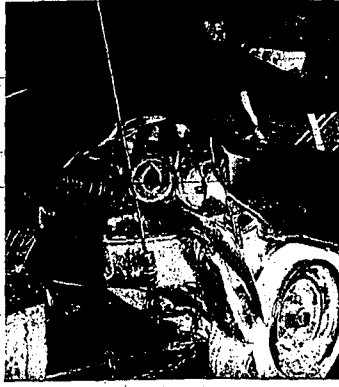

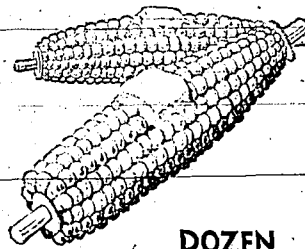

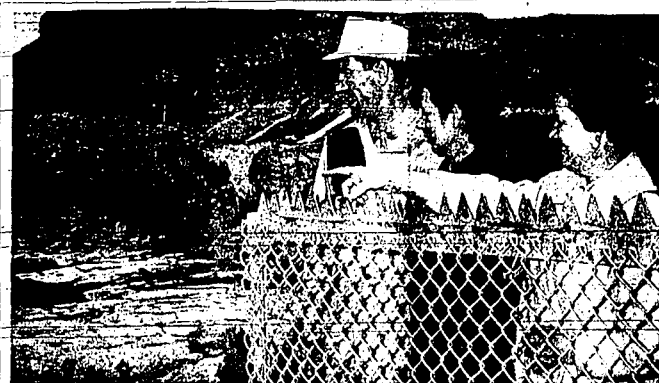

**Regulations Changed on Youth Jobs**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7 (Special)—Retail and service establishments may now apply for certificates permitting hiring of full-time students at less than the "federal minimum" wage. The regulations were announced today by Frank J. Muench, regional director of the U.S. labor department. He said the new regulations will allow wage and hour and public contracts divisions. New regulations on employment of full-time students 14

through 18 years old by such establishments will become effective June 10. When new certificates will be required. Interim regulations have governed such employment since September 2, 1961, when amendments to the fair labor standards act (federal wage-hour law) became effective. The regulations require that such employment be limited to types of jobs not normally filled by full-time employees, and to no more than ten per cent of the total hours worked by all employees in the establishment. Full-time students hired under the certificates must be paid 80 per cent of the applicable minimum wage; generally 80 cents an hour, at present. The 14- through 18-year-olds may work only 24 hours a week when school is in session, 40 hours when it is not, and no more than eight hours per day. Youngsters 14 and 15 may work only 18 hours per week and three hours per day when school is in session. They may work up to eight hours per day and 40 per week in non-school weeks. They may not work after 7 p.m. before 7 a.m. vacation employment under the certificates is available only to those who will return to school in the fall. Applications for certificates may be obtained from the U.S. department of labor, wage and hour and public contracts divi-
