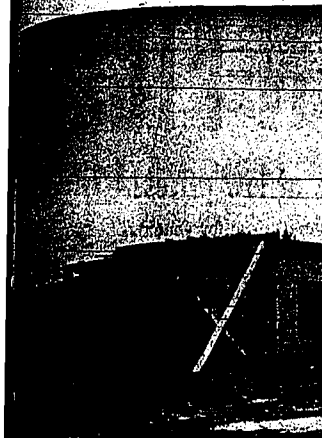

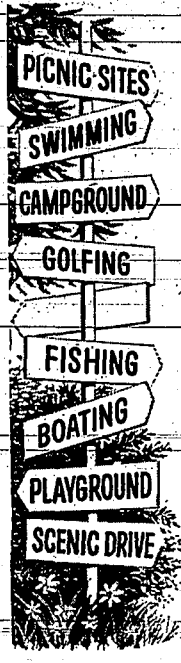

Half-Mast Flags Brace Skies In Tribute to Sen. Dworshak

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—Half-mast flags breed the Idaho sky today in respect to the passing Monday of Sen. Henry Dworshak.

The 67-year-old Republican senator will be buried at Arlington national cemetery today.

Though the man was notably shy in both his personal and public life, he was well-known to many friends here, said about him in last tributes.

One of those friends said Idaho will realize in the coming years all that Senator Dworshak meant to the state. The friend hastened not to compare him to Sen. William E. Borah.

Miss Louie Shaddock, secretary of commerce and development, worked more than five years with Senator Dworshak in Washington, she said. Senator Dworshak was a worker more for Idaho white Senator Borah than more international outlooks. She said tearfully that Idaho voters let their friend when the senator died.

"I remember even before I went to work for the senator, I heard about how he helped Idaho boys overseas get home when there were problems at home," she said. "The military knew the senator was honest and was going to help things when he pulled strings to help out a soldier."

Senator Dworshak was a newspaperman 30 years before he entered politics. He operated a newspaper in Burley, his hometown.

"He was always like a newspaperman in Washington," she said. "He never stopped working or searching for the right thing to do."

"Very seldom did he get to his office after the staff arrives for work. Then he would sometimes stay late into the night, working and searching for facts to support a bill that was pending in the senate. He was a big man; almighty bow-legged, rumped and always busy."

I remember when he arrived at the office he always walked in with his head bowed and in his big steps he would look straight for his office.

"Once a girl said the senator never said good morning to her. She said he just walked right past her into his office. So I told the senator one day: 'You've got to say good morning to these girls.'"

And I remember the senator saying back: 'Well, I thought everyone knew it was a good morning!'

Senator Dworshak never in-

volved himself in the thick Washington society life, Miss Shaddock said. However, there were exceptions but only when an Idahoan was present at the affair.

"As if he ever realized the power and respect he had in the senate," she added. "He never showed it. He just went on plugging away in his quiet hard-working way."

Senator Dworshak would reluctantly take the negative side of a bill and argue it to Miss Shaddock or his other assistants trying to get both sides of it. State Rep. Orville Hansen, once a foe of the senator and told the same story.

"I don't know if he ever found out I finally got wise to that trick," said Miss Shaddock, "but before I did, he would say the bill was no good and he wasn't going to vote for it. He just went away and tried to get more than just his side of the bill."

"There just wasn't a greater guy in Washington," she finally said. "And I'm truly sorry."

Miss Shaddock was attending the Tuesday meeting with Gov. Robert E. Smyly's personal representative.

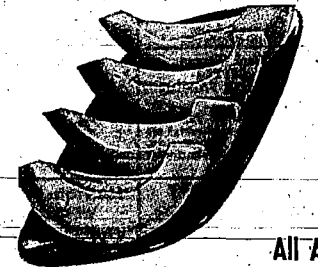

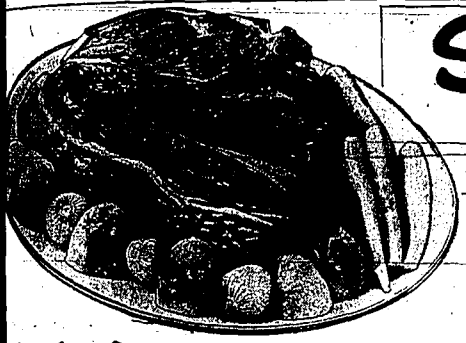

Pilot's Mistake Blamed in Crash Of Light Plane

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—A Idaho aeronautics director-Chester Moulton said pilot error caused the light plane crash yesterday morning which claimed the lives of two Arizona residents.

The victims, tentatively identified as Mr. and Mrs. Robert P. Forbes, were later identified as Robert P. Forbes, 52, Phoenix and passenger Eleanor W. Abbott, Scottsdale. Positive identification came after Moulton investigated the crash scene.

A coroner's report said the plane made a good takeoff from the Thomas creek airstrip and flew down the middle fork of the Salmon river. Forbes then turned up a small creek gully, one which was rising at a faster rate than the plane could climb.

Moulton said the plane became boxed in, and could not turn around in the narrow canyon.

This, Moulton said, was the clearest cause of the crash. The civil aeronautics board is conducting a routine investigation.

Smylie's Afraid To Leave State, Dreylov Claims

CRAIGSMONT, July 26 (AP)—Democratic Lt. Gov. William E. Dreylov says Republican Gov. Robert E. Smylie is afraid to leave the state.

Dreylov commented Smylie is afraid to attend funeral services in Washington today for Sen. Henry Dwyer, for fear Dreylov, in his capacity as acting governor, might appoint a successor to the late senator.

With Smylie out of the state, Dreylov, in his capacity as acting governor, could name a successor to the senate vacancy.

"It's quite obvious this is the reason that the governor is not leaving the state," said Dreylov. "A dozen people remarked to me that the governor doesn't dare leave the state until the appointment is made."

Dreylov refused to comment on what he might do if Smylie did leave the state.

CASSEL, GANDOLF, Italy, July 26 (AP)—Pope John XXIII praised the Telstar satellite, saying it is an important step in peaceful scientific progress.

The head of the Roman Catholic church spoke Wednesday to 800 persons attending a general audience at his summer residence.

He did not specifically name Telstar, but his reference was clear.

"Two days ago you heard voices from several countries and in several languages," he said.

This, he added, was both a peaceful scientific advance and a proof of fraternity among peoples.

Pope John reportedly watched the telecasts exchanged between Europe and America Monday night.

News Around Idaho

AROO, July 26 (AP)—Butte county Republicans have voted to back Ray Robbins, Idaho Falls former state Republican chairman, to be appointed U.S. senator to fill the vacancy created by the death of Sen. Henry Dworakak. Butte Republicans, meeting to organize a delegation to the Republican state platform convention in Boise today, urged Gov. Robert L. Spivey to name Robbins to the now-vacant senate seat. County leaders expressed regret at the death of the senator, who always had been invited to head the Republican campaign in Butte county this fall.

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—Idaho's 1962 chicken crop could be the lowest since the start of record-keeping in 1924, the U.S. department of agriculture reported Wednesday. It estimated a total of 1,566,000, or 97 per cent less than the 1,702,000 of 1957, and 20 per cent less than the 1951-1956 average of 2,528,000. Nationally the number of young chickens raised is expected in total 218,997,000, eight per cent less than in 1961 and the lowest number since records began in 1919.

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—The Idaho calf crop this year is expected to total 654,000, an increase of one per cent over 1961 and 10 per cent above the 1951-1956 average, the U.S. department of agriculture reported Wednesday. For the nation, a crop of 40,825,000 is expected, two per cent more than in 1961.

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—Corn and alfalfa growth in Idaho has been slowed by unusually cool night temperatures, the U.S. department of agriculture said Wednesday. Its weekly report said the first cutting of alfalfa hay has been harvested in nearly all areas of the state and the second cutting has begun in some localities. The USDA reported an increase in aphids and grasshoppers, requiring control programs. Range conditions were reported good.

ST. ANTHONY, July 26 (AP)—Law enforcement officers throughout southern Idaho were looking Wednesday for a three-time jail escapee described as "a real slippery character." Sought was Robert Thomas Bailey, 32, St. Petersburg, Fla., who apparently used a smuggled hand saw to cut his way out of the Fremont county jail at St. Anthony Tuesday. It was Bailey's second escape from the Fremont county jail, and Sheriff Joe Bluffs said he went out the same barred window both times.

SALMON, July 26 (AP)—Authorities were investigating the possibility of arson or malicious mischief Wednesday in a \$100,000 fire that destroyed the Anderson building in Salmon Tuesday. Police Chief W. J. Lewis said a witness told him he had seen a group of youths near the building just before the fire broke out. The fire had a second witness told him he saw a man throw something toward the 62-year-old building just after the fire started.

IDAHO FALLS, July 26 (AP)—A nuclear reactor known as SPECT IV has been activated, setting the stage for a national reactor testing station. It was announced Wednesday. The atomic energy commission said the SPECT IV reactor (special power, excitation reactor) test "went critically" at the eastern Idaho facility Tuesday.

Negotiations Are Resumed For Airline

WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)—Representatives of Eastern airlines, its flight engineers and its pilots met here today with labor department officials in an attempt to bring peace to a third major airline.

Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg said that Eastern's president, Malcolm MacIntyre, would attend the afternoon meeting.

Goldberg was expected to propose again the same settlement terms which MacIntyre had accepted and the engineers accepted earlier this week. Those terms led to settlement of the dispute between Pan American World Airways and the Flight Engineers International association—pending approval of Pan and pilots. Earlier, engineers working for Trans World Airlines had accepted similar terms. The main problem in all three disputes—whether pilots or engineers will get first crack at the third seat in the cockpit when the airlines reduce jet crews from four to three men. The more is expected soon.

Filer FFA Boys Discuss Safety

FILER, July 26—A schedule for Farm Safety week which is being observed this week, was drawn up by the Filer chapter of the Future Farmers of America at their Monday evening meeting.

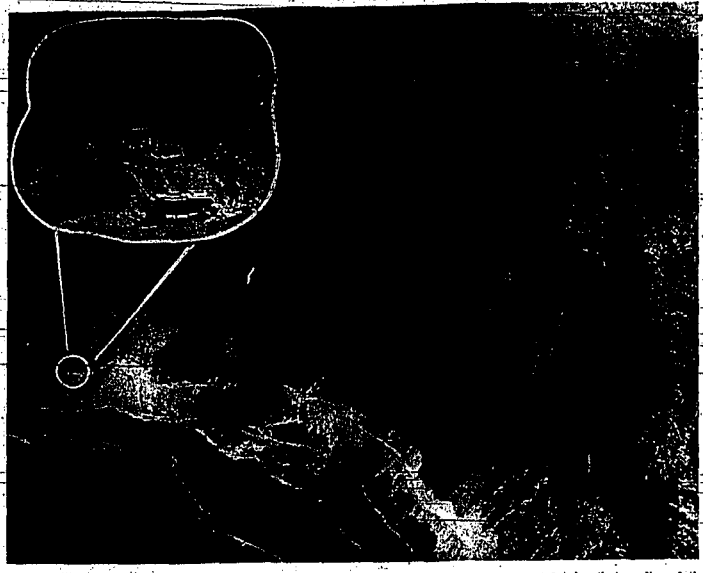

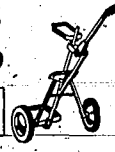

Fur also swirled at the knees of the leggy models, making it im-

possible to shift hem lengths with future style dictates.

By top, tap, tapping with his gavel, Larry Aldrich summoned forth from the dressing room one by one singular women in narrow paired down coats and dresses, and four-cornered skirts and jackets all made of camel's hair.

Camel's hair has been in short supply for years.

Although there has been a shortage of waistlines and sleeves in Aldrich's previous collections, there was none Monday. His coat shapes last season curved outward and inward at the places where the feminine figure usually curves inward and outward.

But he's reversed all that. His tweed jersey suits with their long jackets also copy hung to the right places on manlike. And on his black crepe dinner dresses, "midriff" bands emphasized the long ignored middle. The dresses, incidentally, made up for having no sleeves at all last winter, by stretching fabric to wrists, pulling gloves up over that.

If these garments, particularly Winton's, sometimes cost the price of a down payment on a house, they do guarantee that women will be seen. Brilliant white, that once kept its distance from intense red hue, are put together like a couple of symbols. Greens, blues and violets make other eye-starting combinations.

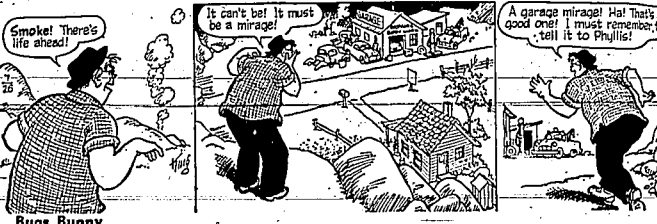
