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U.S.-Europe Alignment Is Under Study

The search of the United States and the European nations for a new economic and political relationship will reach a new peak in the next few days.

The great debate in the American congress over the grant of unprecedented powers to the President for trade agreements with the European Common Market has begun.

In the background are pressing questions regarding the domestic economy and the need of the United States to protect the dollar in a world where a straw in the wind is the presidential reversal of a short-lived decision in St. Louis.

South Viet Nam has from other countries with money supplied by the United States in the case, the "Buy American" rule is on.

It is a small but vivid example of the contradictions of the effort involved in trying to strengthen other economies without weakening that of the United States.

Protestants over the terms of British entry into the common market are being resumed in Brussels. They eventually will decide a situation between Britain and the commonwealth which will bear at least some resemblance to the time when Britain had to ask Washington to assume some of the economic burden of her relations with Greece and Turkey.

A new demand has just entered the picture from the action committee for the United States of Europe, headed by Jean Monnet and representing a powerful section of European thought—a section of thought which is pro-European and anti-American.

The demand is that Britain's addition to the European Economic Community be almost coincident with conclusion of a treaty initiating political union, which will in turn become an equal partner of the United States.

The demand contradicts Charles de Gaulle, who seeks a looser confederation than the unionists, who conflict with a vast body of British public opinion which already thinks the country is being carried too far into Europe at the expense of economic relations with the commonwealth. They are not ready to carry the concept into the field of politics, also.

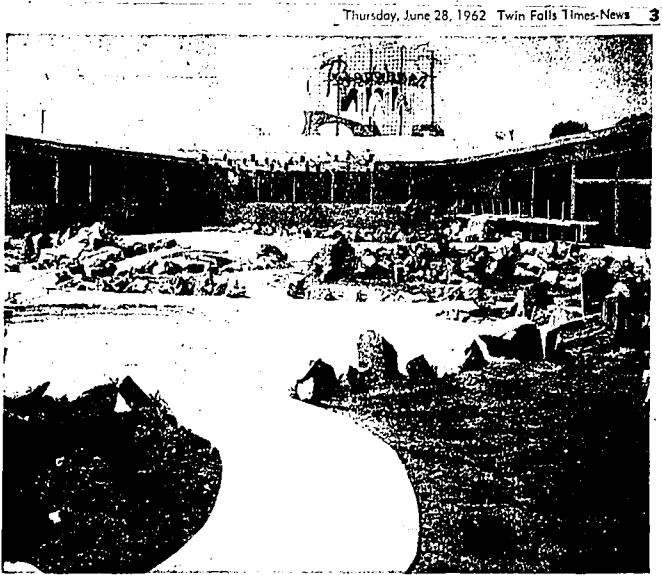
Space Exploring Plans Reported

COLLEGE PARK, Md., June 28 (AP)—A scientist says there are plans for a spaceprobe to explore the entire celestial sphere—hopefully in the next year.

The plans were outlined at a meeting of the aviation and space division of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers by John M. McCool, Jr. He is a project engineer for the space science group of preliminary design with the Grumman Aircraft Corporation of New York.

The plan calls for a spaceprobe to orbit the earth at an altitude of about 500 miles in a period of about 90 minutes.

The probe is to be developed by the University of Wisconsin and the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory.

\$750,000 Motel at Burley Was Built By 31 Businessmen "on Handshake"

BURLEY, June 28 — When a group of Burley businessmen began talking about building a motel this spring they didn't have any time. Pooling their resources, they soon had more than \$500,000 in cash before any contract was signed.

The result of this enterprise is "the business started with a handshake," the three-quarter million dollar Ponderosa Inn, which will hold its grand opening a mile north of Burley Friday.

According to the architect, George C. Hall, Phoenix, Arizona, the businessmen began discussing the project some time ago. They agreed to build a 60-unit motel on a 10-acre tract in Burley.

The number of rooms here will total today, the sources said.

"They called a business college in Oregon who said, sure, they'd put in some money and for them to mail him a receipt. They just told him if he needed a receipt, they soon had more than \$500,000 in cash before any contract was signed."

"The whole project was done on a handshake. The motel, which features a restaurant, lounge and conference room in addition to 60 sleeping units, also represents a lot of community pride," Hall pointed out.

Facilities at the inn are large enough to serve a 300-unit operation and it is built with the growth of the community in mind.

Dutch Locate Paratroop Unit

ROTTERDAM, Dutch New Guinea, June 28 (AP)—A larger force of Indonesian paratroopers has landed among the jungle-covered plains and mountains of northwestern New Guinea, Dutch military sources said today.

A unit of 80 Indonesians landed on the coast of Geelvink Bay May 15 and most of the landing did not reach headquarters here until today, the sources said.

The number of troops here believed to have been sent into New Guinea by the Indonesians since April 25 was pinned at nearly 800.

Military sources said the additional troops were discovered where a police patrol found one of the paratroopers hiding in a small village with a broken leg.

The area where the 80 landed is on the southwest coast of Geelvink Bay in northwestern New Guinea and is known to have a largely pro-Indonesian native population.

48 Refugees From China Enter U.S.

LOS ANGELES, June 28 (AP)—Forty-eight Chinese refugees waited off a plane from Hong Kong Wednesday and into a mass gathering of relatives, prospective parents, businessmen, movie stars and the attorney general of the United States.

The children were the first plane-load of the expected 200 Hong Kong orphans who will be brought here under auspices of International Social Services since the mass exodus from Red China last month. None of the children were among those who fled China in May, however.

The group is the latest since the program started four years ago.

Standing in ages from 9 months to 14 years, Wednesday's group will be adopted by American families, most of them of Chinese ancestry. Seventeen will live with relatives.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy was among those greeting the charter flight at International airport. On his orders, the youngsters and the 10 doctors and nurses accompanying them had gone through all immigration procedures in Hong Kong instead of Honolulu, the first port of call in the United States.

Actress Jane Russell, founder and president of the International adoption program, joined Kennedy in greeting the orphans.

Families in 15 states will receive the orphans. New York gets the most with 16.

ACCIDENT DEATHS CHICAGO, June 28 (AP)—More than 22,000 persons were killed in accidents in the first 10 months of 1962, a sharp increase over the same period last year, the National Safety Council reports.

By RAY TUCKER WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy may soon face a test which will determine whether he is completely unimpaired by the heavy demands of the job between labor and management. Since the Big Steel controversy, and despite the fact that he has received numerous accolades that he favors the unions. In a sense, the pending case, 100 miles in three hours, is a railroad strike, is more serious than the steel affair. For if the railroad strike is not settled, it will paralyze the traffic in heavy materials like steel and similar products. It will also mean that the road passenger service on commuter and through lines, their facilities could not carry the load.

Perhaps more important is the fact that, like the strikes which have been going on, the railroad crisis will show the administration and the economy generally will meet the increasingly grave problem of the loss of jobs through automation.

For the heart of the dispute is the recommendation of a special presidential commission that about 4,000 locomotive firemen be laid off because, so the rail executives maintain, they are not needed on diesel engines.

SOFT SNAPS—The commission, which was appointed by former President Eisenhower, also recommended a stretch-out of a train's run. This would mean fewer trains, and fewer hours or a 100-mile trip, whichever is to the advantage of the employees. A crack train today does 100 miles in three hours.

President Kennedy has declared himself against furloughing, which is the term applied to the employment of more men than are actually needed. He has also said that this year, more than 500 million dollars a year in operating charges. Diesel firemen account for 250 million dollars out of that.

There shall then be another 60 days for attempts to end the dispute. At the end of that period, barring no agreement, the question posed is the size of the stretch-out to be applied to the schedule—and the unions may go on strike.

FIGHT FOR JOBS—The other Brotherhood organizations—the engineers, conductors and brakemen, switchmen and trainmen—are not affected by the furlough, but they would undoubtedly support the firemen with a sympathetic, nationwide strike.

LABOR SECRETARY Arthur J. Goldberg and members of the federal labor board are expected to have considerable ability in settling national and local differences between labor and management. Moreover, the Executive Council recommended that the laid-off firemen be given a choice of work elsewhere.

But the firemen, like the flight engineers and like future victims of industrial development, are not signifi- cantly different. It is, perhaps, only a serious politico-economic problem today, especially in view of the existing unemployment.

TEEN-AGE DRINKING The Rhode Island police have been having a little bit of trouble with teenagers in Connecticut and other nearby points. They are doing it by virtue of a new state statute that makes it illegal to sell alcohol to anyone under 21. In Westerly, R. I., picked up a couple of dozen of these teen-agers. A few days before that, another large haul was made by the chief of police at Narragansett Pier. The latter was quoted as saying that his town was not going to be drinking, brawling, teen-agers.

It is fairly obvious that, with the current trend of teenagers to clog together at beach resorts, the police are doing a good job. A misbehavior could easily become endemic along the New England shore. The easiest way to prevent this is to round up these youngsters and their liquor, and have them brought before the courts. This is what the Rhode Island, for illegal possession of liquor.

The Connecticut state police have sought to curb teen-age drinking-driving by enlisting the cooperation of the parents. This has not been very successful, as some parents obviously serve as an anti-social model for their children. A dealer in alcoholic beverages carried a similar law to that under which Rhode Island police are now operating, the work of local police is being done by a teen-ager was made a misdemeanor the job of paroling the high-ways would be made easier. And in the summer, the lack of controlling roads at beach resorts would also be simplified.—Hartford Courier.
