The White House created an emergency board under the authority to bring the contract disagreeing railroad labor act to a halt. It also ordered the removal of about 10,000 ground personnel between American and 10,000 ground personnel represented by the Transport Workers union. A strike had been threatened for midnight Friday.

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Nuclear Test Flop Blamed On Tracking

HONOLULU, June 20 (AP)—The malfunction of a Thor missile launched by the United States to destroy a gigantic nuclear device in the Johnston Island lava flow last night without exploding Tuesday night was blamed on a tracking error.

The abortive attempt to set off a nuclear device at high altitude above the Pacific test area was the second failure in six weeks. No specific explanation was given for the failure, but it was reported that the joint task force engineers said that the shot was scrapped "due to a malfunction in the system."

The nuclear device was blown up and dropped into the ocean. There was no nuclear detonation.

It was assumed, however, that the "malfunction" referred to involved with the Thor's tracking system — the same problem that caused failure of the first Johnston test shot June 4.

The European economic community in Brussels maintains an official spokesman's group to "tell the story here and abroad" to brief official and unofficial visitors, to answer questions.

The EEC council is working tirelessly on the basic problems of customs or tariffs, and 50 per cent of them have now been abolished.

When the customs problems are cleared, the rest should be easy.

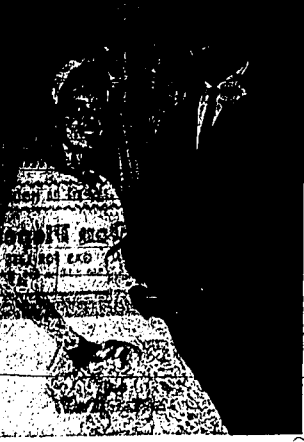

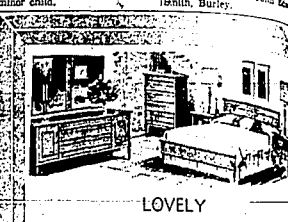

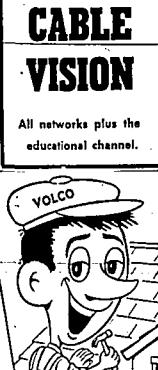

Dodgers Seem Headed for Gate Record

LOS ANGELES, June 20 (AP) — The turntunes are clicking in profitable fashion for the Los Angeles Dodgers, and they seem headed toward breaking the National league season record for gate receipts.

But a Dodgers spokesman viewed with grave apprehension any chance of breaking the all-time major league mark of \$2,620,627 established by the Cleveland Indians in the American league in 1916.

So far, through Monday night's game with St. Louis, a total of \$407,000 customers have watched the Dodgers in their new stadium on 23 playing dates.

"That's an average attendance of a little better than 25,000," the spokesman said. "The same average for the 43 additional home playing dates would total 2,425,000."

Such a figure would eclipse the Dodger-held National league record of 2,233,887 set in 1960 when Memorial Coliseum was their 1960-61 temporary home.

The Cleveland total, based on the 71-home games (not dates) averaged 24,240-plus in a year the Indians won the pennant and the world series.

Many baseball people doubt that the Cleveland mark ever will be equaled.

The beat the Dodgers might hope for this year would be to better the second place figure of 2,270,000 set by the New York Yankees, also in 1948.
