Island Normal After Atom Test.

PERTH, Australia, June 11 (AP)—An Australian naval officer reported today that life had returned to normal in the Monte Dello Islands where the British conducted atomic tests in 1952 and 1956.

The Islands lie off Western Australia's northwestern coast. Commander W. B. Marks, naval officer in charge of Western Australia, said the Australian warship, H.M.A.S. Dianantima, conducted tests at Perononnie from the islands where it had checked radioactivity for seven days.

Marks said the warship's personnel had found plentiful marine life, including giant turtles, in the waters around the island. "Vegetation was growing, once more on the islands and rats and human excreta were air-soiled," Marks said.

U. S. Extends Danger Areas At Test Site

HONOLULU, June 11 (AP)—Extension of the United States high altitude danger area around Johnston Island was announced today as a preliminary to the firing of the biggest nuclear blast of the Pacific test series.

There was no official comment from joint task force eight on the precise altitude and size of the detonation but unofficial sources said it will be from 500,000 times as powerful as the bomb that destroyed Hiroshima.

There have been reports it will be of several megatons in force. A megaton blast is the equivalent of the explosion of a million tons of TNT.

The blast will be set off about 200 miles high, the sources said. It will be the highest and most powerful nuclear test in U.S. history and will be seen in Hawaii 700 miles northeast of Johnston Island.

The joint task force commission and the defense department announced Saturday that the nuclear test series surrounding Johnston Island will be extended 60 miles by Tuesday to a radius of 200 miles from the test level. It will be increased 200 nautical miles at 20,000 feet, to a radius of 200 miles.

3 Candidates Are Close in Peru Polling

LIMA, June 11 (AP)—Three leading candidates in Peru's presidential election were closely bunched today in partial, unofficial returns.

Official indications were that the now congress might have to elect the nation's chief executive from the leading trio of contenders. None appeared headed for the required 34 percent of the valid votes.

An early trend favoring former dictator Manuel A. Odría ended in a narrow victory for the incumbent, General Odría, in the early stages of the election.

The newest trend bunched Odría with Fernando Belaunde Terry of the leftist Popular Action party. The four other presidential candidates were clearly out of the running.

Appropriation Bills Heading Senate Agenda; House Busy

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The senate and house plunge into a full week of business this week for the first time this year.

A little bit of something for almost everybody but the taxpayers is on an unusually heavy docket.

Two appropriation bills top the list of four bills in the senate. They call for an outlay of 48 billion dollars to finance the defense program for the fiscal year starting next month and 92 million dollars for the fiscal year starting next month.

Once they are out of the way, the senate plans to take up bills dealing with all-channel television and a space communications satellite system. They, too, have passed the house.

The House starts its week with a bill to take care of women workers. It would provide that women should receive the same pay as men if they do the same work.

Tuesday the house will take up the controversial Fringing-Arkansas defense program project. That will be followed on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday by

Stockpiling Sale Halted, Witness Says

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—A government expert testified today that several federal agencies have blocked attempts to recover hundreds of millions of dollars for the taxpayers by selling stockpile surplus.


The witness, John J. Croston, administrator of the general services administration, said for example that the commerce and interior departments in the recent weeks declined to permit the sale of 115 million pounds of nickel—all of which is in excess of requirements.

Croston said the agencies feared the possible impact on producers but that he was hopeful the general public would not mind. Nickel now is selling for 70 cents a pound, sharply higher than the 40-cent price paid for part of its stockpile.

Croston's testimony prompted chairman Stuart Symington of the special senate stockpile investigating committee to call for quick enactment of legislation to speed disposal of an estimated 3.4 billion dollars worth of surplus items from the 77 billion dollar stockpile.

Sen. Clair Engle, D., Calif., said industry leaders are writing red tape into the disposal law. Under this law, congress must give specific approval to sales of all surpluses except for a few obsolete materials.



Solon Urges Reexamining Asia Policy

EAST LANSING, Mich. June 11 (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield, D., Mont., told a commencement day audience Sunday at Michigan State university that it's time for a reexamination of this nation's policy toward Southeast Asia.

"The senate majority leader and the administration's chief spokesman in the senate, said that he would yield little to the people of this nation and little to the people of Southeast Asia."

Mansfield said he doubted that U. S. traffic security and other interests justify indefinite commitment to the unilateral defense of the area. Rather, he said, his nation's interest is to gain "every possibility of minimizing the unilateral activity of the United States in Southeast Asia in every sphere."

He asked that "Draw clearly the distinction between what is strategically basic and what is transitory and peripheral in our interests with respect" to the area.

The unilateral supply of manpower and billions is at least "a mistake in the course of 'improvements' and 'at worst, it's a collision course," he said.

Archbishop Tells Catholic Schools To Admit Negro

ATLANTA, Ga., June 11 (AP)—The Roman Catholic church has ordered Atlanta archdiocesan schools desegregated this fall in a move supported by leading Catholic laymen and the mayor of Atlanta.

The historic decision applied to Catholic schools in the 11 north Georgia counties of the archdiocese where about 1,500 pupils are enrolled. The total includes 700 Negroes, all in Atlanta.

Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan said it was up to local bishops elsewhere in the archdiocesan province to decide what action to take in their areas. That included other sections of Georgia as well as North and South Carolina and Florida. All under the archbishop's titular control.

The desegregation decision was announced in a pastoral letter read during Sunday services in all the churches of the north Georgia archdiocese.

Youngsters 14 and 15 Are Permitted New Job Choices

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11—Students in the 14- and 15-year-of-age bracket will find a new wide range of job in store, service stations, cafeterias and other recreational establishments open to them under the recently amended child-labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Frank J. Mursch, regional director of the U. S. department of labor's wage and hour and public contracts divisions, cited a number of the new opportunities for youngsters and outlined the availability of revised, child labor bulletin No. 101 which spells out the new regulations covering them.

Effectively June 1, the new provisions permit 14- and 15-year-olds to engage in such jobs as office and clerical work, selling, price marking, stocking, bagging, ground and cleanup work in stores.

As employees in cafeterias and lunch counters, these youngsters may prepare and serve food and soft drinks, and operate dishwashers, dumb-waiters, milkshake blenders and coffee grinders.

At service stations, permissible work includes dispensing gasoline and oil, courtesy service and car washing by hand, but not work involving the use of pumps or lifting apparatus.

Among occupations not permitted for minors 14 and 15 years of age are work performed in boiler or engine rooms, maintenance or repairs of the establishment, outside window washing, cooking, fuel handling, operating power-driven food slicers or choppers and bakery-type mixers, work in freezers and meat coolers, loading and unloading trucks, operating or riding as a helper in a motor vehicle and all occupations in warehouses, except office and clerical work.

Occupations not permitted for minors 14 and 15 years are subject to the basic 18-year minimum of the act, unless they involve an occupation declared hazardous by the secretary of labor. The act sets an 18-year minimum for such occupations.

The amended regulation also retains the hours standards, which prohibit employment after 7 p.m. and limit the number

Hull Blasts Farm Control At Meeting

SHOSHONE, June 11—Gene Hull, Twin Falls county, Turkey farmer and opponent of federal farm controls, spoke before a joint meeting of the Lincoln-Blythe Pomona Orange and the Lincoln County Farm Bureau last week.

Introducing the subject of farm controls, Glen Doucet, president of the Lincoln County Farm Bureau, presented Hull.

Pointing out that "our forefathers came to America to enjoy freedom and progress," Hull said "we are now faced with people who disregard our heritage and control imposed threaten to bring us under the very bondage our forefathers fled the old countries."

Hull stressed the importance of respect for freedom and individual behavior, even to the point of being fined for the use of the United States.

He cited the turkey growers' attitude since a change of government controls and reporting on a meeting held in Los Angeles in November and December. This meeting, he said was conducted by a judge as he would conduct a trial and every speaker took an oath as witnesses with his testimony or statements open to question by those present following his statements.

Hull then pointed out that attorneys prove that only 11 per cent of those who receive payments from the government actually benefit from the payments.

"Farmers have decreased to seven million in number and they are no longer important in the minds of the majority of the American people," Hull warned.

"Their destiny as a secondary citizen is arranged when the proper series of party prices began and there has been a 34 per cent drop in the past ten years."

Hull explained that those in control in the U.S. are farm prices should be held and labor prices rise, to balance the two industries, but they were unable to hold down the increases in production costs and the farmer's costs of operation while his income goes down.

Comparing the way the laborer and farmer spends excess money, the laborer makes a luxury purchase or takes a vacation while the farmer shops for new equipment or ways to improve his farm.

"To conclude his remarks, Hull referred to a speech by Ronald Reagan, who spoke out against government controls.

Reagan said the supreme court canceled out the fourth amendment of the Bill of Rights when foreign aid was first set up, it was intended to last 15 months. He then pointed out that once a government agency is set up, it never goes out and in 1949 there were 100,000 federal employees for 80 people in the U.S. while in 1961 there was one for every 11.

"To overcome the problem, Hull suggested that every "right" thinking person should feel the same way about government controls and within a year's time something might be done about it.

A lack of interest among local people is evidenced in that far too many public officials are elected without any opposition at all, he said.

"In keeping with the information given by Hull, Wild Mills, public relations chairman for Lincoln county, Farm Bureau, spoke on the importance of relations between the farmer and the state's welfare of life. Farmers have dropped from 83 to 8 per cent of the population each week. Inflation is over \$200,000,000,000.

"The need to tell the farm story from the farmer's standpoint, was stressed by both Mills and Evan Hale, Pocatello, state Farm Bureau publicity chairman.

Hale said part of the problem defined lies with the farmer, because "the past few years they have become regarded as ignorant or unable to know what they want or should do."

He noted the value of public relations through newspapers, TV, radio, magazines and books and listed the four ways people see ideas. "It is most important that we are able to tell our own story," he said. Brochures should be prepared and the farmer needs to ask "who am I trying to reach and do I want something from

Hoffa Charges Negroes Ignored

WASHINGTON, June 11—Senator President-James E. Hoffa today accused President Kennedy of ignoring the plight of the "chronically poor," particularly Negroes with mental jobs.

Writing in the union's publication "Tumbler," Hoffa said Kennedy "seems not only content to play the game of ignoring the facts, but actually willing to establish guidelines which permanently fix the fate of the nation's chronically poor."

At the same time Hoffa's attempts to influence labor organizations to exercise restraint in wage and price demands "weigh most heavily" on minority groups.

Warsaw Pact Nations Want Berlin Talks

MOSCOW, June 11—The Warsaw pact nations published a declaration today favoring continued negotiations with the United States on the Berlin problem.

At the same time the communist bloc warned it is prepared to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany unless a satisfactory solution is found to the German issue.

The political consultative committee of the eight nations making up the pact met here last Thursday while the Soviet bloc council for mutual economic assistance conferred on economic problems.

The declaration, distributed by the Tass news agency, said: "It was unanimously reaffirmed that a German peace settlement through the conclusion of a peace treaty, liquidation of that basis of the occupationist regime in West Berlin and the establishment of a free city of West Berlin, conforms to the interests of European security and universal peace."
