VIENTIANE, Laos, June 12 (AP)—Already sniping at "American warmongers," pro-communist Prince Souphanouvong will take temporary command of Laos' new coalition government late this month.

Neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma, premier designate of the new government, said Tuesday he and rivaling leader Gen. Phoumi Nosavan will be in charge of the same time. During their absence, he said, the whole burden of state affairs will fall on Souphanouvong.

Phoumi, like Souphanouvong, stated to become a deputy premier, will lead a cabinet delegation to Switzerland June 24 or 25 to ratify the Geneva-Lao agreement on Laos pledging the little Southeast Asian nation to neutrality in the cold war.

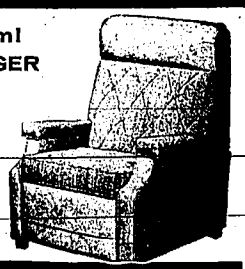

United States Is Preparing Atom Snoop

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Russia expected to resume atmospheric nuclear testing soon, American experts reported, is preparing to do a little snoop of its own.

The Russians have four instruments posted around Christmas and Johnston islands in the Pacific to gather information about the American test series which began April 25 and now has reached about the midway point. There is every reason to believe the Russians have collected considerable data in the week their ships have been there.

It is believed U. S. nuclear submarines which have proved their ability to operate in the Arctic area in winter—may have had a grandstand seat for the Russian modern American jets carry advanced gear and super-sensitive underwater listening equipment.

This radar can spot cloud formations—and that could include steam and hydrogen mushroom clouds—as far as 200 miles away.

Sound-detecting devices can pick up shock waves of the sort a nuclear blast might send through water.

A watching sub might mark the precise time of a nuclear explosion—a factor important in later analysis of the blast.

Such of the air sampling in the wake of Russian tests is done in the Alaskan archipelago, which lie in the path of the radioactive debris moving with prevailing winds.

American aircraft fly into these air masses, then open most ports which trap atomic particles. These particles are brought back to laboratories and are subjected to microscopic, chemical and spectrochemical analysis.

All this tells American scientists what materials went into the bomb, whether or device was efficient it was.

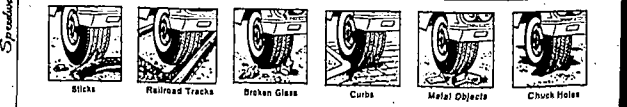

"He's the only 60-year-old in the world who has the condition to play these two first rounds in one day—until Saturday," observed another. "I've been here, especially the men from the mountains disappeared into the locker room."

"I just got whatling when they hand him the scorecard and pencil on Thursday," said a third. "Meaning that they all think that Sam Snead's game is still his with the equipment to win his first U.S. Open golf championship after 21 previous tries—but that they don't give him much of a chance of surmounting the mental barrier that the locker room ever so formidable in his case than the tight fairways and fast greens at Oakmont."

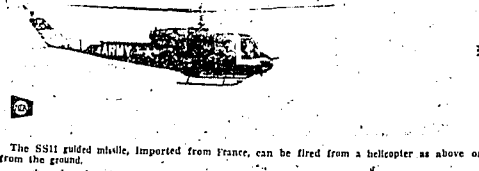

U.S. Army Reorganization Means Big Change in Way War Would Be Fought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The reorganization scheduled for the U.S. Army means a major change in the way our ground forces would fight in any future wars. It is inevitably going to mean a change in army tactics.

It assumes that a great portion of any fighting would be done in places like Southeast Asia, the Congo, the Middle East and Korea.

It assumes the army might have to fight without atomic weapons.

In Asia, the new tactics would be similar to those of the Japanese army in World War II and to the traditional tactics of the old-time cavalry.

In Europe, the tactics would

Oakley Event By Chorale Draws Crowd

OAKLEY, June 13—The world famous Oakley chorale presented the 100th anniversary of the LDS stakehouse Saturday evening before the second largest crowd in eight appearances.

The group was under the direction of Edward A. Sandgren, director, and Carol W. Hurst, accompanist. The program was devoted to religious songs and hymns with the chorale singing "The Morning Star," "Let Thy Holy Presence," and "Jesus Dearest Master."

This combination—in a battle in Europe—the infantry would keep close up with the tanks, using their armor and amphibious troop carriers. The tanks would be supported with self-propelled artillery.

The tank force would have a supply unit tailored to keep up. It could create the same sort of revolution in infantry-tank tactics that the massing of artillery created in 1918.

other new requirements which seem to inherent in the new structure.

The experts say these costs are heavy in many ways, with either the new organization or the old. The new organization, they say, doesn't change these needs. It merely makes the army more suitable for 1964, 1965, 1966, and 1967.

But there's no doubt that this new organization has built-in mobility—enough helicopters in the division for airlifting a company of infantry, drone observation airplanes, a supply and maintenance organization of its own, command helicopters and planes, armored troop carriers in considerable number. These mobility needs point up glaringly the necessity for new equipment in sizeable numbers.

What the change in army organization and tactics? The answer to that question was found in Korea.

Essentially the war in Korea began as an imitation of World War II in Europe. But the tactics weren't right for the terrain; neither was the equipment. The equipment forces U.S. armies to the roads, North Koreans and Red Chinese took to the hills and gained some major advantages.

The Indochina war in which the French were clobbered and the fighting in Laos brought home new lessons. Standard infantry divisions were too rich in heavy armor and equipment. Therefore they were rounded and subject to ambush by small bodies of enemy troops armed with mines, mortars and automatic weapons.

Yet these same divisions, too mechanized for the Far East,
