T.F. Boy Has Key Club Job For District

Charles Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Brown, has received an appointment as assistant to lieutenant governor for division five, Utah-Idaho district of the Key Club International.

In accepting, he becomes the administrative leader of 156 boys who control the four clubs in Twin Falls, Burley, Jerome and Piler. His division is one of five in the Utah-Idaho district.

The first Key club was formed in 1923 by a dozen boys in the Sacramento district. With the intention of helping high school boys learn to become better citizens by helping each other, the club was so well-accepted in its school that the idea spread to other schools.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S VIEW

WASHINGTON, June 18—The vicarious of the price and the demonstrated power of extremists on the right and left, with the most confusing choices in many years. These are the more numerous and troublesome among the Democrats, but they constitute a growing group within the ultra-conservative leadership of the John Birch school.

With such a division of sentiment among the electorate, it will be impossible for any one candidate to win, if he has to win, on a definite and forthright platform. He must be all things to all parties, and he must be able to placate the three states where this situation exists in its most severe forms, although there are others similarly plagued, are New York, California and Texas.

—HOW BE POPULAR AND EXTREME—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, for instance, was regarded in metropolitan areas. He could not have won by \$2,000 otherwise.

But ultra-conservatives of both parties have become suspicious of him for that very reason. To ally their concern, he needs a tremendous majority in California, which he refused to repudiate the Birchites (Nixon did), on the ground that the former vice president, in 1960, had been a "major influence" in the Republican primary. He has said that he will support Nixon in the election only under the condition that Nixon cannot win without the Shell vote and a 20 per cent of the Democratic turnout. Here again, there must be some fraction of the vote, but such a shift so far to the right will cause Republicans who enable him to carry California in 1964 to be regarded as a "middle-of-the-road" politician.

—THE YARBROUGH CONTEST—Texas Democrats may face the same dilemma. John B. Connally, although a former Kennedy aide, ran as an ultra-conservative in the state primary (throughout liberal), by an extremely narrow margin. He, too, must lean to the left, if he expects to do well in the general election.

In viewing the political conditions in California, the politicians recall wistfully the years when there was no such contention, such as the contest between the Democrats and Republicans in 1866 and 1920, respectively. The year 1962 will be as hard on the politicians as on the voters.

—VIEWS OF OTHERS

WASHINGTON, June 18—The great debate now engaged is between the President of the United States and the senior senators from Virginia, John F. Kennedy and Harry F. Byrd.

The basic question seems to be whether unbalanced federal budgets are good for the U. S. economy and for the common man or are, in fact, likely to destroy the American way of life.

Treasury Secretary C. Douglas Dillon has stated more clearly than the President the theory that federal deficits are good for the U. S. economy and the common man. Crusade Just Begun, Says Billy Graham

CHICAGO, June 18—(AP)—Billy Graham capped his Chicago "Crusade for Christ" Sunday by telling the thousands of people at a Sunday service that the "crusade has just begun."

Some 110,000 persons—jammed down-to-crow in Soldier field in Chicago—heard Graham give his final service of the 10-day crusade.

Graham has addressed larger crowds only twice in 15 years of evangelistic crusades, both times in Australia in 1959. He spoke to 100,000 in Melbourne and 150,000 in Sydney. More than 200,000 persons heard the evangelist preach in New York city's Yankee stadium in 1957.

He urged members of his Chicago audience to dedicate their lives to God, to put religion into their social, economic and civil lives, and to fight what he termed "internal decadence of our culture."

"This crusade doesn't end today. It is only the beginning. Now you must go out and live as Christians. You are held responsible to God."

Graham said America is backsliding morally in a manner similar to ancient Rome.

"Rome was not defeated by military superiority," said Graham. "It was defeated by its moral and religious decay. Here in America we also have a decaying religion."

U. S. Readies Biggest Atom Blast at Site

HONOLULU, June 18 (AP)—U.S. nuclear testing force made ready to fire its highest and biggest blast over the Pacific after dark tonight—about dawn Tuesday in the eastern United States. The Manhattan explosion was expected to light the site with a flash brighter than sunshine and to be visible in Hawaii, 750 miles northwest of the Johnston Island launch site. It was scheduled for firing between 11 p.m. tonight—4 a.m. Tuesday EST—and 2-30 a.m. EST. Scientists say communication disrupted for almost two days after the shot, 50 to 500 times as powerful as the atom bomb often used in the Pacific, was exploded some 200 miles above the Pacific. In New York, the Congress of Scientists on Survival appealed to President Kennedy Sunday to call off the high test because of "possibilities of hazard for mankind and his environment." The group told the President in a telegram such tests "will disturb the Van Allen belt," bands of high energy particles several hundred miles above the earth. The 20th announced detonation in the current series will be "the largest" Sunday in the area of Christmas Island, some 1,200 miles south of Honolulu.

It was an intermediate-range device of a force equal to that of 20,000 to one million tons of TNT, was commissioned a first lieutenant in the regular army at Ft. Lee, Tex., where he is serving his second command division. Lieutenant Bingham is liaison officer in headquarters of the division's third artillery.
