

Kennedy Hailed On Mexico Visit; Alliance Firmed

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—President Kennedy's hopes for success of his Alliance for Progress were boosted today by his second personal diplomatic venture to Latin America—a smashing triumph in Mexico.

A movement in revolutionary spirit, poured with the ardor and exuberance of their capital and the streets to cheer the President and Mrs. Kennedy on their week-end visit. That outpouring of humanity, which all but engulfed the presidential double-top-limo as it inched its way Sunday from Mexico's main town shrine, the basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe, alone marked the trip.

Kennedy's Alliance for Progress in Latin America, a multi-billion-dollar international aid program spearheaded by the United States is keyed to "peaceful revolution" to benefit the little people of the hemisphere. He obviously is working on the theory that land and grain aren't enough, that there can't be done without enthusiasm of governmentally appointed people.

From that standpoint, the President and First Lady scored heavily on their trip to Venezuela and Colombia last December. Their week-end in Mexico City was even more spectacular.

Never before had Mexico City turned out in such numbers to greet a visiting dignitary. Government personnel who have been traveling with the president for years say the pulsating reaction exceeded any they had witnessed.

"Years that anti-U.S. elements would cause trouble proved unnecessary. There were no disorders, not a moment of disturbance, through the week-end."

Wherever he spoke, at official luncheons or at official functions, Kennedy talked of revolution in the peaceful sense—the associated political and economic progress in the 1960s with the revolutions that had advanced both the United States and Mexico in the past.

U.S. Reduces Marine Force in Thailand

BANGKOK, Thailand, July 2 (AP)—The United States is pulling 600 Marines out of Thailand as part of a general lessening of U.S. troops in Southeast Asia. Another 1,200 Marines and 60 Army troops are remaining.

The U.S. defense department announced the withdrawal Friday, and said President Kennedy authorized the move.

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Doctors Hit Medicare, Go On 'Vacation'

REGINA, Sask., July 2 (AP)—Saskatchewan launched the first large scale, compulsory medical strike in North America Sunday and most of the province's 100 doctors struck in opposition.

A 9-month-old baby from Dawsonville, Ga., believed suffering from meningitis, died en route to Yorkton after his parents drove to Yorkton in search of doctors who normally were available there.

Dr. W. V. Jones, coordinator of emergency services for the Yorkton area, 50 miles north of Regina, declined to say whether the unavailability of doctors had any bearing on the case. An autopsy was ordered.

Striking doctors charge the plan forces the government of this province of 920,000 people—more population control over their profession. Most closed their offices, left the province or went on vacation.

The government medical plan and the doctors' strike took effect Sunday.

Sponsors claimed a good margin for the health program and said a number of Republicans would vote for it. However, many Republicans and some Democrats remain opposed to social security financing.

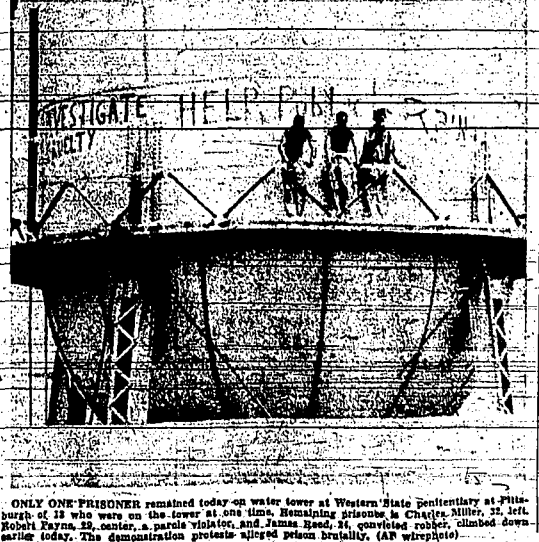

World Meat Production Boost Noted

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Meat production rose 2 per cent last year in the 41 leading countries. This set a new record and reflected an over-all increase in world livestock numbers.

Output in the 41 countries which produce the major portion of the world's meat supply totaled 102 billion pounds, 24 per cent above the 1951-55 average. The United States alone produced 28.5 billion pounds of meat in 1961, far above the 13.9 billion produced by Russia, which is in second place. The combined total of these two countries, 42.4 billion pounds, accounted for about 41 per cent of the total supply.

Demos Split Over Gaming At Conclave

IDAHO FALLS, July 2 (AP)—Prospects were not bright today at Vernon, K., Smith would restore the strong gambling plank he wants from the Democratic party.

At least if state Democratic Chairman A. W. Brunt, Idaho Falls, is an indicator.

Brunt and Smith, the party's nominee for governor in the Nov. 6 general election, split over the issue here Saturday.

Brunt, who may leave his post in mid-month, told a meeting of 34 southern Idaho delegates to the convention:

"We must be neutral on issues

"It is my job as state chairman to fight for the right of all candidates to have a platform they are proud to stand on.

"Most of the candidates want a position of neutrality."

Brunt's statement came after a 15-minute speech by Smith urging the delegates to adopt a strong pro-gambling plank, then sell it to the people.

After the meeting, Smith commented, "instead of promoting harmony in the party Mr. Brunt is encouraging disharmony."

"If you sell the program well win," Smith told the delegates, pointing to the 1958 election in which Democrat A. M. Derr, a gambling advocate, lost to Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

"Derr lost because you failed to adopt a strong gambling plank and left him a ship without

a rudder.

"If we watch on the election," Smith said, who captured 43 per cent of the Democratic ballot in the June 5 primary to win the nomination, "we deserve to lose the election."

Smith said several times in his speech that he would not compromise his gambling stand if the convention failed to support it.

Asked what he would do if the party failed to endorse gambling, Smith said "I'll cross that bridge when I come to it."

Brunt's name was missing when Smith listed four persons he said "would be compatible with me," as party chairman when that position was voted upon at the convention.

The four were Charles Storer, Meridian, a former house candidate; T. Matt Hally, a Boise businessman; Dave Busch, party chairman (1944-46), and Derr.

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Significant Vote

Rejection of a marketing order by the nation's turkey growers may not stop plans of Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to control all segments of farming, but he'll have something to think about. The turkey vote could have a bearing on plans for an August election concerning a possible marketing order for the nation's chicken growers. And stockmen, particularly those who feed livestock, will be awaiting the turkey result with interest because they, too, face the threat of new federal controls.

The turkey marketing order was rejected by a lopsided margin. It was defeated by a two-thirds vote in only four states, Kentucky, Georgia, South Dakota and Wisconsin. In only 12 states including the four above, did the turkey marketing order receive even a bare majority of the vote. The defeat was so decisive that it should make a big impression on department of agriculture bureaucrats who want total controls for all phases of farming.

The background of the turkey marketing order makes the results appear all the more significant. At their national convention, turkey growers adopted a resolution opposing any and all government controls of their industry. Concerning the marketing order referendum, growers proposed to the department of agriculture that the growers help count the vote. The suggestion was turned down flatly.

Then turkey growers all across the nation started receiving a flood of mail favoring a marketing order. A good deal of the mail came from a big grower in Kentucky. No one will ever be able to prove any tie with the department of agriculture, but the pressure to support the marketing order is obvious. Nearly every day, turkey men received a new broadside through the mails. The maximum effort was made in behalf of the marketing order.

In the face of this barrage through the mails, turkey growers decided that there should be no doubt about their attitude toward controls. In view of recent surveys such as that of the Farm Journal and the Grassroots move in Magic Valley against all federal controls of farming, there's a definite feeling that turkey growers are reflecting the wish of a majority of the nation's farmers.

There is little expectation the vote will be so interpreted by the department of agriculture. The department is in the same position as the man who has made up his mind and doesn't want to be bothered by the farmer. The farmer's drive to control is to continue even if it has been crippled.

BLESSED WITH PARKS

An usual, highway traffic can be expected to be heavy on the Fourth of July as many Magic Valley residents take advantage of the holiday. The park at Shoshone falls and Joyce park with its 3500 acres of lawn and an excellent swimming pool. Add the facilities maintained at Twin Falls by the Idaho Power company and there have reason to envy residents of other communities.

Perhaps no local resident is more proud of his city parks than Ernest C. Craner, superintendent of parks and recreation. He has done a good deal to develop the parks and is responsible for the excellent maintenance of parks. It's only natural that he should be in charge of parks and recreation and should call attention to the facilities of Twin Falls parks in anticipation of the Fourth of July. Mr. Craner's invitation to all city residents to enjoy the parks will be a little unnecessary, if the example of other years is followed, the parks will be jammed.

High Altitude Atom Device Shot Slated

HONOLULU, July 2 (AP) — The United States will launch a third try at exploding its biggest and highest atmospheric nuclear shot of the current Pacific series on Wednesday night above Johnston Island.

Washington reports have indicated the explosion will bring the Pacific series near conclusion. The reports said the series is about 85 per cent completed.

The test comes within the two or three months mentioned by President Kennedy in March when he announced the decision to resume nuclear testing. The series, tagged Operation Doolittle, began April 1.

Officially, the high-altitude device will have the explosive force of more than 100 times that of TNT, the nuclear scientists call a megaton. Unofficially, it is expected to be up to 10 times as powerful as the atomic warhead dropped on Hiroshima.

The explosion is expected to set off at an altitude of about 200 miles.
