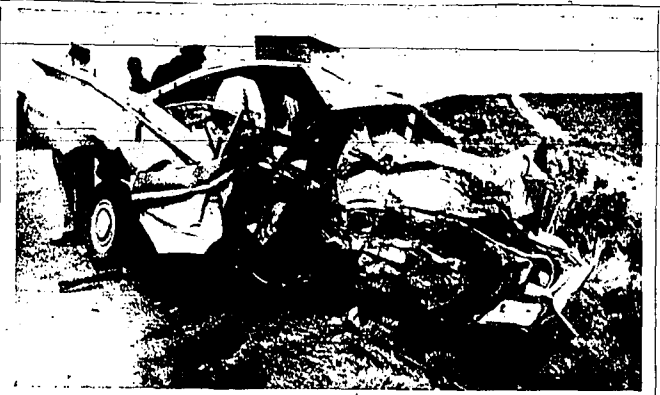

WASHINGTON (AP)—The hope of a real reconciliation between management and labor on President Kennedy's formula of wage increases has been dashed by a productivity gap that has been widely reported because of the two groups' firm positions on this proposal. It is caught between friend and foe.

The blowups of industry have fully recovered from the shock they suffered after their employees voted to increase the wage battle. They showed their new confidence in their hostile stand against the Kennedy formula by supporting the public representatives.

Battle is Joined

Medical care for the aged is the subject of a hot battle being waged primarily between the federal administration and the American Medical Association, although other factions have more than a passing interest in the issue. The battle will be fought right down to the wire and neither side pulling any punches.

The primary action of the administration is House passage of the King-Anderson bill which would provide medical care for the aged under the social security program.

President Kennedy launched the administration's plan of efforts on behalf of the measure when he spoke in Madison Square Garden. It didn't take the American Medical Association long to answer from the same platform. The doctors are opposing the program chiefly on the claim that it would reduce aged patients to the status of numbers and would result in loss of personalized service for individuals. It is also ineffectual because such a program would be opening the way for full-blown socialized medicine.

Long range prediction of irrigation water supplies can be tricky due to unpredictable changes in weather conditions into the future. Projecting figures and data too far into the future creates too many chances for stubbing toes. In addition, there's the possibility that what might be a wet year or causing unnecessary alarm and concern over a water shortage that never develops.

Last September, Snow Survey Supervisor Morlan Nelson was quoted as saying that a Pugetall meeting in Idaho might be in for another year of critical water shortage, "unless there is a drastic change in the present precipitation trend." The Times-News pointed out that September was too early to be trying to "call" for a situation that might not develop.

Now Mr. Nelson has been quoted as saying that the water shortage that has prevailed for several years "has been definitely broken." Again, the Times-News suggests the assertion is premature.

Certainly the water shortage has been interrupted, at least for this year, but what about a year from now? Isn't it too early to be predicting that a cycle is ending or a wet cycle of weather is beginning? Anyway, it would serve no purpose to predict the end of a dry cycle now when there's always the chance for a dry summer and winter with a resulting water shortage.

Mr. Nelson's title of snow survey supervisor is a good description of his work. He's generally regarded as one of the nation's foremost experts on analyzing snow measurement and water supply. How much irrigation water will return? Before planting time each spring Mr. Nelson can predict the available irrigation water supply with a good deal of accuracy. For most farmers' purposes, that's quite sufficient.

One storm or one wet spring isn't enough to herald the end of a dry spell. Mr. Nelson has said so himself.

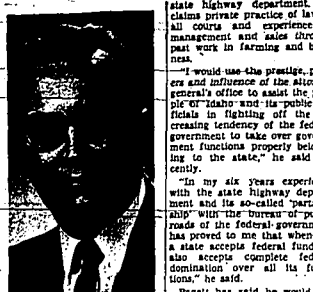

"I would use the prestige, powers and influence of the attorney general's office to assist the people of Idaho and its public officials in fighting off the increasing tendency of the federal government to take over governing functions properly belonging to the state," he said recently.

"In my six years experience with the state highway department and its so-called 'partnership' with the bureau of public roads of the federal government has proved to me that whenever the state accepts federal funds it also accepts complete federal domination over all its functions."

Padgett has said he would use his membership on the board of examiners to correct the damage done to the state's credit and reputation by "the obstructive tactics of Attorney General Frank Benson."
