T.F. Teen-Ager Killed in Car Crash While Trying To Elude Law Officers

Twin Falls teen-ager attempting to elude police in a stolen car hurtled over the creek canyon to his death about 1 a.m. Saturday when the vehicle failed to negotiate a curve just west of the Independent Meat company. Robert McWhorter, 19, 483 Fourth avenue west, was dead when officers reached the scene.

Laborer Is Slain; Burley Man Held

BURLEY, July 21—A Burley bar owner is being held on a \$10,000 bond today on a first degree murder charge for the fatal shooting of a Puerto Rican transient here early this morning. Gene Hernandez, 42, owner of the El Paso bar, appeared before Probate Judge Carter Saturday afternoon and asked for attorney before entering a plea. His case was continued until Monday. He is accused of slaying Gilberto Adino Fonseca, 23, Oumaua, Puerto Rico, a transient laborer who lived at the Burley labor camp. Police said Fonseca and Hernandez were arguing in front of the bar at Main and Alizon streets. The Puerto Rican had walked across the street when Hernandez opened fire on Fonseca with a .32 caliber automatic pistol, police said.

Traffic Deaths

The 20th traffic death in Magic Valley occurred July 21 as a result of an accident in Twin Falls county.

Killed was James A. Bergenske, 51, Hutchinson, Kans. Maxfield said Bergenske had made two passes over the field while spraying peas and was turning to make a third pass when the plane's engine cut out. Maxfield said the plane crashed on a hill covered with sagebrush and grass—and that the surrounding brush caught fire when the plane exploded.

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, who stalked from the Pentagon in a row over Eisenhower's defense policy, is returning as top military aide to the president. This time he has the strongest House backing. President Kennedy announced yesterday that Taylor, his close personal military adviser, will replace Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff this fall. Lemnitzer will become U.S. commander in chief in Europe and probably NATO supreme commander there.

Soviets Will Launch New Test Series

MOSCOW, July 21 (AP)—The Soviet Union announced tonight it will launch a new series of nuclear tests in the next few weeks in the Pacific. The explosions of American nuclear bombs above Christmas and Johnston islands have produced their echo—they have made it clear that the Soviet Union is "not to be trifled with," declared a government statement released by the news agency.

T.F. Teen-Ager, Fleeing in Stolen Car, Dies in Accident

One side of his head was severed by some object in the car. The car immediately burst into flames. Officers were able to remove the body before flames could reach it.

Law enforcement officials first spotted the car when First Sergeant Duane Owen observed it on Highway 30 while he had a stoppage between Twin Falls and Kimberly.

Owen called Twin Falls police and notified them a car was heading toward town at "a very high rate of speed."

At approximately the same time Twin Falls police received a call from Davis, 422 Fourth street west, Twin Falls, reporting a car stolen from near the Star bar, 157 Washburn street. The description of the stolen car matched the description of the speeding vehicle.

Owen lost sight of the fleeing vehicle and officers were searching for it on the east side of Twin Falls when Kenneth Johnston, off-duty Twin Falls police sergeant, called the police station and reported a car had just smashed into the canyon and was on fire. Johnston's home is directly across the canyon from where the vehicle plunged over.

Officers quickly converged on the area and were able to remove the body from the demolished vehicle before flames engulfed it. About 20 minutes after officers arrived the gas tank exploded, spraying flames for about 20 feet in all directions.

Johnston, in describing the event, said he had just gone to bed when he heard sirens followed by a "loud crack that sounded like a high powered rifle shot off in the canyon."

"The first noise was followed by a much louder crashing sound," he observed.

"I looked out my kitchen window which overlooks the canyon and saw a cloud of dust rising above the rim. At the bottom of the canyon I could see flames spring up. A few minutes later the entire car was engulfed in flames."

Investigation revealed that the vehicle was the one reported stolen earlier by Duane Owen. Benham reported that McCowan's mother, Mrs. Kathryn J. Routs was killed Feb. 23, 1958 when struck by a car two and one half miles south of Rogerson on highway 93. She was attempting to flag the car down to help her extricate a car stuck in mud along the soft shoulder of the highway.

Robert Leroy McCowan was born May 28, 1943, at Twin Falls. He was a member of the LDS church.

Surviving are his father, Vernon J. McCowan, California, five brothers, Dennis McCowan, Vernon McCowan, Marvin McCowan, David McCowan and Jerry McCowan, addresses unknown; two sisters, Patricia Ellen McCowan and Carol Ann McCowan, addresses unknown; one half-sister, Mrs. William G. Andrews, Twin Falls, and his grandmother, Mrs. Hazel Gillman, Twin Falls.

Funeral services are pending at White's mortuary.

LONDON, July 21 (AP)—Public reports that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will resign next year are "pure speculation," a source close to the conservative party leader said today.

The London Daily Sketch said Macmillan would resign both his governmental and party leadership next June in favor of Deputy Prime Minister Lord Avon (Rab) Butler, 59, who was named Deputy Prime Minister during the July 13 reshuffle.

Macmillan reportedly regarded the reports as "a year-old rumor" and said he was "not at all inclined to resign," an official source said. The Daily Sketch reported Macmillan's resignation was "based on rumors spread by disgruntled Tories."

But he added he does not expect Kennedy to decide before Aug. 10 whether to ask for action on the matter in this session of congress. Humphrey, who has been arguing at White House meetings for an immediate tax reduction to stimulate the economy, said those who regard themselves as liberals ought to throw their political weight behind a drive for action now. "It's about time for those who are liberal to stand by," he said. "We shouldn't stand by and let the U.S. Chamber of Commerce be the only group advocating immediate action." Humphrey added that to spur the economy, the reduction should run between five billion and seven billion dollars.

ALBANY, Ga., July 21 (AP)—A federal court judge today halted demonstrations in this southwest Georgia city today because, it said, they carried with them a threat of mob violence.

U.S. Dist. Judge J. Robert Elliott made the finding in issuing an injunction naming Dr. Martin Luther King and other leaders in a movement started last December to bring desegregation.

Other defendants in the action included the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy and Dr. W. B. Dierdorf. The injunction against demonstrations, picketing and a boycott of white merchants, resulting in effect pending a hearing before Elliott in Albany on July 30 on making it permanent.

There was no immediate comment from King or the other leaders, who have been protesting the fight against segregation practices.

A copy of the order issued by Judge Elliott was served first on Charles Jones of the student nonviolent coordinating committee.

New Space Building Is Set by U.S.

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Plans to build a new space rocket launching facility at Cape Canaveral so the huge Saturn C5 moon rocket can be launched.

The Saturn C5 is the biggest U.S. space rocket now under full-scale development, with three stages. It is expected to launch up to 120 tons into Earth orbit and to send 45 tons on the way to the moon, employing 7.5 million pounds of thrust.

The new facility, to be called "Complex 30," will occupy some 50,000 sq ft, including a safety zone, on land now being acquired by the national aerospace and space administration.

The main part of the new structure along the Atlantic beach will be a giant building with bays to assemble and check out the rocket simultaneously.

The building—48 stories—high more than two-city blocks—long and 225 feet deep—will completely enclose the rockets during pre-launch activity.

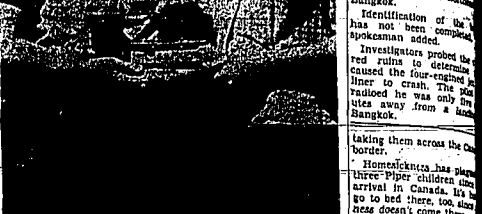
"Four launch pads about 9,000 feet apart will be spread along the beach. They will be linked by an assembly building by a network of roadways solid enough to handle powerful cranes, which will transport the ponderous assembled Saturns.

The longest trip between assembly and pad will be two miles. The three-stage Saturn will be erected in the assembly building, mated to the Apollo spacecraft and checked out on a launch rack which also supports the missile's 400-foot umbilical tower. The Saturn itself is 270 feet tall and with the assembled spacecraft will weigh 350,000 lbs.

Plans to launch the first Saturn in 1968. Lunar orbit shots probably unmanned, are planned for 1968 and 1969. The first landings on the moon are hoped for by 1970.

NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—Millions of women have traded back seat driving for front—but they're still sounding off.

So reports N. Jeanne Wertz, founder and director of the Automotive Council for Women, 1174 purpose is education for women in the finer points of owning, operating and enjoying the family auto.

Miss Wertz estimates there are 30 million women drivers, that women account for 60 per cent of service station sales, and that there are 7.4 million two-or-more car families, which means 7.4 million feminine chauffeurs particularly in the suburbs.

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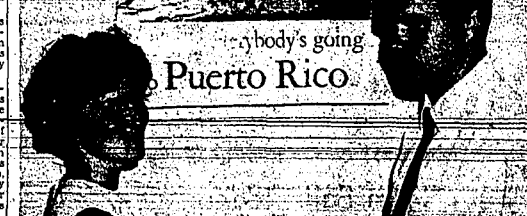

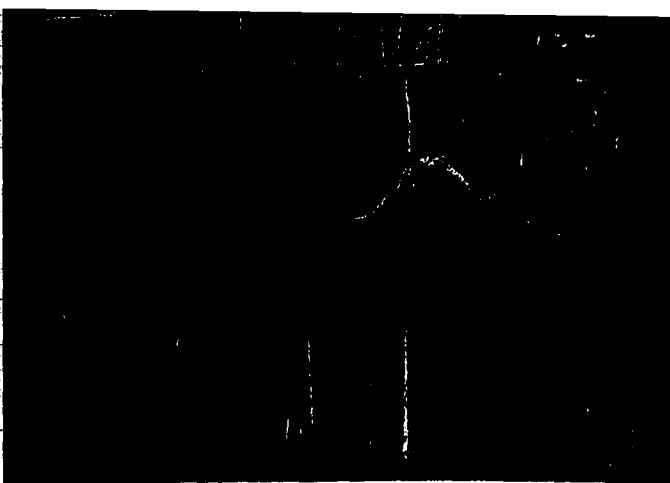
Said one band member, as he surveyed the scene of sun-baked bachelors: "Who says the Soviet Union has food shortages?"

Observing them in rough terrain always has imposed big problems for biologists, especially in the early days of game management. Now, with the aid of helicopters and planes, the biologists and other workers can go almost anywhere and take a good look at the animals.

Chamberlain basin calves are born on the edge and in the vicinity of the "meadows" during May and early June. They are surrounded by heavy snow pack on the ridge. Heavy snow pack on the ridge. Heavy snow pack on the ridge.

Other states do attempt to tag a few elk calves every spring. Oregon reports that in the lower coast range it takes at least three men to surround a 50-pound calf when it decides to get up and migration patterns for each calf are noted.

Several minor meadows north of Chamberlain basin were flown on the recent census in addition to the major big ones. These included Dillinger, White Bird, Harkin, Phoenix, Hot Springs, Middle and Meadow of Doubt, Hand, upper and lower Ramsey, Hesperus, Moose, Whitlock Creek, Root ranch, Cold Meadows, and upper, middle and lower Coltonwood.

Meadow counting involves flight flying over the grassy clearing to spot elk, if any, and count the overall numbers. When a cow or two is made to count calves in the herd group, some of the cows called in the lodgepole-pines that fringe the meadows.

Similar elk trend counts are made yearly in Bear Valley and Soldier mountain areas. On the Big and Little Wood rivers and the Upper Big Lost river, both elk and deer aerial counts are made. Antelope trend counts are made on Crooked creek, Birch creek, Lemhi river, Palouse, Warm Springs, Salmon falls, Three creeks, Upper Big Lost, East river, and siltow Park-Klamath, among others.

Kiwanis Club Hears Talk On Highways

Lewis J. Ross, planning and traffic chief of the Idaho department of highways, spoke about the Interstate highway to the Twin Falls Kiwanis club Tuesday.

Ross stated that during the 50 years preceding the enactment of the Interstate highway law, there was not the purposeful planning in highway construction that now exists in Idaho.

Every single mile of new construction now is carefully studied from all angles before work begins, he said. Idaho's total of 311 miles of Interstate highway of which 123 miles will be two lanes is scheduled for completion by 1972, and will average \$400,000 per mile compared with the national average of one million dollars per mile.

A detailed map showing the different segments of the Interstate system through Magic Valley from Burley to Bliss was used in the presentation and discussed with assistance from Program Chairman Paul Newlen.

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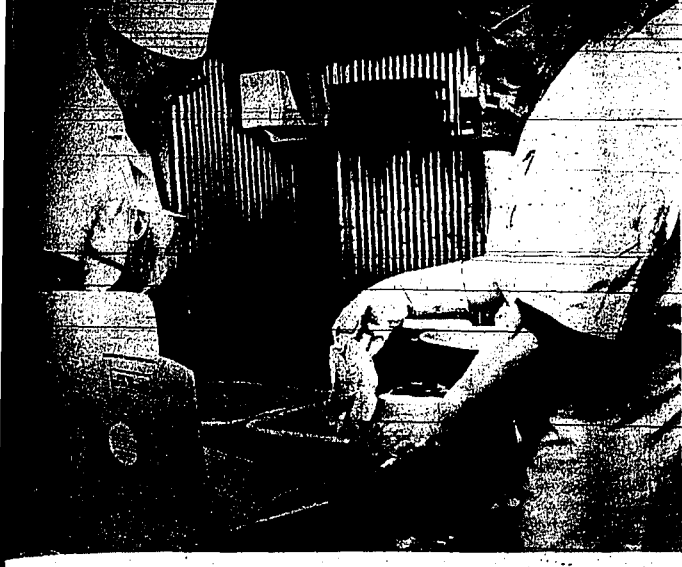
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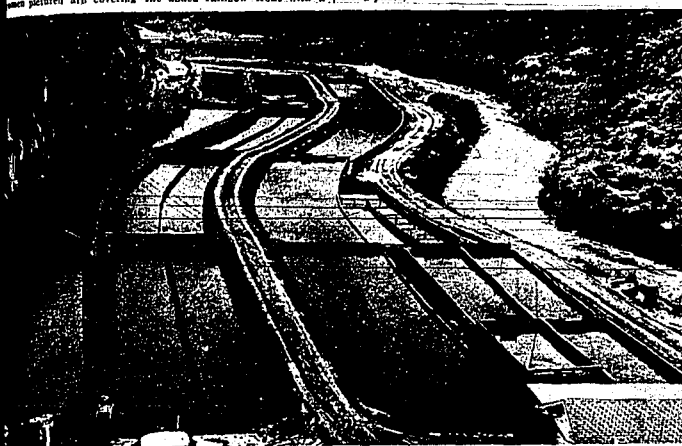

It was pointed out the trademark has as its background an abstract sketch of Idaho Sawtooth mountains. A national sales manager has been selected and facilities are being set up to distribute rainbow trout from Idaho across the United States. The new company includes the Blue Lakes trout farm and Canyon trout farm, both in the Twin Falls area and managed by Earl Hardy. Rainbow trout farms are also near this area. Hardy said the trout are raised in ponds, and the water is pure, well aerated water. Hardy said, "and this must be in a market ready to serve in about three minutes. The boneless nature of the portion appeals to the public and the ease and speed of preparation spread interest nationwide." "Although trout raising had its birth in Idaho as early as 1926, the advent of frozen foods has given the industry its greatest expansion," Hardy declared. 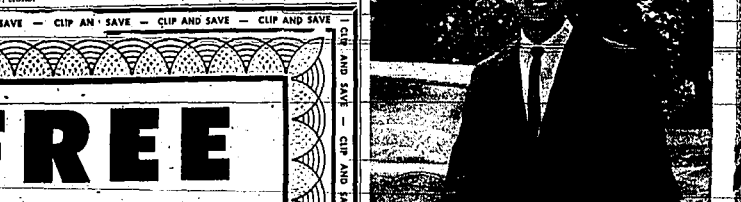

You've heard of the lady who lived in a shoe; who had so many children she didn't know what to do. Well—in Twin Falls—there is a different version of that story. Mrs. John Henderson, 401 Fourth avenue west, has so many shoes she had trouble keeping track of them or a place to keep them. And they aren't shoes that one would wear. These are minuscule. Mrs. Henderson started her shoe collection about seven years ago and it has expanded to 600 of miniature shoes. 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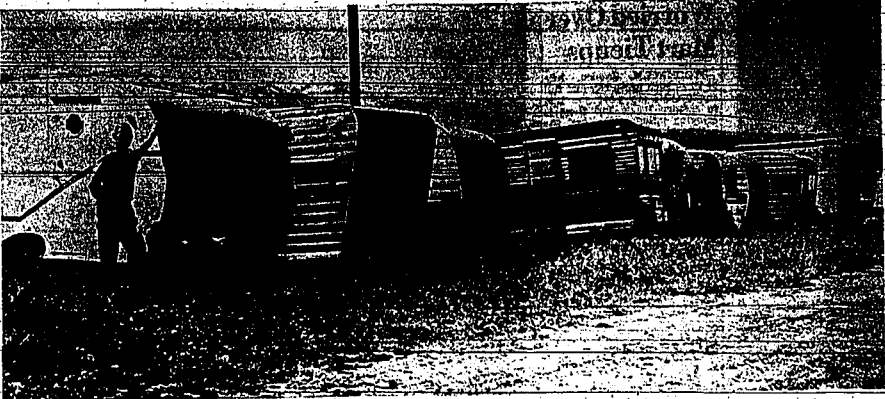

Licenses had been purchased. The total included 814 licensed in Twin Falls county, 183 licensed in Cassin county and 143 in Jerome county. As a result, and with a little imagination as to how many are licensed throughout the state—to say nothing of those coming into this area being pulled by vacation-bound citizens from California and Utah—practically anyone can see parking spaces are lacking.

What is being done about it? The forest service is practically in a crash program to try to get ahead of the trailer influx.

Truth is, trailers are being purchased faster than spaces are provided.

The Redfish lake outlet in Sawtooth valley offers the most parking spaces at the present time. The total there is 46. But remember, any of these can also

be used by tent campers if they get there first. Even this development, though, does not provide sewage connections, running water or electricity. All these are basic in a commercial trailer parking spot where the ground owner would charge the trailer owner an average of about \$1.50 a night. At Redfish the trailer owner pays 50 cents a night just for a place to park.

A new development at Little Redfish lake provides for an additional 17 units. No other parking area available at the present time offers more than a dozen spaces.

Trailers do not have to park in these areas, any more than tents have to stay in a given area. Rather, the trailer now can be parked practically any place desired on forest land. Self-contained trailers (those which have water under pressure, septic

tanks, etc.) can hide out for two or three days.

To try and ease the pressure the forest service now has a rule that a trailer cannot be parked in a designated area more than 16 days in a row. After 16 days it must be moved to another site.

Even if in a designated area, the trailer cannot be left unattended. In other words, the owner is not allowed to park the trailer, go home for a week, and return. He must stay with the trailer. Likewise, even in unattended areas or areas not patrolled, it is now unlawful to leave an unattended trailer.

These rules are proving to be a blessing for resort and lodge operators who now offer "dead" storage space for those who do not want to haul their trailers home after every visit. For the privilege of free parking between visits to the area, the trailer

Wikom says his next assignment for the AID has not yet been determined.

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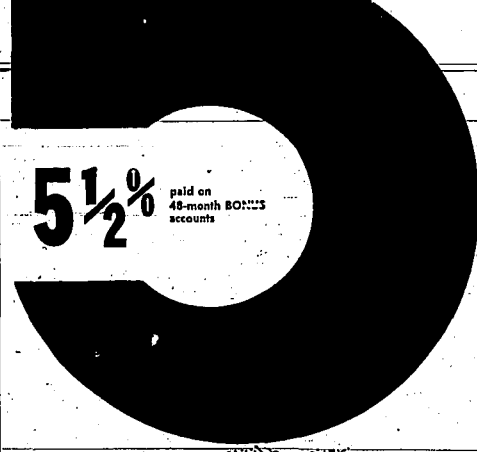

The 8 by 10-inch glass register is the property of the bureau of information of the LDS church.

Pioneer Day parades and celebrations are common throughout Utah and Southern Idaho in commemoration of the arrival of the first group of Mormon pioneers under Brigham Young at the Salt Lake Valley July 24, 1847.

Today the bigger cities, such as Salt Lake City and Ogden, compete to see which can put on the most impressive week of celebrations, each highlighted by parades.

Historians say the first such celebration was July 24, 1846—the second anniversary of the arrival of the first pioneers. A scribe described the event:

"The inhabitants were awakened by the firing of cannon, accompanied by music. The brass band playing martial airs was then carried through the city, returning to the booby-by-a-fish. At 7 a.m. the large national flag measuring 85 feet in length was unfurled at the top of the Liberty Pole. It was saluted by the firing of six guns, ringing the Nauvoo Bell and the spirit-stirring airs from the band.

"At 8 a.m. the multitude was called together by music and the firing of guns. The bishops of several wards arranging themselves on the sides of the aisle.

"The first actual procession started from the house of Brigham Young at 9 a.m. The young men and young ladies sang a hymn through the streets, the cannon roared, the musketry rolled, the Nauvoo Bell pealed forth its silvery notes, and the air was filled by the sweet strains of the band."

In 1856 and 1857 the July 24 celebrations were at Silver Lake at the head of Big Cottonwood canyon. Residents of the valley planned on the day trip to reach the celebration site in time.

The parade in Salt Lake City this year will include about 150 entries. Ogden traditionally stages a parade of similar size.

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT

State's Youngest District Judge Got Early Schooling in 21 Idaho Towns

Idaho's youngest district judge and possibly the youngest comparable judge in the nation—when school setting—his early education in the hard way.

In fact, before he entered junior high school in Twin Falls, Lloyd J. Webb had attended no less than 21 different grade schools spread out from Colburn (near Sandpoint) to Soda Springs.

When he entered junior high school in Twin Falls, it was his mother who "put her foot down" and told Webb's father, Clarence R. Webb, that Lloyd was all through skipping school to Soda Springs.

The elder Webb was engaged in the construction business and because of this found that morning to be near the various jobs was inevitable. He took his family with him.

But his wife was of the opinion that from junior high school through high school a boy should have "roots" and friends, so Lloyd ended his year's travels except during summer vacations of course.

It is interesting to note about here that of all the 21 grade schools he attended, only one was out of Idaho. For a brief two-month period he attended a school in "The States"—the elder Webb, who believed in taking the family along until his wife decided otherwise, is now superintendent of the Duffy Reed Construction company, Twin Falls.

After his educational parables settled down to the more or less routine of school in Twin Falls in the winter and construction jobs in the summer, the man who was destined to be elected the youngest judge graduated from Twin Falls high school in 1949.

The summer jobs on construction projects enabled him to make enough money—or almost enough—to pay his way through college. He "skinned" cats, drove trucks and did timekeeping work.

After high school he entered Brigham Young University and worked in the summer. The elder Webb, who intended, at that time, to go into the eradic and announcer field.

Then he thought of friends he had in the announcing profession and noticed that they were continually moving from station to station.

"That did it for me," Webb recalls, "I had moved so many times prior to the junior high school time of my life that I was not about to get involved in moving again."

It was at this time that his decision to become a lawyer was made. He left BYU and worked in the pre-law at the University of Utah. After three years he was awarded a bachelor of law degree. He took and passed, but a year and where he passed the examinations in both Utah and Idaho.

White he was a senior at college he met and married Barbara Birrell, Salt Lake City. She also was attending the university and

was graduated with a degree in political science.

After his graduation from the university, Webb accepted a position as deputy clerk of the Salt Lake City court for eight months and then went to Alaska as law clerk and special assistant to the U.S. district judge at Anchorage, Utah. After three years he was awarded a bachelor of law degree in Alaska, where they remained for a year and where he passed the bar examination.

In the summer of 1957 the couple returned to Twin Falls and he became associated with the firm of Rayborn and Ray.

...attorney, then prosecuting attorney, was known as Rayborn, Rayborn, Rayborn and Webb.

In June of this year he was successful in his bid for the office of district judge. In the judicial district he will take office the first of next year. In his capacity as judge he will preside over court in Cassia and Milwaukie counties. The district also includes the counties of Twin Falls and Jerome.

Records show that at 30 years old he is the youngest district judge in Idaho. Although a check is practically impossible, it is believed that he is the youngest in the nation to preside over such a high court.

Because a district judge cannot engage in private practice or be associated with any particular law firm, it will be necessary for him to resign from the Rayborn firm as soon as he is sworn into office.

His official chambers will be at Burley, but he will preside over court in both counties.

Webb, who resides in Twin Falls at present, enjoys an occasional hunting jaunt and twice has gone after the elusive mountain goat. He also was active in Boy Scout work and two years ago made the 50-mile wilderness hike which starts from Camp Bradley in the Sawtooths.

"That hike proved that I was better than I look much," Webb jokes. "I thought I would do before it was over."

In addition to Scout work he is a member of the Twin Falls Rotary club, the Twin Falls Troutmasters club and the Blue Lakes Country club.

He is the father of four children, Kevin, G. Curtis, G. Carolyn, and Barry. The family resides at 1031 Highview lane.

Because of the requirement he resign from the law firm he will have plenty to do between now and Jan. 7.

How does it feel to be elected a district judge?

"There is a challenge in the office and I am anxious to take over the duties," Webb said.

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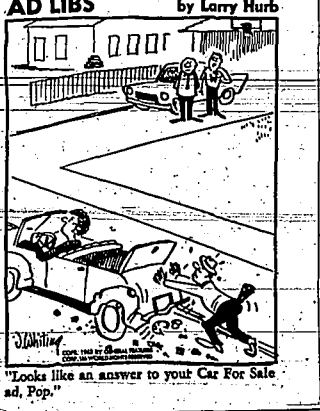

Fidelity Bank Planning Open House As Conclusion to Remodeling Program

Extensive remodeling and redecorating work has been completed and open house date has been set for the Fidelity National bank in Twin Falls as the institution nears the 55th year of its establishment. It is announced by Guy H. Shearer, president.

Open house festivities, at which time the public is invited to tour the structure located in Twin Falls, has been set for Saturday, Aug. 4 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Refreshments will be served during those hours with members of the Jay-C-ettes in charge.

The remodeling program, which saw the building face completely changed and the interior and basement areas changed completely for more efficient banking operations, started in May, 1951, with Neilson and Miller, Twin Falls, general contractors. At the same time an elevator serving the building was installed near the Shoshone street entrance and the upper floor remodeled to suit the tenant, the

law firm of Parry, Robertson and Daly. The firm now occupies the entire top floor of the building.

So far as the banking operation is concerned, the main floor is occupied by the savings department, teller windows, note department, escrow department, executive offices, directors meeting room, safety deposit vault and the main vault. With the exception of the president, all

other locations are in full view of customers and yet are spaced sufficiently to assure privacy. Much new equipment has been added to the office and teller spaces.

The basement, in addition to a

dead storage vault, houses the proof- and bookkeeping departments, lounges for men and women and a coffee room for employees. The building is air conditioned.

The banking operation was started in Filer in 1908. The Filer facility is still maintained as an important segment of the concern. The location in Twin Falls was opened in 1935 after a complete remodeling program at that time. A motor branch bank is also operated on Third avenue
