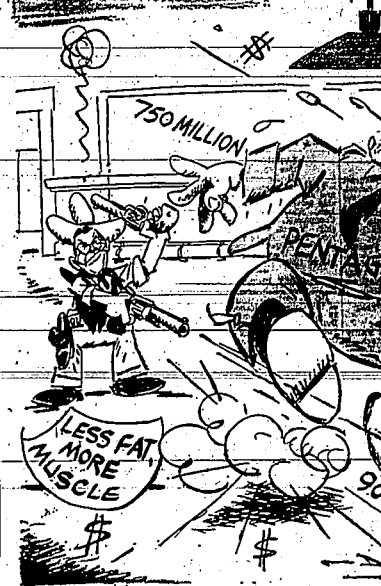

News Around Idaho

BOISE, July 19—The U. S. department of agriculture reported today an estimated 1,000 head of cattle were taken from the state for slaughter—marked as Idaho as of July 1. This compares with 63,000 on feed a year earlier.

Stock Theft Reported on Wall Street

NEW YORK, July 20—The second big loss, and probable theft, of valuable stocks from major Wall Street brokerage houses reported within two weeks was disclosed yesterday. The latest "breach" of securities "vaults" so far, \$25,212 worth of General Dynamics stocks reported missing by the firm of Carl M. Loeb, Rhoades and company has been recovered, but no arrests.

Still missing was \$70,216 in other securities, all of which Loeb, Rhoades said was covered by insurance.

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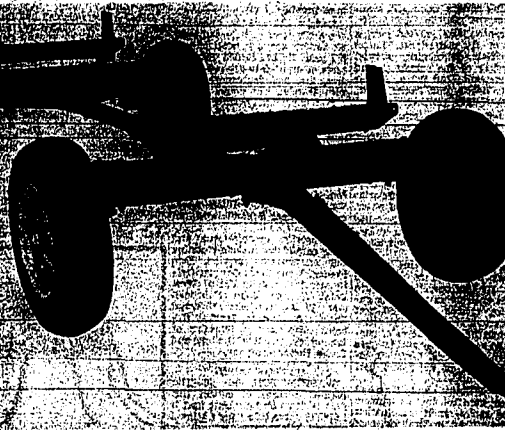

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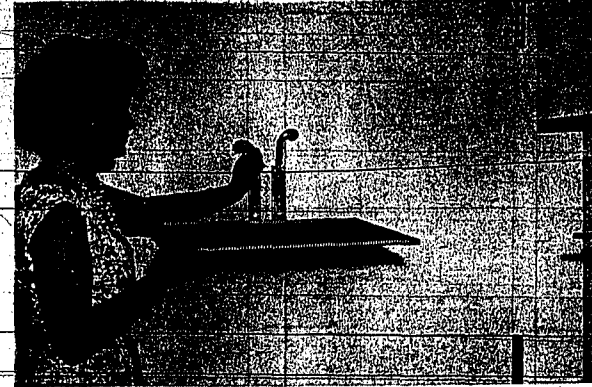
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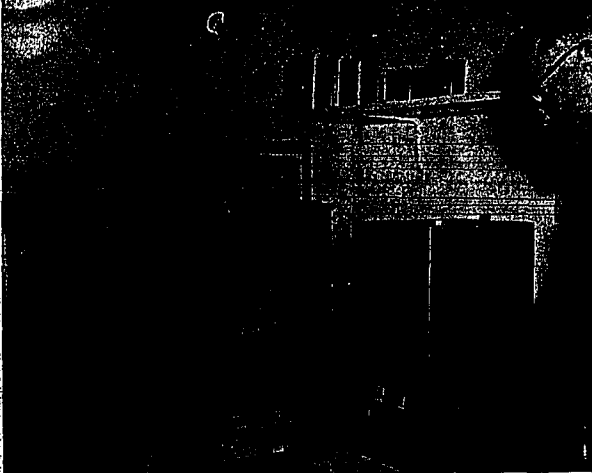

Receipts for Cattle Show Slight Gain
—WASHINGTON, July 20—Cash receipts to farmers for cattle and sheep in 1961 were \$2.7 billion, a rise of 2.8 per cent over the 1.7 billion dollar cash receipts in 1960. The department of agriculture said the improvement over 1960 reflects larger farm marketings of cattle and higher average calf prices only partially offset by slightly lower average cattle prices and smaller marketings of calves. Farmers received almost 10 per cent more in cash receipts for hogs in 1961 than in 1960. Receipts were from 2.27 billion dollars in 1960 to 3.14 billion dollars last year. This was noteworthy in that farm marketings of hogs were about the same in 1961 as in 1960, but hog prices averaged more than 40 per cent higher in 1961 than in 1960. Cash receipts for sheep and lambs declined from 227 million dollars in 1960 to 201 million dollars in 1961. This was the third consecutive year that returns for sheep and lambs have been less than in the year earlier. Farm marketings of both sheep and lambs in 1961 were above a year earlier, but the average prices were well below the 1960 average.

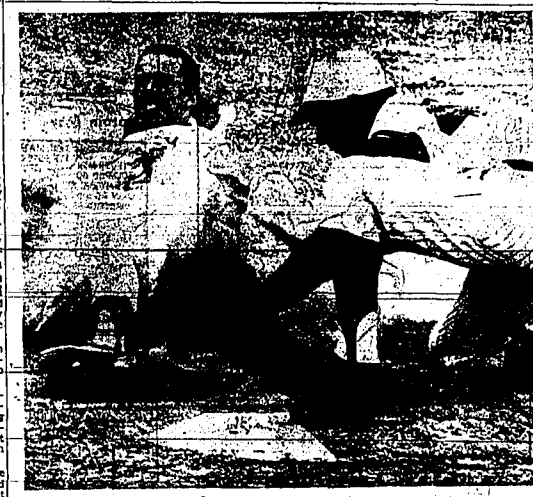

News About Stamps

To commemorate the centenary of its first postage stamps, Hong Kong has issued a special set of three values. The design, which is common to all three, includes a portrait of Queen Elizabeth with the St. Edward's crown and a reproduction of the statue of Queen Victoria, Causeway Bay, Hong Kong. It was during Queen Victoria's reign that Hong Kong's first stamps were issued. The 10 cents is red and black, the 20 cents is blue and black, the 50 cents is yellow and black.

The statue of Queen Victoria shown on the stamps was erected by public subscription in Victoria square, Hong Kong, and was unveiled on May 28, 1896.

Hong Kong was attacked by the Japanese in December, 1941, and fell on Christmas day after 18 days of fighting. The ensuing occupation lasted for 3 1/2 years.

During the Japanese occupation the statue was removed to Japan where it suffered much damage and although the Japanese originally intended that it should be melted down due to a shortage of metal, it was recovered from Osaka in 1948.

After repair, the statue was placed in a new park at Causeway Bay which was appropriately named Victoria park.

Stop, Look For Unusual Photo Shots

The average amateur photographer, impressed with a scenic view or an interesting subject, will stop to take a picture of it. He desires to feel elated when the result shows something different than the routine snapshots or on family pictures which have begun to look monotonously alike.

It's a step in the right direction, but he can go a lot further. Usually the first picture is the obvious one. It is all right, a head-on record shot. But there must be other, better, more meaningful pictures. They must be picked out of the subject with thought and effort and perhaps some photographic experimentation.

The second step is to look for different camera angles and a change of viewpoint. Look up, look down and look closer. Close the subject, if possible, and note how the change in lighting affects the mood. Sidelight and backlight add dramatic impact and, for extreme change, there's a silhouette.

With each change of camera angle there's an accompanying change of background. The challenge is to select one in harmony with the subject or, at least, one that doesn't compete for attention. Backgrounds must be studied carefully and separately to see that they don't merge with the subject.

When you leave, pack carefully. Leave nothing behind you but a good impression. Here, again, the list you've taped inside your suitcase will be a help.

Of Mattress Is Important

CHICAGO, July 20 (UPI)—Preserve a new mattress with proper care, advises one manufacturer.

The new mattress needs to be turned once a month during the first six months of its life. After that, once or twice a year is sufficient, said the Spring Air company. A foam rubber mattress needs no turning unless it's a reversible kind with a different amount of firmness on each side.

The manufacturer recommended use of a protective pad on the box spring for two reasons.

First, it will help protect the bedding from dust and dirt.

Second, the pad produces a half inch of moisture during a night's sleep. Without a washable pad, the moisture can ruin a mattress.

That time-honored method of cleaning a mattress—beating it—may shorten its life considerably, said the company.

Rather than beating, go over the bedding surface once a month with a whitewash or the upholstery attachment of a vacuum cleaner. This removes surface soil and helps fluff the linens.

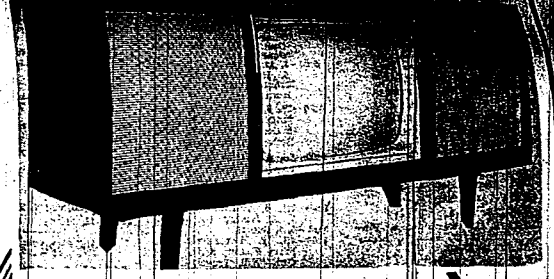

HOLLYWOOD, July 20 (AP)—They said it couldn't be done—Franklin "Muttiny on the Bounty" starring Marlon Brando.
 But it's completed—almost. He's seen it. It has violence, humor, color, scenery, sex and music. Interpretation—Brando's to history's most famous mutineer.
 It took nearly two years and a final cost may hit 25 million dollars.
 MGM has put "Mutiny on the Bounty" together in rough form with running time three hours and 40 minutes plus intermission.
 Most of the controversy on the movie—almost as much rebellion as that experienced two centuries ago on the original HMS Bounty—centered on the ending.
 "Brando was accused by his bosses of too much temperament. He countered [that MGM sent a full company to Tahiti at a cost of \$2,000 a day without having the film's ending in mind].
 The movie naturally invites comparison with the 1935 version starring the late Clark Gable and Fletcher Christian the mutineer, and Charles Laughton as Captain Bligh.
 This time Brando as Christian dominates the movie even against a superb playing of Bligh by British actor Trevor Howard. Brando's Christian is a radical

HOLLYWOOD, July 20 (AP)—It took a movie to accomplish what a year of publicity and several thousand pen pals couldn't do—make Paul Lynde enjoy performance.
 Lynde is that really funny young man with the foot-long smile and selling manner, who has brightened Perry Como's television show during the past season. He is here now to recede into private life as the married father of a precocious teen-ager in "Eye Bye Birdie."
 "This is the greatest thing that has happened to me," he remarked as he lounged outside the movie stage. "For the first time in my career, I am enjoying my work."
 [That sound odd coming from a guy who has convulsed audiences in night clubs, Broadway shows and television specials. But he remains:]
 "I have never gotten over being terrified in front of an audience. Oh, I know most performers get the jitters before they go on, my reaction is more like nervous collapse."

 In the movie, Lynde plays the conception of the role. This is the key to his domination of the movie.
 Instead of getting it the rugged hero portrayed that Gable did, Brando makes first mate Christian humorous, gentle and even a little foolish.
 Bligh was in modern naval parlance, a mutineer—a rarity in a day when very few naval commands were taken up through the ranks.

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
