

Smith Asks for Valley Support On Gaming Issue

Verdon K. Smith, Democratic candidate for governor, did not back off his stand for local option gambling in Idaho as he appealed last night for support from the Magic Valley delegation to the party convention on Saturday in Idaho Falls. Smith, speaking from the Emerson Hotel before nearly 100 persons from the Magic Valley, also accused A. W. Brunt, chairman of the Democratic party, of trying to promote disharmony within the party ranks. The Democratic candidate told the delegates that he must have recognition in the party platform for local option gambling which, he said, was a policy made by the voters in the Democratic primary.

Talking to Brunt, who is not present, Smith read from a letter mailed this week to Democratic delegates throughout the state in which the chairman urged that Smith recognize the right of candidates to disagree with the party platform, as long as they do so in good faith, if they so choose.

Smith, who said Brunt wanted to change the party platform to incorporate into the party's program, said, "What a plan!"

He told the delegates "if I am going to be your candidate, what ever plans we adopt, I want no changing—and no changing" to the gaming issue.

The candidate said that to equivocate on the controversial gaming issue, which has split the ranks of the Democrats in Idaho, would be to "turn our backs on the 35,000 people who voted for local option gambling."

"The gambling plan is a national winner on the gaming issue," he said, "and I am repeatedly urged by my audience to support it at the convention."

Smith said he has split in per capita income, is saddled with millstone taxes, and does not have the political support of the population.

H. Sonner, 103, Succumbs in T. F.

Magic Valley's oldest citizen, Herschel Sonner, 103, died at 1:45 p.m. Saturday at Hazelred nursing home, Twin Falls, where he had lived for the past two years. He was born Nov. 19, 1868, at Jolo, Iri, and was a descendant of the Buhl and Twin Falls families since 1907, when he came to Buhl from Boise valley. He homesteaded land south of Buhl, noting on his 100th birthday that he paid \$1,500 an acre for the land. The 10-day trip from Boise to Buhl was made in a covered wagon.

He and his wife and their five children lived in their home, first building on the homestead, for two seasons until a house was constructed for the family on the farm.

Mr. Sonner's homestead provided cut seeds for Twin Falls during the first two years of its operation. In 1911, when he was 53, his health failed him and he went into permanent retirement, turning his farming operations over to his sons.

He attributed his lengthy life and good health to simple days of living, regularly eating at 6 a.m., eating breakfast at 6 a.m., lunch at noon, supper at 6 p.m., and retiring at 9 p.m.

He lives on a farm east of Twin Falls until October, 1960. (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—The high-altitude nuclear test scheduled today for the fourth time is being postponed because of weather conditions.

He also said that the party is being pulled apart by "lunatic fringe members" who are trying to force a "medical right" issue.

J.P. Kennedy Goes Home From Hospital

RYAN'S PORT, Mass., July 7 (AP)—Former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, rehabilitated enough from a stroke to leave a New York hospital, arrived in this Cape Cod resort today and was met by his son, President Kennedy's father.

The chief executive drove an open wheel convertible from his vacation retreat on the shore of Nantucket Sound to Hyannis airport in mid-morning to welcome his father.

Not until father and son were back in the family enclave of summer homes was the reunion disclosed. Press photographers were not permitted to take pictures.

The 73-year-old former ambassador was discharged from the New York University institute of physical medicine and rehabilitation for a two-month treatment for the effects of a stroke he incurred at Palm Beach last Dec.

Plans for his release were made some days ago, when doctors at the institute concluded the elderly ambassador was well enough to return to the scene of his many happy summers here with his family.

Nothing was said about it, however, in order to keep the homecoming a private, family affair.

An elevator had been installed at the house which the former ambassador has occupied summer after summer. A heated swimming pool had also been built in the lawn.

Turkey Gives Approval to Party Merger

ANKARA, Turkey, July 7 (AP)—The National Assembly approved Turkey's three-party coalition cabinet today and Premier Ismet Inönü's program of social and economic reforms based on a five-year development plan.

The vote of confidence that followed the cabinet's formation was 239-15 with four abstentions.

The 73-year-old Inönü, told parliament the vote "once again exposes the fallacy of claims that the democratic regime cannot survive" in Turkey.

The coalition cabinet, formed on June 25 after a prolonged government crisis, links Inönü's People's Republican party with the New Turkey and the right-wing Resanet National parties.

Dublin Father Comes Back to Life in Time to Stop Funeral

DUBLIN, July 7 (AP)—Bartholomew Murphy, father of six, came back from the dead today in time to catch his funeral.

The 44-year-old former farmer of Longwood was pronounced alive and conscious in a local hospital after his death notice and announcement of funeral arrangements had appeared in the newspapers.

The mixup, his wife explained, resulted when Murphy was transferred from one hospital to another. The first erroneously told the wife that her husband had died. A local newspaper report said when Murphy was taken ill Thursday he was rushed to a hospital in a coma. Later upon transfer to the second hospital he was found to be alive.

Murphy showed signs of life the report said, and he was revived through artificial respiration. The hospitals involved declined comment except to say Murphy was "now quite alive and comfortable."

Urgent telegrams notified friends and relatives, some of whom lived 200 miles away, that the funeral had been canceled.

Low-Power Test Blast Is Resumed

CAMP MERCURY, Nev., July 7 (AP)—The United States fired a secret low power nuclear weapon a few feet above the desert today in the first resumption of aerial nuclear testing on its own soil since 1958. The atomic energy commission and the department of defense said the explosion was in fact the effects of nuclear weapons. The mighty blast may be a prelude to tests next week using troops in atomic battlefield conditions. Such tests have been restricted forthwith without official confirmation.

Secrecy cloaked today's test at the Nevada test site, Ronda, to the military were allowed, and outside observers were barred.

Officials called the device low yield. This means it had explosive force of 20 to 100 kilotons, or 10,000 tons of TNT.

In view of the test results, there was no immediate description of the scene. The blast was expected to produce the familiar mushroom cloud and to send dirt, dust and debris showering high above the desert floor.

"Tremendous though it was, by conventional standards, Saturday's test was a spectacular age. It was a fifth as powerful as yesterday's significant 10-kilobomb blast from December 650 feet deep in the ground.

BOMBAY, India, July 5 (Sunday) (AP)—Police said early Sunday two airplane boys found the wreckage of a plane believed to be an All India Jetliner that had disappeared with 36 persons aboard. They said the wreckage was sighted on a hill in the jungles about 50 miles northeast of Bombay.

Officers of the town of Junnar reported the body of one man who was believed to have been found in the wreckage. They said an Italian lira note was found nearby.

BORDEAUX, France, July 7 (AP)—West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer temporarily pushed aside a growing political crisis at home today and concentrated his efforts on healing old Franco-German wounds.

He toured this famous wine-producing center on the next-to-last day of his six-day visit to France, the first three days of which were spent in London.

Adenauer will cap his visit with a trip to Rheims, famous cathedral city in the rolling champagne-country in eastern France.

There he and French Premier Charles de Gaulle will stand side by side for the first time since the salute at a review parade of French and West-German troops at nearby Camp St. Omer.

Together, they also will attend mass in the Roman Catholic cathedral of Rheims, which was destroyed in World War I by German guns and restored in the between-war years by the French.

Adenauer's visit was in part a gesture of goodwill toward the American Rockefeller foundation.

Rheims itself was sacked by the Germans in World War I and became France's martyr city. It was extensively damaged and lost its Gothic spire in a 1918 little less than a century ago.

WASHINGTON, July 7—For 40 years, as many Negroes as were eligible to vote contributed to the Democratic party. For almost 30 years, they have supported the Democratic party. Their political importance is magnified, for it is estimated by both headquarters that more will vote next November than in any previous election here.

It is understood that 40,000 will be eligible to vote in the single city of Atlanta, Ga. throughout the South, it is possible that they may equal a balance of such voters as New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and possibly public farms.

MOSCOW, July 7 (AP)—A resolution asking congress to liberalize the non-service connected pension for veterans will be considered at the annual American Legion of Idaho state convention in Salmon July 15-18. 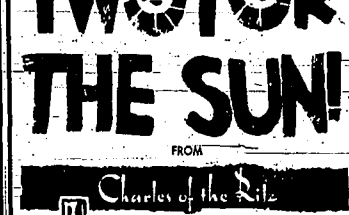

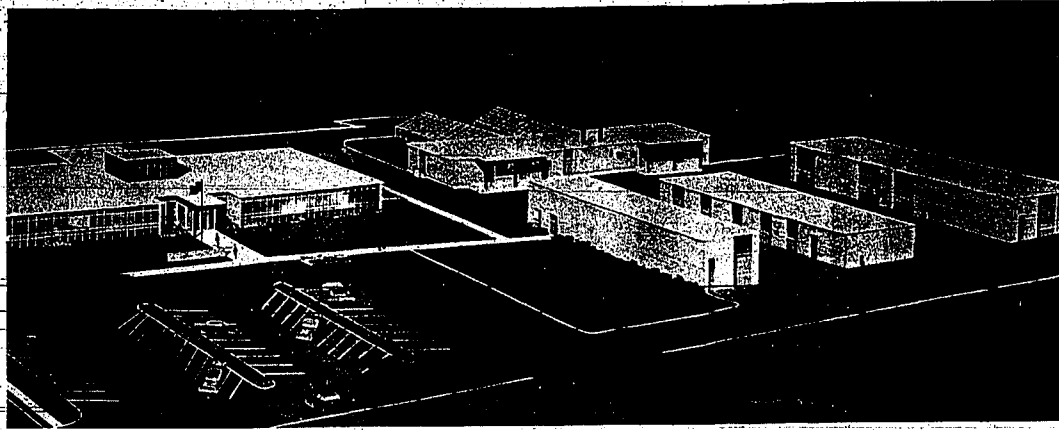

U.S. Eager to Settle Dispute With Mexico in Land Case

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Spot in Mexico-U.S. relations for more than half a century. Although the average U.S. citizen never heard of it—or forgot it if he did—in Mexico it has become a fiery, emotional issue of national pride and has been cited there frequently by anti-U.S. promoters as an affront to Mexico's dignity by its neighbor to the north.

Nobody seems to be exactly certain just what makes up the Chamizal, U.S. officials say a sizable chunk is undeveloped land or is occupied by two stockyards, but some of it may be potentially valuable property

along the river in El Paso. And if such land were to be handed over to Mexico the Chamizal might become a pretty fiery issue in El Paso and throughout Texas, too.

A week ago Kennedy and President Lopez Mateos of Mexico issued a communique during Kennedy's stay in Mexico City saying they were going to instruct their executive agencies to recommend complete solution to this problem.

At his news conference Thursday Kennedy said the Chamizal area was awarded to Mexico in the arbitration award of 1911 but that the United States, which had agreed to arbitration, backed down and did not accept the award.

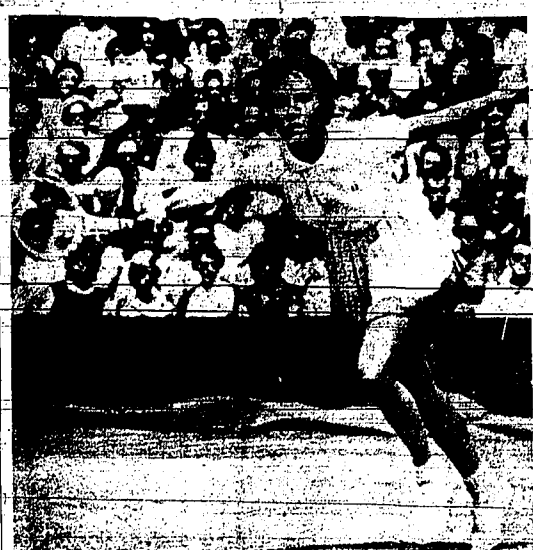

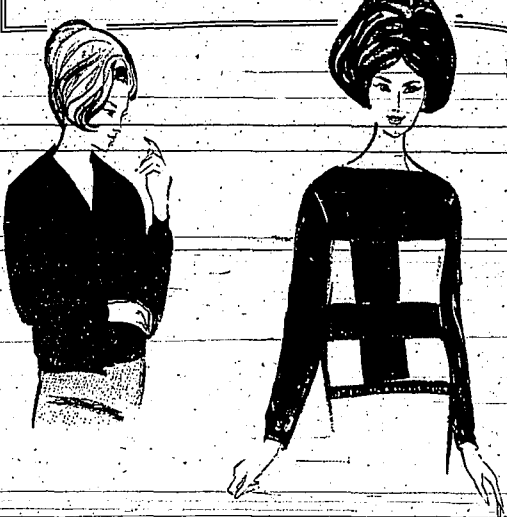

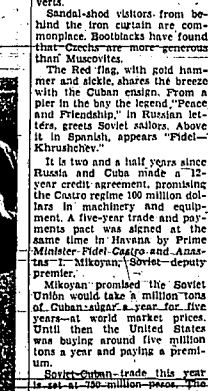

Space Age Takes Tiny Town From Gaslight to Satellites

ANDOVER, Me., July 7 (U.P.)—From gaslight to satellites in the history of this tiny Maine village.

A year ago satellites were something that kids read about in the city pages.

Television reception wasn't very good because the village is located in a valley of mountains in western Maine.

The party line telephone system was an old-fashioned magneto hand-crank phone.

You could tell a stranger in town because he'd drive up to the gas pump and wait for the general store and sit waiting for someone to put the gas in the tank.

Townsmen swapping yarns on the bench in front of the store liked to see just how long it would take a stranger to read what he'd better help himself if he wanted gas.

Andover's population has seemed to have been bypassed by the electronic age of communications. But suddenly it took one big jump and landed in communications satellite age.

A little more than a year ago strangers appeared in town, started buying up land previously of interest only to loggers and deer hunters.

Next about 50 local men were hired to timber a clearing and build a road to a small hill. Then after test borings, a massive concrete foundation was built.

Such fuss in a small town started the widest of rumors. When the bubble of imagination burst it left another bubble almost as fantastic in the biggest bubble in the world.

An isolated plastic sphere at stories high on the rim of the foundation was set up to house the world's largest relay, a 360-ton horseshoe magnet able to catch a faint whisper from a satellite several thousand miles away.

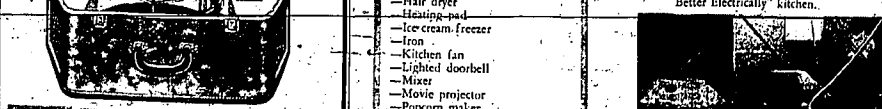

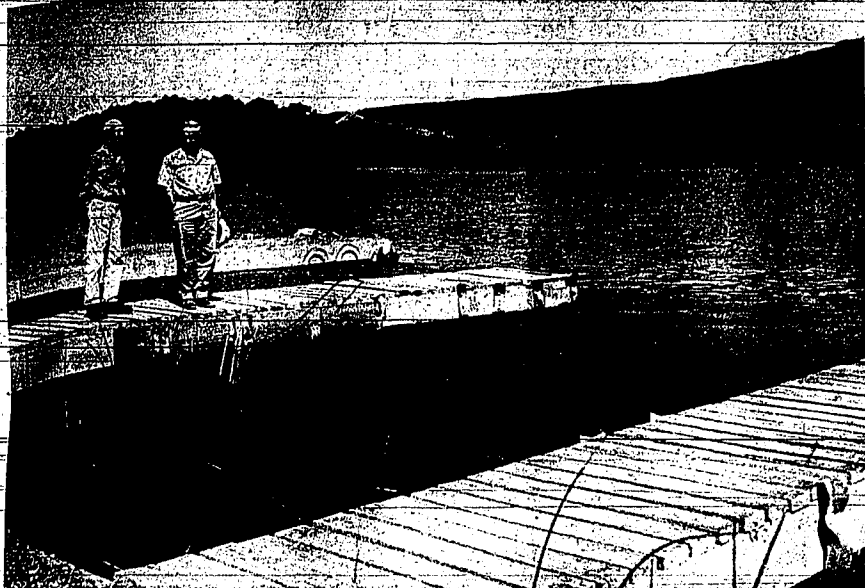

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 7 (AP)—The Winds of freedom, late in concentration, are blowing hard toward the Caribbean, Jamaica, ruled by Spain for 167 years and then by Britain for 307, becomes independent Aug. 6.

There will be a big day for 6-foot, 2-inch Big William Alexander Bustamante. As premier he hopes to put his island country into the Organization of American States, the British Commonwealth—and the United Nations.

A month or so ago Bustamante forbade Russian sailors to come ashore when two Soviet ships put in at Kingston. The premier says Moscow may be mad at him over that. Maybe they will even vote Jamaica's entry into the United Nations.

"I don't care what they do," he says. "I've done it and I'd do it again."

"We are pro-African. If by being pro-American, we are voting against our decision, we will accept it."

"We are anti-Communism because we are. If the United States were pro-Communism, we would still be anti-Communist."

But, Jamaica has a ruddy complexion. Jamaica 78 years ago to an Irish father and a mother who was mostly African. The island is the premier of the nation, as a result of his party's victory in last April's elections.

His domain has 1.8 million people, mostly black, in an area smaller than Connecticut. About 18 per cent of the workers are unemployed, but economic growth is keeping ahead of population.

A bank survey says the advance of Jamaica's economy in the last decade has been exceeded only in Japan and Puerto Rico. Exports brought some 170 million dollars last year, but heavy duties on essential goods led an unfavorable trade gap of 12 million dollars. The figures, however, do not include tourism, which is reckoned to produce 30 million dollars a year.

The main exports are aluminum and sugar. The world and its cigars are becoming better known as the Cuban supply dwindles.

Jamaicans seem of mixed feelings about their independence. They will live it out next month when Prince Margaret comes here to touch off celebrations. But there are sobering thoughts about going on their own.

Weeks of toil have given a gleaming new face of bronze to the massive 20-foot central doors of St. Peter's Basilica.

All the renovating is in anticipation of the Ecumenical Council of the Roman Catholic Church, the first in 92 years.

Heretofore it is the theme of the council itself, a worldwide gathering of the Roman Catholic hierarchy before the throne of Pope John XXIII, which is to be held in Rome.

There is much hope that Christian unity lies beyond the doors where 3,000 prelates and theologians gather Oct. 11 for possibly six months of discussions and decisions in the largest clean-up-Catholic-meeting of all time.

Ecumenism—the movement in Christian churches toward rapprochement and eventual union—is bound to the aims of the council but is not the council's chief reason for existence.

The gathering — to be known as the Second Vatican council — will be a council of discipline for the internal church. The first Vatican Ecumenical council (1869-70) was essentially a council of dogma at which a long-held belief in papal infallibility on matters of faith and morals was proclaimed a tenet.

Growth of Shrubs, Trees Is Threat to Great Elk Herds of Northern Idaho

By JIM HUMBERT
State Fish-Game Department

Over 50 years of natural succession of plants, shrubs and trees is turning the vegetation back to habitat conditions similar to those found before the great North Idaho wildfires of 1910. These fires and later ones converted some 1,500 square miles of timber to large brush and a habitat condition favorable to the American wapiti.

The region today generally is covered at the continent's No. 1 elk producer, and this is ascribed to the favorable but temporary browse habitat created by the fire's influence. For just a few years after it swept across the state, the brush and certain wildered loss of the brush was a major threat to several towns, threatening others, and causing widespread loss of property. The brush was reduced by an almost unlimited supply of fire.

These three stands of shrubs in the old burn areas included highly palatable and nutritious plants such as willows, redstart, sassafras, mountain maple, scruboak, yucca and chokecherry, as well as the shrubs that are so prized to the stage where "browse" species are growing out of reach of elk, just as they were 50 years ago before the brush was over the heads of the 18-year-olds.

Indeed there already is concern about the future of the winter range in the Clearwater river drainage. The second growth canopy under which deer and elk numbers are expected to decline.

Timber cruisers say that some of the young trees will be ready to use and saw in the not too distant future. In other areas the brush is being removed, but the canopy-shading and retarding of the development in 1910 of several experimental methods of inducing mahogany regrowth.

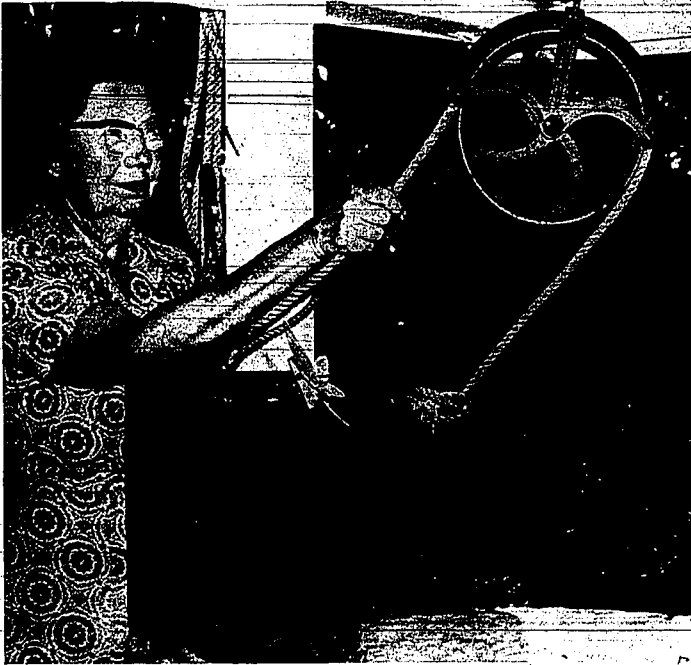

Next in line is a light house, complete with two lights for night. It is constructed of cement and also shells which the owners picked up on a recent trip to the Gulf of California in Mexico.

Still another creation is a series of water falls and related objects which is to bear the name Hole in the Wall.

Mrs. Pulpipher's favorite is the wishing well, which contains rocks from practically every state in the union. It now features the old oak bucket and a well pulley which is more than 100 years old.

The pulley was originally on a well which was dug by her great-grandfather. As a girl she took water from that well using the same pulley. During a visit to her former home in Arkansas this year, her grandfather gave it to her and she brought it back to Twin Falls, placing it on the wishing well in her yard.
