Mishaps in T.F., Cassia Counties Claim Lives of Three; Valley Toll Is 20

Magic Valley's 1962 traffic death toll continued to rise with the lives of three more motorists claimed Tuesday night as a result of two separate car accidents. The deaths raised to five the number of persons killed on Magic Valley roads since Saturday. An 11-year-old Kimberly boy, Garrett (Cotton) Brim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Brim, and a Salt Lake City couple, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Duman, were killed in a grinding two-car intersection collision about 6 p.m. two miles south of Five Points east. He was a passenger in a 1962 Volkswagen driven by his father, Cecil Brim, 19, also Kimberly.

Mrs. Brim was reported in fairly good condition Wednesday morning at the hospital. Also injured in the accident and reported in fair condition were Mrs. Williams, 43, and Mrs. Williams, 40, Monroe. Mrs. Brim received lacerations of her face and fractured ribs; Williams has fractured ribs and Mrs. Williams has a broken leg.

Fireworks Conclude Governors' Parley

HERSHEY, Pa., July 4 (AP)—Governors headed for Philadelphia and a major speech by President Kennedy today after winding up their business sessions in a squabble over civil rights. On the eve of Independence day the governors shot off all kinds of political fireworks. But they were forced by a Southern filibuster to delay a civil rights rocket of doubtful explosive power in a closing session they elected Gov. Albert D. Rosellini, Washington, Democrat, as their new chairman.

Berlin Hails Yank Parade For Holiday

BERLIN, July 4 (AP)—U.S. troops, tanks and armored cars lined up along West Berlin today in a Fourth of July parade in this communist-encircled city.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay, here on a three-day visit as President Kennedy's consultant, took the salute as guest of honor. The crowd gave a warm cheer to Clay, whose slight brook broke the Soviet blockade of 1948-49 and who is considered a leading advocate of the hard line in dealing with the Soviet Union on the future of Berlin.

The parade started in cold rain, but the skies cleared before it was over.

The Little American garrison in the isolated city does not usually hold street parades on July 4, but it has several parades of its kind. But today it brought out 3,000 troops, almost half in strength, and 10 tanks, tanks and armored cars.

City stood on a platform outside the borough hall of Kreuzberg, with Maj. Gen. Albert Watson II, the U.S. commander in the city and Brig. Gen. Frederick O. Hartel, the local commander.

There was a full line of July 4 events for Berlin's Little American colony. A musical salute to the 50 state flags, a baseball doubleheader, a cook-out and dinner-dance for officers and civilians, and a picnic for the non-commissioned officers.

European Working Partnership Proclaimed by Kennedy in Talk

PHILADELPHIA, July 4 (AP)—President Kennedy proclaimed from the birthplace of American independence that the United States is preparing for a "declaration of independence"—a working partnership with Europe. The transatlantic partnership will not be built cheaply or easily, Kennedy predicted, but it holds the promise of "a world of law and free choice, banishing the world of war and coercion."

The President aimed his message at the peoples of all nations, but his Fourth of July address was written for a hearing of governors of 48 states and territories. He also addressed the Philadelphia masses outside Independence Hall and nationwide radio and television broadcasts.

The founders who pledged their lives, fortunes and sacred honor to the break with Britain on July 4, 1776, Kennedy said, had prepared address, unaltered, a resolution of national unity which remains the most powerful force on earth today.

But in the same hall, the President went on, was drafted the American constitution which created an independent Europe and welded the world of sovereign states which has become Europe's greatness.

It was much more than a generalizer—the American people built working partnerships with other nations, Kennedy said, and the builders of the "new Europe" also have far to go.

But I will say, here and now, on this day of independence, that the United States will be ready for a declaration of independence with a united Europe.

And by means of forming a more Atlantic partnership—a mutually beneficial partnership between the new union, now emerging in Europe and the old American continent.

But this will not be completed until we let the world know that we are ready to do it.

It is the adoption of the resolution, Alexander Hamilton told his fellow New Yorkers to do so "contemporaneously." Today Americans must learn to think contemporaneously.

Six Still in T. F. Hospital With Injuries

Six persons are still hospitalized at Magic Valley Memorial hospital with injuries received in two of the four traffic accidents which have claimed five lives on Magic Valley roads since Saturday.

Julie Anderson, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson, Jr., route 2, Filer, is listed in good condition at the hospital with injuries received in a two-car collision Monday afternoon one mile south and a mile west of U.S. highway 20 south of Five Points east.

Mrs. Booker Harmon, Buhl, driver of the 1964 Falcon, which collided with Mrs. Anderson's car in poor condition with a severe skull fracture. Her daughter, Cynthia Jane Harmon, 12, is listed in critical condition with a skull fracture.

Three-Man Spaceship for Moon Voyage Is Planned Under Hurried Program

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—The space agency was reported today to have adopted a speed-up plan to get American astronauts on the moon—land them there on a spacecraft flying in lunar orbit.

Under such a technique, a three-man Apollo spacecraft would be launched from Cape Canaveral to go into orbit about the moon. At some point 50 or 100 miles from the moon's surface, a small capsule would be sent off on a separate mission and carry two astronauts down to a landing.

Church, Smith Amicable at Lunch, but Bitterness Stays

BOISE, July 4.—The outward show of harmony between Sen. Frank Church and Verdon K. Smith is not likely to last beyond the Democratic platform convention if Smith insists on a programing plank.

Church, seeking reelection to a second six-year term, is reported to be strongly opposed to the local option gambling plan advocated by Smith, the party's nominee for governor.

The two men who will head the Democratic ticket this fall met for lunch Tuesday. Both discussed their positions as congressional. But they were noncommittal about whether they shared a common ground.

"We had a very delightful lunch," Smith said. "It was very pleasant. We renewed old friendships."

Smith acknowledged that he and Church had discussed the gambling question. But he added that, "We just talked in generalities. We didn't go into it in detail."

There was nothing surprising in that. I think both of us are convinced that the Democratic party is going out this fall and win the governorship, the senatorship, both congressional seats, all state offices and a goodly number of senators and representatives for the legislature," Smith said.

Church declined specific comment, saying only that Smith "has covered it pretty well."

The senator is reported to be hopeful that Smith will not insist on a plank in the platform which would place the gambling program behind the family program.

Smith on the other hand has said the platform must include such a plank if the party is to keep faith with the voters who nominated him.

He believes that A. M. Derr, the Democratic nominee in 1958, was defeated because the party refused to support his programing position.

The Boise attorney believes that the party must fully support Smith and his program if Democrats are to wrest control of the governorship from the Republicans.

A number of Democratic leaders agree. But others have said they would find it difficult or impossible to endorse Smith's gambling plan.

Church is expected to play a key role in determining how the problem is finally resolved.

As the party's United States senator, Church will carry considerable influence with the delegates at the platform convention in Idaho Falls July 14.

There have been reports that he may fight a gambling plank on the convention floor if no deal can be struck with Smith.

Church declined comment on that point.

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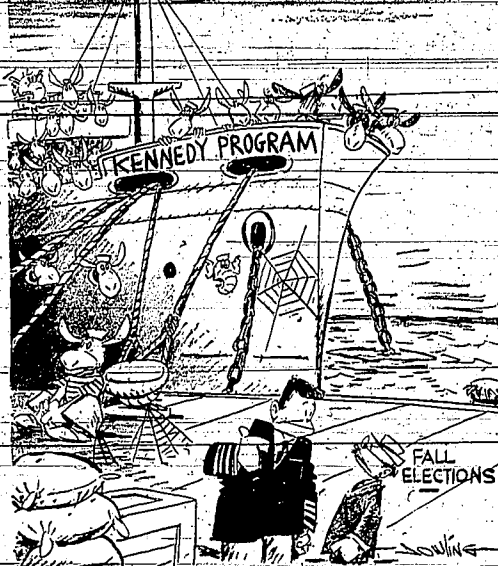

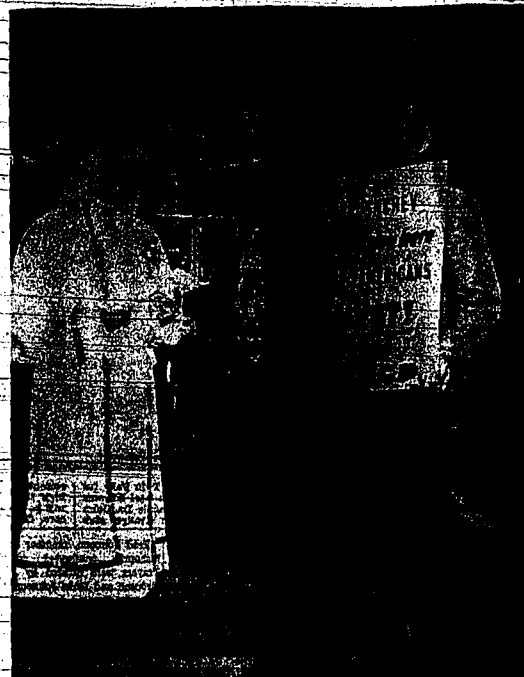

Boy Returns To Israel In Reunion

NEW YORK, July 4 (AP)—An Israeli mother has returned to her homeland with the 10-year-old son who was spirited away from her in a religious dispute three years ago.

Ida Schumacher, 37, accompanied by her 17-year-old daughter, Zina, rushed the youth onto a plane Tuesday night, avoiding the protests and rioting in her hand for the departure. A spokesman said they wanted to avoid a "riot scene."

Also at the airport was Rabbi Zantli Garter of the ultra-Orthodox Hasidic sect, in whose Brooklyn home Y. G. Immigration authorities found the boy, Yosef (Yossel) Schumacher, last September.

Mother and son were reunited earlier Tuesday in a poignant ceremony at the office of the consular general of Israel here. "I am very content to be with my mother and sister," said the shy, rick-checked boy speaking in Yiddish through an interpreter.

Mrs. Schumacher, who flew here Monday, identified her son through a scar. Officials said it was only a formality. The mother and son recognized each other immediately, a spokesman said. Yosef had gone to live with his grandparents in 1957 when the Schumachers immigrated to Israel from the Soviet Union and were not able to obtain proper papers.

Two years later, the parents asked for the boy's return. But the grandparents, Sarah and Mrs. Nahman Shartes, refused on grounds that Yosef would not be enough Orthodox to live in his own home. The boy then grew up in a kibbutz.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara offered to visit the governors in their state capitals in an effort to put over his plan for national guard cuts.

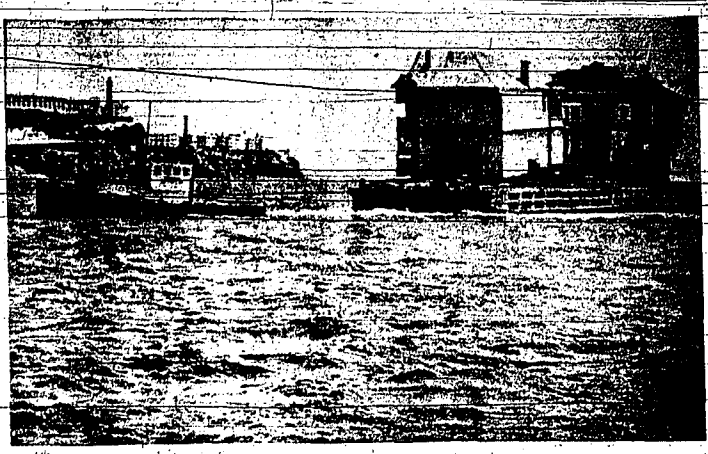
Under the defense department plan, national guard and army reserve manpower would be cut by 58,000 men and more than 750 units would be eliminated.

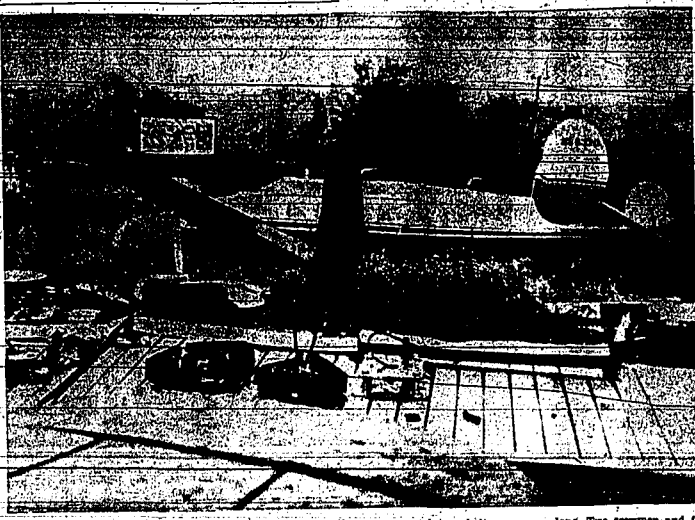

Negroes Put Picket Line Before Cafe

ATLANTA, Ga., July 4 (AP)—Negro pickets marched in front of 10 hotels and six restaurants in this deep south city Tuesday protesting the burning away of some delegates to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

A sign carried by a picket in front of the Dinkler Plaza said, "Khrushchev could stay here for equal rights. An estimated

400 pickets were equipped with signs and sent to many of the city's hotels, motels and restaurants.

Lester Maddox, a segregationist and owner of a restaurant, said they could picket his place all day and all night as long as they did not block the driving situation out. We have only a few pickets on the picket line. You know our people have to work for a living. They are not all on welfare like many of these Negro pickets."

The NAACP voted to picket hotels and restaurants to emphasize the organization's fight through Sunday.

There was an exchange of light talk between Khrushchev and the Kennedy family. Khrushchev said that he had been to the law school where they were quickly surrounded by correspondents.

"To a question about Berlin and Germany," he said: "There had been some progress. I think Danoy Goodman, American jazz band leader, interrupted the po-

National Council Lists Steps To Aid Alcoholics' Recovery

—(Editor's note: Before we get started on the dark mystery which lies in the body—on to the end of an alcoholic demanding drink. But small details in knowledge are better than the last in a series describing the disease, and its cause, and the steps, advances and light some helpful tips.)

At 3 a. m. in a fuzzy voice the young man telephoned a doctor—had never met, asking for an appointment.

He burst into the office early in the morning, demanding some of those pills to keep me from drinking. I've got to stay sober the next few days—very important.

There is an antidrinking drug, but it's not magic powder—putting coffee affair.

This drug is disulfiram—trade name antabuse. It is completely harmless, until a person drinks any alcohol. He becomes violently ill.

It acts as a chemical fence reinforcing the alcoholic's determination not to drink. It must be prescribed and guided by a physician, for otherwise reactions could be disastrous. The alcoholic must know that he's taking it and what it will do. It is wasn't the easy answer for the young man, except so far as it marked a start toward real desire to stop drinking.

The road back from alcoholism is tortuous and difficult, but

much can be done medically and psychologically, explains Dr. Ruth Fox, medical director of the National Council on Alcoholism.

A first step is restoration of good health and diet. The alcoholic often has liver, nerve or other damage.

He may need hospital care for a "time" tranquilizing drugs—now can help him sleep or handle mood swings and anxiety.

Clergymen—increasingly—are helping alcoholics find and follow new ways.

Hypnosis, in the hands of trained physicians, can assist in the removal of old habits and tensions, Dr. Fox says.

All treatments, she explains, point out, have a common goal: Understanding and reinforcing the need for total abstinence of life without drink.
