

Man Wounded in T.F. Knife Fight; Two Are Nabbed

A brawl Sunday night in the 100 block of Second avenue south resulted in two knifings. One man, Rufus Garcia, is in critical condition at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. Another man, Marcos Jasso, cut across the nose, wasn't hospitalized. Arrested by Twin Falls police for suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon are Job Loredo Alvarez and Daniel Perez Torres. The time of their arraignment hadn't been set Monday morning.

According to Frank Barnett, the fight started shortly before 10:30 p.m. The doorman received a call that a fight was going on and Officers George Edwards and Gary Carter investigated.

When they arrived Loredo and Perez had fled in an automobile. Garcia was rushed to the hospital.

Roadblocks were set up in the area to apprehend the men. Barnett called at home, came to the station to check on the incident and left in a patrol car to join the search.

Shortly after he left the station he saw the men driving down Broadway street north. Barnett followed the men and turned on his siren and red light. The men stopped. Barnett finally curbed the car in the 200 block of Second street east. He reached the car and saw the men. They arrived and the men were taken to the station. Barnett said he about 11 p.m. when he found the men.

He said the knifing happened after Garcia had been knocked down by the two men. Garcia alleged to have wielded the knife. Garcia was stabbed in the left arm and the left lung. The blade collapsed the lung.

Blood stains were found in the car. The suspects were driving and fled from the front of the car. Barnett says some of the men involved in the brawl had been

Rusk, Briton Eye Red China Forces Poised at Island

Terrorists Bomb Oran School Anew

ALGIERS, June 25 (AP)—The first plastic bomb explosion in 10 days rocked Algiers today, and the secret army organization in Oran bombed a school in its campaign of sabotage in the western post city.

They were the first bombs to be set off in Algiers since Friday, June 22, when the local OAS changed fire by hitting about the harbor near the village of Tel-Dak, but no one was hurt, Jerusalem radio reported.

The broadcast said Israel has protested to the Israeli-Syrian mediator commission, charging that the Syrians opened fire first.

The OAS terrorists struck this morning at a school near the central station. It was the third time in eight days the school had been bombed. Today's

blast virtually completed the building's destruction.

The new explosion and fire followed a day in which diehard OAS commandos bombed or set off 13 public buildings in Oran and killed two policemen.

Israeli, Syrian Shots Exchanged
 BEIRUT, Lebanon, June 25 (AP)—Israeli and Syrian patrolling exchanged fire in the Golan Heights today, but no one was hurt, Jerusalem radio reported.

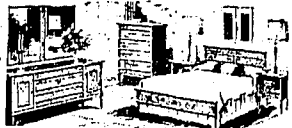

News Around Idaho

General OK's Spy Sentence For Captain

WIESBADEN, Germany, June 25 (UPI) — Gen. Hans Speier, former commander of the 17th Air Force, has reviewed and approved the 20-year sentence given Capt. Joseph P. Kaufman, 49, for passing military secrets to the Soviet Union. The air force announced today that an air force court martial found Kaufman guilty in April. It sentenced him to 20 years hard labor and forfeiture of pay and allowances. Kaufman had been assigned to the 17th Air Force at Ramstein, Germany, for the trial. Approval of the sentence by Speier, Hamstein commander, until last week, was the first in a series of reviews. A three-judge board of review in the office of the judge advocate general will now review the trial record. Kaufman, who may appear in court before the court is flown to West Germany, N. J. in the next few days, he will be sentenced to 20 years in a prison in review hearing, a spokesman said.

Indians Rap U. S., British Kashmir Vote

NEW DELHI, India, June 25 (UPI) — Newspapers here bitterly criticized the United States and Britain for supporting a United Nations security council resolution calling for Indian-Pakistan negotiations on Kashmir. The papers praised Russia for killing the resolution with its 100th veto Friday night. British and American officials at social events over the week-end and complained about the U. S. government's "double standard" in die regards as unfair support for Pakistan.

The Pakistani foreign minister Mohammed Ali Bogra today condemned the Soviet veto as "a shining example of the fundamental right to self-determination." He criticized the United Arab Republic and China for abstaining and charged that India was practicing "double standards" in letting the people of Kashmir vote on their future.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru himself set the keynote for the anti-American and British criticism. News of the security council action reached India as Nehru was winding up a foreign policy debate in the upper house. Obviously agitated, the prime minister said: "It is a matter of deep regret to me that repeatedly on subjects which concern us so much about which we feel rather passionately, on subjects like Goa and Kashmir, it should be our misfortune that these great powers, the United States and United Kingdom, should almost invariably be against us."

A-Protestors Sail for Zone

HONOLULU, June 25 (UPI) — The pacifist protest boat Evergreen II and its faithful companion, a coast guard cutter, sailed for the Pacific ocean today headed for the fringe of the U. S. nuclear testing area at Johnston Island. The cutter was there to make sure the Evergreen and its three-man crew stays out of the danger zone. The coast guard had orders to keep hands off unless the 29-foot ketch ventures within the test area. Dr. Monte Steadman, San Francisco skipper of the Evergreen, said he would sail to the edge of the Johnston Island zone and not beyond. He and two other Californians — C. C. Benello, Berkeley, and Franklin Zahan, Pomona, are making the voyage to protest U. S. nuclear testing.

Pact Okayed, Ford Starts Production

CLEVELAND, June 25 (UPI) — The Ford Motor company started back on the production track today following approval by union members of an agreement to end an 18-day local strike. The dispute by 3,300 members of United Auto Workers Local 428 (AFL-CIO) at the Walkers Hills stamping plant had shut down all Ford passenger car output and idled 71,000 employees throughout the nation. About one-third of the union members at a 10-day Sunday's meeting and only four men voted against the settlement in a show of hands. The agreement was reached Friday night with the aid of federal mediators. Ford spokesmen said 39,000 workers would be back on their jobs by midnight tonight, the others returning by next Monday. Four hundred returned on the midnight shift at the Walkers Hills plant, a key supplier of parts on Ford passenger cars. The other 2,900 started operations today. Assembly plants are not expected to resume operations until Wednesday.

Boxer Hero

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., June 25 (UPI) — A boxer dog jumped between 3-year-old David Gamble and a rattlesnake and killed the snake in a frenzied battle. The dog, a dedicated child watcher called Bud Bup, was struck three times by the snake Sunday and became gravely ill. Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Owens, the dog's grateful owners, were unable to find a veterinarian with snake serum, so they took Bud Bup to a city hospital. Sympathetic nurses supplied an injection which restored the dog's health.

Through June 1, exchange members had sold 91.9 million shares and bought 85.3 million shares and selling 39.1 million—adding 7.1 million shares to their portfolio.

The principal question raised by the study: Did the specialists' dealings tend to depress prices? The figures would seem to indicate they might have. The exchange officials questioned their significance.

Said G. Keith Funston, president of the exchange: "In the face of the highest volume in more than three decades, exchange specialists exceeded their recent performance records for stabilizing transactions and maintaining price continuity."

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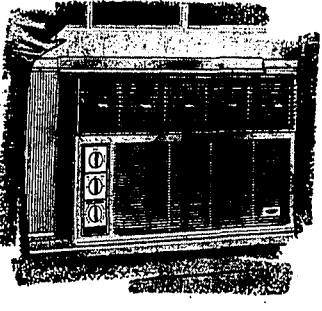
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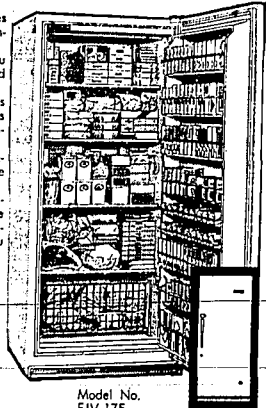
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Key Figure in N. Y. Scandal Leaves Jail

DANBURY, Conn., June 25 (AP)—James J. Moran, 43, a key figure in a major scandal in the administration of Mayor William O'Dwyer of New York, was released from jail today after 10 years and five months in prison.

Moran had been in prison here since last June. Before that, he had spent nine years in state prison in New York as the mastermind of a \$40,000,000 hoarding of fuel oil dealers.

As the New York City first deputy fire commissioner, Moran was accused of taking money from fuel oil firms for city permits to install equipment.

The state prison sentence stemmed from the charges. His time in federal prison was for perjury before the senate's Kefauver investigating committee and for income tax evasion.

He won a federal parole March 20.

Daily Prayer For Schools Is Outlawed

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled today that daily recitation of an official state prayer in public schools, even though non-compulsory, is in violation of the religious freedom guaranteed in the constitution.

The 8-1 decision came in a New York case but will affect many thousands of schools throughout the country.

Justice Hugo L. Black wrote the court's decision. The dissenters were Justice Potter Stewart, Justice Felix Frankfurter and Byron R. White did not participate.

The decision came as the court cleared out a backlog of cases on the final day of its 1961-62 term.

In other major decisions handed down today:

- Struck down that part of California health and safety code which punishes addition to narcotics except when administered by a physician.
- Clarified its obscenity test and at the same time set aside an order barring from the mails copies of three magazines said to appeal to homosexuals.
- Rejected a technical challenge to a New York federal court decision that workers protected by the seniority system may "follow their jobs" if a plant relocates.
- Upheld a lower court order compelling two New York companies, Brown Shoe Company and G. R. Kinney company. It was a major anti-trust victory for the government.
- Agreed to review seven more cases involving sit-in demonstrations in North and South Carolina, Maryland, Louisiana and Georgia.

R. F. Kennedy Claims Estes Cost Is Low

DETROIT, June 25 (AP)—Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy said today that the cost of dealing with the agriculture department had not cost the federal government as much as estimated.

But he acknowledged that the government has spent thousands of dollars investigating the case. He said the department of justice had from 75 to 400 men probing Estes' affairs and it had spent over \$150,000 already on the matter.

He said the case of the Texas fertilizer king was "a serious one. This administration accepts the responsibility for the appointment of Secretary of State Rusk, Secretary of Defense McNamara and it must take the responsibility for appointing others who have not lived up to their trust."

"But our investigation so far, we have found that Estes' relationship with the government has not cost the government any money. It has cost financial companies large sums, however."

Kennedy, here for a meeting with department of justice officials, said the cost of the "Estes" case is low because the government has spent in investigating the case and its president, James H. Hoffa. He said he was "satisfied with the progress of the Hoffa probe, but it is a long, slow process," he added, but refused to go into detail because Hoffa is already under indictment.

China Refugees Sail to Formosa

HONG KONG, June 25 (AP)—The first group of Chinese refugees being taken to Formosa by a nationalistic-supported relief organization sailed today aboard the vessel Szechuan.

The number of refugees was estimated by reliable sources at "between 65 and 70."

The fares were being paid for by the Free China Relief Association, a nationalistic-financed organization which cares for refugees in this British crown colony.

The Hong Kong government had no official part in the shipment, refugee officials said.

Eliminated

DURHAM, N. C., June 25 (AP)—Duke hospital has eliminated its policy of racial segregation for private rooms.

The hospital announced today that "private patients of all races, creeds and origins may now be admitted to private rooms at the hospital."

Duke university opened its graduate schools to all races 25 months ago, and earlier this month opened the Negro-degraded school to Negroes.

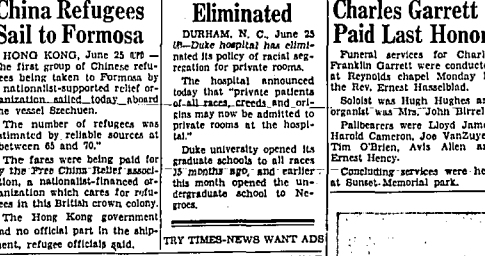

MOSCOW, June 25 (AP)—Soviet premier Nikita S. Khrushchev returned home today from a week-long visit of Romania during which he renewed his threat to conclude an East German peace treaty if the West prolongs negotiations.

Before leaving Bucharest, the Soviet premier thanked his Romanian hosts and expressed satisfaction that their talks resulted in "a complete agreement." He stressed the necessity of "preserving the parity of the Leninist bloc" and urged a resolute fight against dogmatism and revisionism.

Khrushchev told a mass meeting of Romanian communist party members in Bucharest yesterday that the "only" solution to Berlin was to "end the military occupation status and convert it into a demilitarized free city."

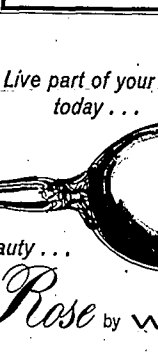

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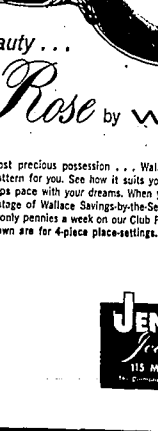

Outlook Precarious On Ducks This Year

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The interior department said today the outlook is still precarious for wild duck production this year. This bad news for hunters was based on reports that the duck breeding population in the northern United States and Canada is smaller than in any year since the summer waterfowl surveys began in 1951.

With aerial survey flights completed to the important breeding portions of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, the data indicated a 37 per cent decrease in the breeding population in those areas when compared with last year. Mallard ducks are about 10 per cent below the 1951 count and the number of pintails was down 28 per cent.

The duck situation has become increasingly serious during the past several years because of severe drought in the continent's primary duck factory, the prairie province of the Dakotas and Minnesota and the provinces of Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta in Canada.

One bright spot is the improvement in the water and habitat in the Dakotas and Minnesota. However, increased production from this U.S. area is not expected by the service to compensate for the lack of production indicated in the northern portion of the Canadian prairie provinces.

POCATELLO, June 25 (AP)—A joint meeting of the Pocatello chapter of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People and the local civil rights committee is scheduled tomorrow night to look into problems which may arise from arrival here of a number of Southern Negroes.

Mrs. John Purce, treasurer of the local civil rights committee, said the two groups have asked representatives of the Red Cross, employment security agency, the Blainock county commission and the American Legion to attend.

The joint-meeting was organized by reports that a number of Negroes from Louisiana were coming to Pocatello in response to newspaper ads in "New Orleans" advertising for farm laborers. Five are reported to have left for Pocatello by automobile last week and others were scheduled to come here by bus today as "reverse freedom riders."

Yesterday, the local chapter of the NAACP issued an open letter warning that there are few jobs, no low cost housing and no public aid available to newcomers in Pocatello.

Mrs. Purce said purpose of the letter was to warn others still in Louisiana who might be thinking of coming here. The letter was signed by Charles Woods, president of the Pocatello chapter.

Kennedy Names TVA Chairman

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Aubrey J. Wagner, who has been with the Tennessee Valley authority from its earliest days, was named chairman of its board of directors today by President Kennedy.

Wagner was made a member of the board last year. He has been with TVA since 1934 and has held a number of positions, including general manager. He succeeds Herbert D. Vogel, who has resigned as chairman effective June 30. The White House said the vacancy on the board would probably be filled this week.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 25 (AP)—A man who antics broke up a Sunday school session at his church was shot and killed by a policeman trying to arrest him.

Officers said Lawrence Woodard, 32, Nashville, was shot Sunday by Patrolman William Adcock after Woodard grabbed the policeman's night stick and began beating him with it.

The Rev. Anthony Roguter, who called police, said Woodard was in the pulpit playing a transistor radio. "When he started tearing up the Bible page by page, we suspected that something was wrong with him, and when he kicked over the pulpit, we knew there was" the minister said.
