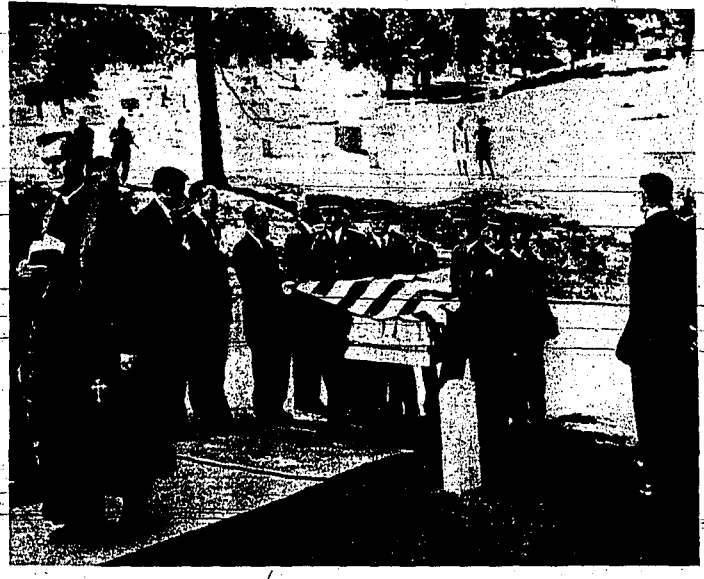

MANILA, July 27 (AP)—Philippine President Diosdado Macapagal proposed today that the Philippines, Malaysia, Singapore and the three Borneo territories be joined in a 'Confederation of Greater Malaysia.'
Macapagal told his weekly news conference the Philippine foreign office is working out details of the proposal. He said he would be formally submitted 'for the serious consideration of everyone concerned.'
He said the proposed confederation would not be limited to the Philippines, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei, Sarawak and British North Borneo.
'All those who qualify to be members would be invited to join,' he said. 'We would certainly welcome Indonesia.' Macapagal said 'to a question whether Indonesia might eventually be included.'
Macapagal's plan would add the Philippines to the members of the federation of Malaysia Premier Abdul Rahman.
The Philippine president has been accused of trying to sabotage the Malaysia plan.

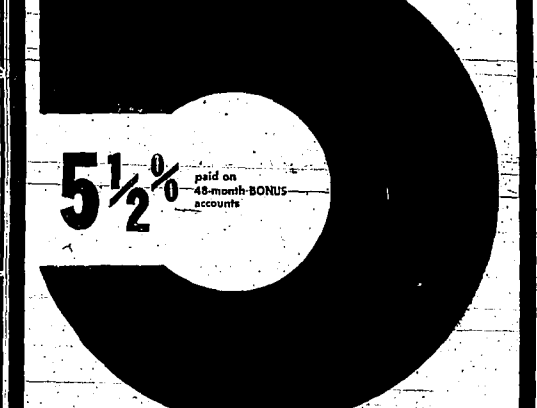

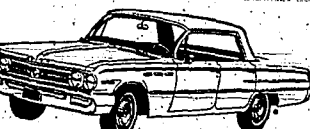

### Art Treasures Recovered by Police Action

LONDON, July 27 (AP)—Thirty paintings stolen two weeks ago in Britain's first million-dollar art theft were recovered in London today in a police raid in the city's seamy dock district.

Two detective sergeants of Scotland Yard, after a long search, burst into a house before dawn and recovered the masterpieces of unrelated two men.

The paintings, worth an estimated 12 million dollars, were the cream of a summer show at the Diana gallery. They were taken by midnight thieves who forced a door and set across rooftops with their net.

The paintings included works by Picasso, Toulouse-Lautrec, Renoir, Degas, Braque, and others.

Police said they arrested John Terry and William Bedford, both in the charge of receiving the paintings. The actual thieves are still at large, the officers said.

The police said they raided the house at 1 a.m. on a tip.

Gallery owner Jacques O'Hanna was shocked today. His wife, who told him the good news by telephone, said O'Hanna was "delighted."

"There is terrific jubilation here," she said. "We are all especially delighted and glad. As soon as the police can let us have the pictures back, we'll repair the frames that were broken and hang them."

The thieves took 23 of the pictures from their frames and took the other 12 frames and all.

It was the third major art theft here in 14 months.

Three earlier stole a \$400,000 portrait of the Duke of Wellington from the national gallery. It has not been recovered.

Police worth nearly \$90,000 was taken from the Lefevre gallery.

### Grain Storage Drop Affects U.S. Industry

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Government production and storage reports are beginning to indicate the extent to which the nation's greatly expanded commercial storage industry will be pinched by cutbacks in grain production and growing markets.

As of July 1, it appeared that total supplies of grains available for storage in commercial warehouses, elevators, mills, government bins and on farms were more than 700 million bushels less than a year earlier.

Claremore supplies from previous crops and this year's indicated production put the total supply of grains, including soybeans and flaxseed, at about 6,225,000,000 bushels compared with 6,000,000,000 a year earlier.

Already many warehousemen

in grain areas are complaining about increasing storage space and declining revenues in some areas; they are appealing to their congressmen for help in getting government supplies for storage.

Commercial warehouse capacity was expanded sharply during the 1950's as grain production kept exceeding demand with surpluses moving into government hands under price support programs.

A number of factors are contributing to this situation—pleasing to government farm officials if not so pleasing to the warehousemen themselves.

It foreshadows a decrease in government costs for storing and handling grains, which has been running more than half a billion dollars a year.

Last year's smaller wheat crop a result of less favorable weathered, the 1951 and 1952 emergency feed grain programs and this year's wheat program are among the factors. The feed grain and wheat programs offered pay-

ments to farmers for reducing surpluses of the surplus grains.

Another important factor has been movement of wheat and feed grains into export markets at record levels. Still another has been usage of corn by the domestic livestock and poultry industries at a record high level.

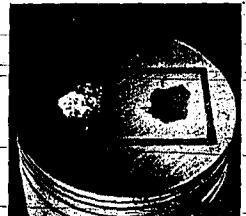

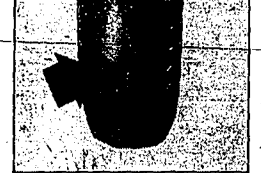

# South Korea Regime Starts Mayor's Trial

SEOUL, July 27 (AP)—South Korea's military regime began the trial of a former mayor of Seoul and 29 other persons today on charges of plotting to overthrow the government and assassinate its leader.

Two separate hearings were being held by army courts martial at the army provincial marshal's headquarters here.

Ex-Mayor Kim Sang Don and 28 other persons, most of them former members of the defunct Democratic party, were being tried by a five-officer court presided over by Brig. Gen. Lee Sun Yang.

A second group of 18 persons was being tried by a similar tribunal headed by Brig. Gen. Yang Chung Ho.

Both trials recessed after the reading of indictments accusing the defendants of plotting to overthrow the military regime and replace some of the defendants also were accused of trying to enlist the aid of American officials.

# Frank Benson Is Candidate For Senator

Two others joined the long list of names mentioned for the office. The Boise county central committee endorsed Roy Fanning, former Idaho Falls automobile dealer and former state Republican-party chairman.

County L. Jensen, Idaho Falls, counseled a meeting of the Bonneville county Democratic central committee Friday to consider endorsing Robert Fanning, former Idaho county prosecutor and a native of Idaho Falls, among lives in Kellogg.

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Arnold Williams said he believed there is no merit to a suggestion that Gov. Robert E. Smylie appoint a successor to Dwerzhak and announce that the appointment is to run until 1964.

The governor has nothing to say about what names go on the ballot for the fall election. "That is the duty of the secretary of state, who must certify the names of the nominees to the 41 counties for printing on the ballots."

"I am convinced that under the present circumstances there is a vacancy in the senate that must be filled by election this fall. An appointment made by the governor would be effective only until the person chosen in November is properly certified."

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., July 27 (AP)—A 245 rocket-plane thundered upward to 100,000 feet and began a series of descent-braking loops over the desert.

Anti-Semitic Actions Are On Increase

BUENOS AIRES, July 27 (AP)—Anti-Semitic actions in Argentina and Uruguay express concern today over a recent upsurge of anti-Semitism in the region.

More than 40 instances of anti-Semitic violence—beatings, beatings and window smashings—have been reported in the two countries since June, and there has been a sharp increase in such incidents in the past month.

Argentina was shocked in late June by an attack on Gracielita Sirola, a 21-year-old Jewish medical student. A group of teen-agers kidnaped her, burned her with cigarettes and carved a swastika on her forehead.

Buenos Aires' 300,000 Jewish population protested the earlier attack by closing down shops and other businesses for a day. Uruguayans, professional societies and student groups staged protest meetings.

Interior Minister Carlos Rodriguez promised "inflexible" punishment of the offenders, and a group of Uruguayan students and ultra-nationalist Tacuara and Restauradora Nacional groups were blamed for the attack.

Several Uruguayans have been interrogated by police but there have been no arrests.

### Farm Taxes Top All-Time High in '61

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The agriculture department reported today that taxes paid on farm property and interest paid on farm mortgages both reached new record highs in 1961. Taxes were reported at \$1,632,000,000, compared with previous high of \$1,540,000,000 in 1959. These figures did not include farmers' payments for income of excess profits. No estimate was available on the amount of these levies. Last year's farm property taxes were 40 per cent greater than 10 years earlier and nearly four times larger than 20 years ago. Interest paid on farm mortgages totaled 680 million dollars, compared with the previous record-high of 536 million dollars in 1950. Interest payments were 25 per cent greater than 10 years earlier and 240 per cent above 20 years ago. But the net rent paid by farmers to nonfarm landlords—\$1,077,000,000—was below the record of \$1,435,000,000 in 1947.

### Air Force Is Convinced of Missile Value

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Air force officers are convinced that the air force is highly reliable. But they are concerned that three Thor missiles in the Pacific region of the air force have given an optimistic impression. The air force claims better than 90 per cent reliability for the war-rocket version of the Thor. The Thor used in the high altitude tests at Johnston Island are basically 1,500-mile range ballistic missiles, but they have been modified in significant ways to suit their special assignment. Two of the Thor missiles were traced to those modifications. The Thor used to lift nuclear devices high over the Pacific and guided and tracked by radio. The war version of the Thor is equipped with inertial guidance system. Inertial guidance which is incorporated into all of the most advanced U. S. intercontinental ballistic missiles — involves a built-in computer and gyro which work together to keep the rocket on course automatically. The air force is aiming for 90 per cent reliability for the Minuteman ICBM, which soon will become the mainstay of the U. S. nuclear striking force. Eight hundred of these 3,200-mile range solid-fuel missiles are to be employed in underground launch-bases. The Atlas ICBM, another 6,000-mile range weapon, is tracked up 12 successful shots out of 13 combat-type launches from Vandenberg air force base in California. These Atlases were fired by strategic missile squadrons. Crews who went into practice action with the type of missile they are to employ in combat, come to shoot at an enemy target instead of the open Pacific. The Titan, another liquid-fuel missile more powerful than the Atlas, has not recently become operational. But air force experts are sure it will measure up in reliability on the basis of only four failures in 66 test shots.

### Record Cold Weather Hits Eastern U.S.

Record chills gripped parts of the East today. Violent thunderstorms continued in areas of the Rockies, Plains and Ohio. The mercury slipped to 55 at Philadelphia, 49 degrees below the lowest reading for July 27th set in 1920. It was 41 at Philadelphia, Pa. Temperatures in the 50's were reported at scattered spots in the weather bureau east. Storms dumped 1 1/2 inches of rain on the naval air station at New Orleans, Douglas, Wyo., was lashed with hail and rain, totaling 3 1/2 inch. Quarter-inch downpours soaked northern New Mexico and southwestern Nebraska. This was mild compared to afternoon and evening weather elsewhere. In West Texas, tornadoes were sighted near Brownfield, Spearman, Haskell, Welch and Lamesa as storm after storm moved through the area. The 12 nuclear striking force launched no damage. One-half inch hailstones pelleted Precott, Ariz., and a funnel cloud was observed west of the city. A storm dumped 3-inch rain on Scotchbush, N.H. Near Snyder, Tex., some 3 1/2 inches of rain fell. Fort Worth, Tex., was drenched with 2 1/2 inches of rain. More than 3 inches of rain caused lowland flooding at Bonham, Tex. Cloudburst at Silver City, N.M., sent the river that runs through the town over its banks, flooding streets. A B-58 supersonic jet bomber added 34 feet on the end of the Crosswell air force base runway during a torrential rainstorm at Fort Worth, Tex. It ended up in the mud. Firefighters mopped up operations against a slide on Emigrant mountain north of Yellowstone park which has burned across more than 40 acres. In Iowa, Dubuque county officials said wind and hail storms last Sunday caused an estimated 1 million dollars damage to corn and oats. Federal aid was requested.

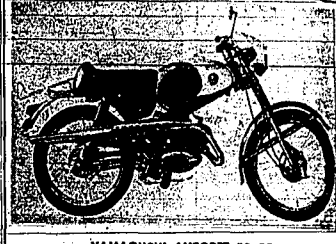

## Scattered Cases of Brain Fever Seen Among Horse Population in District

Several cases of encephalomyelitis, more commonly known as brain fever, have been noted among horses in Magic Valley, but the number is still not as great as several years ago. Latest animal to be stricken with the disease is a quarter horse owned by Claire Fife, who resides on his farm west of Jerome. Prompt treatment by a veterinarian has resulted in the animal being saved. Although very thin and weak, the horse is making steady recovery. The owner believes the fact the horse had been inoculated probably saved its life. Veterinarians report that encephalomyelitis is caused by a virus. There are three strains common to men and horses. These are known as the Venezuelan, eastern and western. The last two are listed as being important in the United States. The clinical signs of the disease are similar, regardless of the strain producing it. The disease has a very marked seasonal occurrence and a great majority of cases occurring in mid and late summer with the virus can be transmitted in this manner. There is no transmission from horse to man. Symptoms are a fever 102 to 104 degrees and early nervous signs of hypersensitivity to touch and sound. They appear related with an apparent blindness and they will walk in circles or into objects. Muscle tremors are often seen at this stage. Later there is severe mental depression where the head will hang very low, and the animal will often yawn and appear to be asleep. If the horse is to live, as he may do, he will remain in the stupor or early paralysis stage. Here in the west where the western type is most prevalent, about 75 per cent of the affected cases will die. If the animal lives, recovery is slow and often incomplete. In many cases an affected horse is left a dummy and not satisfactory for work. Horses may be successfully vaccinated for both western and eastern strains. The ideal time to vaccinate is late spring or early summer just before warm weather and the mosquitoes become prevalent. Two shots are required some seven days apart with the vaccination being made in the skin with a very fine needle. Authorities reported to the Times-News that in Magic Valley the number of cases reported annually is not as great as in past years. The reason is probably due to the fact that more horse owners are aware of the problem and are vaccinating. It is especially important to vaccinate if the horse is kept within a few miles of the Snake river or if the animal is kept near the canals or laterals which are good breeding areas for mosquitoes. Owners taking horses to the mountains for outings and sport should not forget that the mosquito feeding on him or his horse can give either or both brain fever.

## Retail Price of Bread Rises While Ingredient Cost Drops

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The price of white bread at the retail counter has risen more than 45 per cent since 1947-49, but the cost of the farm ingredients has dropped 12 per cent, according to the agriculture department's economic research service. During the same period there was an 18 per cent rise in the consumer price index for all good things purchased for home consumption. In 1951, white bread sold at an all-time high of 20.9 cents for a one-pound loaf, this was an increase of 7.6 cents over 1947-49. ERG said all of the increase was due to higher marketing margins at the various levels of production. The farm value of the ingredients which go to make up bread averaged 29 cents on a one-pound loaf in 1951, compared with a 33-cent value in 1947-49. ERG said the drop was due principally to lower farm prices for wheat, hard, sugar and milk. Milling adds another one cent per loaf. From 1947-49 to 1951, the margin for milling remained stable at 0.8 cent per loaf. Since 1951, the margin has risen 67 per cent. The wholesale baker's share in 1951 of the loaf price was 11.7 cents per loaf, almost double the six cents share in 1947-49. ERG said increased labor costs to the wholesaler, particularly for bread distribution, accounted for a major portion of this sharp rise in the wholesaler's margin. The total labor cost, including wages, commissions, salaries, and fringe benefits was six cents per loaf in 1951, compared with 2.2 cents per loaf in 1947-49. Other expenses, including advertising, packaging, delivery, and profit, amounted to 5.5 cents per loaf in 1951, compared with 2.2 cents in 1947-49. The retail margin in 1951 was 2.9 cents, or 13 per cent of the total price of the bread. In 1947-49, the retail margin was 2.9 cents per loaf. The remaining 1.5 cents spent for bread in 1951 went for storage, hauling, transporting, and handling. This was only slightly more than the cost of these services in 1947-49.

# Board Report Shows Cut in Chick Supply

WASHINGTON, July 27.—The supply of "broiler" chickens and turkeys is on the way down, according to hatchery reports of the crop reporting board.

Hatcheries produced 225,991,000 chicks during June, down 1.5 per cent from June 1961. Broiler-type chicks totaled 181,934,000, down 1.5 per cent from June of last year. Egg-type chick production in June totaled 1,268,000, down 1.5 per cent from June of last year. The cumulative hatch of egg-type chicks January through June totals 16,200,000, down seven per cent from the comparable period last year.

The cumulative hatch of broiler-type chicks during the first six months of 1962 was 1,146,240,000, down three per cent from the same period last year.

Eggs in incubators on July 1 indicate a smaller hatch of broiler-type chicks during July than in July, 1961.

The June production of turkey poulters was down eight per cent from June 1961. The cumulative hatch of turkey poulters during the first six months of 1962 totaled 11,660,000, down seven per cent from the same months in 1961.

# Seed Growers Complaining On Mail Rate

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Seed growers and nurserymen told congress recently that the government will harvest less postal revenue under the increased rates of a house-passed bill.

Small-business firms, which depend on the nation's green thumb with an annual outpour of brightly illustrated catalogues, will just have to curtail their mailings and other operations, they told a senate committee.

Spokesmen for the seed firms and nurseries testified before the senate postoffice and civil service subcommittee. They complained for the most part, about the increase in mail rates from 10 cents to 18 cents a pound.

Harry B. Dieckhoff, vice president of W. Albee Burpee company, Philadelphia, said the increase would "cut mailing costs for the annual Burpee catalogue from four cents to more than seven cents per copy. The company's mailings in direct class bulk mailings rates from 10 cents to 18 cents a pound.

George Park, president of the family-owned, Greenwood Farm, Park Forest, Ill., said the increase would reduce the number of catalogues mailed would be curtailed under the house-approved third class rates. Revenue from first class mail would not be as well as taxes on catalogs not mailed, also would be lost to the government, he said.

Harold Timmons, sales manager, Huntington Nurseries, Inc., Shelbyville, Del., stated that third class rates already have been increased by 160 per cent since 1962.

Thomas Yerkes, secretary, Connecticut nursery, West Grove, Pa., joined the other witnesses in declaring that the postoffice department is government service and not a business.

Several witnesses, including District Commissioner of the department of agriculture, also would be applied to some third class mail. Nurseries and seed catalogues, said in a report that 10 million gardeners across the nation and do not fit the junk category.

# New Record Attained In U.S. Farm Exports

### Study Shows Leaf Cutter Bees Are Helpful on Farms

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, July 27—The leaf-cutter bee, that newest and most popular of bees, has some human characteristics.

The male of the species is perfectly willing to let the female cut out a piece of her structure, and all up nights with the offspring. She does this by cutting up a few alfalfa leaves, using the hole that is her home with them, and then going out after food for her unborn child. She eats pollen from alfalfa, splits up a small pool of it on the leaves of a small part of her nest, deposits a single egg. Then she seals off the room, in three or four days the egg hatches and the offspring feeds on the pool of partially digested pollen. Before you know it he or she is a full-grown larva. She pinches for some three or more weeks, and the young bee comes forth to go to work in the alfalfa fields.

Where is Papa all this time? Well, he's mostly out of the frame, pollinating a few alfalfa blossoms in his spare time. He may not even come home nights. He sleeps in his own apartment.

BOISE, July 27—Idaho is expected to produce 20,775,000 bushels of barley in 1962 according to information released by the U. S. department of agriculture crop reporting service.

### Insecticides Have Limited Damage Effect on Wildlife

WASHINGTON, July 27—In recent years certain pesticide organizations and individuals have blamed chemical pesticides and similar materials for the gradual decrease in the wildlife population of this country, but that just isn't so, according to the National Academy of Science.

In an effort to settle the wildlife-pesticide dispute, a committee for all the academy formed a committee to study the matter scientifically and impartially. After looking into the matter thoroughly, this committee felt obliged to come up with a verdict of not guilty for pesticides by farmers, homeowners, and others who pose no serious or permanent threat thus far to America's wildlife.

In fact, the known impact of pesticide use on wildlife has been considerably less than that caused by other everyday activities of man, the committee concluded.

The committee went on to point out that those admittedly have been isolated instances where pesticides have caused wildlife losses. But these losses have been or can be minimized through improved procedures and techniques.

Pesticides, the committee notes, are a modern necessity in agriculture, forestry, and public health work. If used properly and with discrimination, they ordinarily should pose no threat to wildlife.
