

Stock Market Continues to Stage Gains

NEW YORK, May 31 (AP)—Spurred by worldwide buying, the stock market extended its brisk rise today but momentum of the advance eased under profit-taking. At its peak the rally wiped out the mammoth loss of Monday. By late afternoon key stocks held substantial gains. Profit-taking had cut into some of the gains, however, with the New York stock exchange's high-speed ticker tape running more than one hour and a half late, the trading pace was even more frenzied than Tuesday. When 14,775 million shares changed hands, some brokers estimated the day's turnover might reach 16 million shares. The record is 16,000,000 shares traded Oct. 29, 1929.

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Three-a-Day Limit Placed On Cutthroat

BOISE, May 31—There will be a three-a-day limit on cutthroat trout per day or in possession on the Middle fork of the Salmon river with the general fishing season opens Monday, June 4, the fish and game department reminded anglers today.

However, the trout limit of 15 fish, seven pounds and one fish still applies to other kinds of anglers and Dolly Varden are used to make up the difference.

That is the way James C. Simpson, chief of fisheries management explains the new regulation.

"The Middle fork of the Salmon river is one of the few rivers in the nation where self-propagating cutthroat trout populations still abound in a primitive state," he pointed out. "And the fish and game department wants to keep it that way."

Salmon, a tributary of the Clearwater is Idaho's second cutthroat trout stream.

Upwards of a thousand anglers a year float down the river on rubber rafts. With this increasing pressure and catch along the 100-mile expanse of the Middle fork through the turbulent heart of Idaho's million-acre primitive area, the cutback in cutthroat trout bag and possession limit is necessary to protect this resource.

Three Idaho Democrats, including the incumbent, are seeking the party's nomination for lieutenant governor in the primary election Tuesday.

Competing for the nomination are William E. Drevlow, incumbent, Craigmont; state Rep. Ralph Litton, St. Anthony; and Russell C. (Bud) Larsen, Kimberly.

Drevlow is a native of Minnesota and moved to Idaho in 1923. He has lived in Craigmont since 1943 and operates a hardware store. He served three terms in the Idaho house of representatives, and two in the senate before being elected lieutenant governor in 1938. He announced early for governor, but later withdrew to run for reelection.

He suffered a blood clot in his leg last summer, a state board tour, last summer and underwent amputation. He now has an artificial leg, but usually uses crutches in getting around.

Drevlow served more than five months as acting governor in the absence of Gov. Robert E. Smythe during the past four years.

Litton has lived in St. Anthony since 1923 where he practices law. He has served twice in the state senate and once as senate attorney and now is a member of the house. He has served seven terms as prosecuting attorney of Fremont county.

WASHINGTON, May 31—President Kennedy has proved to be an astute general proponent of inaction in refusing to repair Wall Street as an intangible indicator of economic recovery, and by failing to use his influence to inspire an upward movement in the price of stocks.

He shows, publicly at least, a consistent concern over the fact that prices have fallen to their lowest point since January 1961. He has, in fact, entered the White House. He has bound because he anticipates improvement in the second half of the year.

Nor does he blame Congress, a certain former president have done. And delay in enacting or deferring legislation which directly affects both small and large investors. The measure in question is the income tax bill which will raise the 1962 revenue bill and a new farm program. All will have some kind of an effect on investors and industrial plans for expansion.

NO MIRROR ON WALL—His indifference contrasts sharply with a consistent concern over the fact that prices have fallen to their lowest point since January 1961. He has, in fact, entered the White House. He has bound because he anticipates improvement in the second half of the year.

Even after the black October, 1959, Hoover insisted that the country was "fundamentally sound" and that prices would rise. He blamed the stock market crash largely on foreign factors, such as the collapse of German and Austrian financial institutions.

WAIT ON "ECONOMIC HOYALISTS"—FDR really "killed" the personal, political economy, and "with good reason." The New York intellectuals opposed every one of his social and economic programs. He was a "hooyalist" of depressing price deliberately so as to discredit his policies. Truman reacted this way.

President Kennedy could have adhered to the same way because the bear market began almost immediately after he took office. The financial community is generally hostile to the New Frontier, especially as reflected in the fact that the "big" stock market is "higher" than in contrast, he is too partial to organized labor.

ADJUSTMENT—The political restraint over the markets alone, however, is looked upon as a favorable sign. It could mean that he deliberately avoids an all-out assault on the moguls of business, industry and finance.

Numerous industries have canceled or deferred plans for expansion. The Federal Reserve's refusal to abide by the Kennedy formula that wage rates should be equated with increased productivity is a major factor.

BEFORE YOU INVEST
Speculators who fancifully plot word gambling — is once more rearing its iron pyramidal head in a number of familiar areas on the American continent. It is the Federal Reserve commission, the securities and exchange commission, and the better business bureaus cannot keep their heads above water.

COVERING THE CAPITAL WITH PETER EDSON

When you add them all up, you find the operating bill for the fiscal year 1963, an economy-manipulating government and directed toward the public good.

To implement this plan, President Kennedy is seeking new federal powers in almost every important economic field. He is, in actual fact, asking for more power than he has ever had.

There are some of the new powers the President has asked congress to give him:

1. The power to cut taxes as much as five per cent without the prior approval of congress.

2. The power to influence the economy by directing the flow of goods and services through authority to appoint his own chairman of the federal reserve board.

3. The power to launch massive new public works programs on his own initiative.

4. The power to control the federal deposit insurance corporation, the federal savings bank, the federal savings and loan insurance corporation and the federal housing administration.

5. The power to cut tariffs as a huge, unprecedented tariff program.

6. The power to extend federal income taxes.

7. The power to control the flow of money into and out of the country through a department of war finance.

Smokescreen

The majority party in congress is in position to claim all credit for the accomplishments of congress, yet on the other hand it also has to accept the blame for unpopular legislation or failures. Organized congressmen rely heavily on the majority party, which takes the chairmanship of all committees and a majority on every committee.

Nevertheless, the majority party cannot shift responsibility or failures to the minority party, if the majority cannot attain its aims while being in numerical control, then obviously the majority has failed to retain discipline in its own ranks.

During a Democratic lull in Washington the other day, Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman and Idaho Representative Harding were discussing the prospects of the farm bill. Mr. Freeman volunteered the information, "It will be a tough fight to get it out of committee."

Mr. Harding would have been far more honest about committee prospects if he had pointed out the possibility of reduced farm income joining Republicans to keep the bill in committee. The blame rests with the Democrats, not the GOP.

Legislation of a partisan nature inevitably leads to more or less party line voting. In the case of the farm bill, for example, it is easy to see that every effort will be made by the Democrats to win a solid vote from party members but at the same time Republicans are lining up solid opposition. If the majority fails to attempt, it is likely to lose the vote.

Voters are not likely to be fooled by such misleading political tactics that tries to saddle the minority party with the failures of the majority. It's a matter of simple arithmetic.

Area Anglers Reminded of Courtesy, Regulations for Opening of Season

Maglo Valley anglers preparing for the opening day of the general fishing season are reminded of courtesy and regulations for opening of season.

The general season opens Monday at 4 a. m. with advance of Maglo Valley favorite spots being held off of special openings.

Included in the special opening category are all lakes and tributaries in the Big Lost river drainage, which opens July 15.

While most of the waters are open to fishing from 4 a. m. to 10 p. m., there are some exceptions. Claver's Ingon, near the Haystack in the Silver Creek area, and Riley Creek, and the lake near the Haystack, are restricted to the hours between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m.

The lakes within the refuge, known as the Frank Oiler lake, and all sloughs and impoundments east of Highway 30 have the limit of five fish.

Boats and rafts are prohibited in the Silver Creek and Lake Cleveland. Anglers planning on using boats on Lake Washington come under the federal regulations on boating.

Motor boats are not allowed on boats or rafts on Crane Falls lake or Sublett and Dog Creek reservoirs.

Dead fish and parts of fish may be in possession and used for bait in any of the waters except those under special regulations. Use of live minnows or fish in any waters is prohibited.

The daily limit for trout and kokanee may not be more than seven pounds and one fish but may not exceed 15 fish.

Will urged all anglers to obtain the free set of regulations made available by the department through license vendors.

Since the Silver Creek area usually attracts large numbers of fishermen considerable controversy has raged between anglers and land owners. Most landowners have agreed to fishermen using portions of the stream as it

meanders through their lands on a specific basis.

"If anglers and fishermen should read and comply with all posting in the area. Private property should be entered only at designated access sites and the use of stiles should be mandatory. He

urged fishermen to observe the no camping signs and refrain from using firewood. Fishermen should follow the bank of the stream closely, rather than cut across cropland and fields.

Two large areas are provided for access and camping by the department at the Haystack hatchery and another site north of the power sub-station on state highway 23. Directional signs have been placed to aid in locating the latter site.

Boat owners are reminded by Twin Falls county sheriff James Brennan that every boat must be licensed and have a valid identification number clearly visible on the bow of the boat. All safety requirements must be met.

The sheriff's department in each county along with the Idaho state patrol are charged with enforcing the boating laws. Lt. M. J. Byers, Jr., announces trained officers are available to speak on these regulations to any interested club or group. Arrangements may be made by calling Lieutenant Byers.

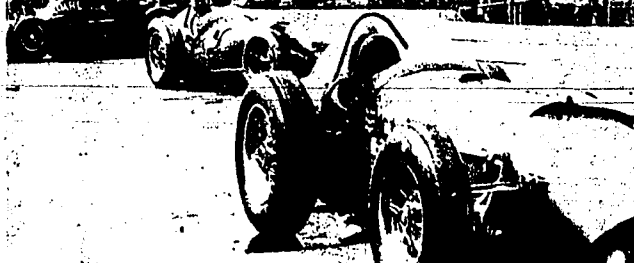
