

Nuclear Device Set Off 200 Miles Over Earth in Successful Pacific Effort

HONOLULU, July 9 (AP)—A powerful hydrogen device exploded 200 miles above the Earth and lit the reaches of the Pacific from Hawaii to Australia for six minutes starting at 4 a.m. eastern standard time today. It marked success on the third try by the United States for the high-altitude test from tiny Johnston Island. The atomic energy commission in Washington at first would say only that the explosion involved a nuclear device and that it confirmed it would be proper to call it a thermonuclear explosion and use the term thermonuclear device.

Britain Backs Upper Strata Atomic Blast

LONDON, July 9 (AP)—The U. S. high-altitude nuclear blast over the Pacific was denounced by the British today and criticized and defended in Britain. Watchers in the distant Pacific set a spectacular display of fireworks. In Auckland, New Zealand, the blast produced 10 minutes of spectacular light and color. The sky was flooded with calls from New Zealanders, some curious, others angry. Telephone and telegraph lines were jammed. The explosion appeared above the northern horizon, spreading across a clear sky to the southern horizon. Then a lurid orange and red light shone through with quivering white shafts of light. Watchers in the Fiji Islands saw a glow of green, blue and yellow in the northeast sky. This turned to orange and crimson as the glow spread to the southwest. Shafts of bright white light in the center of the glow also were reported there.

Red World Congress Lashes U.S. Testing

MOSCOW, July 9 (AP)—The communist-led world peace congress, opened quietly in the Kremlin today but exploded into life as the United States exploded a nuclear device high over the Pacific. "It is a gift to the congress," jubilantly exclaimed Pravda's political commentator, Georgi Zhukov, as he got the news. Communist propaganda organs and delegates set out to exploit the test to the fullest. One after another, they collared waiting microphones of radio Moscow to denounce "American atom-maniacs," "American criminals," and "American warmongers."

Industry's First Space Launch Due

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., July 9 (AP)—Today, a communications relay satellite which represents private industry's first venture into space, scheduled to be launched Tuesday. Bell Telephone Laboratories of the American Telephone and Telegraph company built the complex satellite, and will pay all costs involved in launching the satellite. The satellite is being tracked by the company's tracking and control system. The cost is estimated at a million dollars, which will be paid by the mission falls.

Rusk Reveals Breakdown in Signal System

Kennedy, who made the appeal in a speech before the Cape Cod summer residence Sunday, reported some encouragement in a statement that more boys and girls were able to pass tests in schools with organized fitness programs, and that fewer failed after a year of physical education.

Chinese Guns Are Aimed at Spit of Rock

KAOTUNG ISLAND, off China July 9 (AP)—If red China attacks in the north Formosa strait this summer, this spit of rock rising out of the sea may be the first target.

Through a stowaway-sized telescope, this correspondent watched communist troops working on one of several new big gun positions directly opposite the Nationalist outpost island. The distance: four miles.

For Nationalist Chinese troops, Kaotung stands sentry just off the tip of red China's Huangchi peninsula, which throws a thin protective arm around a communist navy base in Lo-Yan Bay. Lo-Yan would be a major maritime area for a communist amphibious assault.

Closest to the mainland of any of the islands in the Nationalist-held Matsu complex, the Kaotung (seven-tenths of a square mile) is a place from which to watch the enemy and a place from which to fight if necessary.

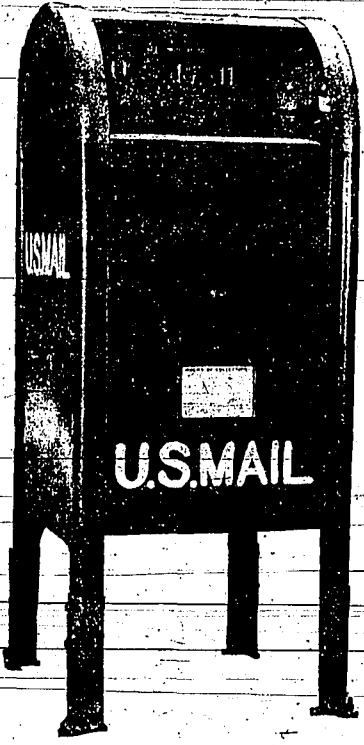

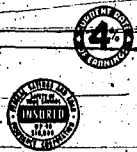

News-Around Idaho

POCATELLO, July 9 (U)—The sixth annual Idaho law enforcement training academy opens Monday at Idaho State college. Thirty-five police officers and sheriffs will attend the two-week training program in law enforcement and related subjects.
