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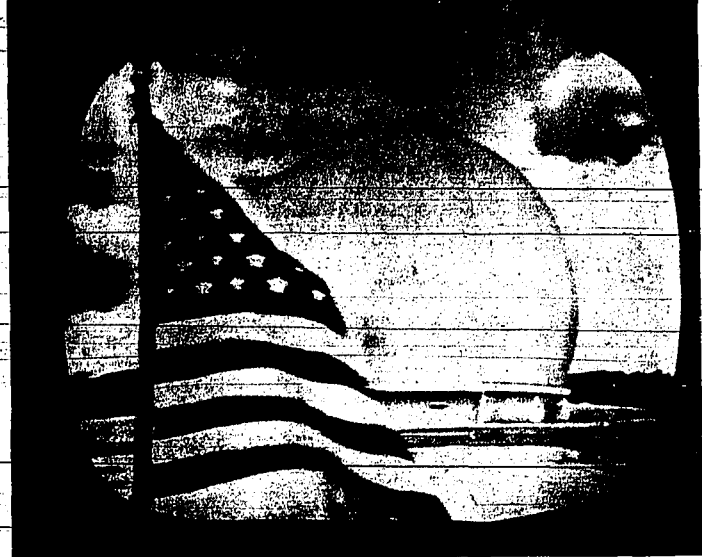
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Students Mob Kennedy at White House

Satellite Zooming In Space, Brings World Eyes, Ears

NEW YORK, July 11 (UPI)—Telstar, America's chattering new satellite, zoomed through lonely space today on its pioneering mission to bring the world new voice, ears and eyes. In triumphant baptism Tuesday night, it sent television pictures spanning the Atlantic to France and England, as well as into U. S. homes. It relayed a telephone call from Maine to Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson in Washington as loud and clear as the best of local calls.

Then for an encore, the versatile Telstar—only a yard wide—simultaneously transmitted three stories at a 1,600-word-a-minute clip, relayed photographs perfectly and supplied two-way telephone calls with perfect promptness from a 3,000-mile height in space.

Remarkably clear television pictures were received in France and were to be relayed by Telstar into French homes today.

French television officials predicted a boom in return programs to the United States beginning tonight or early Thursday French time, which is six hours ahead of New York's eastern standard time.

A Paris dispatch said this would include a song by Yves Montand, several views of Paris, and a message from Jacques Chateau, French communications minister.

In Britain, faint and fleeting pictures were picked up as Telstar received, amplified and re-radiated the program, beamed into space from a powerful horn antenna in the little town of Andover, Me. The first telecast via space opened with a view of London on Paris, Oct. 7.

Atom Device Set Off at Nevada Site

CAMP MERCURY, Nev., July 11 (UPI)—A low-power nuclear device, "fired" underground, sent a cloud of dust and sand soaring high over the Nevada desert today.

First-site observers said it flashed brighter than the morning sun, and a fireball boiled up above the ground's surface. Newsmen watching from mountains bordering the site, closed to official observers, saw neither the flash nor fireball.

Informed sources had said that a flash outlining the morning sun and a brilliant fireball might be visible. But newsmen watching from mountains bordering the test site were not able to see them, they reported.

The first flash was a large white cloud billowing upward from behind low hills in the Yucca Flat area, 65 miles north of Las Vegas.

Presumably, the nuclear device was buried so shallowly that it sent millions of tons of earth skyward, blasting a crater in the process.

Senators Approve Tax Revisions

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UPI)—The Senate Finance Committee today voted 10-5 to knock out of President Kennedy's tax revision bill the withholding system on dividends and interest.

The vote was a sharp setback for the President. He had counted on the withholding provision as the biggest revenue source in the bill to pay for benefits promised to business.

It was a victory for the committee's certain chairman, Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D. Va., who has vigorously opposed the withholding plan, and for many thousands of savers and investors who opposed it.

Prober Mentioned Estes Abuse Before Death, Senate Is Told

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UPI)—A former Texas farm official said today Henry Marshall told the Texas state committee in late 1960 or early 1961 he thought the cotton allotment transfer program was being abused and mentioned Billie Sol Estes.

But Baldwin P. Davenport, of Stamford, Tex., former chairman of the state agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, said nothing was done by the committee and the matter never came up again.

Marshall, U. S. agriculture department program specialist for Texas, was found dead of a gunshot wound in mid-1961. A verdict of suicide has been disputed but not overturned. Agriculture department officials say his death has hampered their investigation of how Estes was able to transfer more than 3,000 acres of cotton allotments into Reeves and Pecos counties.

The subcommittee is seeking to determine whether instructions from the agriculture department to halt the transfers reached the county level.

The department later canceled the transfers and fined Estes \$55,000 for overplanting. The allotments came from farmers forced off their farms by public projects, some of them in other states.

Although the state committee set policy on cotton allotments, Davenport said administrative matters involving them never came to the committee's attention unless there was some complaint.

"I'm just trying to find out about this operation," said Chairman John L. McCellan, D. Ark. "You mean you never heard anything more about these transfers. Didn't a lot of them go on in 1960?"

Davenport, who served as the chairman through 1960, until March, 1961, replied, "I wouldn't know, sir. Mr. Marshall's office handled all that. I'm sure it there had been something wrong, he would have brought it before the committee."

Sheriff Theo Johnson, who is directing dragging operations, said it surprised the man became worried about his daughter, Linda, 14, and four other girls who were swimming in the canal Tuesday afternoon. He is presumed to have driven over to the canal to check on them.

However, the girls did not get into the water. The man who lives near the canal, said he saw the car drive along the bank, but thinking it was more teenagers going swimming, paid no attention.

Boy, 8, Gets Chemistry at State College

RALSTON, N. C., July 11 (AP)—Eight-year-old Henry Rich normally is a third grade student. This summer he is an advanced member of an advanced chemistry class at North Carolina State College.

"Henry is an experiment," explains Dr. Alton Coots, freshman chemistry instructor at the college. "We are trying to find out how much a person can do in the future."

The professor said that Henry's aptitude was reading. "He is able to comprehend all of the reading in the advanced course," Coots says. "He does as well as the other students in the class and the writing of formulas and chemical configurations."

Coots said that Henry's ability to understand the college level work has shown us that a secondary school pupil can comprehend advanced work, so that general science begins in the fourth or fifth grades instead of the eighth or ninth.

Henry's carpenter father, O. N. Rich, said there had been no plan to develop the youngster's aptitude. He said Henry took a chemistry book given him as a gift.

When Henry can tear himself away from his academic work, he likes to hit baseballs and run over the college campus.

Moslem Calls For Socialist Algeria State
ORAN, Algeria, July 11 (AP)—The Moslem military commander in the Oran region, an avowed follower of dissident Deputy Premier Ahmed Ben Bella, called Tuesday for Socialist Algeria, but added: "Get this straight — we are not communists."

Capt. St. Bakhti, 40, a battle-seasoned veteran, praised the Red Chinese but expressed distrust of the Russians. Bakhti told newsmen: "Red China saved the nationalist rebellion against France by providing 150 million dollars in aid in 1960 after the Moslem leader, nearly broke, was turned down by the United States and other Western countries."

He said he had a great deal to say to the Chinese people, Bakhti said, "but it doesn't mean we will adopt their system of government."

"He added that he distrusted the Russians because 'with them, there are always political overtones.'"

He said: "I would receive you Westerners in my camp, but not the Russians."

Bakhti halted Ben Bella on "the issue of the future for all the Algerian people."

The captain, who commands about 1,000 men camped on the outskirts of Oran, and other towns in western Algeria, left no doubt that the infant country's second largest city is a Ben Bella stronghold.

He said he is obeying the orders of Col. Houari Boumediene, former chief-of-staff and Ben Bella ally who was removed from his post by Premier Ben Yousef Ben Khedda. The action split Algerian nationalist leadership.

Bakhti defined his political goal as Algerian socialism founded on the system of local communal life prescribed in the Koran.

The captain, who worked in a World War II U. S. army office in Oran in 1944, talked to newsmen in one of his many command posts, a stucco plantation house outside Oran that once belonged to a European settler.

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New Chemical Saves Plants

TULSA, Okla. (U)—Make a note of Dr. S. H. Whitner, professor of horticulture at Oklahoma State University. He has discovered a new chemical, N-6-benzylamine purine, probably the most important discovery of 1947.

The chemical doubles the storage life of harvested vegetables. Whitner told a science meeting at the University of Tulsa. It's tasteless and doesn't affect the nutritional qualities of food, he added. He said the federal food and drug administration has given it temporary approval.

"What the chemical does is inhibit respiration of the plant—slow up its breathing," he said. "That's all — and it works."

"No matter what the temperature of storage, such products as lettuce, celery, cabbage and broccoli keep their freshness twice as long," he said. "If a head of lettuce normally keeps fresh three days in a refrigerator, then it will last nearly a week if it has been treated."

He said an East Berlin scientist discovered the food-preserving qualities of N-6-benzylamine purine about six months ago.

Shrinkage Puzzle Bewilders Patron

NEW PHILADELPHIA, O. (U)—The large bookmobile of the Tazewell county library had been damaged in a traffic mishap and a repair man was requested from the state library to use until repairs could be completed.

The state sent over a smaller model, though the exact color of the county's own bookmobile's first run, a youngster stopped the librarian and asked, "What happened? Did it shrink when you got it washed?"

Mosquitoes May Give Age Clue

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (U)—Dr. Calvin A. Lang of the University of Louisville hopes to use mosquitoes to find out why men grow old.

Lang is doing basic research into the biochemistry of growth and aging, with one goal being to determine why one person is burned out at 35 and another is spry and active at 50.

Why mosquitoes? Although they live only about 30 days, they have precise and sharply divided periods of development. They grow rapidly, age rapidly and have nutritional requirements similar to humans.

Restaurant Puts Caricature Back

NEW YORK (U)—Lillian Roth has been restored to the picture gallery that is a feature of Broadway's best-known theatrical restaurant (Savoy) after a 30-year absence.

Miss Roth was one of the first celebrities to be caricatured by the restaurant's first artist, Alec Gard, but the portrait was stored away when she slipped out of show business. She recently resumed her career as a principal player in the musical, "I Can Get It for You Wholesale," and the rehanging ensued.

Lincoln's Farm Changed to Park

LINCOLN CITY, Okla. (U)—Leo Sergeevitch has farmed the Lincoln farm, which is to be made a national memorial park, for 40 years.

He became owner of the farm, on which you can still see the Lincoln, when he inherited it in 1922.

The U. S. senate and house of representatives approved bills in February to make the farm part of a national Lincoln Memorial Park.

Water Springing From Old Spring

SALEM, Mass. (U)—A spring that supplied the Indians is still producing the purest of water here.

Public Property Sup. John J. O'Rourke says the spring had been on park department records as long as anyone can remember.

The spring has been piped to facilitate filling jugs. People come from miles around daily to get their supply.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (U)—Being overweight and being fat are far from synonymous, two doctors from the school of aerospace medicine at Brooks air force base, Tex., told a medical convention here recently.

Capt. James R. Wamsley and Dr. James E. Roberts studied the bodies of 51 army aviators selected at random. A body composed of as much as 20 per cent fat was considered overweight.

The studies showed 15 of the 51 were obese but not overweight and six were overweight but not obese, while only five were both overweight and obese, the doctors said.

Because a similar conditions probably prevail on other planets, Dr. Fox says intelligent life based on DNA, probably could have developed elsewhere.

Smith's Conservatism Seems Out of Step With Democrats

BOISE, July 11 (UPI)—Vernon R. Smith's ultra-conservative political philosophy seems as much out-of-step with the views of most Idaho Democrats as does his former advocacy of legislation governing the Democratic nominee for governor is far to the right of the three members of the congressional delegation who will be his running mates in the fall general election.

His positions on many of the major issues parallel those of his Republican opponent, Gov. Robert F. Smylie. And in some cases, Smith is much more conservative than Smylie.

Smith himself acknowledged that the "main contrast between" Smylie and me is the matter of unnecessary wasteful spending in the way the government is operated.

Smith, a native of Peacetto, unsuccessfully sought the Republican nomination for state representative from Ada county when he came to Boise to open his law office about 20 years ago.

His current bid for the governorship—as a Democrat—is his second try for public office.

Smith is backing his campaign on the promise to "take a butcher's ax to the budget and an axe to the tax structure."

His views are sharply at odds with the overall philosophy of the Democratic party, which has emphasized "increasing government services through liberal social welfare programs."

Smith flatly rejects this philosophy.

Smith said he does not believe that his philosophy is out of step with the rank and file Democratic voters.

Smith's greatest challenge now is selling his gambling program to the Democrats at their platform convention Saturday in Idaho Falls.

But he may also run into trouble with party members over his conservative views on government.

India Charges Red Chinese In Aggression

NEW DELHI, July 11 (UPI)—India accused Red China Tuesday night of a new aggressive thrust onto Indian soil in Ladakh and warned Beijing it will be held wholly responsible if a shooting war results.

Prime minister Nehru, from his vacation spot in the Pahalgam, Kashmir, dictated the final contents of a protest note handed to the communist Chinese embassy here.

The note charged nearly 400 Chinese soldiers presented the Galwan valley, in the Chinaladakh border area Tuesday and encircled the Indian military post there.

If the Chinese overrun the post, it would make the sixth Red military base, by India's count, set up in the disputed border area since 1959.

A note last Sunday from Peking to the Indian government charged that the Indians had established a post in the Galwan area to isolate a Chinese post in the lower reaches of the Shiyok river.

An Indian reply said the Chinese were nowhere in the valley when they sent the note and added that they had no business to be there.

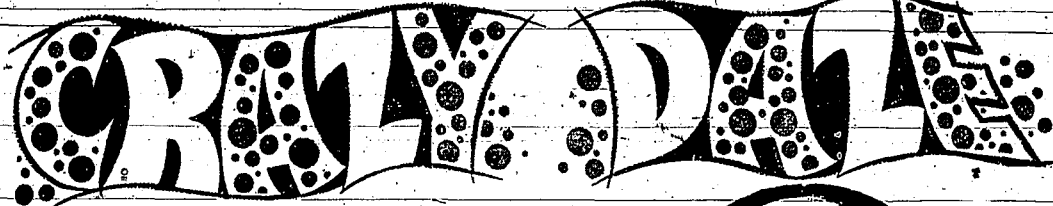

Exemption of Property Tax Is Reported

SHOSHONE, July 11—Assessed valuation of Lincoln county property for which persons received exemption in taxes this year is estimated at \$28,000, according to the county auditor's office.

There were 49 persons who completed the applications for tax exemptions for this property involved.

County commissioners completed their action as a board of equalization during the regular business meeting Monday at the courthouse. They also received quarterly reports from officers.

Myron D. Johnson, county treasurer reported collecting \$4,765.69 less in the second installment of 1961 taxes, the period ending June 30, 1962, than was collected for the same period a year ago.

Collected as of June 30, 1961, was \$185,998.77 while for 1962 the amount was only \$191,220.26.

Shrinks were awarded the coal supply for the year, for both the courthouse and Wood River Consolidated center.

Queen's Solid Gold Hot Dog Is Just Base Chicago Gild

CHICAGO, July 11 (AP)—Trio of tourists planning to visit Britain's Buckingham palace: All that glitters is not gold.

Take, for instance, that "solid gold hot dog" you'll find in the queen's gallery amid the art treasures and the jewels.

That hot dog would probably feel more at home amid a collection of gold bricks, deeds to the Brooklyn bridge and stock in Billie Sol Estes enterprises.

It's just a gilding job on base metal.

And no matter what they tell you, it wasn't an "official" gift from the city of Chicago. It came from the national hot dog and sausage council, which is a group of press agents who dedicate their lives to the care and feeding of frankfurters.

Not that, her majesty's been had, you understand. Or no more so than Billie Schuchman. He's got one too.

Palace sources in London announced yesterday that the "solid gold-hot-dog" from the city of Chicago would go on display along with a Rembrandt and other mementoes Queen Elizabeth has picked up in her travels.

Col. Jack Kelly, Mayor Richard J. Daley's director of special events, replied: "The city of Chicago never gave Queen Elizabeth any solid-gold-hot-dog."

...Really added, "We kept everything on a high cultural level that exemplified Chicago. The official city gift was some recordings by the Chicago symphony orchestra."

But Virginia Wertheimer, executive secretary of the hot dog and sausage council, said that if the Queen has a gold hot dog, "it couldn't possibly have been given her by anyone but us."

Mrs. Wertheimer said the council sent the Queen a gold hot dog in 1957 as a "cute gesture." The Queen's secretary sent it back "for some reason of protocol."

The council tried again in 1959 after the Queen visited Chicago. Apparently that trip to the oncine "hog butcher of the world" softened hearts among the palace entourage. At least, the hot dog was not returned.

"I'd hate to say it," Mrs. Wertheimer said. "It's our hot dog—and I'm sure it is—it's only gold plated. It should be among the silver knickknacks."

But if it's any consolation to palace tour guides, "Initially every person of note in the world has received a gold hot dog from us," Mrs. Wertheimer said.

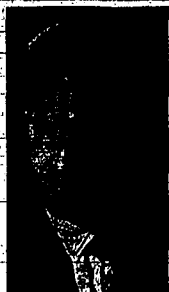

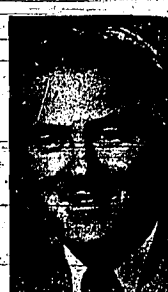

Marathon Race Sparks Oakley Event

OAKLEY, July 11—The creative men behind and organizers for the Pioneer Day celebration July 21 at the Oakley Village are sponsoring a marathon race which will be held during the July celebration in 1958, followed by two more, one in 1949, one in 1950.

The marathon is a relay race which was run between Burley and Oakley, a distance of 50 miles, in 1949. It was won by a team of 23 men, interested riders from Idaho and Utah enter and each mile is allowed to use a string of fire hoses.

In 1948 Bob Johnson, Rupert, won first prize, covering the distance in 48 hours, eight minutes, 11 1/2 seconds. The winner of the 1950 race was Clarence Ehlquist, Oakley, whose ride took 59 minutes, 11 1/2 seconds. "Kid" Boushara of Cronise Creek, Utah, is 1958 man of the race in 56 minutes, 43 1/2 seconds. Several hundreds of dollars in purses were given each year.

The Oakley Vigilantes did not sponsor another marathon race until 1958 with larger purses to help attract more riders. The first prize was \$200, second \$100, third \$50. Allen Ripper, Idaho, captured first prize, making the ride in 1958 in only three minutes and five seconds. The winners in 1957 were Greg Kimber, Cronise Creek, whose time was 36 minutes, 45 1/2 seconds.

In 1950, "Kid" Blanthorn won the prize for the second time. The distance between Burley and Oakley was covered in 55 minutes, 45 1/2 seconds. "Kid" Blanthorn won the 1950 first prize, which was raised to \$100, second prize to \$50 and third prize to \$25. Last year, the riding club from St. Johns, Utah, won first prize over "Kid" Blanthorn by a very margin, within a short distance from the judging stand, the time being 45 minutes, 47 1/2 seconds. The winners in 1957 and 1958 have been announced in the past several years. Warrant Is Issued for Roof Fraud

SHOONHO, July 11—A warrant was issued today by Lincoln county sheriff's officers for the arrest of Arthur Joles, who is wanted for fraud in connection with several roofing jobs done in the area.

The complaint was signed by a Shoonho citizen who was charged \$225 for having his roof treated with what Joles referred to as "asphalt of mineral spirits." Sheriff Thomas W. Conner said the mixture is a potential fire hazard—it appears to be low grade gasoline mixed with a slight amount of asphalt mix and aluminum powder.

The sheriff said investigation indicates Joles is operating with two brothers and his father. The father was located in Lincoln county just about to set another roof job started and the brothers were operating in the Jerome area.

Two of the men have pickup trucks with 4B licenses, one has an 8B license and the fourth, member of the family has a truck with an Oklahoma license. The men are from Oklahoma, the sheriff said.

One resident in Shoonho said when Joles approached her for the roof treatment job he estimated it would take 15 gallons of the mixture at \$5.50 per gallon. But when he got through he said it had taken 30 gallons.

The sheriff said reports from individuals who were "taken in" by the men indicate they jugged their prices, according to what they thought they could get.

Officers threw some of the mixture onto weeds and tossed a match into it to test the fire hazard. The mixture is highly explosive and "really blows up into a blaze," they reported.

Saskatchewan Protest March On Medicare Draws Crowds

REGINA, Sask., July 11 (AP)—Thousands of citizens from all parts of Saskatchewan converged on this provincial capital today for a demonstration against the government's compulsory medical care plan.

Leaders of the protest move expressed confidence there would be no violence, but some officials indicated concern by issuing appeals for calm and restraint.

Cavalcades were expected from all leading cities and towns. Estimates of the number of persons taking part ran as high as 20,000 to 30,000. They planned to mass before the provincial legislative building to voice opposition to the medicare plan.

The demonstration is sponsored by the Keep Our Doctors Committee, most vocal group backing the doctors strike which began July 1.

A majority of the province's 700 active physicians have joined in the strike against the controversial plan, claiming it opens the door for government control of the medical profession.

The plan, designed to provide medical care for everyone, is financed by single person and family assessments and by general taxation.

Nine British doctors arrived from London Tuesday night to fill vacancies created by the doctors strike. Officials said at least two dozen more doctors from Britain were due here later this week.

Earlier appeals from the government were answered by 11 other doctors from Britain, two from the United States and four from other Canadian provinces.

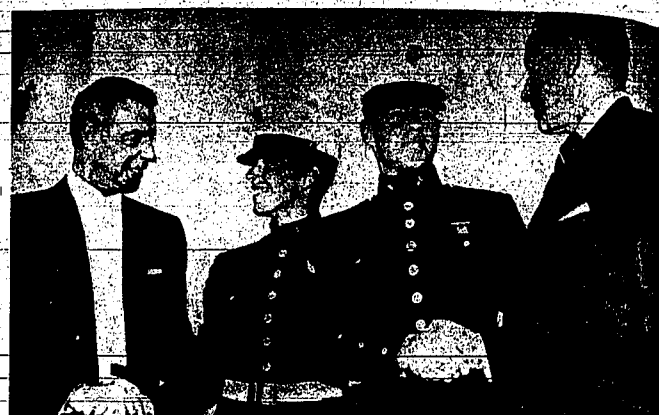

General Gets Second Spot From Franco

MADRID, July 11 (AP)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco, for the first time in his 23 years as head of the government of Spain, has decided to name a second in command, official sources said today.

In a reshuffling of his cabinet, Franco has created the new post of vice president of the council of ministers, according to the sources who said the appointments would be announced officially tomorrow. Changes will be made in seven key ministries the sources added.

Franco, who is 69 and who has refused to indicate a choice of a successor in the event he should step down, has chosen Capt. Gen. Agustin Munoz Grandes for the post of vice president of the council of ministers, the sources said. Munoz Grandes, 60, has been chief of the joint general staff highest ranking officer in the Spanish army. Except for Franco, he is the only captain general of the armed forces.

Munoz Grandes also has served as general secretary of the Spanish navy. Or Franco's military household, and army minister. He has the most command of the Spanish army divisions on the eastern front during World War II.

U. S. Doubts Russians Have Effective Antimissile System

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—U. S. officials believe the Russian still are a long way from achieving a combat-ready antimissile system, a report said today. They are not disputing that the Russians may have developed an antimissile rocket, as Soviet Premier Khrushchev claimed Tuesday. But they stress that development of such a rocket is only part—and not the most difficult part—of the problem of fashioning a complete antimissile system with associated radar and other highly sensitive and complex gear.

One of the biggest problems as the United States has found in its work with the Nike Zeus antimissile system is to perfect a radar that can discriminate between oncoming warheads and decoys sent out by an enemy to confuse and foil the defenses.

One official familiar with intelligence reports said the Russians have been employing large numbers of fairly powerful radar units, but that their radar is not able to reach no higher than perhaps 100,000 feet and

partly as part of defenses against nuclear bombers. He said there is no information here to indicate the Russians have developed an operational warhead, as distinguished from a research and test model.

It is known that the Russians last September exploded high above Earth a nuclear test antimissile system—a test of a type that "killed" some of the characteristics of an antimissile weapon.

President Kennedy, in a broadcast four months ago, announced plans to resume U. S. nuclear testing in the atmosphere. The Soviet test was aimed, in part, at "improving" their "capabilities" in this area.

But he added: "While appearing to seek information which is important in developing an antimissile defense system, these tests did not, in our judgment, reflect a developed system."

The information Kennedy said the Russians appeared to be seeking was believed to involve the effects of nuclear blasts on radar and communications.

U. S. scientists were looking for similar information in developing a hydrogen device more than 200 miles above the Pacific last Sunday night.

Defense department sources said evaluation of the results of that high altitude shot are not expected for perhaps 48 hours. How much information will be made public is not known.

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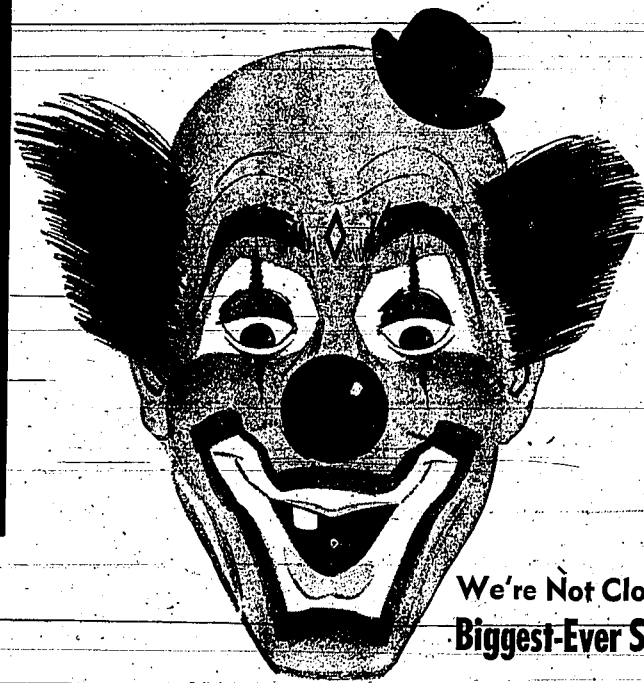

Tax Levy Is Set for Area Road District

RICHFIELD, July 11—Steady improvement of roads, bridges and culverts was noted at the Richfield highway district July meeting when the 1962 appropriation and tax levy was set.

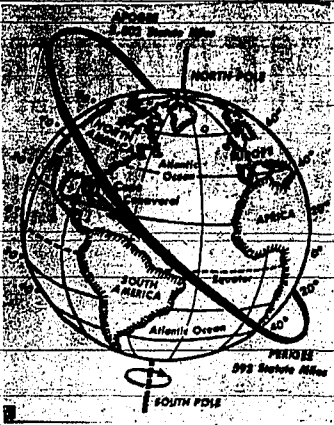
The sum of \$48,000 was appropriated from the district treasury to improve the highway system. This year's tax levy of one dollar per \$100 assessed valuation remains the same as last year.

Planned improvements include regrading of 25 miles of road by penetration of process on approximately four and one-half miles on the west, and grading Richfield on the east, and closing 14 1/2 blocks near the Richfield schools as the district part of cooperative school district improvement plan with the school district and village of Richfield in 1962.

Two additional blocks will be closed from the school east to Main street on the south side of the town park. The district will be reimbursed by the village for necessary expenses on the latter two blocks.

Net receipts in 1961 for the Richfield district were \$33,285.88. Cash expenditures for 1961 were \$31,292.27. Estimated 1961 appropriation expense was \$51,000, but because of a slight drop in the district full expenditure of the appropriation was not as high.

In past years snow removal costs have run into thousands of dollars. Cash balance at the beginning of 1962 was \$19,421.85 with anticipated gross income to be \$39,240. Forty thousand dollars of the amount is for maintenance and construction and \$5,000 for bridges and culverts.
