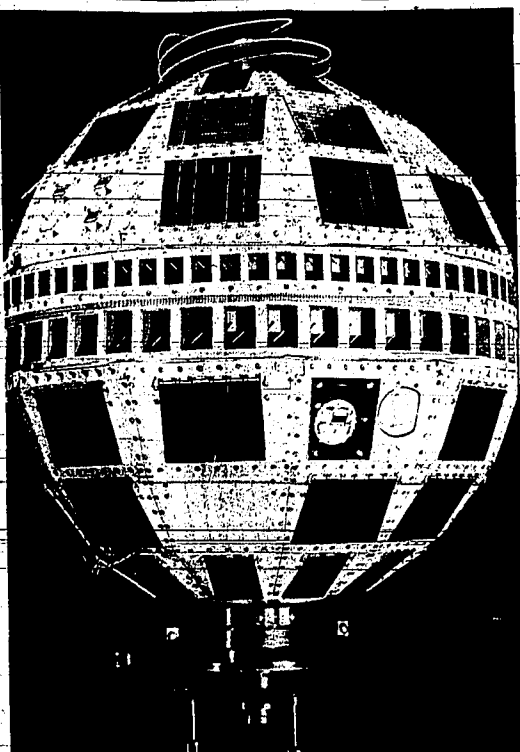

"It all depends on what the test program ends at Johnston Island."

CAPE CANAVERAL, July 10 (UPI)—The United States hurled into a near-perfect orbit today "Telstar," a world communications satellite heralded as the first "switchboard in space" for the telephone, radio and television industries. Technicians will try tonight to transmit "live" and video tape television programs, still photographs, news dispatches and telephone conversations between ground stations at Andover, Me., and Hightel, N. J., and the soaring "teletel." The three television networks will broadcast the historic adventure starting at 7:30 p.m. Eastern time. The "Telstar" whizzes around the Earth at 16,000 miles an hour on its 10th orbit.

A number of lightning fires were reported in North Idaho today Monday and more storms were expected to threaten the area.

Firemen were called to several strikes in the Clearwater National forest near Orofino and state crews controlled five small natural caused blazes over the week-end.

BOISE, July 10 (AP)—Crews brought a range fire in the Little Willow cross-area north of Boise under control after 11 days. The blaze started in buildings on the McClellan ranch about 20 miles northeast of Fayette, then spread to camped the Blaine.

The figures compare with a 1960 crop valued at \$1,718,000 and 1959 sales of \$1,500,000. The 1961 gain resulted both from a larger crop and from better prices. The 1961 crop totaled 1,150,000 bushels compared with 900,000 bushels in 1960 and the average price was \$2.00 per bushel in 1961 compared with \$2.25 in 1960.

BOISE, July 10 (AP)—Transfer of \$6,125,000 in state aid to the public schools, the first unit of \$125,000 dollars to be allocated during the fiscal year, was reported today by state treasurer Rulon Brewster. The money comes from the state's general fund and is allocated to the 44 counties on the basis of the formula approved by the legislature last year. The 17 million dollars to be distributed during the year will be \$1.7 million dollars to be distributed in 1961, \$1.7 million dollars allocated last year and increases the total for the biennium to the 33 million dollars authorized by the legislature.

Assault Count Against Hoffa Is Dropped

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The government has dropped an assault charge against Teamster union President James R. Hoffa because of conflicting accounts of the incident at union headquarters.

The misdemeanor charge was lodged May 17 after Samuel Baran, a field director of the union's national warehouse division, claimed Hoffa shoved him over a chair and knocked him down twice.

The U. S. attorney's office said Monday it was not able to prosecute Hoffa because there are serious conflicts between accounts given by Baran and those of six Teamsters employees who witnessed the incident.

Baran, 59, displayed a cut over his right eye, a blacked left eye and bruises on his face and leg after the alleged assault.

After the charge was brought against Hoffa, Baran said he was threatened and pressured to drop it.

Baran said a difference between Hoffa's "conception of the labor movement and mine" was behind the incident.

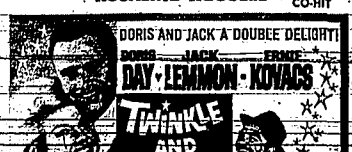

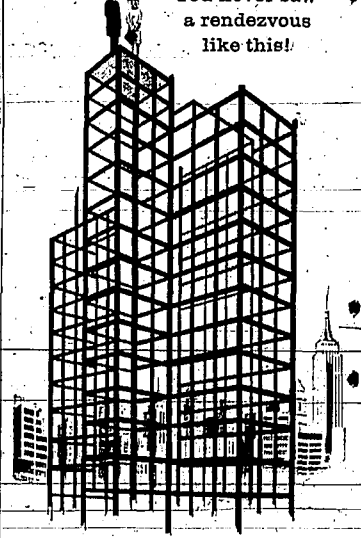

Players Seek Cut in Major Loop Schedule

Scott said the players feel the two all-star games are necessary in order to provide additional money that is necessary for the maintenance of the players' pension fund, which last year was budgeted to include managers in addition to the players and coaches.

The player representatives selected Bob Friend of Pittsburgh as the National League player representative and Bob Turley of the New York Yankees as the American League representative to succeed Gene Woodling, who was sold by Washington to the New York Mets last month.

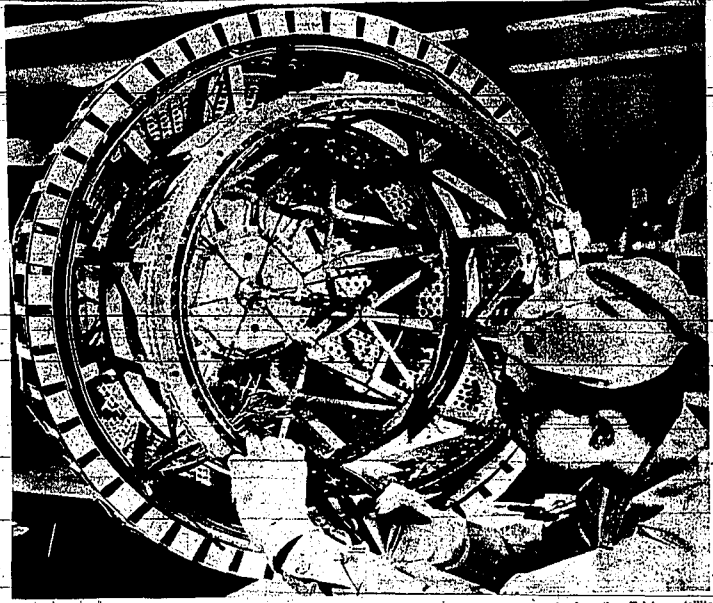

ANDOVER, Me.—A mountain-encircled ground station here is the originating point for test transmissions to Telstar. Equipment aboard the satellite is designed to amplify and retransmit to the ground the voice, video, picture and data transmissions it receives. Domestic tests scheduled after sixth orbit, about 14 hours after launch.

Satellite-Makes-TV Possible From Continent to Continent

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—History's first transatlantic telecast was days or weeks away today but its pioneers already were speculating about the first commercial in space.

Europe and America will beam live programs to each other if and when the Telstar satellite lines up between the two continents at decent viewing hours. This might be July 17, 18 or 23 if booster, rocket and relay satellite function satisfactorily or later. These are the program plans.

Atomic Waste Steam Power Plans Upset
