

Flight Engineers, Project Settlers, Lines Are Confused

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Agreement was reached today to head off the threatened strike of flight engineers on Trans World Airlines, but engineers employed by Eastern and Pan American airlines rejected the terms and threw the situation into new confusion. Government mediators headed by Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, who pushed the marathon negotiations that brought about the TWA settlement, had relied on a pattern for general agreement on the threatened carriers. A meeting of the Eastern and Pan Am chapters of the International Association of Flight Engineers called for New York Friday to decide on the course they would follow.

Demos Pushing Farm Bill Through House

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The house headed toward a final showdown on President Kennedy's big farm control bill today after voters by cash subsidies ranging up to about 5 cents a quart for farmers who voluntarily reduced milk production.

Saigon Says Cambodians Hit Border

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Tensions between South Viet Nam and Cambodia increased today as charges of border violations (from both sides) and a formal complaint from Cambodia to the three-nation coalition.

The Saigon press today claimed that 100 Cambodian troops attacked the Vietnamese border town of An Lao 100 miles west of Hanoi Monday and claimed that Vietnamese forces there captured eight of the Cambodians were killed and arms were taken.

In a cautiously worded communique, Hanoi said that the attack was carried out by "about 100 unidentified elements in battle-dressed uniforms" and the fight lasted more than six hours. South Viet Nam said that one of its troops was killed and two wounded.

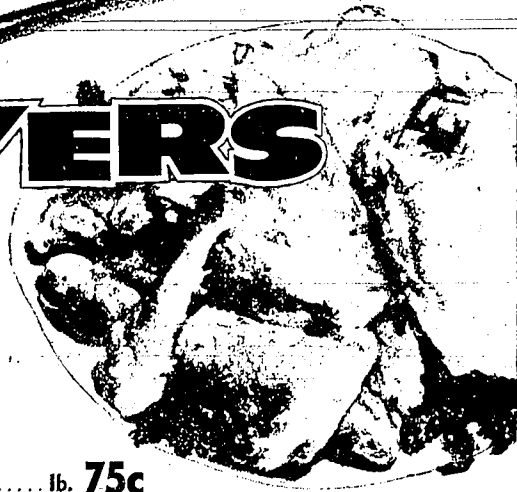

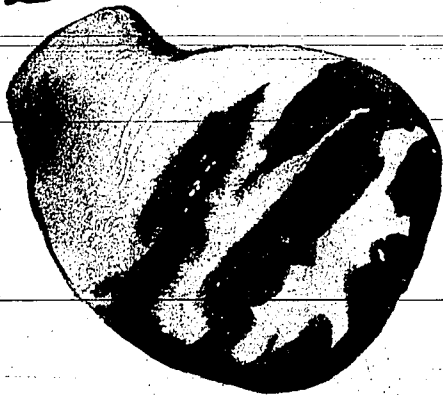

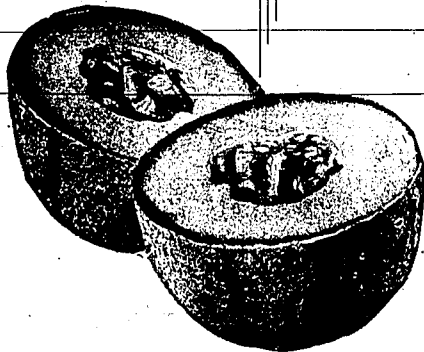

Thousands of Chinese Sail For Formosa

TAIPEI, Formosa, June 21 (AP)—Reliable sources today said the transfer of thousands of Chinese Communist refugees from Hong Kong to Formosa will get under way next week.

The transfer apparently will be carried out by tacit agreement between the British crown colony and the national Chinese government.

The foreign ministry and the government-supported Free China Relief association declined comment on the reports because of the delicate relationship existing between Hong Kong and Formosa.

(The Hong Kong government also refused comment.)

Nationalist China offered to provide homes for an unlimited number of refugees from Hong Kong and Chinese mainland.

The Hong Kong government officials said they have not accepted the offer. However, the sources said it appears the government is considering the offer.

It was reported here that the refugees will arrive in comparatively small groups to avoid creating tensions between the Peking regime and the British colony on the China coast.

The sources said the first shipment of 300 refugees will arrive next Wednesday aboard the British freighter Seachuan.

Nuclear Tests Will Continue After Flots

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Atomic sources indicated today the United States will keep trying to test nuclear warheads in a row despite two failures in a row.

The first attempt to hurl a nuclear weapon into the sky over Johnston Island failed June 4 when the Centauro lost its missile. The tracking system, not the Thor, was blamed. Both missiles and warheads were destroyed by ground command.

The second attempt failed yesterday because of a malfunction in the rocket itself. Again the nuclear warhead and missile were destroyed.

A spokesman for the atomic energy commission said the Johnston Island schedule is being decided in view of the two failures. The AEC had reportedly previously decided to cancel the high altitude series would be rescheduled.

That test called for lofting a submunition which would be powered to less than a million tons of TNT at an altitude of "tens of kilometers." Officials said they interpreted this as meaning about 30 miles.

The test scheduled yesterday called for exploding a weapon in the megaton range at a height of 100,000 feet.

That was estimated, again unofficially, at about 200 miles. Whether it will be rescheduled has not been announced.

The third and highest test was to be of a submunition weapon exploded perhaps 500 or 600 miles in space. That shot, if it comes off, will be the highest ever exploded by the United States.

Original plans called for a possible fourth high altitude test, depending on results of the previous three. It would be exploded at an "intermediate" altitude.

Idaho Land Board Okays Bond Change

BOISE, June 21 (AP) — Wall Street's worries reached the Idaho land board yesterday.

In a 3-1 vote, with Atty. Gen. Frank L. Benson abstaining, the board told the state finance department it could accept premature payment of bonds it was holding for four Idaho school districts.

"This will allow the districts to resell the bonds at a lower interest rate to investors who find a more secure feeling in tax-exempt school bonds than in currently fluctuating stocks."

The finance department, which originally purchased the school bonds with monies of the state endowment funds, will have to reinvest the monies—presumably U.S. government bonds.

The proposal to pay off their bonds came from class A school district 331 at Reabour, joint class A school district 311 at Payette, Bingham class A district 32 at Moreland and joint class A district 150 at Soda Springs. The board could resell the bonds at a lower interest rate because of current pressures on the bond market.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, the lone Republican on the five-member land board, voted against the proposal. He said that at the moment he felt the board should be certain the state could reinvest the money at a better interest rate.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams said he felt he board could make more money out of federal bonds the rate could under the present interest rates paid by the school districts. Both the districts and the endowment funds would benefit this way, he said.

"You're establishing a policy that could cost you money later," Smylie said.

Williams already established it. Williams replied, referring to earlier permission to sell a Meridian school bond.

"We're trying to do it work in the best interests of the schools," Williams said. "We're not just one of the schools, not just one of the parents, not just one of the taxpayers. We're on dangerous ground here. I have great reservations."

Richard A. Kenney, Salt Lake City, representing the Edward A. Burton company, told the board he felt it could receive a better interest rate from federal rather than from school districts. When municipalities (school and other such bonds) are selling at 3.00 (per cent interest), the government is over 4%," he said. "There's always a little difference when the government is concerned. It's very rare this is not true."

Williams agreed with him. So did Public Instruction Supp. D. B. Engelking, who said the board could change the policy if a danger point ever were reached.

Smylie suggested the board defer action until it was certain the change "is a matter of right," but Attorney Joe R. Williams said he felt the matter should be settled now, one way or the other.

Engelking said that the Payette district is ready to go. They're awaiting our action today. They'll go to considerable expense if they wait any longer."

Smylie said he will wait to see what certain, however, that the state would not lose money on the deal. He said that he did not share "Mr. Kennedy's confidence" in the U.S. government bond market.

Engelking moved the board approve the proposal and Arnold Williams seconded him. Joe Williams blocked them while Benson abstained from voting and Smylie voted against the proposal.
