

# Commandos Shell Moslem Quarters, Wound 18 Troops

ALGIERS, June 19 (AP)—Mortar shelling of a Moslem quarter of Oran broke the uneasy Algerian truce today. Official sources said 18 troops were wounded by the shells, apparently fired by secret army organization commandos. Moslem casualties were undetermined. Secret army elements in Oran and Bone had rejected a peace pact between Moslem Nationalists and European leaders in Algiers, threatening a return of the killings and a fresh campaign against independence for this North African territory.

# House Passes Sugar Quota Boost Bill

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The house today passed a bill that would increase American growers' share of the nation's domestic sugar market but force the United States to continue paying premium prices for cheap foreign sugar.

The bill now goes to the senate where independent forces will attempt to revamp it. It would overhaul and extend for five years tight government controls which have restricted sugar marketing in the United States for 25 years, requiring controls expire July 1.

The administration favors the increase in marketing quotas for domestic growers. But it wants imports placed on a competitive first-come, first-served basis. Instead, the bill would continue to parcel them out through quotas which insure over-market prices for the chosen foreign suppliers.

With the existing control program scheduled to die in 12 months, congress probably will have to approve a temporary extension to give it more time to reach final agreement on a new program.

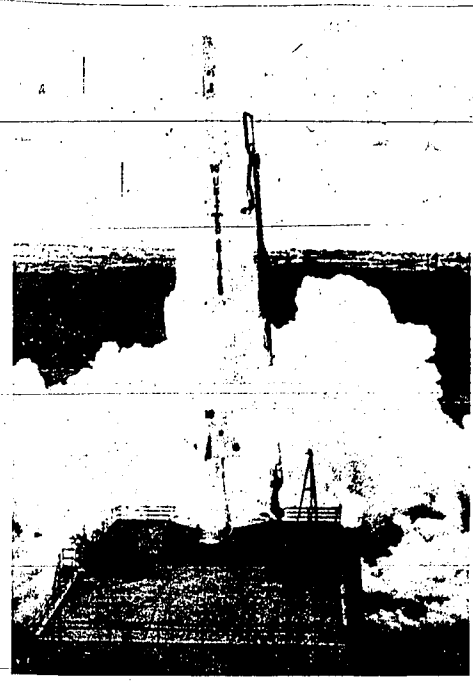
Gary Lee Miller, Burley, was sentenced to 14 days in the Twin Falls county jail today on charges of obstructing an officer.

# Hurricane-Hunting Tiros Sent Aloft to Seek Cause of Storms

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., June 19 (AP)—Hurricane-hunting Tiros V rocketed into orbit today to seek the cause of the killer storms and perhaps help develop means of limiting them. A three-stage Thor-Delta rocket blasted off carrying the fifth in the series of weather-eye satellites. The national aeronautics and space administration announced that the satellite was in orbit and had transmitted its first series of cloud cover pictures.

A pair of television cameras in the Tiros V will photograph the clouds from the satellite's first orbit and relayed them instantly to a tracking station at Wallops Island, Va.

Weather experts hope the pictures will provide valuable information on the origin, development and movement of tropical storms born in the 1962 season, which opened last week.

The robot weather man achieved an altitude of 200 miles above the earth today by launching a short circuit developed in ground equipment designed to beam radio commands to the guidance package.

# Khrushchev Sees No Reason to Go To War for Berlin

BUCHAREST, Romania, June 19 (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev told Romanian workers today that the Soviet Union gives no reason to go to war for Berlin and "we do not give any deadline" on settling the Berlin issue.

"Those who talk about war had better remember that if they pushed the button it would all be morning against them. We do not give any deadline, but as soon as the matter is ripe we will solve the problem," he said.

In Washington, three top White House aides gave immediate comment from the White House. Under normal procedure the White House defers public reaction to statements by Khrushchev and other world leaders if it has any of its own to add.

Khrushchev spoke to a crowd of railway workers in the college-street yards on the outskirts of Bucharest. He arrived in Romania Monday for a week's visit.

"I am convinced that tomorrow the red flag will fly over the rooftops of Bucharest and will fly the flag, it will be the American people themselves."

Discussing Berlin, Khrushchev said: "We want an agreement with the Americans to change the occupation status of West Berlin and convert it into a free city. But if there is no understanding on this matter with the United States, we will sign a peace treaty with the German Democratic Republic ending the occupation status of West Berlin."

Khrushchev attacked the United States for failing to reach an agreement on Berlin and a halt to nuclear testing.

"Therefore we have to produce bombs," he said. "This is a waste of energy because people cannot eat bombs."

He said the armament race was responsible for the recent increase of meat prices in the Soviet Union.

CLARKSDALE, Miss., June 19 (AP)—A group of northern college students who wanted a first-hand look at Mississippi segregation customs said yesterday they were arrested for their trouble.

A white attorney accompanying the biracial student group said he and the four students were held incommunicado for about 20 hours by authorities who asked a white cop if he ever had sexual relations with a Negro.

"I just couldn't believe that something like this could happen in the United States," said Vicky Burroughs, 21, Greene, Ia.

Mr. Burroughs, a student at Coe college, said she "answered all their questions about my relationship with Negroes except their last—Did I ever have sexual relations with a Negro?"

"I felt it was unnecessary to answer that," she said.

The others arrested were Negro coed Jean Johnson, 21, Des Moines, Ia., and two white students from Oberlin college in Oberlin, O., David F. Campbell, 19, Tulsa, Okla., and Philip K. Stutz, 18, Westchester county, N. Y.

The attorney, William L. Hikes, 26, Jackson, Miss., said he and the others were arrested Sunday night when they left a meeting in a Negro church.

"They told us they were arresting us on suspicion," said Hikes, unsuccessful congressional candidate against Rep. John Bell Williams, D., Miss.

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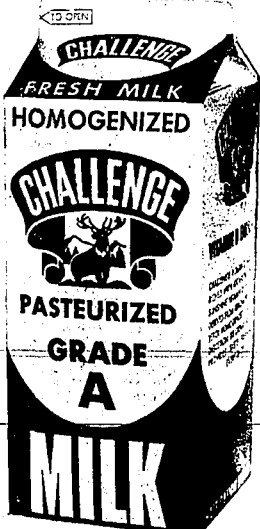

WASHINGTON, June 18—The need for an overhauling of the 15-year-old Taft-Hartley act has been emphasized by the ruling of a five-member federal appeals court examiner that unions may fix production ceilings and punish strikers in violation of the act. The court's decision is expected to give employers without violating this labor-management statute...  
The controversy is that it reveals for the first time publicly that the unions can fix production ceilings and punish strikers in violation of the act. For would this break off economic growth...  
The reason for general ignorance about such a situation is that few workmen share either a defining or a working knowledge of the act.

The revelation may inspire a McClellan investigation into the question of how many other unions prevent their members from being paid extra money. Once expelled from such unions, a man would undoubtedly be considered a member of any other labor organization.

**—SINISTER IMPLICATIONS**—The trial continues. The NLRB ruled the full NLRB Board on a scheduled appeal, has another seemingly similar implications. It justifies James R. Hoffa's rule that any union which punishes its members and provides him immunity from congressional or court action.

In upholding the production ceilings and penalty provisions, Trial Examiner of the NLRB found that they constituted the "internal affairs" of the union, and were, therefore, not subject to court action.

In such cases, he declared, the union has the power to enforce discipline, no matter what the cause or purpose of the disciplinary action may be. Only courts, he said, can correct such situations.

# Dangerous Imports

From time to time there are experiments transplanting various forms of life from one continent to another. Not all of these experiments have proved beneficial.

A couple of the nuisance birds that are well known over nearly all of the U.S., today are the English sparrow and the starling, both of which were imported. Another example could be carp in Snake river, which are reported to be multiplying.

Then another phase of the same problem is trying to keep undesirable forms of plant and animal life out of the nation because of the possible control of the normal tendency to spread and mislead efforts of individuals.

One such example came to light recently when the Vilus Park zoo at Madison, Wis., purchased a giant African snail from a Texan who has been growing them in large quantities.

Any farmer who goes through the annual battle with hordes of insects can appreciate the problem. Any insect with the possibilities of the giant snail should be treated as a menace and kept out of the country.

Advocates of economy in government sometimes despair of ever reducing federal expenditures or lowering the federal debt. Sensitive administrations apparently are stuck on determining how to live on the amount of spending and debt that can be survived by the nation.

But now Sen. Frank Church has offered an amendment to the foreign assistance act that would permit reduction and ultimate termination of military equipment and supplies to nations deemed able to equip and maintain their own defense.

"Most of these countries have now become so prosperous that their per capita income is that of some of our own countries," Senator Church said.

"Clearly, there is no economic basis upon which to justify our continuing subsidies to these countries. Congress stopped substantial economic aid to these countries eight years ago, recognizing that our continuing subsidies were doing us self-harm. It is long past time for us to take a similar stand on military aid," he declares.

When the federal government gets going on any form of spending, there's just no stopping. If a little bit of aid is good, a lot is better. If a little bit of aid is in trouble, then quit obviously all farmers are in trouble and let's straighten them out, regardless of the cost.

## Police Here Report on May Activity

Twin Falls police made 870 arrests and answered 484 calls during the month of May, reported Frank Barnett, police chief.

There were 44 traffic accidents investigated during the month. Two persons were arrested for drunk driving, 38 for speeding, seven for running a stop sign, two for running a stop light, one for hit and run, one for following too closely, nine failure to yield the right of way and three for making improper turns.

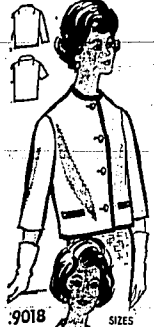

## Dangers of Food Poison Are Reported

Food poisoning can spoil many summer picnics and vacations this summer. Health authorities estimate there are as many as 1,000,000 cases of preventable food poisoning each year in the United States.

The most frequent cause of food poisoning is failure to keep foods properly refrigerated in warm weather. This applies to cooked as well as uncooked foods.

United States public health service scientists have shown that bacteria commonly causing food poisoning will grow and multiply in foods at temperatures as low as 42 degrees. Perishable foods should therefore be refrigerator-stored at no higher than 40 degrees.

The most commonly affected foods are meat products, fish, custards, and cream-filled pastries. Although highly distasteful, food poisoning is usually not serious and seldom fatal. At the first sign, which is usually sudden, call a doctor and if possible go to bed.

## Budget Bureau Approves Loan To Area Firm

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—Budget bureau approval of a loan and grant for the Coasta Creek Reservoir company was announced Monday by Rep. Charles E. Wiggins of Idaho.

The two said the application was sought to finance a flood control, irrigation and water life project costing 2.8 million dollars.

The firm asked the federal government for a loan of 2.3 million dollars and grants totaling 500,000 for fish and wildlife and flood control purposes.

Harding said local interests would provide \$311,000 in the form of all rights-of-way and water rights and the costs of planning the project and a maintenance fund.

The loan would be repaid over a 30-year period.

The project is expected to provide supplemental irrigation water for about 11,000 acres of land near Malta.

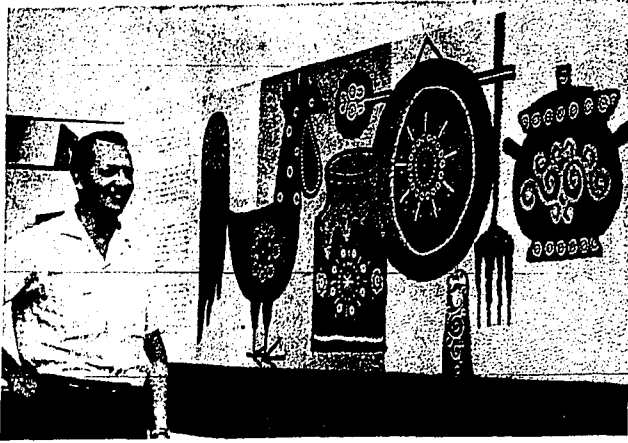

## Gooding Man Represents Idaho's Bean Industry at Israeli International Fair

Tel Aviv, Israel, June 19 (Special)—A crowd that may equal one-half the population of the United States flocked to the fair at the colorful, month-long 1962 Near East International fair.

Fourteen American officials and representatives of growers, handlers, dealers and processors were present at the fair.

Here to acquaint Israelis with the values of their products, give them a glimpse of the American way of life and thereby enlarge their share in this growing market.

One of these American representatives is Tom Morrison, Gooding, Idaho, who represents the Western Bean Dealers Association and the Idaho bean commission. Morrison is employed as a division manager by the Mountain States Bean company, Denver, Colo., which operates dried bean grain warehouses at processors.

Noting that more than two billion pounds of dried beans were produced in the United States last year, Morrison stressed that the high quality of beans grown in Idaho is due to the high productivity of the reclaimed desert irrigated soil.

Beans are a staple food in Israel.

This international exposition is the first for Israel since it became an independent state in 1948. It is being held in a park-like area of 10 city blocks on the Tel Aviv on the Mediterranean.

The site includes a lake, complete with swans and pelicans; an extensive plantings of exotic trees, shrubs and roses; free-form sculptures—archesque of twisting light; a central pavilion for orchestra concerts and ballet; and a hundred exhibition halls and pavilions of glass, aluminum and concrete.

The American pavilion, hailed here as "one of the special interests" and by Americans here as "one we are all proud of," is a modern design in pastel colors, and, in front, a 20-foot painting of a knife, fork, and spoon, to emphasize the food displays inside. On top is the American flag and a simple sign, USA.

Visitors, who come from all over in private cars and special trains and bus excursions and who are interested in the fair, are met at the fair office by a staff of 1,000. The fair office is in the American building.

The White House sent eight place settings of tableware, used at the President's state dinners, which are displayed in an illuminated revolving glass case.

Presiding Kennedy's special message is shown prominently in all letters. It reads: "Trade among free nations means better living for people and strength for the world. This trade fair is a link in the chain of friendship and commerce which joins our two countries. I wish it every success."

One wall is filled with representative American supermarket-type packaged and frozen foods. Attractive Israeli girls remove frozen dinners from refrigerators and demonstrate the ease of preparation. Others bake packaged cakes.
