









## Thugs Flee Prison Van, Fight Police

DENVER, Colo., July 4 (UPI)—Two convicted robbers escaped from a prison van Tuesday and later surrendered to a heavily armed police force, killing hostler, a mother and her son in the process. Four shots were fired in the escape and capture. A Denver deputy sheriff was wounded in the thigh in the fight.

Charles Ferguson, 33, and Theodore Ruark, 25, emerged hands in the air from the home of Gwin Rutledge, 26, as about 100 police officers rincted the frame home in a suburb south west Denver. Mrs. Rutledge and her children escaped harm.

Ferguson and Ruark are convicts serving life sentences in Canon City. They were brought here for court hearing Tuesday morning.

## Walkouts in Space Shop Forbidden'

LOS ANGELES, July 4 (UPI)—A federal mediator says Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg won't allow a walkout in the aerospace industry.

Walter Magglio, who leads a team of 15 mediators aiding negotiations between the industry and the United Auto Workers and International Association of Machinists, said Tuesday that Goldberg's warning did not indicate how a strike might be handled.

The Kennedy administration would invoke an 80-day injunction or appeal to both sides to settle a fact-finding committee appointed.

Aerospace industry employees announced a nationwide strike date July 23. Leaders of both unions began meeting in Washington, D.C., to plan the walkout.

The two unions seek unexpected

salary increases, a four-week vacation, improved employment benefits, improved insurance programs and retention of cost-of-living escalation clauses.

Strikes have been authorized by the unions in plants in California, North American Douglas, Ryan and General Dynamics plants and missile bases across the nation.

The average wage in the industry apparently is \$3.70 an hour.

## Chiefs Spurn Aide's Bid on Guard Cut

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—Secretary of the Army Cyrus Vance has asked the nation's governors to help the defense department work out a practical and sensible national guard manpower levels in their states. His conciliatory wires to governors holding their annual conferences drew a prompt but polite rebuff.

As expected, the governors voted unanimously to support the national guard the way it is now—without the manpower cuts proposed by the defense department.

The bid for backing of the guard reduction was Vance's first major official move since he took over this week from Elvin Stahr, Jr.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara offered to visit the governors' meeting to talk over his plan to put over his plan for national guard cuts.

Under the defense department plan, national guard and army reserve manpower would drop by 30,000 men, and more than 750 units would be eliminated.



ATLANTA, Ga., July 4 — Negro pickets marched in front of 10 hotels and six restaurants in the city yesterday, demanding that they stop discriminating against Negroes by turning away some delegates to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

A sign carried by a picket in front of the Dinkler Inn said, "Khrushchev could stay here, for equal rights. An estimated

Negro Americans, yet."

Some time after the Negro pickets appeared, several white KKK members of the Ku Klux Klan began handing out leaflets near the picket line at the Dinkler Inn.

Gulvin Crisp, a Klan grand dragon said, "We are just feeling the situation out. We have only a few men on the picket line. You know our people have to work for a living. They are not out on welfare like many of the Negro pickets."

The NAACP voted to picket hotels and restaurants to emphasize its organization's fight

## Khrushchev Attacks Jazz, Toasts Yanks

MOSCOW, July 4.—Premier Khrushchev went to a party for U.S. diplomats at the American embassy today—topped President Kennedy's said things were getting better about Berlin, and commented that he didn't understand Russian jazz either.

Khrushchev went to the party for the second successive year. He skipped 1960, the year of the U.S. missile crisis, the collapsing summit conference.

He appeared in a good mood. "We did everything possible to make the weather good for the day," he said, pointing to sunny skies after a week of rain.

He toasted the President as he stood near the porch of the embassy residence, Spaso House, while a white mist of tree blossoms fell.

To a question about Berlin and Germany, he said: "There had been many mistakes made, but now many modern ideas are taking hold."

He also toasted the "genius" Benny Goodman, American jazz band leader, interrupted the po-

son who whirled around in the air: "I want to congratulate the American people." He said, "I wish for personal success."

He said that is the main thing.

There was an exchange-of-light talk between Khrushchev and Ambassador Charles Valois, the U.S. chargé d'affaires, who was seated on the lawn where they were quickly surrounded by correspondents.

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
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
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
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
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
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Talks in Buhl
