Crippled Canadian Airliner Crashes, Burns; 27 Are Dead

HONOLULU, July 23 (UPI)—A crippled Canadian Pacific Britannia airliner crashed and burned in a series of explosions late last night while trying to land at Honolulu international airport. Twenty-seven persons were killed. The airline said there were 40 persons aboard the plane and 13 survived. It said there were 20 passengers and a crew of 13. The plane, a four-engine-propeller, took off for Sydney, Australia, but turned back about 20 minutes later because of mechanical failure.

The plane burst into flames, and one witness said there were several explosions apparently when flames reached the engine and fuel tanks. Five persons were treated at the Hickam dispensary and ordered to nearby Tripler Army hospital. They were identified only as two students and a man, a woman and a young girl. They appeared bruised and battered but didn't seem to be too seriously injured, a Hickam spokesman said.

The plane burst into flames, and one witness said there were several explosions apparently when flames reached the engine and fuel tanks. Five persons were treated at the Hickam dispensary and ordered to nearby Tripler Army hospital. They were identified only as two students and a man, a woman and a young girl. They appeared bruised and battered but didn't seem to be too seriously injured, a Hickam spokesman said.

The president said that the saying of his words by "Teddy" is an indication of the kind of world in which we live. Kennedy said the United States will not carry out further unilateral tests unless an analysis of new Soviet tests shows we are "forced" to do so.

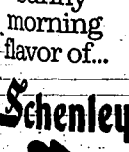
Ironworkers End Walkout in Northwest

The strike is over, hundreds of ironworkers returned to construction jobs today beyond the 100 million dollar pact.
End of the strike, which began months ago in Seattle and spread in late July to the Spokane area, was secured in Washington by Labor Secretary Arthur Goldberg.
The disclosure came after four days of almost around-the-clock sessions among contractors, government officials and representatives of the International Association of Bridge, Structural and Ornamental Ironworkers.
The announcement indicated an settlement of the wage question was being placed in the hands of a mediation team, while contractors who ask in the discussions revealed, however, that "management" had agreed to a wage proposal and "agreement" now was up to the iron membership.
The agreement called for a 7 percent increase effective Jan. 1, 1950. It provides a total pay and benefit package of 71 cents an hour spread over three years, a pension fund and an apprentice-training fund.

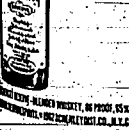
Missile Blast Injures Crew

Billy Graham Ends Crusade In California

FRESNO, Calif., July 23 (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham closed his eight-day crusade in this central California valley city last night with a sermon on the final judgment and a challenge for his audience to prepare for the "second coming of Christ."

Graham exclaimed that "The great question before many of our leaders is: 'Are we at the end of history as we know it and is the day of judgment here at hand?'"

The evangelist said the Bible teaches that Jesus Christ will someday return to earth and the kingdom of Christ will ultimately prevail. However, he said current intellectual opinion does not agree with this.

He said many people think the idea of a "final judgment" is a "false teaching because the coming of Christ did not take place as the early church predicted. He also noted the doctrine of Christ's coming cuts across the plans of 'millions of people who want to eat, drink and be merry without interference.'"

Humphrey Asks Tax Reduction

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota appears to favor a tax cut this session.

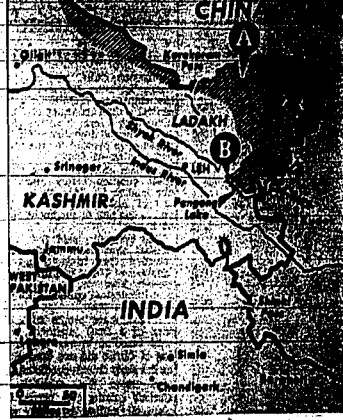

Second Outer Space Rocket Shot Planned

CAPE CANAVERAL, July 23 (AP)—The United States is expected by a rocket fallow in its first attempt to explore Venus, will put another space booster on a 100-foot Atlas-Agena, and a sparkling gold and silver-plated probe named Mariner-2 were kept ready for a rush to the launching area...

U.S. scientists may launch the new Mariner on a planned flight to within 10,000 miles of Venus as early as Aug. 15—if they can escape delays from major technical problems and from a hurricane season weather, or involvement in threatened new labor disputes...

The shot will be America's last at the planet until 1964. For Mariner-2, there may be another time-consuming factor—the possibility that the Atlas-booster might have to be modified as a result of the trouble which forced safety officers to destroy a 10-story rocket and the 446-pound Mariner-1 at the edge of space early this year...

At a full day of agonizing reappraisal, scientists still were uncertain as to what caused the Atlas-Agena to veer off course 3 1/2 minutes after it was launched on what was supposed to be a 14-day flight to Venus by a complex little Mariner spacecraft...

The wreckage tumbled from space into the Atlantic Ocean, hundreds of miles east of Cape Canaveral. As of today, scientists still had another 50 days in which to try the second shot. After that, Venus will be too far along in its orbit to permit a close shot with the available rocket power.

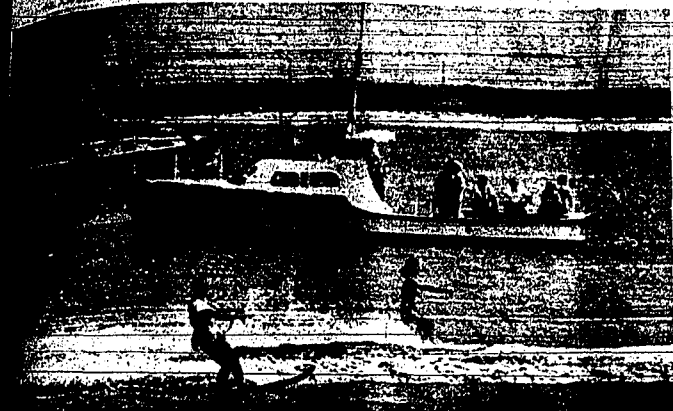

Wheat Export Figure Rises During Year

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—The agriculture department reports that U. S. exports of wheat during the 1961 crop year ending July 1 set a new record of 714 million bushels. This is an increase of eight per cent over 1960 crop season foreign sales of 662 million.

The 52-million bushel increase in foreign sales helps reduce a big surplus of the bread grain. This year's crop down 15 per cent from last year—also is helping to do the same thing.

The department also reports that exports of feed grains are running at record high levels. Foreign shipments between July 1, 1961, and June 1, 1962, totaled 12.6 million metric tons, or 24 per cent above the same period for the preceding year.

Corn accounted for all of the increase in feed grain exports. Other feed grains declined. The increased corn shipments were largely to West Germany, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and Japan.

The major buyers of U. S. wheat have been India, Turkey, Egypt, Pakistan, Japan, Yugoslavia, Brazil, the Netherlands, Spain, Italy, the United Kingdom and Poland.

The department predicts, however, that U. S. wheat exports from the 1962 crop may dip to around 620 million bushels.

Wildlife Federation Opposes Smith on Convict Labor Idea

The "Convict Wildlife Federation has adopted a resolution opposing a proposal of Democratic gubernatorial candidate Vernon R. Smith that convict labor be used to plant fish.

Art Manley, president, said the resolution describes the proposal that convict labor be used by the state fish and game department for this purpose as a "crackpot scheme."

Meanwhile, Smith said, convicts very over his pro-gambling proposals is not without precedent in American political history.

He said the late Franklin D. Roosevelt campaigned for his first term as president "on a

platform to repeal the 18th amendment and thereby legalize intoxicating liquors." He also referred to Roosevelt's decision to seek a third term and added:

"To those of us who feel deeply against any political officeholder's perpetuating himself in office term after term this caused great consternation and near revolt."

The tortured emotions which were suffered by many Democrats because of Mr. Roosevelt's third term ambitions in 1940 are only exceeded by the sick feeling which many good and loyal Republicans are enduring today as they see our Republican incumbent

perpetuate himself in office as a third term governor."

Gov. Robert E. Smylie is seeking reelection this year to a third term.

State Rep. Carl R. Burt of Boise, Republican nominee for secretary of state, said the man he seeks to displace is attempting "to make political hay" out of his position on the gambling question.

Burt is opposed by incumbent Democrat Arnold Williams.

Williams, as a member of the Democratic pre-convention platform committee, voted against the gambling plank which was approved at the Idaho Falls convention last Saturday.

Burt said that as a state representative from Madison county, Williams on three different occasions voted for legislation legalizing slot machines. The latter, Burt said, "I know is one of the most vicious forms of gambling operation" of the Boise City Council as a five-term member of the State Legislature.

"It has been to take the Idaho from the state seat."

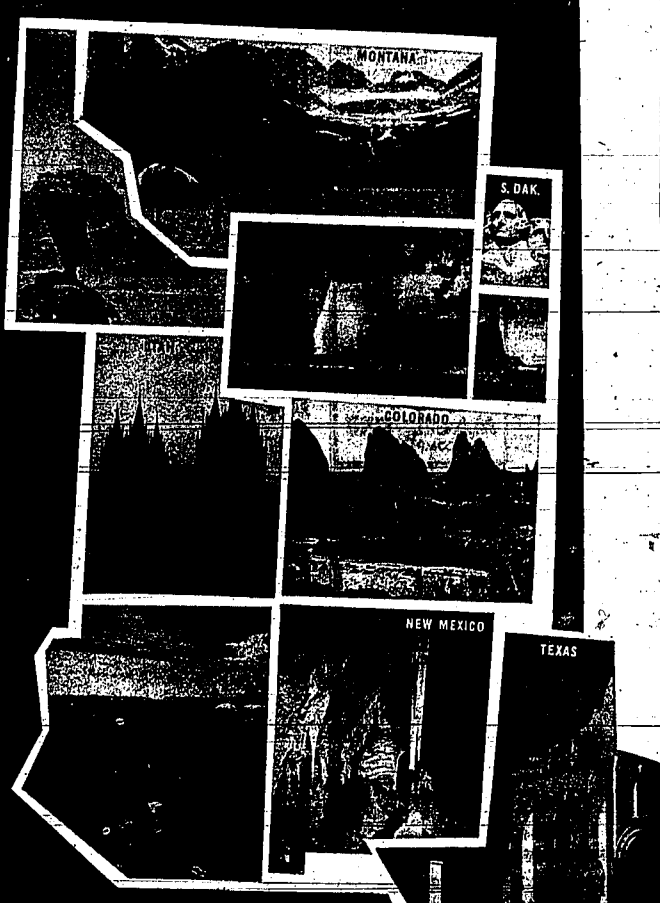

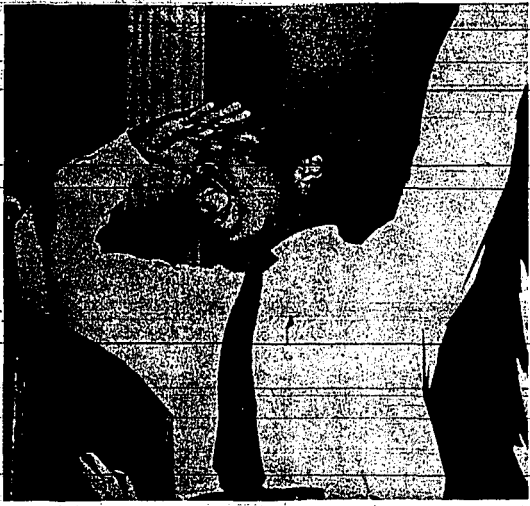
