

# U.S. Had Warning of Crooked Estes Deal, Prober Says

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Senate investigators were told today the agriculture department had advanced warning Billie Sol Estes' get-rich-quick deals in cotton acreage allotments were outside the law. Paul E. Kannerick, assistant counsel to the senate investigations subcommittee, testified he has learned that a warning was given as far back as Dec. 20, 1950, and that every one of Estes' disputed cotton acreage deals was sanctioned at later dates by farm aid officials in Washington.

He said H. L. Manwaring, agriculture department deputy administrator of production adjustment, ruled on that date in 1950 that the complex deals under investigation were to sell land to farmers, then back the cotton acreage allotments on those acres, appeared to constitute a scheme or device which should not be approved.

Kannerick's former FBI record, said he found the agriculture department to be a sort of bureaucratic jungle that needs an overhaul. But he said he considers it an inconceivable that inefficiency in Washington alone could explain what had happened in the Estes case.

With Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman a scheduled witness, Kannerick's testimony opened the senate subcommittee's massive investigation of the scandals flowing from the collapse of Estes' Texas financial empire.

Freeman said the Estes deal was being introduced by all present, but later he was told by Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., as saying he regretted the remark.

Sen. John L. McClellan, D., said the subcommittee chairman reviewed in an opening statement the law that congress enacted in 1950 which made it possible for farmers, if crowded out of their lands by public projects, to transfer their cotton allotments to other lands acquired by them.

"Under these circumstances allotments have a distinct monetary value and will be a hot commodity," he said.

At the second organizational meeting of the board Wednesday morning it was announced that incorporation papers are expected from the Idaho secretary of state on Friday. All but three of the 21 members of the board were present for the Wednesday meeting.

# Seething Congress Assails High Court

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Members of congress, still firing salvos of criticism at the supreme court's ruling against public school prayers, have introduced amendments to the constitution to override the decision. But congressional leaders—and the long, tedious mechanics involved—cast doubts on the move's success.

House Speaker Carl Albert, who hurried across Capitol hill at the white marble court building by members of the legislative branch, some of whom contended the justices had taken God out of the law of the land.

# Hansen Scores Win in Runoff Ballot To Meet Haring

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—Orval Hansen crushed the political comeback bid of former Rep. John Sanborn in Tuesday's runoff election. That total of slightly more than 16,000 votes, against the 45,000 Republican ballots cast in the June 5 primary election.

In that election, Hansen polled 17,450 votes in the five-man GOP primary, 11,397 for Sanborn, the runner-up.

Hansen said "now we can get off the main job of reorganizing the Republican party in Idaho." He said he would be "effectively representing it here."

# Kennedy Says U.S. Will Defend Matsuo

WASHINGTON, June 27 (UPI)—President Kennedy today said the United States would help defend Quomo and Matsuo if an attack on them by Red China were part of an attack on Formosa and the Pescadores.

Kennedy thus kept American policy toward the islands off the China mainland as it was stated by President Eisenhower seven years ago.

The President told his news conference that the recent Red Chinese troop buildup on the mainland constituted a "serious concern to this government."

He said the purpose of the red buildup including heavy tanks and artillery was "clear but the U. S. position should be 'clearly understood.'"

The United States, Kennedy said, has always been opposed to the use of force in the area. He recalled that Eisenhower repeatedly called on Red China to renounce its threat to use force in the area. Kennedy said his administration "continues to support" this policy.

"The United States," Kennedy said, "will take the action necessary to assure the defense of Formosa and the Pescadores."

# U.S. Reports Plans For 6-Orbit Flight

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The United States announced today that the next manned orbital flight will be planned for as many as six orbits, sometime later this summer, with astronaut Walter M. Schirra as pilot. Dr. Brainerd Holmes, manned space flight director of the civilian space agency, said the decision as to the specific mission—that is, how many orbits will actually be made—will depend upon many technical factors which will be evaluated constantly up to the time of flight and even during the first turns around the Earth.

If the mission goes to six orbits it would involve a nine-hour flight, compared with the four and one-half hours of three-orbit missions. The two U. S. orbital flights so far have been for three turns.

The flight plan will call for considerable drifting flight to conserve fuel for reentry maneuvers.

If the flight goes to five or six orbits, it would mean a landing about 300 miles northeast of Midway island in the Pacific ocean, although the space craft would be launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla. That is because of the rotation of the earth during the extra flight time.

A four-orbit mission would bring the craft down about 200 miles east of Midway.

Landing points for one, two or three orbits would remain the same as in earlier Mercury-Atlas missions, off the southeastern coast of the United States.

The NASA official said astronaut L. Gordon Cooper will accompany the next flight to Schirra.

# U. S. Seeks to Prevent Fight Between Reds, Nationalists

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Officials said today current U.S. diplomatic and military moves in the Far East are designed to forestall any possible clash between fighting between Red China and Nationalist China.

President Kennedy is expected to discuss the Formosa situation and the buildup of Chinese Communist forces opposite the Nationalist-held area at a news conference late today.

One question the news clearly is U.S. policy with respect to the defense of the Nationalist-held islands of Quemoy and Matsu in the Taiwan Strait, where they received the Eisenhower administration's aid.

The United States has sent units of the seventh fleet into Formosa waters, possibly with the dual purpose of defending the Nationalist stronghold against an assault and at the same time discouraging the Nationalist forces from moving toward the Red Chinese.

George V. Anderson, Jr., chief of naval operations, said Tuesday that he foresaw "no real war" in the Taiwan Strait. He said that he doubted Red China will launch any serious attack on the offshore islands.

The United States is reported to have told Red China through its ambassador at Warsaw that this country would not support any invasion attempt by Nationalist President Chiang Kai-shek. At the same time American officials have urged the Nationalist Government to get German duty.

## Sugar Quota, Wheat Control Near Approval in Congress

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Congress' arduous machinery is beginning to move cranking toward some decisions on President Kennedy's major legislative proposals.

Despite an unresolved Senate-Senate passage of money bills, administration prospects for early action on important measures seem bright.

A sugar quota bill, drastically revised from the measure the house previously passed, got the blessing and support in the Senate of Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois.

Agreement between the two houses is needed on this measure before the fiscal year expires at midnight Saturday.

In this same deadline category is the administration's house-passed measure to raise the debt limit to \$108 billion dollars. Leaders hope to bang it through the Senate Thursday or Friday.

The house faces up to decisions on Kennedy's international trade expansion bill, cleared Tuesday by an 8-7 vote on the Finance committee for procedure which would bar amendments from the floor.

The knot fractured his skull, killing him instantly.

Muniz, 47, left a wife and three children.

The 63 refugees ranged from 11 to 70 in age.

### Economists Foresee Dip For Economy

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Federal reserve board authorities are wondering whether the nation's economy will stand this summer and perhaps next fall a little better.

At least one veteran observer is saying privately that the economy may have lost a little ground in June. This official hopes business will achieve a plateau this summer, rather than a decline.

Authorities at the reserve board, which regulates the supply of bank credit and heavily influences interest rates, are not using the word "recession" to describe what may be the immediate economic outlook. That word would connote more of a slide than they think likely.

But they are predicting a leveling off or slight decline during the summer followed by a rebound in business activity in the final three months of the year.

"This is a decidedly more bearish forecast than that of most administration economists, who still are talking about significant gains in the economy in the summer and autumn. However, even administration optimism is not what it was a few months ago.

The view at the federal reserve is that the continuing stock market decline—highlighted by the plunge of May 28—and other unfavorable news are making consumers skittish about spending their money.

"These huge declines in stock prices have helped make people a little uneasy," an official commented. "Do they cause people to spend less? Well, they certainly do. But, if you look at the record in recent years, they work in the direction of lowered spending.

Also helping unsettle the consumer, it was said, have been the Buick and Oldsmobile strikes, the airplane engineers' dispute and the flight to Brazil of New York executive Edward M. Gilbert.

Although some prominent businessmen, such as Henry Ford II, have said they were not cutting investment spending because of the stock market slide and published surveys have even to the contrary, some economists' officials are skeptical.

They argue that the big drop in stock prices is causing some retrenchment by small and middle-sized business. Cumulatively, it could amount to enough to help change the tone of the business situation.

Plans for May suggest some alleviation in the face of economic expansion. Industrial production rose only slightly in May, although cutbacks in steel stemming from an earlier strike threat may bear much of the blame.

Retail sales dipped, but only because new car sales tumbled from their record April pace. Housing starts forced ahead, a surprise which makes most economists certain they must come down. Personal income and non-farm employment rose only a little.

BELCOURT, N. D., June 27 (AP)—Chippewa Indians have vowed to continue their protest dance outside a federal public health service hospital until the bureau of Indian affairs replies to their protest of mistreatment.

The Indians, in full tribal regalia, concluded their seventh day of dancing yesterday at the Turtle Mountain reservation, Francis Cre, tribal council chairman, said the choreographed protest would continue until the bureau at Washington, D. C., responds on its investigation into the death of Elmer Cree, 41 months, who died June 11, four days after being examined at the hospital.

The 15 dancers complained that the hospital's equipment was obsolete, the staff was insufficient for the 7,000 reservation Indians and the staff was inexperienced.

# Navy's Wet, Salty Sailor Tells House

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover thinks the navy is all wet in its opposition to building more nuclear-powered ships because of their high cost. The cost of a nuclear ship over a 20-year life, taking building and operating costs into account, will be about one and a half times as much as for a conventional ship.

"While an increase of 50 percent is considered a reason for not going to such naval ships, I have not heard any naval aviators advocating that we should not use naval aircraft even though their cost has gone up about 2,500 percent."

"Actually, almost everything has gone up in cost. Even the cost of having babies has gone up. I believe it is now about 1.7 times what it was in 1950. On that basis, we should stop having babies, but I see no visible evidence of this."

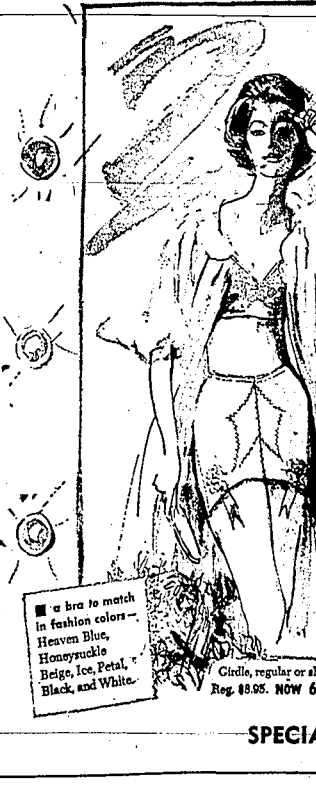

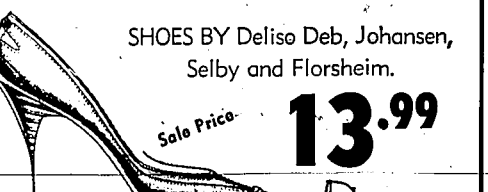

## Poll Indicates Kennedy Felt Anti-Business

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Eighty-eight per cent of businessmen responding to a poll labeled the Kennedy administration as antibusiness, the Business Institute of America, Inc., said Tuesday.

However, the institute said the poll showed remarkable support among businessmen for many tax and trade programs proposed by President Kennedy.

The results included a 2-1 favorable margin for the proposed eight per cent tax credit on investment—for new equipment—and a majority vote in favor of tightening taxes on business income earned abroad and over-issuing support for a broader trade bill and revisions in depreciation allowances.

The institute, a 28-year-old research organization, said it sent out 30,000 questionnaires and received the heaviest response in its history. No figures were given on how many businessmen replied.

The poll showed 51.8 per cent said the Kennedy administration was strongly antibusiness, 36.2 per cent said it was moderately antibusiness while 9.6 per cent checked the "neutral" category, 2.7 per cent said it was pro-business and 3.4 per cent did not answer.

### 47 Chinese Orphans Are Going to U.S.

HONG KONG, June 27 (AP) — A group of 47 Chinese orphans are leaving Hong Kong Wednesday to live with relatives in the United States to be adopted by American families.

The group is the largest since the orphan replacement program was inaugurated in 1953 by the International Social Service. Apparently the mass exodus of Chinese refugees from the communist mainland last month gave impetus to the movement by the social welfare organization, which has moved 650 orphans to the United States in the past four years.

None of those leaving by chartered plane was part of the 60,000 May influx, however.

At least 18 Chinese refugees have left Hong Kong for the United States since the American government decided to step up admissions last month. A U. S. consulate spokesman said the issuance of visas has been increased to 10 a day but no cumulative record is kept of those actually leaving.

Most of those leaving have had their applications in for several years. However, 70 refugees from Red China, ranging in age from 11 to 70, are en route to new homes in Florida.

They are the first sizable group to leave for residence in Florida since the massive rush for asylum in Hong Kong.

### Red Germans Build Pillbox Over Bunker

BERLIN, June 27 (AP)—East German labor brigades Tuesday completed a heavy concrete pillbox on the ruins of Adolf Hitler's old bunker, apparently another part of a fortification in depth of the communist wall.

The work was completed as West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt declared in a report to the city parliament that the unbreakable wall must go in the interests of peace, and that the order to East German guards to shoot escaping refugees must be revoked.

Brandt's words echoed a statement by U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk here last week that a way will be found to do away with the wall.

The newly completed pillbox, with three narrow slits facing westward, stands in the backyard of Hitler's former Reich chancellery, about 400 yards from the wall, but commands a wide field of fire toward the border.

At several other sections of the wall, labor brigades of the East German people's police are adding trenches, foxholes, dugouts and trip wires extending the depth of their border fortifications.

In his report, Brandt said American, British and French forces may appear along the red wall if tension continues to generate as a result of shootings by East German police.

PHILADELPHIA, June 27 (AP)—Curtis Publishing company said Tuesday that Robert MacNeal will soon be leaving as president. The press reports that MacNeal will soon be leaving the company, which publishes the Saturday Evening Post and Ladies Home Journal, among others, for \$2 million dollars last year, the first loss in its history.

### Curtis Publishing Head Is Leaving

The executive committee of the board of directors is charged with selection of a successor. The Philadelphia Bulletin said earlier that directors decided at Monday's board meeting to drop MacNeal.

MacNeal is vacationing abroad, reportedly in Spain.

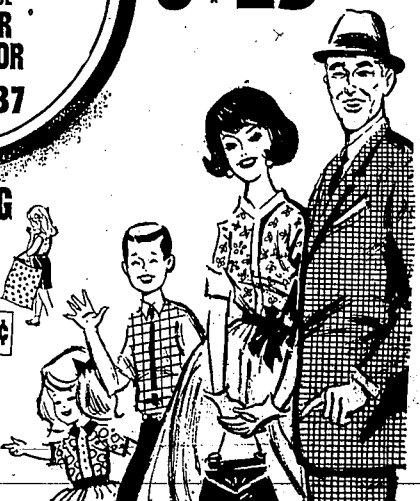

### Nixon Backer Wins Demo Nomination

COLUMBIA, S.C., June 27 (AP)—State Rep. Albert Watson, who supported the Nixon-Lodge ticket in 1960 Tuesday won the Democratic nomination for congress from South Carolina's second district.

After trailing in the early count from the district's eight counties in a runoff primary, Watson overtook Dr. Frank Owens and won going away on the basis of unofficial returns.

Owens, former mayor of Columbia, supported President Kennedy in the 1960 campaign and this split of party loyalty made for one of the hottest primary campaigns in the state's history.

With votes counted from 251 of the district's 261 precincts, Watson had 16,097 to 10,826 for Owens, a physicist.

The seat became vacant in January when veteran Rep. John J. Riley died. His widow, Corina Boyd Riley, was elected to fill the unexpired term ending in January. Mrs. Riley declined to run for a full term.

Owens and Watson each voiced strong conservative and states rights platforms.

### Higher Debt Ceiling Need Is Predicted

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon told the senate finance committee Tuesday that an even higher debt ceiling than 308 billion dollars will be needed if there is a federal deficit next year.

Dillon and Budget Director David E. Bell appeared before the committee in support of the house-passed measure fixing a temporary 308 billion dollar limit for most of the fiscal year which starts Sunday.

The secretary declared this figure "the absolute minimum needed if the government's finances are to be managed in an orderly and economical manner and if we are to be able to finance our purely seasonal cash requirements in fiscal 1963 within the framework of a balanced budget."

President Kennedy has forecast a balanced budget for the next fiscal year but both the administration officials conceded this now is in serious jeopardy.

Dillon said that if a red ink situation does develop in fiscal 1963, he will have to come back to congress next January to ask for a higher ceiling than 308 billion dollars.

### Way Studied to Preserve Body Organs by Freezing

CHICAGO, June 26 (AP)—The U.S. navy tissue bank at Bethesda, Md., is investigating methods by which whole body organs can be preserved indefinitely in a deep freeze state.

Lieut. Cmdr. R. D. Gresham, director of the tissue bank department, said the primary task and greatest research effort of the bank is the long-term preservation of living tissue, possibly whole organs.

Achievement of this goal would make ready a vast supply of workable material if medical science scores its expected breakthrough in transplanting organs.

### Books, Film Are Sent to Cassia

BURLEY, June 27—The Magic Valley chapter of the Idaho Genealogical society has received another shipment of books and microfilms from Boise. This material will be available Monday through Friday from 1 p.m. until closing time at the Burley public library until July 7.

Books include "Vital Records of Billerica, Mass.," "Scotch Family History," Stuart's "American Marriages Before 1890," Climens; "Taylor Genealogy," J. Montgomery Seaver, and Revello of Illinois and Utah.

Microfilms are from Tennessee, Virginia, Indiana, Alabama, Kentucky, South Carolina and Utah.

The navy tissue bank, Gresham said, uses freeze-drying to preserve bone, skin, connective tissue, membrane, and cartilage obtained from cadavers. He said this material, which no longer has potential but still has clinical uses, may be stored successfully for more than 10 years.

Various living tissue can be kept alive for a short time when maintained in a nutrient medium a few degrees above freezing, he added.

### Replacement Of Film Czar Is Discussed

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—The board of directors of 20th Century-Fox will meet here Wednesday to discuss the possible replacement of Sydney Skouras as president of the film company, studio spokesman said Tuesday.

In the \$130,000-a-year presidency, Skouras is boss of actress Elizabeth Taylor, who has been home with a 20th Century-Fox film, "Cleopatra."

The spokesman said Skouras, a Greek-born movie tycoon, is ready to put up a fight for his job. Skouras is a member of a board and he and his family control about 5 per cent of the company's stock, the spokesman said.

Pressure has been placed on the board to replace Skouras not only

because of his age but due to stockholder complaints that the firm has been in the red for several years, the spokesman stated. Last year's 22-million dollar loss was the biggest in the company's history.

For the first quarter of this year, the loss was about a half-million dollars, the spokesman said, with another big chunk coming down the drain in the second quarter.

### Red Chinese Buildup Felt Too Apparent

The Chinese Communist military buildup on the mainland opposite Quemoy and Matsu Islands have been too well-publicized to have any offensive meaning.

When the Reds intervened in the Korean war, you will remember, the Americans began to capture the "volunteers" before their presence was recognized. Indeed, the Chinese presence on the front was discounted at Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters for some time after the first captures.

The political telegraph had carried some signals, but that was some time before.

This time Peking is boldly talking about the troop concentration in Fuzhou, and Western foreign offices are accepting it as a detente against any overt action from Nationalist Chiang Kai-shek's Formosa.

There has been a good bit of talk in the Far East, especially by the Chiang Nationalists, about the time being ripe for revolutionary action on the mainland

and invasion. There is no indication, however, that the nationalists might desire that the United States be prepared to permit anything more than the maintenance of the Formosa forces as a continuing threat.

Chinese Nationalists in the United States are reacting to the buildup as a response to this threat, rather than as a threat in itself. They think there is a feeling of insecurity in Peking because of trouble with the peasants.

There also is a feeling in some quarters that the troop concentrations, which seem actually to take the form of static concentrations, are designed to distract attention from the internal trouble and to bypass the troops beyond sight of what is happening to their families at home.

### Americans Adopt Chinese Orphans

HONG KONG, June 27 (AP)—Forty-eight Chinese orphans left Hong Kong by jet airliner today for adoption by American families.

Most were between 3 and 12 years of age, and they were evenly divided between boys and girls. It was the largest group of orphans sent to the United States since the program was inaugurated here in 1958. All came to Hong Kong prior to the mass refugee exodus from Red China last month.

The program is sponsored by the International Social Service, which has moved 650 orphans from Hong Kong to the United States in the last four years.

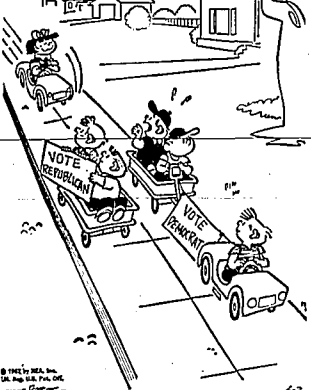

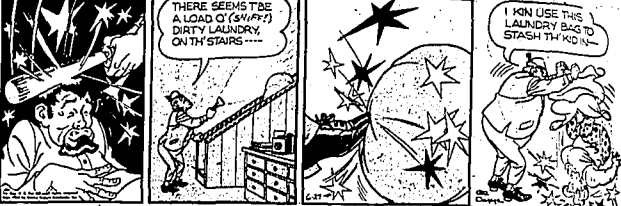

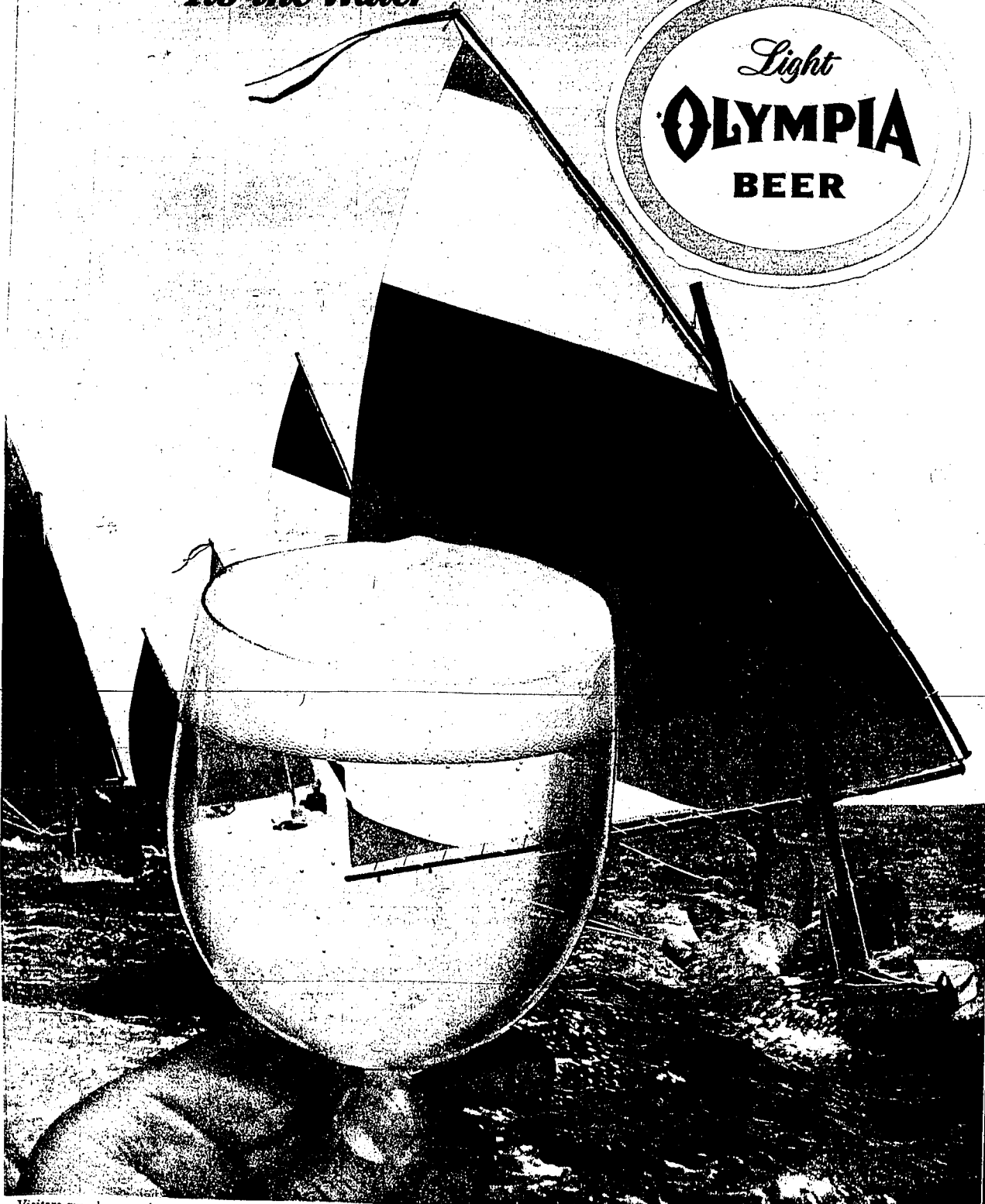
