Berlin Chief Claims Reds Are Bluffing

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Otto Bach, president of the West Berlin parliament, said yesterday the situation in his divided city looks "more dangerous abroad than it looks from the inside."

"Up to now, communist threats have been all bluff," he said.

Bach said he did not believe Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev would sign a separate peace treaty with East German communist boss Walter Ulbricht because the latter "is a Stalinist and a cat's paw."

The German leader said that East and West could negotiate in Berlin and to establishment of an international committee to guarantee free access to the city.

However, he said "we cannot now deal with Mr. Ulbricht. We are ready to deal with him if he gets by a free vote, a mandate to negotiate."

Bach was here for the international trade fair which opens today. He is scheduled to address a conference at the fair Friday.

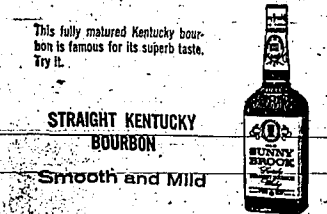

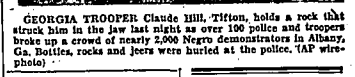

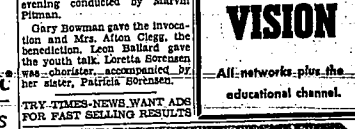

Berra, Runnels Added to American Loop Team for Second All-Star Contest

BOSTON, July 25 (AP)—Colorful Yogi Berra, picked for the 14th straight year, and leading batsman Pete Runnels have been added to the squad for the second-all-star game, American league president Joe Cronin announced Tuesday. In a further bid to stem the rising National league tide, AL manager Ralph Houk of the New York Yankees has named his circuit's hottest pitcher—Los Angeles' Ken McBride, winner of 10 straight—and left-hander Jim Kaat of Minnesota.

Going into the second All-Star Game, Chicago's Wrigley field Monday, the Americans have won only one of the last seven series, though still clinging to a 10-1/2-1 margin in the series. The National league won the first game at Washington 2-1. Houk made his moves under a ruling permitting an addition of three players to bring the squad to 23 for the second all-star contest. New York's Berra, who has played a majority of his 14 games as a catcher, will be a spare outfielder while Runnels of the Red Sox is to succeed infielder.

Given a free hand in the pitching department, Houk selected McBride (11-3) and Kaat (9-11) while dropping Boston's Bill Marchetti, who hasn't hurled a complete game in nearly a month.

Houk also named Milt Pappas from Baltimore to his mound staff instead of teammate Hoyt Wilhelm, who had been picked for the first game but had to be replaced by Pappas at the last minute due to his development sore.

The repeat pitchers are Detroit's Walter Johnson, Hank Auker, Dick Donovan of Cleveland, Minnesota's Camilo Pascual, Cincinnati's Mike Anderson and the Yankees' Ralph Terry.

All right star players for the other positions who have voted their berths by fellow athletes must include Hank Aaron for both games. They are Yankees outfielders Mickey Vernon, Willie Mays, who has been picked for the first game, and second baseman Billy Moran of Los Angeles.

Other players named include first baseman Richie Rollins of the Minnesota Twins, Baltimore infielder Earl Bateman, who has been named as shortstop Luis Aparicio. Except for the additions of Berra and Runnels, the reserves men for the non-pitching positions remain the same. Detroit's Dick Groat, Philadelphia's Tommie Thomas and Jim Landis of the White Sox are the outfielders.

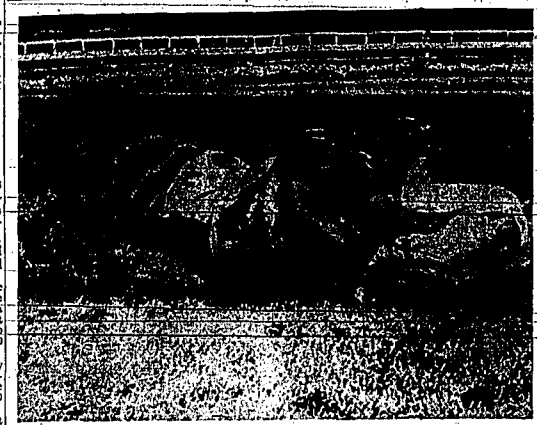

Cardinals Top L.A. Musial Ties Record

St. Louis, July 25 (AP)—Officially of the Bonneville Speedway association—hung an unusable sign Tuesday night on two-and-one-half miles of this western Utah salt track—meaning race driver Mickey Thompson probably will not be able to make an attempt at the land speed record. Thompson planned Wednesday to aim at an endurance record—driving 1,000 miles in a 10-mile circular track at an average 100 miles per hour.

Two years ago Thompson hit 108 miles per hour in the Utah salt flat, but his car broke down on the return run necessary for a record. Then he had a course of almost 12 miles.

Officials said the cracks in the two and one-half miles of salt would cause Thompson's car to such an extent that he could not run.

Mickey claimed 28 new stock records after Tuesday's race. Thompson, a 33-year-old speed veteran from Rolling Hills, Calif., took his stock car Pontiac onto the salt flats today and claimed records ranging up to a speed of 133.94 miles per hour for one kilometer from a flying start.

His flying start time for 10 miles was 12:47. And his time from a standing start ranged from 12:29 for five kilometers to 14:16 for 10 miles.

Most of the times he beat have stood since 1958 and 1959. Originally he planned to try for a record of 140 miles per hour (present mark 131 for 100 kilometers). But after setting the shorter marks he postponed the longer run until Wednesday and spent the afternoon studying the land straight track where he hopes to set a new world land speed mark for the measured mile.

The stock car he drove to the track today has an engine displacement of 421 cubic inches.

Puerto Rican Balloting for Choice Urged

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—President Kennedy today agrees that the people of Puerto Rico now should vote on their preference for independence, statehood or perfecting the present commonwealth form of government.

Kennedy's views were in a letter the White House said Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson would deliver to Gov. Luis Muñoz Marín, Kennedy appointed Johnson to represent the people of the United States on the centennial today of the 10th anniversary of the founding of the commonwealth government.

Johnson's views were in a Tuesday night on his arrival in San Juan.

Johnson had written the President that he believes the time has come for growth and improvement of the commonwealth system. He said he intended to ask the Puerto Rican legislature to enact a law that would submit to a vote of the people a plan to perfect the commonwealth within its association with the United States.

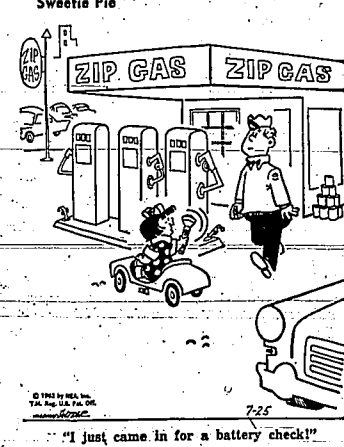

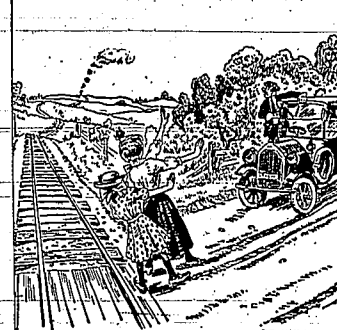
