Copper Firm Signs Pact With Union

SALT LAKE CITY, July 24 (AP)—Kennecott Copper Corporation—with contracts signed with its two biggest unions—resumes negotiations Wednesday with the 18-member International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

It was the electrical workers who went on strike two years ago after contract talks failed. Kennecott reached agreement Monday with the 3,400-member International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (I. M. S. W.) after negotiations which began at 1 p. m. Sunday under supervision of federal mediators.

The federal mediators also will

supervise the talks with the electrical workers. And both sides have agreed that the negotiations will be continuous—either until a settlement is made or until the talks break down. And that could bring another strike. Details of the agreements with the Mine-Mill union and a group of smaller unions known as the Utah Unit Council were not reported.

But the regional director of the Mine-Mill, Vernon Curtis, said the union would not have agreed to the contract if it had not felt that it was a good one.

The pact was formally signed Monday night.

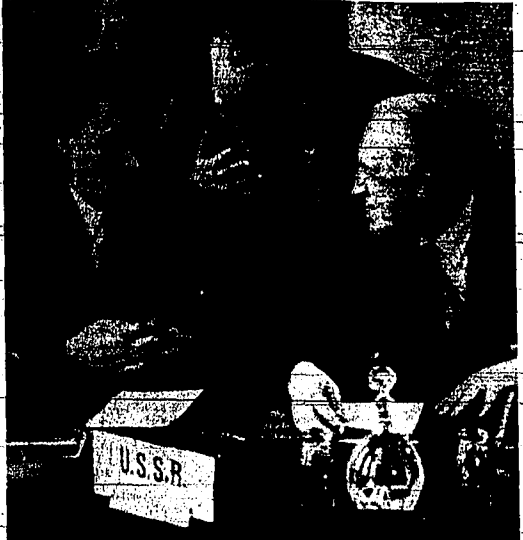

Area Farmers Using Loans, Bank Reports

Long-term first mortgage credit continues to be a major tool of agriculture in Twin Falls and Jerome counties, reports Jay H. Paul, manager of the Federal Land Bank association of Twin Falls.

During the 12-month period ending June 30, the Federal Land Bank association of Twin Falls extended \$1,031,200 of such credit to farmers and ranchers in this area, representing a substantial increase over fiscal 1961.

Of the \$1,031,200 loaned by the association during the year, \$762,145.00 was new money, according to Paul. He said that the long-term funds are being used primarily to purchase land and livestock, to make improvements, to pay for operations and to refinance indebtedness.

At the end of the fiscal year, the association had \$7,367,403 in loans outstanding, representing an increase of \$82,200 over the same date in 1961.

Senate Sends Farming Bill To Committee

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP) - The senate sent the house-passed stop-gap farm bill to its agriculture committee Monday, with instructions that the committee report it by next Monday.

The action, which came by voice vote after a flurry of parliamentary maneuvering, will give Kennedy administration forces a chance to put amendments onto the bill in committee by senate vote. As passed by the house, the bill merely extends present farm programs for another year.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D., La., chairman of the agriculture committee, abandoned his efforts to have the bill placed before the senate without going through his committee. Ellender had hoped by this means to substitute for the house bill the measure which the senate has passed and which the house refused to consider.

Ellender and other backers of the Kennedy farm proposals are pushing strongly for adoption of higher controls on wheat and feed grains.

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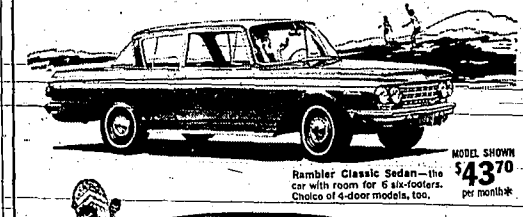
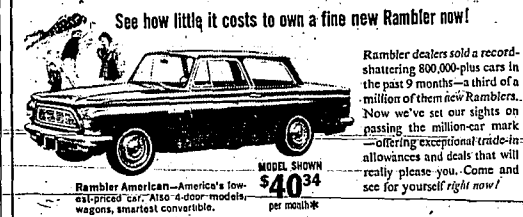
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News Around Idaho

BOISE, July 24 (AP)—The Ada county board of commissioners announced Monday the appointment of Elmer E. Bonville as Lewiston and Ada county engineer. Bonville, 47, resigned effective Aug. 20.

BOISE, July 24 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court ruled in favor of the state highway department Monday in a case involving damage to Ketchikan county. The court ruled that the highway department's action, contending that construction of U. S. Highway 10 east of Fourth of July creek had caused permanent damage to the county road. The highway department had argued that highway construction caused Fourth of July creek, which flows through their property, to flood and destroy crops. The district court, however, had affirmed the highway department's claim that the supreme court approved the ruling.

four big reasons as a national secretary—one in charge of each major set of programs. For the bureaucrats have taken over almost completely.

Instead, farm officials say Freeman has tended to put in fellows and his own men in top positions. They aren't the tough hard administrators needed to handle the complex and changing situations in such situations as these:

There are so many complicated problems with so many exceptions and counter exceptions that some officials say frankly they can do nothing and find a way to justify it.

Department of agriculture programs are rigidly compartmentalized. Often the job doesn't know what the right hand is doing. In any given city there may be a handful of men, many agricultural officers or officials groups dealing with farm problems. They may, in fact, be working at cross purposes. One may have information of an attempt to evade regulations—information that put together the information in the hands of a man a few miles away might add up to something significant. But these chunks of information may never be brought together, or may be brought together too late to any good.

Some department bureaucrats in key spots over the years have come to do their work and superficially, even when handling transactions involving large amounts of money. If a man certifies he bought a piece of land without making any side deals, these officials tend to take his word without checking it out. It would be hard to get a man's word without it worth 12 million dollars, these officials seem to accept this.

There has been no complete and thoroughgoing check of the hundreds of thousands of men and women who in one way or

another have something to do with administering the nation's department's programs. The great bulk of those men and women are young men and women not being a weeding out of those few that are weak and "leaky" in the first place. Mrs. Lucille Smylie received a phone call after phone call from throughout the nation expressing grief, dismay and shock at the death of the senator.

"It's a real blow," she said as she reached for the telephone that kept rattling through the mansion of the chief executive.

The calls came from Cleveland, New York, Boise and Casper, Wyo.

Even as the calls came to Mrs. Smylie still attempting to reach her husband who was en route somewhere between here and Idaho Falls. At that time she said she believed the governor was between Carey and Gooding and that she had alerted the state police in order to find him.

Speaking in absence of the chief executive, Idaho's first lady said of Dworshak's death:

"It's one of the greatest shocks that could come to our state at this time and to the nation because we was a fighter for a lot of people. He was just had lunch with me."

Yank Troop Withdrawal Is Leisurely

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The United States will take its time withdrawing some 150 military advisers from Laos, officials indicated today.

"We'll want some pretty good assurances from the international control commission that the North Vietnamese have started to pull out before we move," one source said.

Under a 14-nation agreement signed Monday at Geneva, all foreign elements must be removed from Laos within 70 days, or near that time, depending on what the other side does without withdrawing its military force.

The Geneva agreement designed to seal off Laos from the cold war gives the three-nation control commission the job of monitoring the military pullout on western and communist groups.

Red North Viet Nam is reportedly to have sent as many as 10,000 of its trained fighting men into Laos to help the pro-communist Pathet Lao in their rebellion against a pro-western government.

There is concern here that any North Vietnamese troops withdrawn from Laos may be shifted into South Viet Nam to help the communist guerrillas there.

1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup chopped parsley
Few drops yellow food coloring, if desired
Combine above ingredients.

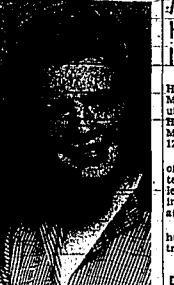

New Building at Gooding School Nearing Completion

GOODING, July 24—The new dining hall-infirmary building at the Idaho state school for the deaf and blind in Gooding is nearing completion and will be ready for use for the new school year which begins Sept. 5, according to Ed Reay, superintendent.

The brick building is situated on the campus directly south of the present buildings and was built at a cost of \$144,620, by the Ullman Construction company, Twin Falls. The building, which was started on the governor's priority list, was begun earlier this year with funds appropriated by the last legislature for the permanent building fund.

It is heated with steam heat from the central heating plant located in one of the adjacent buildings.

Entering the dining hall and kitchen building through the main entrance, one finds a foyer, with rest rooms opening off it and a coat closet. The main dining hall features a north-wall window, almost entirely of glass, and a south wall featuring ceramic tile. The ceiling has laminated beams and decorative ceiling tile.

All other rooms in the buildings are tiled with decorative tile in various colors. Another door off the foyer leads to a smaller dining area for staff members.

The kitchen is located on the east side of the building, with range tops and ovens located in the center of the room, with hood and exhaust fans overhead to carry off all cooking odors and smoke. There are work centers located in three different corners of the room, one for baking, one for dishwashing and one for vegetable preparation.

The unit features two new walk-in refrigerators and one new freezer. All other equipment in the building will be that which has been in use at the school previously.

There will be a large steam heated serving table in the front of the kitchen facing the main dining room. There is also a large pantry and a storage room which opens on the outside to a loading ramp. The loading area and driveway will be paved by the highway department.

A door on the east side of the main dining hall opens into a smaller room, which will serve as a dining area for the employees.

In the hallway leading to the infirmary, there are an office for the food service supervisor, a janitor's room and rest rooms. A janitor's room and rest rooms. A janitor's room connects the building with a door opening into the food service room in the

infirmary building. This is the area where food is brought and left for the patients. Across the hall is the nurse's office, for Mrs. Johnette Bragg, head nurse.

The main entrance to the building faces east and opens into a foyer and desk in the main lobby. There are two wings to the building, one for boys and one for girls. Each wing has one large and one small ward room, an isolation room and restrooms.

Capacity of the building is 20 beds. There is also a dispensary where drugs and supplies are kept, and public restrooms.

Reay stated that during the last school year, there were 140 students enrolled at the school. 102 of whom were in the deaf department, with Allen Hoyer as principal, and 33 attended the blind department, which is under the direction of John Best. The institution employs a total of 44 persons, of whom 25 are on the "educational staff." The remainder serve in various capacities, as care takers, housemothers and fathers, cooks, housekeepers.

Reay said another building is to be built immediately east of the new building now being completed. This will be a girls' dormitory, and should be under construction soon, he added.

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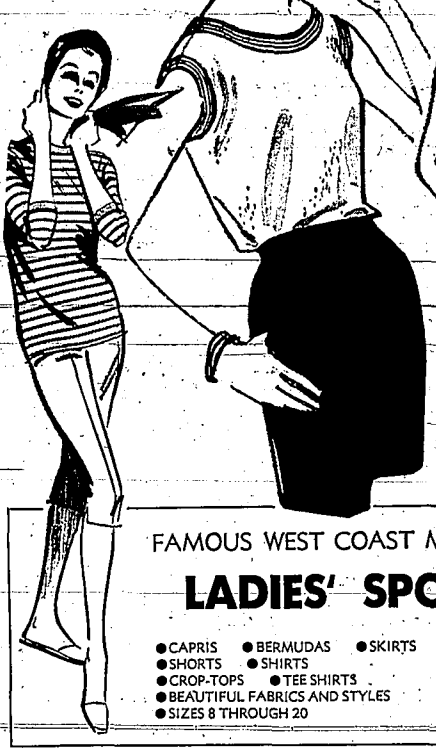
