.

Yields in California winter crop potatoes was stable in all areas. Harvest in the Kern county area is complete while San Joaquin valley and Perris-Irwin districts, are just finishing.

The early spring crop is estimated at 2,016,000 hundredweight for 1962. Production at this time would be six per cent greater than average but 16 per cent less than the large 1961 crop.

In Florida, the Hastings area crop is placed at 2,416,000 hundredweight, compared to 2,990,000 in 1961 with lower yields accounting for much of the decline. Harvest of the Hastings crop began in late March, and the quality has been good. Frost damage in March was relatively minor. Irrigation requirements were heavy until rain relieved all sections.

Other areas in Florida reduced acreage substantially, and yields are expected to be lower this year. Production in other areas is down.

The Texas crop is in good condition, and yield prospects are well above those harvested last year. The acreage is slightly larger. The estimated production of 152,000 hundredweight is up 28 per cent. Harvest in the Rio Grande valley has started.

Acreage of late spring potato harvest is a record low of 111,000 acres. This is 17 per cent less than last year's 133,000 acres. The acreage is down 28 per cent. Harvest in the Rio Grande valley has started.

Saddle Horse Needs Spring Conditioning

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25—Saddle horses need a spring tune-up just as badly as any other farm vehicle.

"After a long idle winter, don't expect your horse to go out on a long spring canter without first setting into condition," said Anthony Timmons, technical service manager, Leslie Sait company.

Some of the check points for this spring tune-up include: Check your horse for internal and external parasites and follow your veterinarian's advice for controlling them, and increase energy and protein content of ration.

Put out extra amounts of salt. "Horses in warm weather or after strenuous exercise need more salt," Timmons noted. "Be sure your horse has a salt lick instead of the abrasive tongue that catches a wheezy tractor."

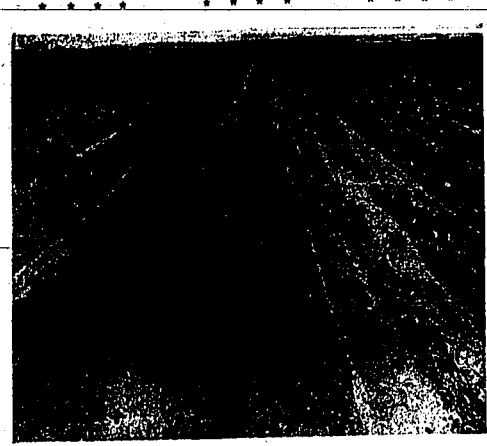

(Continued from Page 7) to the desert where she is nourished and sheltered by the host weeds and where she lays her eggs. When these eggs hatch each spring, it is the host plant which rears the bugs to adulthood.

The host weeds have grown up in the Baylor creek and nearby areas because the natural foliage of the region was destroyed by fires from aerial bombing practices and by overgrazing in some sections. Permanent control of the weeds, and thus the beet leaf hopper, can best be accomplished by restoring the grass to the desert to replace the weeds.

To finance the war against the hopper the federal government spent \$47,000 in 1959 and 1960 by seeding 85,300 acres of the desert to grass.

From 1961 to 1962, to complete a 10-year program of beet leaf hopper eradication and grass restoration, the government plans to spend another \$7,175,000 to reseed and develop an estimated 200,000 acres of desert.

Participating in the program with additional funds are the range users who will benefit directly from the program.

Officials of the USDA-Idaho agricultural department and the Idaho bean commission feel officials say that the control program to date has been effective. However, big weeds will con-

tinue so long as there are wide areas in which they can hatch.

The Idaho bean commission feels a strong responsibility for keeping the Idaho legislature, the department of agriculture and congress informed of the need for and the results of our fight against the hopper.

William Morgan, Burley, commission chairman, told the Times-News. "By its nature this program must be a continuing one, carried to full completion, if we are to wipe out the insect."

Morgan points out that Idaho farmers and the state government must have a vital stake in the program because the damage occurs on Idaho farmland. "The federal government has a responsibility in destroying the bug because federal lands are a source of the insect infestation."

He also explained that the program must be a flexible one so that emergency funds can be put into the fight at any time emergency situation in any area.

"Not only the bean growers and other plant growers, but all Idaho shall benefit," Morgan declared. "In addition to providing a permanent long range control."

Odd Weather Is Affecting Area Ranges

SHOZHONE, May 25—It will be some time before an accurate determination can be made of range grass conditions in southern Idaho, said a spokesman for the bureau of land management. The bureau is waiting to see how the recent rainfall affects the annual and perennial grasses.

Other conditions appeared excellent sometime ago before the gradic weather set in. So far the several years depending on the effect of the rainfall.

In the higher elevations there is still considerable moisture and conditions as reported by many of the farmers and ranchers are still excellent.

If the rain improves the range as is hoped for, this could be one of the best years for range grass in the past decade.

As the time approaches for another spirited season of cleaning kitchen cupboards and the house-maker can promise herself a great reward. With planning and a relatively small amount of expense, we can convert a cluttered, old-fashioned cupboard into a modern example of orderly convenient storage.

If your kitchen, like mine, has the deep and dark base cabinets with one or two stationary shelves, you know that efficient storage is a laugh. Little things hide behind big articles and putting things away is largely a matter of shoving hard to fit them in.

Perhaps you'll be interested as I in the new accessories that do bring such modern conveniences as compartmentalized storage, sliding shelves, and lazy Susan turntables to old cabinets. What's almost as important is that we can install them ourselves without waiting for day to set to it.

These accessories include roll-out vegetable drawers, sliding lid racks, several kinds of roll-out storage drawers and turnables. They are sized to fit standard base cabinets. Drawers, for example, are 10 1/2 inches long and range in width from about 8 to

On My Own Time

At this time of year when thousands of men and women are being graduated from everything from college to graduate school, it seems appropriate to reveal some information from the federal government which speaks well of U. S. young men and women. It is in sharp contrast to the wallings of some that we're going to the devil in a little red basket, via the juvenile delinquency route.

A few years ago the education department plan of offering students a college scholarship was proposed and approved. Thousands of students and prospective students took advantage of the plan which stated they could borrow the money for college and pay it back after school on a systematic payment plan which involved three per cent interest, a not-too-steep interest rate in this day.

There was some reluctance on the part of congress to go along with this plan—probably because they would rather have spent the money on some public works plan.

Now reports say that the money is flowing in in payment for education and apparently the young college graduates are taking care of this obligation in excellent fashion. It's encouraging, officials say, because it shows two definite trends. One is that the graduates appreciate and they want the obligation. The other trend is that apparently these persons received better paying jobs and more capable of repaying without hurting themselves financially. At least surveys show this.

Now the point to be made, we suppose, is that the senate has approved a large sum of money for continuation of this plan. The house of representatives has balked and news has it that the whole plan is in jeopardy.

Crusades are old-fashioned and we're not so sure they do any good anyway, but it sure seems a shame to let this program go down the drain. It might help our children some day.

"What's the teen-age girl's mind when she reads Seventeen (magazine)," asks the ad. One answer in the ad is "Things to charge to Mom's account." One office worker replies, "Who needs Seventeen? My daughter can read a comic book and think of things to charge."

Ward has it that also headed for Twin Falls this summer, after theater owners decide who gets first grab, is "West Side Story," the one which ran away with the Academy Awards. Summer movie fare promises to be top this year.

Sports Illustrated has published two excerpts from a forthcoming book by Jim Brosnan, now a relief pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds, and if they are representative of the rest of the book or anything like his first book, for which he has become a baseball sports fan. His first effort was "The Long Season," in which some controversial baseball material was used. The most recent is "Pennant Race" in which he writes for the National League and American League in 1961. Some of the stories are precious. If you like baseball, you should like Brosnan and his books.

Songs Eddie Fisher may want to avoid including in his night club routine: "You Made Me Love You," "I Don't Know Why I Love You Like I Do," "Giddy Me Five Minutes More" and "You're Cheatin' Heart."

The classified section of many newspapers is the ideal place for offbeat messages, some of which would not be tolerated in other parts of the newspaper. Here are a few from newspapers from metropolitan areas: Chicago Tribune, "DES PLAINES—Roosevelt Townhouses, Men or Women to share. Its baths . . . no lease." Or how about this one from the New York Times: "I Dream I Bathed in Marble Hills, 440 east 57 street Sutton Pl. Inmate—apartments per floor—"

If you stop to think about it, it's no trick at all to win an argument on paper. This might best be proved during a political election year, but it could serve as good advice in many other instances. Our Bureau of Minority Reports Designed to Aggravate All But a Few of the Citizens proved this point recently in a report in answer to the slogan "Buy a Home." The report is entitled "Don't Buy a Home, You Idiot." It's destined to remain a minority report.

So with no offense to anyone in mind, we use this enlightening remark, or a portion of it, to prove again that: He Who Speaks Last Speaks Loudest.

Take for instance the statement: "The payments are cheaper than the rent you now pay." Seeing an opening, the bureau's answer was, "But how about paying by a new hot water heater, or paying a carpenter to fix the leaky roof, or paying a plumber to pick hairpins out of the drain?"

The bureau is already three runs ahead in the bottom of the third. Running down the list we spotted "Just think, no landlord to deal with the messes. Here are the terms from a metropolitan newspaper warning to its landlord: 'I'd like it nice to know that when the water pipes freeze that you have to do it phone the landlord and it's his job to get them fixed and pay the bill!'"

Still another remark was given you a great feeling to know that the home is yours and that in a few years you can own it all yourself. "The bureau, how leading by seven runs in the eighth, counters, can't fix what happens when the boss fires you without notice and you have to look for another job and the wife and kids behind when you both the job and . . ."

We doubt if you need any more examples to see the point. Never speak for others. Always speak for him, and no matter what you say it's still: He Who Speaks Last Speaks Loudest.

Garden Hose Should Be Kept in Good Repair for Longer Life; Tips Given

Buying a new garden hose? Or are you repairing an old one? Here are some tips to guide you in either case.

A good garden hose, cared for, will last for years. Both plastic and rubber hoses wear well, but in either case one that is reinforced will hold up better under water pressure.

Plastic hose is subject to stiffening in cold weather, while rubber remains more flexible. This is unimportant in most cases since the hose will be used principally in the summer.

But, it is a factor to remember when you store hose. If you toss your plastic hose in a heap in an unheated garage over the winter, you may find it kinked up. Soaking the kinks in hot water will allow you to work them out with your fingers.

Hoses are available with a variety of inside diameters. Half-inch opening is sufficient in most cases. Get a larger hose if you have a large area with several sprinklers to cover.

Get a hose that is long enough. There should be enough length so that you can use it anywhere on your lot without stretching it, nor having to cut a corner of a building or kinking it at the faucet.

Leak generally occur at the faucet. If you're lucky, this means nothing more than that you need retreating.

Hose washers are cheap and should be renewed at the beginning of every sprinkling season and at intervals of a month or so.

Sometimes a leak will continue at the faucet end in spite of new washers. The face of the faucet may be worn and should be rough. Touching up with a file will correct this.

Use hose mender to repair bad spots in a hose. Cut out the bad sections. Ends should be neat. Use a rubber mender is a tube with cleats at the center that press down into both ends of the hose once the mender is inserted.

Dip the ends of a plastic hose in hot water to soften them. Insert the mender tube. A taper nut is slipped over the tube and pressed onto the hose. Place the other taper nut on the tube and insert the tube into the other end of the hose.

New couplings can be installed the same way.

A hose will last longer if cared for. Do not leave it in the hot sun. Not only will the sun soften the hose, but the water remaining inside will boil.

Women Don't Take Pride in Clean Autos

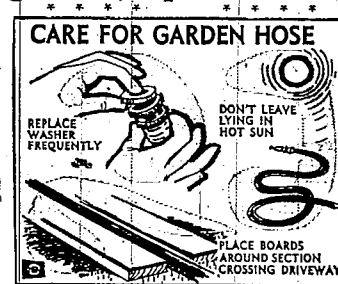

Built-in Stereo Adapter Aids In Judging of Hi-Fi FM Tuner

BY PRESTON MEDRAW

There is a new device to be considered in trying to judge whether a high fidelity FM tuner is delivering poor, medium or outstanding performance in relation to what it cost. The element is the built-in stereo adapter.

A stereo adapter adds nothing to the factors that an FM tuner is judged by—constantly, but distortion, the width of the signal it receives or ability to weed stray and unwanted broadcast impulses out of the sound it delivers to the amplifier.

A perfect example of this is the Harmon-Kardon F500X integrated FM stereo tuner. The price (about \$170) includes both tuner and adapter. When a listener realizes that such steps affecting the performance of the expensive and celebrated Harmon-Kardon Citation III tuner, he has to rate the F500X as outstanding for the price.

For talking out the stereo adapter leaves a comparatively inexpensive tuner (about \$110). The main difference between the F500X and Citation III is sensitivity.

The printed material that comes with an FM tuner is difficult to read. This is true on straight FM signals of metropolitan area strength.

Blair, who specializes in the antique business, said a piece of furniture isn't necessarily an antique just because it is old.

Trend Shows Swim Pools Are Popular

NEW YORK, May 25 (AP)—By 1970, if present trends continue, one out of every 32 home owners in the United States may have a back yard swimming pool and the number of pools may total 125 million. At present, about one out of 120 homes has a pool.

Figures compiled by Swimming Pool Age show a sharp rise in construction since 1950, with all pools totaled 56,000. At the end of 1961, there were 363,000. Home pools comprised 248,000 of this total, which includes hotels, motels, clubs and apartment houses.

These statistics indicate the days when only a millionaire could aspire to having a swimming "hole" are gone. Though no median income figure is available, many California families in the \$5,000 to \$8,000 annual salary range are building pools. Though pool prices run highest in California, construction is increasing in other parts of the country.

Based on figures from 1956 to the end of 1961, the highest percentage of growth was in Florida, with an 850 per cent increase. The North Carolina surge, with second with 821 per cent—increasing from 5,000 to 54,450 in the six-year period. Though California still has the most pools, 129,000, its 417 per cent rate of growth is second lowest. Lower is the Northwest, where pools increased 251 per cent. In the Midwest, pools increased by 722 per cent.

Preberg Struggles Gypsies Labor, Thinkers—Again

HOLLYWOOD, May 25 (AP) — That Stan Preberg has lost again and this time he has engaged disgruntled labor, unemployed gypsies and assorted free thinkers.

In the past adman-comedian Preberg has incurred the wrath of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Indian tribes, the city of Omaha and other groups.

His current ad campaign in newspapers and on radio for an eastern tea company includes instant fortunes on the tags attached to the company's tea bags. Among the fortunes are:

"You will meet a tall internal revenue man," "You are going to take a long trip," "They have found oil about the money" and "The (date) will find out about that week-end in Phoenix," which was censured by the tea company as being too racy for their production.

To placate tea drinkers further Preberg took ads in New York and Boston newspapers patterned after those of unions and management locked in a labor dispute.

On behalf of the gypsies Preberg invented the American Federation of Gypsies (local 42) whose ads shrilled: "Who threw the gypsies out of work? It went on to read, "Over 5,000 unemployed gypsies and tea-leaf readers in America today and you can lay the blame squarely at the well-shod feet of the tea company."

Denying it has eliminated the middle class or women from the tea leaf reading, Preberg's ads in defense of the company ran: "What with the American Federation of Gypsies holding perfect meetings over our parking lot here in Woburn so that an executive can't even step out of his car without putting his foot through a tambourine, we feel some sort of explanation is in order."

While the ads were all in fun, they brought repercussions.

"I originally wanted to take ads in the Wall Street Journal and the Daily Worker," said Preberg, "but the tea company objected. The company also got letters from people defending the gypsies and there were rumors about the poor gypsy union — which doesn't exist."

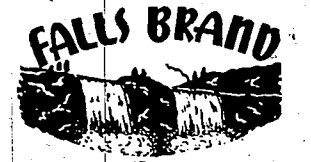
