Airlifted Vietnamese Battling Red Guerrillas North of Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, July 17 (AP)—Heavy clashes were reported today between Red guerrillas and a strong force of government troops airlifted into combat. The Viet Cong reportedly were hit by Viet Cong ground fire, but there was no word of U. S. casualties. The region is not far from the spot where about 600 guerrillas ambushed a convoy of 15 vehicles and 270 Viet Cong troops Saturday. The Red killed 23 Vietnamese and their American advisers, Capt. Don J. York, Asheville, N. C., then got away. Searchers have found the body of another American serviceman from another helicopter shot down by the communists Sunday. This brought the toll to two Americans and four missing in three air crashes in two days.

New Sewer System Nearing Completion

Construction of the Twin Falls sewer system is 86 per cent complete, Gene Miller, consulting engineer, reported to the city commission Monday evening. Britain Hints At New Stand In Arms Talk

GENEVA, July 17 (AP)—Britain hinted strongly today that the West will suggest some new compromise proposals to the 17-nation disarmament conference. British Minister of State George Gordon called on the Soviet Union to modify its own proposals to prevent the conference from being bogged down in failure and added:

"It will be seen in due time that the communists are not being wasting their time during the talks. The conference will be held after a one-month summer recess.

Gordon told the 15th plenary session of the disarmament conference that the Soviet proposals tabled yesterday are welcome inasmuch as they go beyond the Soviet draft which would leave the advantage continuing on the disarmament process.

The Soviet Union wishes to abolish nuclear delivery vehicles and foreign bases and then move on to the abolition of nuclear weapons.

"The U. S. draft treaty suggests gradual reduction of these weapons over about 10 years," Gordon welcomed two minor proposals from Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin yesterday: "A hot telephone" between the Kremlin and the White House to cut down the risk of war by accident, and an exchange of military missions among participating nations.

But, he said, the "Soviet proposals are mostly too far in content." The Russians served notice yesterday that they will accept a nuclear test ban treaty, Goder said, but not touch on this today.

Rocket Plane Apparently Sets Record

Military Coup Looms in Peru

LIMA, Peru, July 17 (AP)—A military coup was reported imminent today following the resignation of the Peruvian cabinet because President Manuel Prado refused to bow to demands that he nullify the June 10 national elections.

Premier Carlos Astorga Paz and his ministers quit Monday night during a four-hour emergency meeting with Prado. Ex-Financo Minister General Zamla told newsmen he expected the armed forces to take power in a day or two.

Domestic Sugar Producers Given Big Quota

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UPI)—Domestic sugar producers have been given a larger share in the supply of sugar to be imported into the United States.

The new quota, which is 1,100,000 tons, is a 25 per cent increase over the 875,000-ton quota that was in effect last year.

The new quota is to be phased in over a two-year period, with 500,000 tons in 1963 and 600,000 tons in 1964.

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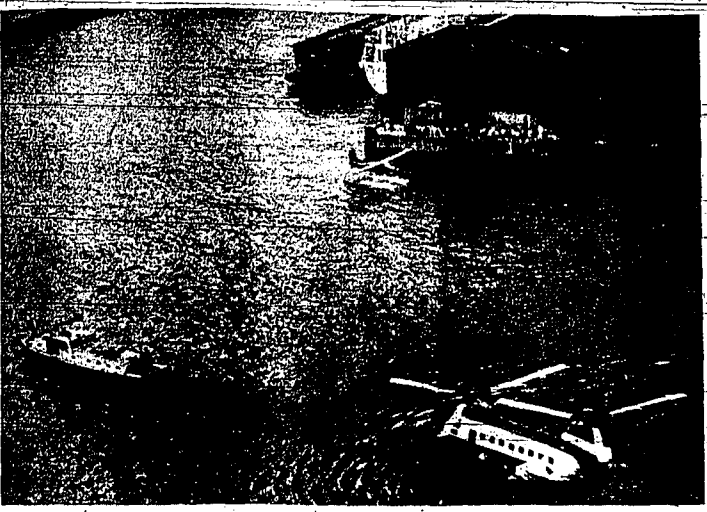

PARIS, July 17 (AP)—Acting United Nations Secretary General Thant conferred with President Charles de Gaulle for 45 minutes today and described the meeting as a "very useful exchange of views on matters of mutual interest."

Asked if France would now be willing to increase her cooperation with the United Nations, Thant said yes.

"It would not be proper for me to say anything beyond that at this moment," he said.

However, he said that his talks with De Gaulle covered "important African questions" and disarmament.

Thant was rendered all the honors customarily given a chief of state on his arrival and departure.

Helicopter Lands In Gotham River

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—An airport shuttle helicopter carrying 22 persons made an emergency landing on the East river Monday after one of its two engines failed. It stayed afloat—no officials said it was difficult to do—and was towed ashore.

None of the 19 passengers and three crewmen was injured.

Representatives of the federal aviation agency and the civil aeronautics board, called to the scene, reported foreign matter found in one of the two engines caused its failure.

The helicopter, a new Boeing Vertol 107 of New York Airways, took off from Newark, N. J., airport for Roosevelt airport with a stopover at the Wall street heliport on the East river.

Mother Seeks Role in Space For Women

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—The "PTA" type "bridge club" can look pretty tame to a girl when outer space beckons, a senator's wife who is a mother of eight observed today.

So why, Mrs. Philip A. Hart asked a house subcommittee, doesn't the United States take a closer look at the possibility of rocketing a female into orbit?

Space agency officials have shown no enthusiasm over proposals that women be included in the space travel program.

"It is inconceivable to me," said the wife of Michigan's junior Democratic senator, "that the world of outer-space should be restricted to men only, like some sort of 'men's club.'"

Mrs. Hart hastened to add that she wasn't trying to be a space age Susan B. Anthony.

"I am not arguing that women be admitted to space—merely—40 that they won't feel discriminated against," she said. "I am arguing that they—be admitted because they have a very real contribution to make."

Her testimony was prepared for a house space subcommittee studying the qualifications for astronauts—male and female.

Mrs. Hart is convinced the Soviet Union will send a cosmonaut into orbit this fall—and will be first unless the United States acts soon.

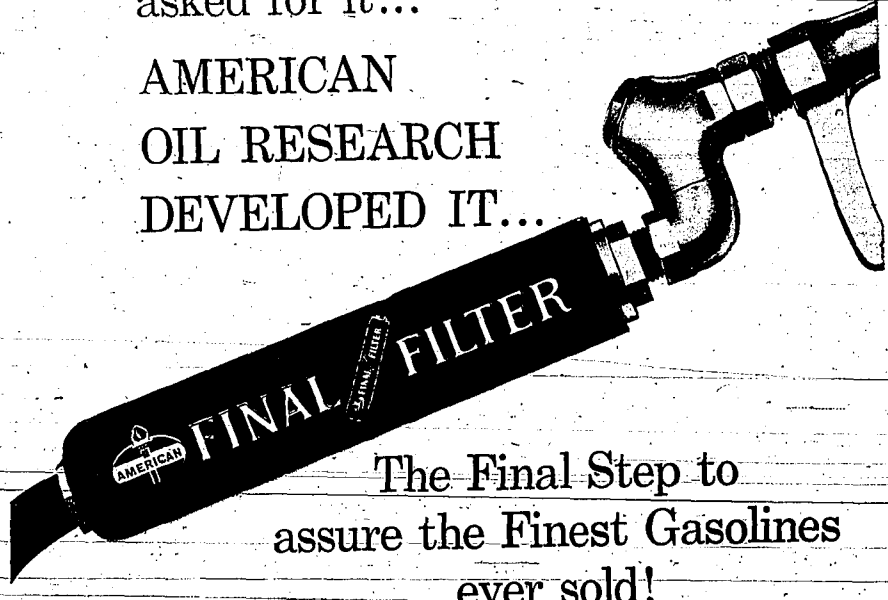

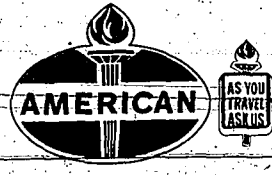
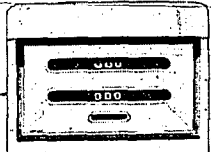

Foes of Racism Continue Fight In Cairo Jail

CAIRO, July 17 (AP) — The hunger strike of 37 Negro and white anti-segregation demonstrators went into its third day today at two Cairo jails.

Some of the hunger strikers had a date in court this afternoon to face disorderly conduct charges stemming from an earlier demonstration at a roller rink. They were jailed last week for a demonstration at a Rotary club-operated swimming pool.

Six of the 37, charged with state law violations, were held at the Alexander court jail. The other 31, accused of violating city ordinances, were in the Cairo city jail.

The student non-violent coordinating committee, which began demonstrations at Cairo restaurants June 26, hoped to enlist public support for those jailed by distributing leaflets from house to house.

"We need your support and prayer. We must have everyone's strength if we are to win against Jim Crow," the leaflets said, appealing to Cairo residents to attend a protest meeting Saturday at a Negro church.

Negro Rally Cheers King

ALBANY, Ga., July 17 (AP) — Integration leader Martin Luther King Jr. introduced an "eighteenth-century Moses" to a wildly cheering crowd of Negroes last night that "we have to go all the way and go now."

King and another Negro clergyman, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, spoke to a mass meeting of Negroes trying to decide next moves in a tense and developing struggle for desegregation in this South Georgia city.

The Negro leaders head up the Southern Christian Leadership Conference which is dedicated to non-violent approach to integration. They were jailed briefly last week after refusing to pay fines for leading racial demonstrations here last year.

"Why can't some of us die in the battlefield of Albany?" Abernathy asked. "We've gotten tired and weary waiting. Let them close the parks, we're not used to them anyway."

At another point, Abernathy, who helped King run the Montgomery bus boycott five years ago, called the Albany operation "an American movement" and said "we need white friends."
