

Heavy Turnout S Predicted in Idaho's Primary

Heavily battles over gambling, taxes and power and caucus campaigns for a number of offices are expected to attract a larger-than-usual turnout Tuesday in Idaho's primary election. The predictions range from 110,000 to 140,000 votes, with about an equal number expected to call for Republican and Democratic ballots. Balloting will begin at noon and the polls will close at 8 p. m. in the 390 precincts of the state.

Young said, "Insecticides are recommended. However, one of the most effective is Permethrin in 100 gallons water will result in good control. Insecticides which are recommended are malathion, chlordane, parathion, diazinon and malathion plus methidathion.

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Terrorists' Bid Spurned By Moslems

121 Americans Die In Flaming Jet's Crash Near Paris

PARIS, June 4 (AP)—A chartered Air France liner faltered on its final approach to New York Sunday and skidded into a flaming crash that killed 130 persons. It was the worst single-plane disaster in aviation history. Only two persons, both airline hostesses, survived. All 121 passengers were Americans. Most were cultural leaders of Atlanta, members of the Atlanta Art association heading back to the Georgia capital with happy memories and souvenirs of a three-week tour of European cultural sites and art galleries.

Others who died were eight crewmen and Air France's Atlanta agent.

The plane, a four-engine Boeing 707, lifted only a few feet from the runway in clear, bright weather. Then it pancaked down and, ripping through an airfield fence, thundered across 300 yards toward the hamlet of Villeneuve le Iton.

The six-million-dollar airliner, pushing flames, raced across a rolling, wooded slope to a halt at the doorstep of houses in the hamlet. The fuel tanks exploded.

The grieving mayor of Atlanta, Ivan Allen, arrived in Paris today to help identify the bodies of the victims—many of them his personal friends.

The mayor was accompanied by the newsmen in an emotional city attorney of Atlanta. They were met by officials of Air France, Orly airport, the Paris city council, the foreign ministry and the ministry of public works.

With tears in his eyes, the mayor told newsmen in an emotional, filled voice that he had come to France under "particularly tragic conditions." He said the elite of Atlanta had died in the accident.

Allen said he had come to Paris on behalf of the residents of Atlanta to view the scene of the crash and to hear official reports on the accident.

He expressed thanks to everyone who had attempted to save the passengers.

"I know all of those who died Sunday," the mayor said. "We were of the same generation and many of them were childhood friends."

Allen said he would stay in Paris until all the bodies had been identified and their return to Atlanta assured.

Pretty Françoise Aubert, one of the hostesses, said: "It was terrible. So sudden. I didn't have time to realize what was going on."

Witnesses said Capt. Roland Hoche, one of Air France's most experienced pilots, apparently died frantically to halt the engine after engine trouble developed as roared down the runway, but the plane was going too fast.

The blast from the exploding fuel tanks scuttled the village residents just sitting down for lunch.

The takeoff just before 1 p. m. was in clear, bright weather—one of Paris' sunniest days this summer.

Webb Replies to Heap's Statements

"It is record fact ascertainable from many sources; the county and state records, the senior district judge, the supreme court, the lawyers who have practiced in this area for many years. I cannot believe that a district judge would try to deny recorded fact, but I am sure that if I had a chance to decide whether this indicates an inability to recognize his own falling or whether it is merely a campaign tactic—to spring a denial when he thinks it cannot be answered. Webb, I cannot believe that anyone is so busy that in eight weeks he cannot spare an hour to refute a statement if it is untrue; the inaccuracy of his statement and its timing is glaring."

Webb added that Heap did not deny his statements about Webb, but only attempted to excuse it. Webb said that Heap has significantly less work than Ward, yet required help.

Webb said that for a district judge in this state can draw his salary he must sign an affidavit advising that no matter submitted to him for longer than 30 days remain undecided. For a period of 24 months during Judge Heap's tenure of office he was unable to sign such an affidavit and was unable to draw his salary.

Webb questioned Heap's recollection that said there were no decisions pending in the court. Webb also said, "The most amazing part of his statement is my belief that he asked the Idaho Falls judges to come. They were sent, and I have permission to quote the senior district judge for this by the governor and the supreme court, with the concurrence of Judge Ward."

Ball denied that the department strictly discouraged the use of such words as "victory" in reference to the cold war.

As Ball made a return speech before the armed services subcommittee studying alleged misdeeds of the military, Chairman John C. Stennis made public the state department's written reasons for nearly 100 deletions from Pentagon speeches.

Ball testified that he felt they showed that the department had done its reviewing "in a credible and responsible manner."

Ball said that since he and other state department witnesses testified in February three "steps toward improvement" had been taken. He said the department had tightened up its speech review procedures.

Panel Predicts Large Increase In Atom Power

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Atomic power plants will be built in "significant numbers" around the world in the next 10 years, according to a report submitted to the government. The panel of experts making the prediction said the trend is due to the advantages of the atom. It recommended that in most cases such projects could be carried out through a national international atomic energy agency, which includes the United States. The panel, headed by Dr. Henry D. Smyth—Princeton professor and U. S. representative to the international atomic agency in Geneva, warned, however, that "without effective worldwide controls, commercial nuclear products" can be readily diverted to the manufacture of atomic weapons.

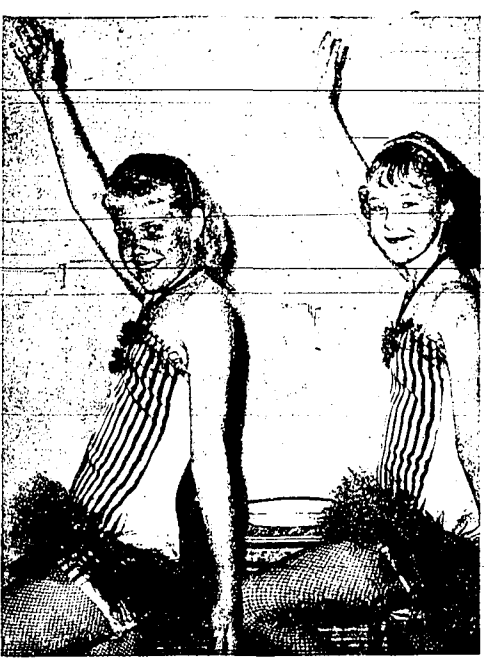



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Senate Quiz In Gold Price Is Scheduled

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—A bill designed to stimulate gold mining will get a Senate quiz next week. The bill will require cabinet members to appear before the Senate if they do not hear the Kennedy administration is opposed to the bill, hence the cabinet members would be "quizzed" exactly as to appear.

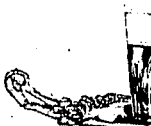

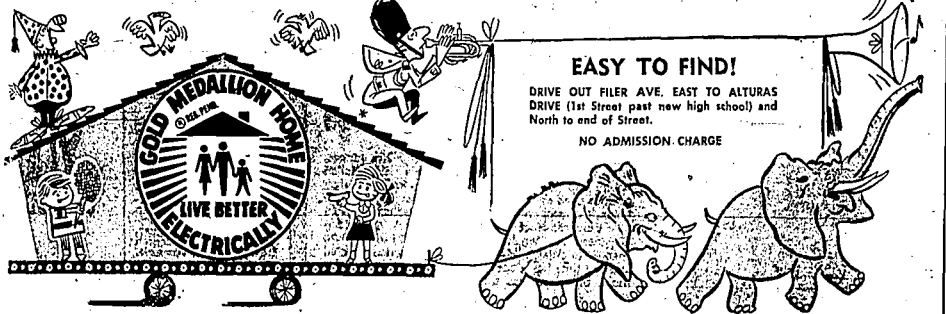

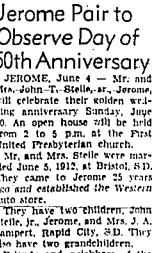

Woman Anthropologist to Study African Nyiha Tribe

NEW YORK, June 4—Attention woman anthropologist and the mind usually imagines a sturdy, tailored type digging in the joints of an ancient civilization.

Then comes along Dr. Marjane Slater to break that image. Anthropologist Slater has red-brown hair, blue brown eyes and a friendly smile. She is five feet six inches barefoot and weighs 115 pounds.

On June 30, the 30-year-old anthropologist will start her field work to study the Nyiha tribe in an isolated area of the Nyasa-Tanganika corridor in the southeastern coastal area of Africa.

According to the anthropologist, little first-hand knowledge of the Nyiha exists in research literature. The pioneering studies were done by Dr. Monica Wilson, whom Dr. Slater plans to visit at the University of Capetown.

She does know that the tribe believed number about 60,000. It is semicircular, and that its members are cultivators who depend on millet and on milk from their cattle at their food staples.

Various groups of Nyiha, Dr. Slater said, have been on the Nyasa lake since the 1950s college staff.

She'll fit in. She has a white house and two interpreters to translate the complex Nyiha dialect into Swahili and into English.

Dr. Slater said the trip had been in the "thinking stage for more than a year," but the district council finally granted the Ford foundation granted her \$2,000 to help underwrite it.

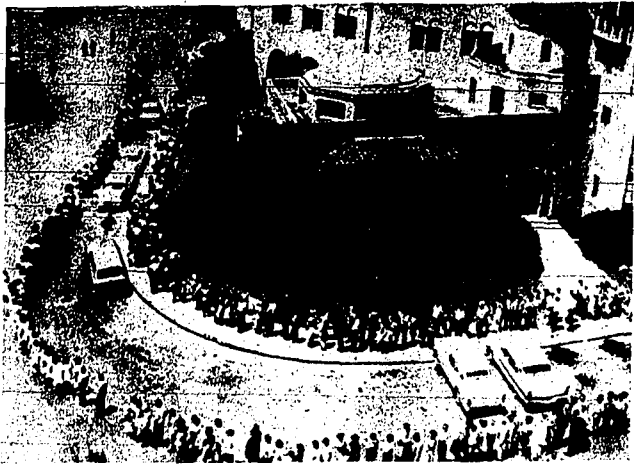

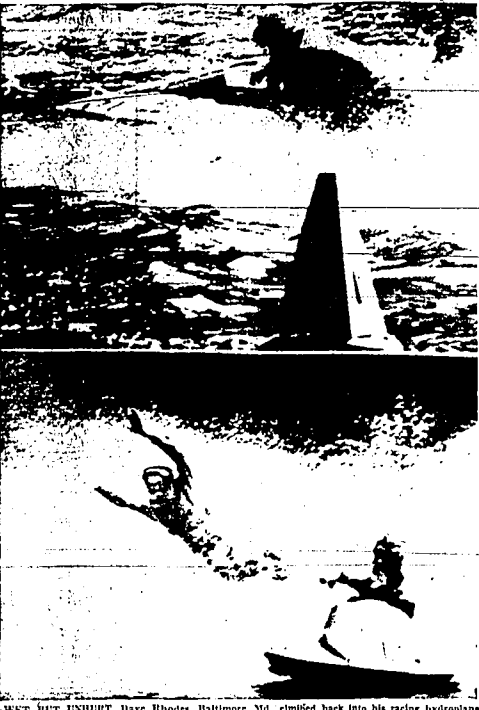
