

House OKays Bill For 308 Billion National Debt

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The house passed a bill today to raise the national debt limit to a record 308 billion dollars, after defeating a Republican effort to hold the ceiling at two billion dollars lower. The bill, which goes to the senate, where quick action is assured, unless congress acts, the limit—now 300 billion dollars—will automatically drop June 30 to 285 billion dollars, which may be almost nine billion dollars under the actual debt at that time. Republicans argued that the lower limit would force graining of spending plans and thereby checked defense officials in efforts to line up support for the bill.

A teller vote went against the Republican 308 billion dollar proposal 201 to 219 and the result was continued on a roll call, 234 to 145.

After voting in the move to raise the ceiling, the opposition Democrats concentrated on an effort to kill entirely the bill to raise the limit from 300 billion dollars to 308 billion dollars.

Defeat of the measure would force a quick compromise if it could do nothing but the limit will automatically drop June 30 to 285 billion dollars and the actual debt may be almost nine billion dollars higher at that time.

The vote on the proposed Republican substitute followed a speech from Rep. John W. Byrnes, R. Wis., that defense department personnel had guilty of criminal conduct in efforts on behalf of the higher limit.

Israeli Dies In Gun Fight Along Border

JERUSALEM, Israel, June 14 (AP)—An Israeli policeman was killed and three others wounded today in the first gun battle with Jordanians along the Israeli-Jordanian border dividing Jerusalem in four years.

The clash erupted near the Israel quarter of Jerusalem, Israel closed an immediate protest with the U. N. truce commission and U. N. observers moved in to investigate the incident.

Israeli officials said Jordanian opened fire on an Israeli patrol. They said one policeman was killed instantly and three others wounded, one of them seriously.

Although Israel has had several border clashes with Syria and Egypt in recent years, its last clash with Jordan was in November, 1957, when Jordanians and Israeli military detachments exchanged fire across the armistice line.

On the same day, Nov. 21, Jordan burned back the convoy 1958 had been sending twice a month to Mount Scopus, an Israeli enclave in Jordanian territory, on the ground the convoy was bringing gasoline for use in an Israeli fortification.

The clash did not lead to any more serious and the Mount Scopus dispute was settled a month later under U. N. auspices with both parties agreeing to the 1949 pact which concluded the enclave allowing Israeli convoys to supply it.

Congressman Charges Collusion To Estes, Commercial Solvents

WASHINGTON, June 14 (UPI)—Rep. Ross Bass, D., Tenn., charged today there was "collusion" between Commercial Solvents Corp., Billie Sol Estes and the agriculture department. The charge was emphatically denied by officials of Commercial Solvents, which produces a liquid fertilizer sold by Estes in West Texas.

Bass, a member of a house subcommittee investigating Estes' grain storage department to investigate the loss of \$10 million from the Texas land bank license from the agricultural department, testified that Commercial Solvents executed a \$200,000 loan to Estes on Dec. 1, 1958.

Water Pressure for Burley Is up Again

BURLEY, June 14—Water pressure in Burley was back to a satisfactory level Thursday morning after falling sharply Wednesday. Joe Hucksberger, city engineer, said a temporary connection with two irrigation wells was completed about 9:30 a.m. Thursday to bring the pressure back up to 55 pounds per square inch. Normal pressure is from 55 to 60 pounds. In parts of the city farthest from the wells, pressure is 40 pounds. After the pressure fell Wednesday, the city had to take one of its two pumps out of operation. When crews started lowering it to reach the water level it was found the underground water level had dropped.

Further investigation showed need for major repair on the pump, Hucksberger said. The work will require several days on the line.

Officials blamed low water conditions during the past five years for the drop in the level. The decline in water pressure had been noted in other cities in eastern France.

DeGaulle Murder Plot Is Foiled

VESULI, France, June 14 (AP)—An assassination plot against President Charles DeGaulle, the second in less than a month, was thwarted here today. A 42-hour search for he arrived here today on a meet-the-people tour to win support for Algerian independence.

Official sources revealed that six men of a secret army organization plotted to assassinate DeGaulle. The plot was foiled by a French commando unit detailed to kill the president when he visited the small town in eastern France.

3 Major Airlines Face Walkouts as Union Talks Fail

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Government efforts to settle long-standing labor disputes between three major airlines and the Flight Engineers International association collapsed today. Ron Brown, the AFL-CIO union's president, said a strike appeared inevitable. Brown was asked whether a walkout will take place on the three carriers—Pan American World Airways, Trans World Airlines and Eastern Air Lines. "It certainly appears so at this time," Brown replied. He said the 1,700 engineers employed by the three carriers had authorized a strike sometime this week. But he said he wanted to report back to the men involved in direct action with them on their wishes. Negotiations which extended for 24 hours broke off this morning.

Arthur J. Goldberg, said that further he approved unless the union was free to strike. Goldberg left immediately to report to President Kennedy, he said the carriers had accepted but the union had rejected a last-minute proposal by the flight engineer to submit the contract to a voluntary arbitration.

The union attorney, John Schwartz, told newsmen that arbitration would be industrial suicide. He said the union had offered to arbitrate wage and other issues but not the key controversy—whether members of the union will still have jobs on it planes when the carriers reduce present crews from four to three.

Joe Pridin, attorney representing the airlines, said that if the engineers asked for a work stoppage in the second irrevocable strike against a large segment of the air transport industry "over the head of the FAA."

Pridin referred to a six-day walkout in February 1961 that shut down airlines on the crew reduction issue. This was the most airline labor stoppage in history.

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Telephone Company At Albion Rapped

BOISE, June 14 (UPI)—The public utilities commission today ordered the Albion Telephone Company to get rid of two television sets and a trailer house which were not necessary to its operations. The commission, reporting on its investigation of the company's accounting and managing procedures, also told Albion to bill Pagosa Springs telephone company for all expenditures made in its behalf. The PUC said an effective collection policy has not been followed by Albion Telephone Company in order to keep all of its subscribers on an equal collection basis. It ordered that quarterly statements be submitted to the commission showing the individual amount of each subscriber's bill.

The commission said, the company should keep detailed records to substantiate the allocation of salaries and other expenditures to certain classes of plant and operating expenses.

It also ordered that the company should keep detailed records also kept in the state of Idaho, the PUC said, to be readily available for audit by the commission.

Sugar Quota System Gets Extension

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The House agriculture committee today on provisions for a five-year extension of the nation's sugar quota system.

The agreed terms would provide for an increased share of the market for domestic producers allocate new sugar quotas to 14 countries.

U.S. Impounds Art Collection Imported From Hong Kong

SALT LAKE CITY, June 14 (AP)—Customs agents impounded a collection of ancient Chinese art objects Wednesday which they said entered this country illegally from Hong Kong.

The 23-piece collection, part of which has been on display at the University of Utah Museum of Fine Arts, included vases, late ivory carvings, framed woven tapestries and jade. Some of the objects date back to the ninth century. The collection was valued at more than \$40,000.

"These are some of the finest objects I've ever seen," said E. B. Minickoff of Washington, D.C., chief of enforcement for the foreign assets control division of the U.S. treasury department.

Minickoff said the objects were brought into the United States over a period of years through San Francisco by Ed Grant Heston, a custom collector who died here. Heston is now studying for a doctoral degree in Asian antiquities in Seattle.

Minickoff said customs agents confiscated the collection for violation of foreign assets control regulations. The official said the case came under their jurisdiction, part of the trading with the enemy act, because the objects originated in communist China.

Heartening Vote

Filer residents set an excellent example for everyone when they turned out Tuesday to approve overwhelmingly a \$71,000 general obligation sewer bond. Only 26 of the 250 eligible voters failed to cast ballots, an almost unbelievable record of participation. The voting record of 205 to 18 in favor of the bond also is almost unbelievable.

Such bond issues require a two-thirds majority of the vote for approval. The vote here has been termed ridiculous and unrealistic. Yet Filer voters turned up with a 91.9 per cent majority, far more than the minimum requirement.

Here is an example of citizens living up to an obligation. True, the dependence of public health has been Filer's problem for some time and soon—about its sewage disposal, yet the warning could do nothing about assuring that Filer voters would approve. All the warning carried was the necessity to present the issue to the people.

Filer residents displayed unwillingness to increase taxes in any way, shape or form. It is heartening indeed to find the citizens of Filer ready to approve a \$71,000 debt for what generally is regarded as a community responsibility.

Their civic spirit is shown by their first place acceptance in Twin Falls. The first time a sewer bond proposal was presented, it was defeated and the second vote in which the project was approved didn't get anything like a 90 per cent majority.

Filer's citizens can take pride in the example they have provided.

FEE'D 'EM WHEAT!

Two stories appeared side by side on the first page of the Twin Falls News that day that served quite well to point up the ridiculousness of the whole grain production picture. One story concerned the department of agriculture prediction for a wheat crop this year totaling 1,057,000 bushels. The other story concerned the crop in Greece so that the wheat crop is expected to be some 200 million bushels less than last year and nearly 100 million bushels under the 10-year average. The other story concerned Greece and the Greeks are getting surplus aid from the U.S.

It sure makes a lot of sense for Greece to urge farmers to grow less wheat so they can get a handout from the United States which has a few million bushels stored away here and there. The worst part about the whole muddled mess is that Greece and other countries are coming to the point where they expect the handout and undoubtedly figure it's an obligation of the U.S. to provide it.

Here's the spectacle of an artificial price for wheat as an inducement for U.S. farmers to raise wheat which they sell to the government which turns right around and gives away what it can, to avoid building up already huge surplus stocks. The surplus gets so far out of hand that some device is needed to get program under which U.S. farmers are paid not to grow wheat. And Greece is discouraging growth of wheat in order to get-in-on-the-big-handout.

The U. S. taxpayer, being blind, goes right on paying the farmers for the whole thing until he gets out of the 'big dent year' and year out is a bigger tax bill!

ANOTHER REASON

It was no excuse for James Annett to declare his support for Orval Hansen in the Republican runoff election for second district congressman, particularly when Annett said he would do so because of the age of John Sanborn. The reference to Mr. Sanborn's age constitutes a low blow from the wrong side of the fence.

Certainly Mr. Sanborn, whose appearance belies his 76 years, is going to hear more about his age. If he defeats Orval Hansen and their age is a factor in the Mr. Sanborn can expect Rep. Rep. Hansen to keep picking away at his age for the November election. Mr. Sanborn would have a far more effective issue in pointing to Harding's newly blank record over two years in congress.

What isn't generally known is that Mr. Annett figured he had the election won. If he could persuade Mr. Sanborn to change his mind about filing, Mr. Sanborn ignored all of Mr. Annett's arguments and their age was the only factor more than that of the Annett statement in support for Hansen, "because it is my personal opinion that John Sanborn's age seriously handicaps him," indicates Mr. Annett was leading the sour grapes of DeLoach.

WHY RIGID

WASHINGTON, June 14 — American labor unions must pay attention to the fact that the big game which they sponsor, but they are exempt from the provisions of the Federal Reserve Act, the private investments estimated at more than \$500 million dollars. These investments are limited to more than 100 million dollars.

Despite many radical changes in the Federal Reserve Act, the conservative-house ways and means committee has not tampered with the Federal Reserve Act of 1934. There have been many complaints of its unfairness in that it favors the interests of the public over the interests of the labor unions. Besides, it has made labor unions into wealthy corporations which also function as powerful political organizations.

It is almost impossible to compile the wealth of organizations that exist. But by careful investment of dues, they now own public and private securities, mortgages, office buildings, apartments, banks, financial companies and other kinds of real property. In fact, organized labor has become "big business."

LABOR UNIONS TAX LOPHOLE — Section 301 of the 1954 code provides for the general exemption of labor, agricultural and horticultural organizations. It also allows for the exemption of their income shall be treated by the tax collectors.

Receipts from an official internal revenue letter on the subject shows how wide a lophole has been opened for labor unions by the Federal Reserve regulations thereunder. One paragraph reads:

"A labor organization, which establishes exemption from Federal income tax, is therefore not subject to tax on income, such as dividends and interest. However, it is subject to tax on unrelated business income."

Unrelated business income, in general, means income derived by certain exempt organizations from a business regularly carried on by them.

RELATIONSHIP DIFFICULT TO SEE — It would mean that this paragraph required payment of taxes on the income from the various kinds of labor union properties listed above. It is difficult to see any relation between these investments and the industries organized by George L. Henney's AFL-CIO, Walter E. Reuther's automobile workers union, and James R. Moffat's Teamsters and John L. Lewis' coal miners.

One paragraph of this internal revenue analysis shows what a broad construction has been placed on this section. It says:

"Income tax regulations provide that labor unions which are entitled to exemption are those which have as their object the betterment of conditions and a higher degree of efficiency of those engaged in their respective occupation."

ADVANTAGE OVER PRIVATE FIRM — The purpose of the Federal Reserve Act, in general, is the latter part. There is no tax on unrelated business income if it improves workers' conditions which are entitled to exemption and those union funds have been used to that effect.

Now is there any doubt that union income has done a lot of good for its members. It has built hospitals, schools, homes, and provided medical care, and it has provided pensions and out-patient care. But these would be lawful deductions from income.

However, their earnings have enabled them to compete on more favorable terms than private firms in the same line of business. These unions have been able to expand and expand and strike, placing the federal government in an unenviable position. They have financed the cost of such a tremendous figure as \$10th and his.

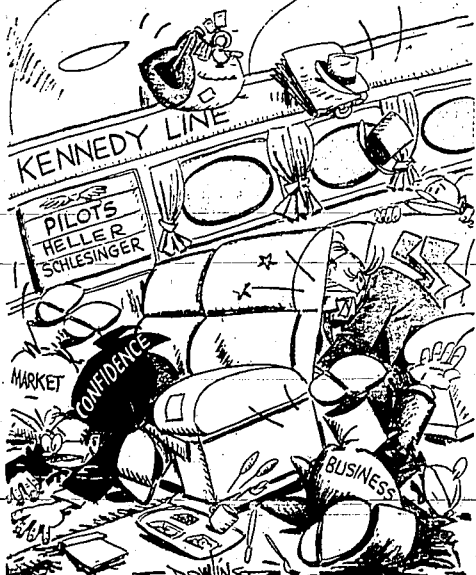

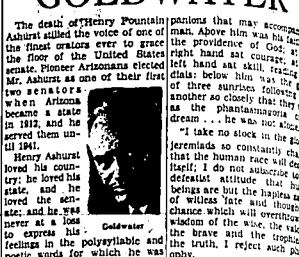

Red Terror Follows West Berlin Girl

BERLIN, June 14 (U)—The pretty, 18-year-old was terrified and with good reason. She had taken her life to escape to West Berlin but the specter of communism was still haunting her.

"I'm too terrified to move away from here ever since I got this letter," she told newsmen today at the West Berlin Marienfelde refugee camp.

The girl reached into a cheap plastic handkerchief, she pulled out a postcard. On one side were portraits and a bunch of roses. On the other side was her name and the address of the camp. In the space on the left were three ominous words, printed in block letters:

"You will be punished for your past."

She was one of 14 East Berliners who escaped to West Berlin last Friday aboard a communication rigger steambomb under a hail of East German bullets.

"Some of the others who escaped on the boat have gotten exactly the same postcards," she said.

"They are all terrified," the official said. "But they risk their lives to flee and then they get threats like this."

The postcards are printed in East Berlin. They can be purchased anywhere for 10 pennies (13 U.S. cents). They are mailed in West Berlin, bearing a West Berlin stamp and postmark.



Scots Protest Behavior of Yank Sailors

DUNOON, Scotland, June 14 (U)—Authorities here complained today that immorally, illegitimate and teen-age drunkenness in this remote seaside town have increased since it became a U.S. atomic-submarine base.

Town councilwoman Anne Melville said district police chief Kenneth MacKinnon will be asked to do something about the "objectionable" conditions that have arisen here since the U.S. depot ship Proteus dropped anchor in nearby Holy Loch.

MacKinnon said he had had no complaint so far from Dunoon, but that "the matter will receive my fullest attention."

Mrs. Melville said the arrival of U.S. sailors in Dunoon was accompanied by an increase in prostitution and a sharp rise in the teenage illegitimacy rate, with some unmarried mothers still of school age.

"When the Proteus came, we were informed that its personnel were the cream of the American navy," she said. "If that is the case, I hope I never have dealings with their inferiors."

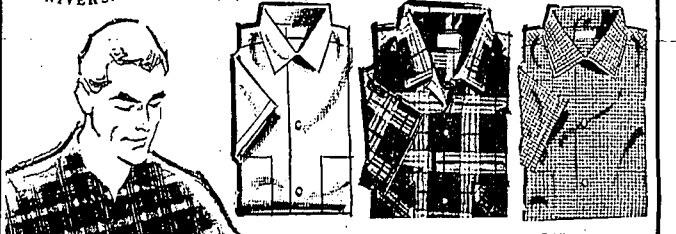

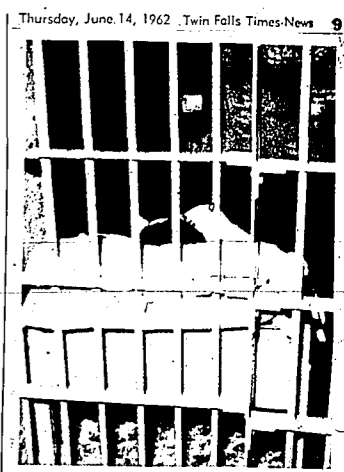
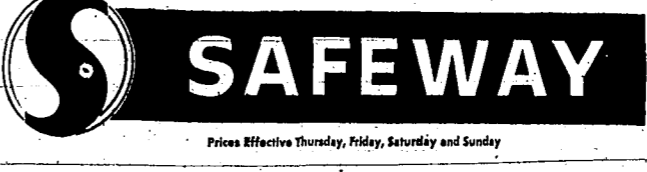

Arms Parley Is Recessed In Deadlock

GENEVA, June 14 (U)—The 17-nation disarmament conference started a month-long summer recess today with the Soviet Union and the Western powers still deadlocked on 17 key issues after three months of negotiations.

Western delegates took a gloomy view of the first phase of the conference at Western, Communist and neutralized nations.

"I feel the negotiations have not been entirely useless," said one diplomat, "but on substantial matters we have achieved absolutely nothing."

The Westerners were hopeful the conference at least had served to explain some of the complexities of world disarmament to the 100 nonaligned nations who joined the East-West negotiations here last March.

The eight — Brazil, Burma, Ethiopia, India, Mexico, Nigeria, Sweden and the United Arab Emirates — have no nuclear weapons, large armies and no far-reaching military treaty obligations. Thus they had little concept of the problems that complete disarmament would pose for a major power.

The West and the Communist bloc appeared as far apart as ever on two key issues — international controls and an international police force to keep the peace in a disarmed world.

throwing a .22 caliber revolver through a window into a passeway next to a cell which held Miss Lambert and five other women. Miss Lambert, swatting trial on grand larceny charges, grabbed the weapon. She shouted to Anderson that she was sick.

"She pulled a gun on him," Cox said, "and ordered him to back up to the cell. But he started running and the cut down on him, hitting him in the back."

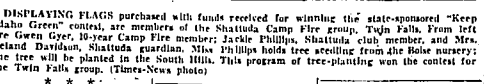

Mary Garden, Famed Opera Star of Past, Sings Again

ABERDEEN, Scotland, June 14 (AP)—Mary Garden—one of the world's great opera stars of the past—has sung again.

Now 85, and recovering from a fall in which she broke both arms, she sang to what must have been one of her most unusual audiences.

Seated in a chair, the soprano with the golden voice sang to patients, nurses and doctors packed into a ward of Aberdeen's Royal Infirmary.

"It's the first time I've sung in public for many, many years," she said.

Her song was the beautiful old Scottish ballad, "Annie Laurie."

Her performance was on Monday but the story just leaked out.

Miss Garden was born in Aberdeen Feb. 20, 1877. At the age of 6 she was taken to New York by her father. The family eventually settled in Chicago where she received her early training.

Before the turn of the century she went to Paris, studied there and made her debut at the Opera Comique in 1900. In 1907, she made her first appearance in America in the title role of "The Girl in the Red Velvet Shoes." She retired in 1924 and returned to the city of her birth a few years ago.

"This is one of the most ambitious tours we have arranged," Miss Porterfield said. "The two speakers will be most interesting and the territory visited is historic in Idaho's past. On this trip everyone will learn the land, whether a member of the society or not."

Dayley, 81, was born and reared in the Oakley area. His birthplace was a dugout home and as a boy he played with Indian children who came into the area with their wandering parents. He is a former deputy sheriff of Cassia county in the Diamondfield area.

Hale is also an area pioneer and relates that the interesting thing about the stage holdup was that the mine payroll which the bandits thought was on the vehicle was not there because the banker had forgotten to send it. The payroll would have been around \$2,000.

Hale also said that the holdup men missed \$500 he hid between the seats. When captured the men were sentenced in federal court, one receiving a 25-year term and the other a three-year term.

Leaves Are Poisonous On Rhubarb

By The Associated Press

Rhubarb is a favorite food of many persons, but don't eat the raw or cooked leaves or blades of the plant. They can be poisonous, especially if eaten at the poison control center of the New York City health department.

The rhubarb leaf stalks, generally used for cooking and baking, is perfectly safe. But the leaves or blades contain oxalic acid, a poison or toxin.

Pepper-Upper

In tests 10 men and women complaining of chronic fatigue, Dr. Palma E. Ferrima of Old Bridge, N. J., found that tablets of potassium and calcium salts of aspartic acid restored normal energy to 87 within six weeks.

Life-Saver

A safety expert estimates 800 lives have been saved each year in automobile accidents because of improved safety locks installed in automobile doors since 1956.

The analysis is based both on the assumption that 40 to 50 per cent of cars now have the locks, and on an investigation of accidents.

The locks cut the frequency with which doors open, and occupants were thrown from cars.

If all autos on the highways had been post-1956 models with the new locks, perhaps 1,800 lives a year would have been saved, writes John W. Garrett of the automobile crash injury research of Cornell University, New York.

Protest Issued Against Movie

SEATTLE, Wash., June 14 (UP)—The Seattle World's Fair was asked by the National Association for Advancement of Colored People on Wednesday not to show the 41-year-old silent film, "Birth of a Nation."

"The picture is one of 14 chosen by the nation's movie critics as the best made in this country, all of which are to be shown at the fair's Playhouse."

"There are little things such as slavery, and black-faced minstrel shows, which are degrading to the Negro," said Charles V. Johnson, attorney and Seattle NAACP chapter president.

"We feel people don't need to be reminded of these things," Fred Vogel, assistant director for the fair's performing arts division, called the picture a technical masterpiece which revolutionized movie production.
