

Jerome Man Is Killed in Crash, Wife Is Injured

JEROME, July 19—Earl Kennedy, 74, Jerome, died at St. Benedict's hospital here at 2:28 p.m. Wednesday of injuries received in a truck-car smashup at 1:10 p.m. Wednesday, three miles south of here on highway 77. Mrs. Helen Kennedy, 71, a passenger in the 1959 Ford stationwagon driven by her husband, was reported in fair condition at St. Benedict's hospital Thursday. She was in shock. Deputy Sheriff Frank Mobley said Mr. Kennedy was making a U-turn at a county road intersection on highway 77 and pulled in front of a Bertie Poultry company truck driven by Bruce Estroff. The stationwagon was struck broadside on the driver's side, Mobley said. Pores of the impact knocked the car about 50 feet down the road.

Several Political Prisoners Held in Peru, Paper Reports

LIMA, Peru, July 19 (AP)—The military junta is reported holding several political bigwigs in custody today after Wednesday's lightning seizure of power. Although the cabinet publicly announced no political prisoners were taken in the overthrow of the Prado government, the newspaper La Prensa reported differently. It said that beside 72-year-old President Manuel Prado, Minister of Government Ricardo Elias Aparicio and others are in custody.

Crackdown on Estes Ordered, Canceled

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UPI)—Senate investigators were told today that the late Henry H. Marshall issued orders to crack down on illegal cotton allotment transfers such as those involving Billie Sol Estes but withdrew the instructions a week later. The testimony came as the senate investigations subcommittee sought to reconstruct Marshall's role in the Texas financier's cotton operations. J. Taylor Allen, former southwest regional director for the agriculture department, testified that Marshall told his attorneys on Jan. 17, 1961, that he considered Estes' cotton allotment transfers an illegal scheme.

Texas Says Marshall Was Murder Victim

AUSTIN, Tex., July 19 (AP)—The Texas department of public safety said today its investigation into the death of Henry Marshall near Franklin on June 3, 1961, was murder, not suicide. Marshall, at the time was investigating Billie Sol Estes' cotton allotments. A federal agriculture department official charged with policing acreage allotments was shot five times in the body with a bolt action .24-caliber rifle. His death originally was ruled a suicide. The case was widely publicized nearly a year later that he was investigating Estes.

Russians Offer Atom Measure

GENEVA, July 19—The Soviet Union indicated today it would withdraw nuclear weapons from red China if the West dealt likewise with West Germany and other Atlantic allies. Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vladimir Zarin told a committee of the 17-nation disarmament conference. Moscow is ready to join the United States, Britain and France in a firm pledge to stop the spread of nuclear weapons.

Hoffa Loses Fraud Appeal Before Court

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—The U.S. court of appeals ruled today that labor unions may not sue union paid attorneys if the unions failed to defend union funds charged with fraud. The court unanimously ordered a U.S. district court review of the question whether President James R. Hoffa and other Teamsters union officials must reimburse the union for legal services in certain fraud charges cases. The appeals court decision was written by Judge Charles Fahney and joined by Judges Robert and Wilbur C. Miller agreeing.

Baltic Coast Is Closed by German Reds

BERLIN, July 19 (AP)—The East German government today closed off unauthorized trips to the Baltic sea coast in an effort to halt the flight of refugees along a warty version of the Berlin wall. It placed the 190-mile-long coast from West Germany to Poland off limits to all persons without special permission.

U.S. Reports Atlas Rocket Intercepted

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—The United States successfully tested an antimissile missile today in a historic development of the missile age. The army antimissile, called the Nike Zeus, was fired from Kwajalein Island in the Pacific and intercepted an Atlas missile which had been launched from California, 4,500 miles away. It was a demonstration that it is possible to knock down intercontinental ballistic missiles, with their nuclear warheads, which have posed a threat that has been in any great measure war could "rain" destruction on each other.

Senator Says Ike Ordered Stockpiling

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—A Senate subcommittee's effort to find out who ordered millions of dollars worth of unneeded lead and other metals for national strategic stockpile cleared today on former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's testimony. Sen. Henry C. Dvorshak, R-Ida., said Eisenhower suggested buying lead and zinc for the emergency Atomic Energy Commission stockpile in 1954. Testifying yesterday to a Senate subcommittee, Dvorshak said the President chose purchasing lead and zinc because of tariffs as the best way to aid industry.

Church Seeks South-Idaho Public Power

WASHINGTON, July 19—The history of private contract with the federal government to build a power administration marketing area in southern Idaho would increase the earning potential of private power. The plan, which is being estimated at \$24 million, would be financed by the federal government.

Shah Names Iran Premier, West Backed

TEHRAN, Iran, July 19 (AP)—Shah-Mohammed Reza Pahlavi appointed Asadollah Alam premier today. Alam promptly pledged to remain a firm friend of the United States. Alam, a 43-year-old veteran of high cabinet posts in previous regimes, was named to succeed Dr. Ali Amiri in an attempt to solve Iran's financial crisis. Alam resigned yesterday because of what he said was poor health and the nation's economic problems for which he said the United States was somewhat to blame.

Spy Appeals From British Court Ouster

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—Convicted Soviet spy Dr. Robert Soblen appealed today against a court ruling that refused to free him from a British prison. The appeal was a last-ditch attempt to escape return to the United States and a life term in prison for espionage for the Soviet Union.

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—Increased funds for development of the highway system in Idaho will result from the omnibus highway bill passed by Congress, Rep. Conrad Frost, D-Ida., reports.

Armament Plan Offered Parley

GENEVA, July 19—The United States called for a national disarmament conference today to adopt a five-point declaration that would lead to a nuclear war by accident. The United States, he said, already has taken unilateral measures to reduce the risk of war by such steps as advance notification of troop movements and the country's various branches of the service.

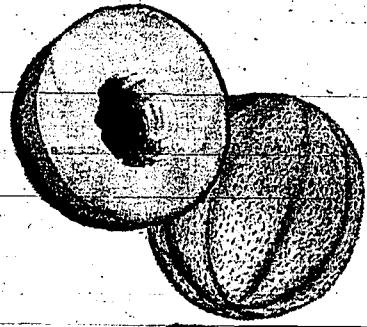

BOISE, July 19 (UP)—Production of chicks in commercial hatcheries in Idaho during June totaled an estimated 469,000, the U.S. department of agriculture reported today. This is down 10 percent from the corresponding month of last year, but is 30 percent above the average June output in the preceding five years.

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UP)—If the United States has agreed to return to Mexico, to one here claims to know anything about it today. The subject became a center of interest in the capital because of remarks made Tuesday by El Paso mayor Ralph Sledge, who said that U.S. property owners in the city would get about 35 million dollars in indemnity when the land involved returns to the Mexicans. The disputed property is the El Chamblé (the Thicket) section of El Paso. It switched national allegiance in 1854 when the Rio Grande river—forming the U.S.-Mexican boundary—suddenly changed course and cut off the 60 acres of former Mexican territory.

President Kennedy and Mexican president Adolfo Lopez Mateos agreed during Kennedy's visit to Mexico June 29 that the question should be negotiated. And despite Sledge's remarks, U.S. officials said this in the matter stands. But in El Paso last night, the mayor said the dispute was near solution regardless of the statements made in Washington.

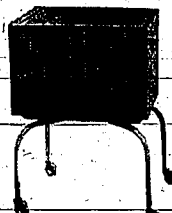

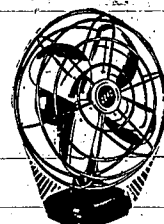

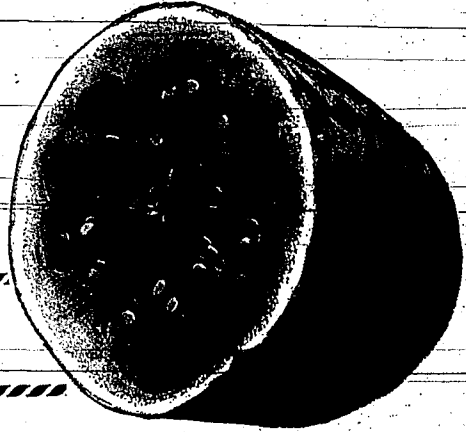

Peru's Conservative Forces Give Helping Hand to Castro

Peru's conservative military men probably have given the communist-Castro forces in Latin America a helping hand and struck a blow at President Kennedy's Alliance for Progress.

The military seizure of the government in Lima was not based on reason or on logic but on emotion. It was a strike by the Latin Americans called "personalismo" — a big struggle.

The June 10 election in Peru was important for the whole hemisphere. By refusing to let constitutional process operate, Peru's military drove home some painful truths.

The election was a test whether old habits could be broken, whether oligarchies and military leaders could change their spots and reform. Peru's experience indicates they cannot.

It is not an isolated case. It resembles Argentina's experience, dominated by the blind spot of Latin America. The Argentine army did not like the results of the 1958 election and moved in and installed a figurehead president.

Argentina's case embarrassed the United States. Argentina is too important a country to let go down the drain. Argentina was only a basically illegal, imposed government to work with. Accepting the United States drew taunts from the enemies and criticism among its friends.

Like Argentina, Peru is an important nation in the Alliance scheme. Its future is a critical matter to Latin America. Yes to work hand in glove with an illegal regime imposed by the army is to feed ammunition to the extreme left.

The paradox in the military's action is this: Of the three major candidates in the June-10 election, only Victor Raúl Haya de la Torre ran on an openly anti-communist platform. His popular Revolutionary Alliance Party had cooperated for six years with the intelligent government of President Manuel Prado. It had stated its old extremist attitudes.

On the other hand, Haya's opponents might have been suspected by a conservative military leadership. Fernando Belaunde Terry flirted with the communists and Castroists. Former dictator Manuel Odría did not reject extreme left support. The communists were interested in one main goal: Haya, as a "reformist," had to be stopped by any means.

The army had an old grudge against Haya and his party, dating back to the violent days of the 1930s. So did certain members of Peru's rich oligarchy. In advance of the election, military officers announced they would not accept a Haya victory although they allowed the voting.

Haya got more votes than any of seven candidates, though the third of all votes required to prove fraud, even though it was the choice. There was a possibility that when the election would make a deal with Odría.

The military leaders' minds seem still for that. They would good Haya's political hopes in Peru. But they have not ended his party's influence, and they may only have succeeded in forcing its members to fight in it and so, there will be wide repercussions in Latin America.
