WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The biggest federal tax cut of any kind since 1954 is in effect today. Business gets the bulk of the 3.6-billion dollar reduction designed to spur faster economic growth. President Kennedy announced the cut Wednesday and noted that the principal pressure for it came from the business community. Many businessmen have been extremely critical of the tax cut.

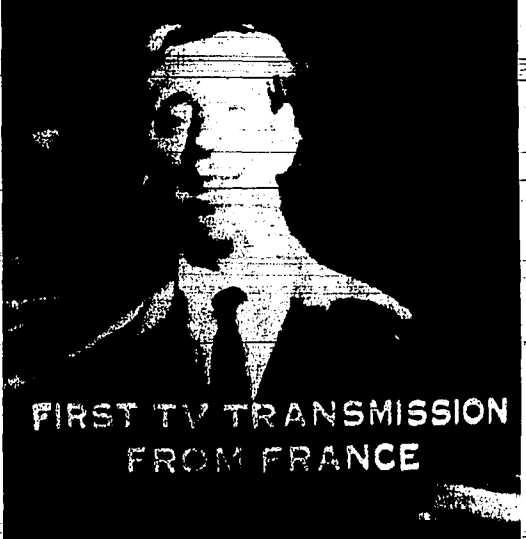

WASHINGTON, July 12—The reaction to the All-Republican conference organized by National Chairman William F. Buckley Jr. and formally christened at former President Eisenhower's White House last week has had the effect of solidifying the various parties of the right and the left into a single bloc to stage a comeback in 1962 and 1964. Opponents seem to realize that they are fighting a monopoly hostile to new ideas and to new faces.
Strains against this new bloc are principal target of this criticism, which is being ventilated through his views open.

DEFENSE SPENDING — His other remark, which is generally regarded as unfortunate in these critical days of the "cold war," is that the defense administration is spending too much money on the national defense budget. He contends that this charge will not find much "complaint" in either major party.
It hasn't. In fact, with bipartisan support, congress has tried to force both Eisenhower and Kennedy to reduce their defense spending. This has not been the case. In fact, both the White House and their defense secretaries considered to be necessary.

ROCKEFELLER'S REBUTTAL — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, although he is the outstanding political symbol and beneficiary of "business" conservatism, is siding strongly with former President Eisenhower on this question.
In what amounted to a rebuttal, although couched in mild language, Rockefeller said that the GOP must be representative of all elements of our diverse and heterogeneous society. And the individualistic, entrepreneurial spirit which has made our country what it is, he said, is the business and industrial community do not constitute a majority of the electorate, which has a right to be heard.

NEED SUPPORT OF "LITTLE FELLOWS" — Although Vice President Nixon, by reason of his former association with Eisenhower, offered an unqualified and unreserved support of the nominee, he faces the same problem as Rockefeller in his attempt to be elected governor of California in the fall. He needs the support of the "little fellows" in the increasingly cosmopolitan coastal state.
The fact that a large number of the state's great and electorally influential states has elected a businessman as governor in many years, the fact that Rockefeller is a banker, but he was such a liberal that FDR called him my good friend.

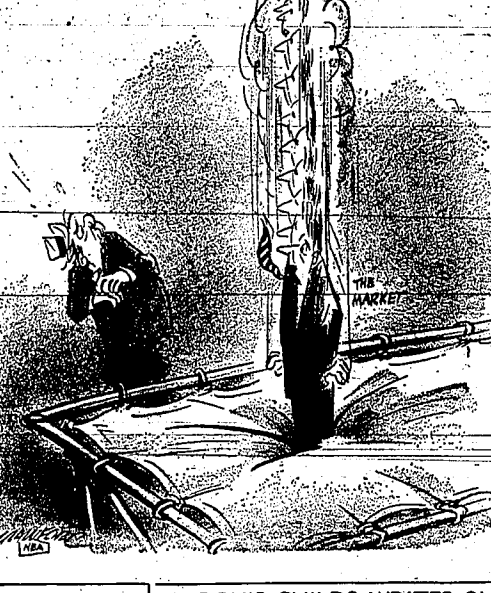

LESSONS OF THE PRIMARIES

Sen. Carl Hayden of Arizona and Rep. Clarence Cannon of Missouri are chairman respectively of the senate house appropriations committee and the House Appropriations Committee. Both are men of long enough to know better than to make the "whole hog" contention by a quarrel over the "meat" of the program.
The result of this infinite contention is to hold up appropriations needed for the operation of the government. For one example, the agents and clerks of the government are being paid.

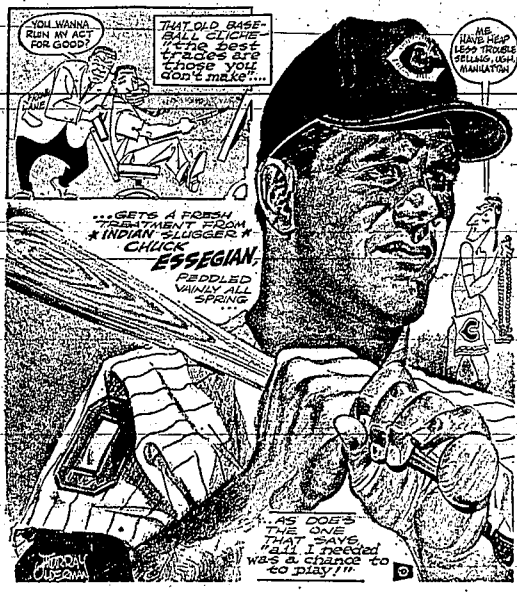
