Boy's Body Is Found in Mine Shaft

Social Needs Discussed at Rupert Meet

RUPERT, May 30—The need for a family counseling center was stressed at the May 30 luncheon meeting of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

He pointed out there are three types of family counseling: physical, mental and emotional. Of the three, the mental angle receives the most attention, and is really the most important as far as character and happiness are concerned, he said.

The help could be given free to those who are unable to pay, he said, with fees scaled to the parents' ability to pay.

Committee members were urged by the speaker to investigate the needs he had pointed out, and to take some action to remedy it.

Winnipeg, shop lifting, gang activities and scholastic failures in a community show a need for better supervision and mentoring by the Rev. King stated.

Paul Taylor, boys counselor from Mendota county, highlighted some of the available scholarship, and asked the chamber to consider making a grant available for one.

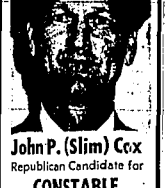

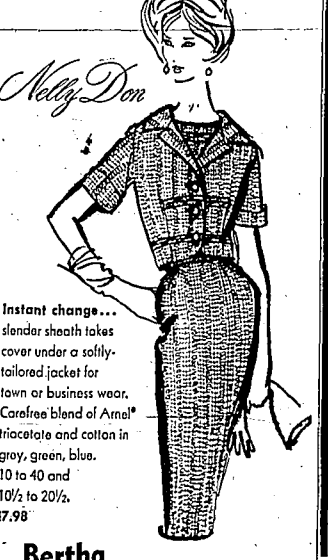

Once through the Tanana they plan to go by kayak up the Anaktuvuk and Colville rivers, emerging in the Arctic ocean at Harrison Bay, now named Padda, the remaining 250 miles to the village of Barrow, Alaska.

Only Weber has made additional plans and he will go to New Mexico. The others said they would decide later what to do next "for a little excitement."

Reelection of Controversial Benson Has Secondary Role

BY WILLIAM HUBBARD
BOISE, May 30—The reelection effort of the controversial figure in Idaho government has been strangely overshadowed in the Gen state's 1962 primary election campaign.

With the voting just a week away, top attention is given to the contests for governor, the lieutenant governor and the five-man Republican race for congress in the second district.

Even the candidates for state mine inspector and state auditor

All three of Benson's challengers have tried without success to change the attorney general in a public battle over his record in office. But the man who often responded respectively to his critics during the first three years of his term, has chosen to remain silent in this contest.

Whether you agree with him or not, you cannot deny that Benson has played a dramatic role in the operations of state government.

To some, he has been the defender of the rights of the average citizen. Others see him as an obstructionist who always charge has seriously handicapped some governmental departments.

The balding former school teacher became the state's chief legal officer in the Democratic landslide of 1953. When Robert F. Schure was the only Republican returned to the state office, Benson's strategy was to attack down steadily by the courts and the state supreme court charged him for "unprofessional" conduct.

He was the target of sharp criticism in the legislative arena and Republicans attempted to strip him of all of his legal powers and cut his office appropriation.

But the Democrats came to their rescue and in the election of 1955, when Benson was re-elected, they were the only ones who have been against the state highway department, the state insurance fund, the children's commission and the attorney general has not been shy in his criticism of others who have disagreed with his own style.

His actions have made the leaders of his own party shudder and most of the top Democrats in the legislature have made an error of their support of Gov. Benson.
