Tax Exemption Study Urged By Lincoln County Officials

BOHONHO, July 28—Lincoln county officials believe property tax exemptions should be given only when actually needed and they say the "vague" state statute needs revision.

Considerable discussion has been held by county officials since last month's constitutional meetings acting as the board of equalization.

Assessed valuation of exempt property this year by Lincoln county citizens totaled \$28,000, about \$4,000 more than in 1961.

The statute governing exemptions states widows, disabled veterans and others can claim a tax exemption of \$1,000 valuation, provided they do not possess property exceeding \$3,000 in value.

But does that mean the actual worth of \$3,000 or the assessed value? Most counties use the assessed valuation, which allows possession of considerably more property.

Besides real estate, the exemption claimers often possess bank accounts, or have income from investments. The statute is again vague concerning property other than real estate.

Under the present law some will be benefited more than others. One widow may have a small home alone, while another may have much more property but still get the tax exemption of \$1,000 of the assessed valuation, county official point-out.

Beetle Damage, Problems Of Range Noted on Tour

Two things are being proved in the Sublett division of the Sawtooth national forest. One is that the only way to combat the pesky Douglas fir bark beetle is to haul the tree away, and the other that good range management in grazing cattle pays off.

Both these truths were inspected last week by four members of the advisory committee of the Sawtooth forest, on a 12-hour tour by forest officials. The committee members saw first-hand how both projects are progressing.

Heading the tour was J. I. Sevy, forest supervisor, and Fred Baugh, range and wildlife staff officer, both Twin Falls, and Ranger Marcus A. Kery, Malheur National Forest, Malheur, Ore.

Committee members are Robert C. Wake, Malheur, president of the staff; River Gattlemen's association; Austin Wallace, Burley, businessman; R. E. Hoffmeyer, former publisher of the Times-News; and G. A. (Gus) Kelker, Malheur.

The beetle infestation in the area has resulted in the largest timber sale ever made in the history of the Sawtooth forest.

Sevy told the group 40 million board feet of lumber is involved in the transaction, with the purchase being the Wendell Mill

and Lumber company headquarters in Fairport. The concern has a new plant at Itzburn.

By terms of the contract, the company builds 99 miles of required road to harvest the timber. These roads, together with forest service construction, will open up areas which formerly were not available to vehicular traffic.

Through terms of the contract the company pays \$4.61 per 1000 board feet for the lumber. Of this amount, \$1.06 goes to the treasurer of the United States; \$1.50 goes to regenerate the stand and \$2.05 to clean up the brush and debris.

In addition, of course, the company must pay cost of labor and manufacture, road construction and milling before the wood can reach the market.

The forest official said a total of some 8,000 acres of timberland is involved in the sale and it will take six years to get all the trees down and hauled out.

All efforts to control the beetle failed and so the harvest was decided upon. The beetle does not damage the wood but girdles the tree. It was explained to committee members. Because the fire bark is so thick, it is impossible to use conventional methods to control the pest.

Starting as an egg, the beetle-to-be turns into a larvae and finally pupates and then into a beetle. In this stage it can fly and moves to another tree and starts the cycle over again. Most of the beetles fly in June so it is important to get as many trees as possible down and out by that time.

Sevy pointed out that virtually all the mature trees in the Sublett division which it was feasible to include were involved in the sale.

"We hope the move will reduce the bug incidence," he said. "Actually, it had to be a big sale to keep up with the bug. The beetles do not hurt the wood of the tree in any way but can kill the tree if it is harvested in time."

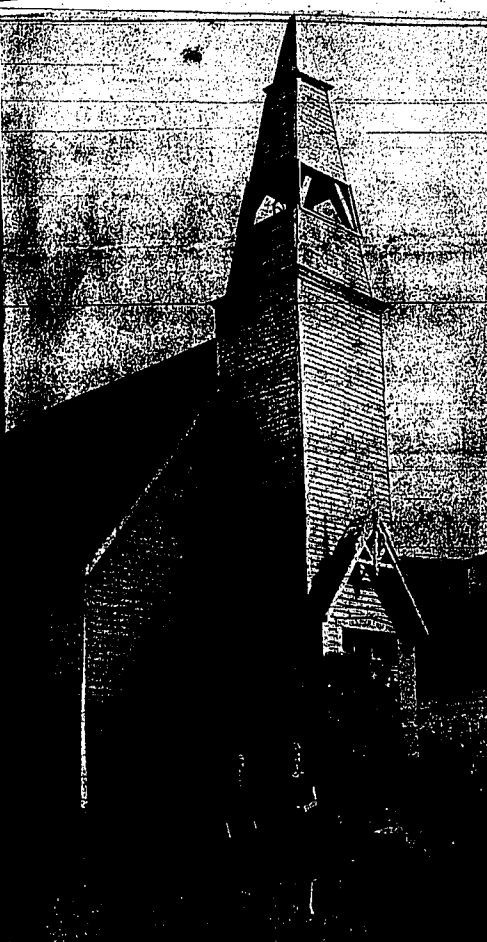
During the tour the group was joined by Peter J. Walker, Malheur, assistant ranger in charge of the timber sale. He removed patches of bark from several trees to show the larvae and beetles at work.

Second portion of the tour saw the group inspecting a unique range project which has tripled the amount of range that can be properly utilized.

A few years ago the 720 residents of Blooming Grove, Tex., decided to hold a 78th Anniversary Jubilee. It was a rousing success. Such a success, in fact, that the following year they held another 78th Jubilee. Americans, it seems, just enjoy holding jubilees—or festivals or parades or celebrations of whatever sort. And any excuse will do.

In cities and hamlets throughout the land folks turn out periodically to frolic in the name of everything from permutations to pack burros, rattlesnakes to red flannels, snowballs to swamp bogies.

They grow beards, wear outlandish clothes, crown queens, fire muskets, whoop and holler. They eat watermelons, wild onions, bratwurst and mushrooms. Every city worth its Junior Chamber of Commerce has something for which it considers itself famous, something worthy of annual observance—be it only shootings and harvests such as the sentimental citizens of Tombstone, Ariz., re-enact each year despite the distraction of women speculators who faint.

Large Lake Being Constructed North of Burley for Sewage Use, Not Recreation

BURLEY, July 28—Raw sewage disposal in the Snake river has come to a head during the past few years. The tremendous fish kill at Miller dam a year ago prompted several towns which were dumping raw sewage into the Snake to take action to clean up the river.

Twin Falls, Blackfoot and other towns are constructing sewage treatment plants. Burley decided to use a different method. They decided to use the lagoon method of treating their sewage.

Treating sewage by lagoon method is a simple, accurate way of disposing of sewage. According to William Sinclair, consulting engineer for Council, Holland, Hayes and Merryfield, who is the engineering firm on the Burley project, this method is so simple that many people don't believe that it will work.

Lagoon method is simply depositing the raw sewage into a lake before it runs back into the river. If the lake is properly constructed and the flow of sewage regulated and distributed the method has no odor and the water is returned to the river in a pure state.

The lagoon method exceeds the state requirements for disposing of sewage into the river. It affords both primary and secondary treatment. Unless a sewage lagoon is properly constructed there can be difficulties.

Burley is one of the first towns in southern Idaho to try the lagoon method. The method is not a new one. Lagoon methods were pioneered in the North Dakota region, almost 10 years ago.

The sewage lagoon—or better still lagoons, being constructed in Burley—are located on the north side of the city a few hundred yards east of the railroad bridge on the bank of the river.

The entire lagoon area covers about 90 acres and is divided into two 45-acre ponds. As much of this land was marshy and covered with vegetation, the problem was to strip off the vegetation and dig the lagoon deep enough to work satisfactorily.

The depth of the water in the lagoons will vary from three to five feet. A completed earth dike was constructed around the ponds.

Many sections of Burley have deep enough to put a snake in a sub water problem. To dig lines it was necessary to dig "dewater" trenches. These are filled into the ground along a parallel course to the sewer line. The pipes pick up sub-water and it is pumped off. This enables the construction crews to dig down and lay sewer lines without having to battle water and mud.

The present sewage lagoon will take care of a town twice the size of Burley and all they need to do to increase the size of their sewage system is add another lagoon.

The cost of the lagoon is expensive and uses only a portion of the \$240,000.

...ice breaks on the lagoon.

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Former Police Chief Recalls Events Of Past While Meeting Friends Here

It was about 25 years ago when Sam B. Elrod knew just about everything that was going on in Twin Falls. And if he did not know that he could find out. He was chief of police.

Elrod, accompanied by his wife and found things a bit different. The city was bigger, there were lots of strangers walking the streets, the "kids" of his day were now men and women and his friends were a bit older.

The former chief of police was a bit older too, but you had to look close to find it out. He was just about as restless and active as the days when he was head of the force.

Elrod came to Twin Falls the first time in 1922 and a while later he owned and operated the Matt Nichols-transfer company. Those were the days before extensive use of automotive hauling vehicles and, as a result, Elrod's wagons were pulled by horses.

He was appointed chief of police by the city council in 1924. At that time O. H. Coleman was a member of the council and police commissioner.

Perhaps the most spectacular case in his tenure in office was the Van Vlack affair in which a young man kidnapped his estranged wife, shot a police officer near here and then killed his wife before finally being captured. It was Elrod who found the body of the murdered wife stuffed in a culvert near the city limits.

Tried in a sensational court case, the handsome Van Vlack was convicted and sentenced to be hanged at the state prison in Boise. On the night when a select group (including J. J. Mullein, then managing editor of the Times-News) gathered at the prison to witness the affair, the unexpected happened. Van Vlack broke out of his cell, jumped from the cell block and was killed by the fall.

One of the amusing happenings when he was in business in Twin Falls was during the days of prohibition. Various trucks and boxes were stored in his warehouse but, he said, "it was none of my business what was in them and I could not open them."

But the contents in many such cases did not take a long stretch of the imagination. Owners would stop by at intervals to "inspect" their property, which was often as not would be five gallon cans of bootleg whiskey.

Additional Either Sex Deer Tag Will Simplify Idaho Management Problem

Summer-time fishermen in the middle fork of the Salmon river canyon are struck now and again by the bad condition of the range. Many of them return when the leaves begin colorizing for some of the finest deer hunting in Idaho.

While not widely known, the middle Salmon deer herd has 21,000 in 1945 to more than 72,000 last year. Statewide totals this fall are expected to hold or exceed that figure and this upward trend is found throughout the West, not just Idaho.

Whitetail and mule deer provide sport and table fare for millions of hunters across the land. These growing herds hold up under pressure that would be impossible without today's "know-how" of game and range management. Problems facing big game biologists are legion. Perhaps the big one today is how many deer to take out of any given area.

For example, deer herds have doubled and tripled in some areas during the past decade or so as a result of growing recognition of some of the large game populations. However, it is true that some Idaho areas now have more deer than they had 10 years ago.

The important thing to remember is that deer is one of the most prolific of all big game animals. A healthy deer herd on good range can have from 30 to 50 per cent of its summer population removed, during the year and still maintain its annual numbers. The biggest part of this annual crop can and must be harvested by hunters during the fall seasons.

Using information gathered on the Cassia, Owyhee and Boise areas, Idaho game managers can show that a properly cropped herd carries a better than an underharvested herd. The reason is that the remaining deer of all ages and both sexes have more food and maintain themselves in better condition. This is important when good deer food is in short supply, as it is in the winter ranges in the Middle Fork of the

Salmon river. When 25 well-nourished does will produce more fawns than 100 poorly nourished ones, why carry the extra 25 does on the winter range?

The fact that there is a critical shortage of good winter range for the number of big game animals in the middle fork and some other areas is not peculiar to Idaho but is found throughout the mountain states. Actually, the ratio of winter range to summer range may be one to ten or even wider. This is because summer ranges are in the high mountains and covered with deep snow in the winter time.

That it is obvious that winter range in the lower canyons and valleys is important out of all relation to its size. It follows that this winter range must be maintained in good shape if it is to continue supporting game animals in any great numbers.

In areas such as the Middle Fork where deer winter range is not only in short supply but

in poor conditions as well, a stepped-up deer harvest is needed. This will permit deer remaining after the hunting season to have enough food to get them through the winter in good shape and to give relief to overcrowded food plants.

The multiple deer hunt, including the new antlerless one, represent one method of getting more adequate harvests. Because of the extra tags and hunters claiming extra deer is beginning to balance out.

In several recent seasons around two thousand deer have been taken from the Middle Fork. Indications are that this can be increased considerably when additional hunters take full advantage of the multiple tags available.

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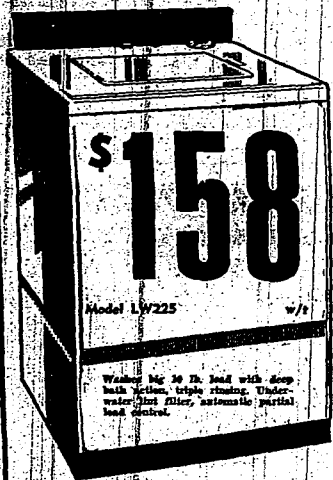
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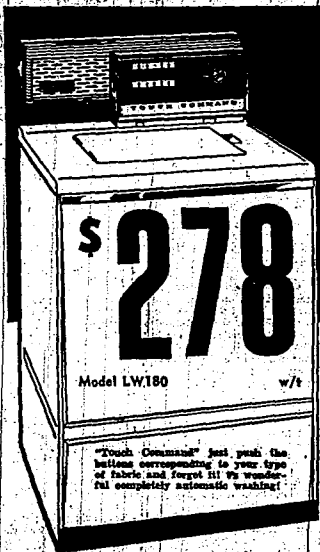
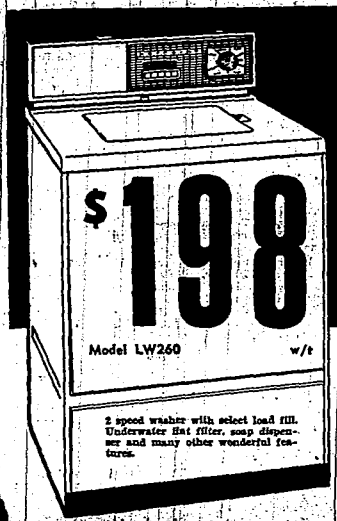
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Hope Pleased With Crowds During Fair

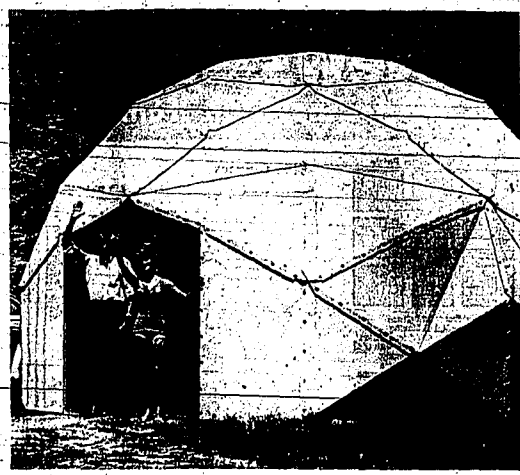

According to Vissers the trip was impressive and he returns with a better understanding and knowledge of the U.S. and the role it plays in world politics.

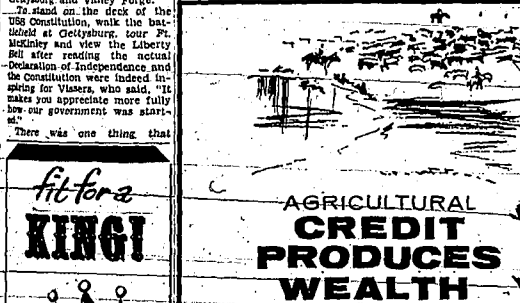

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Unique Looking Structure To Change Skyline of Wood River Resort Town

KETCHIKAN, July 28—Something different cut the skyline in this resort town—the other day—and chances are that there will be more of them.

For a country used to more conventional log cabins—and more recently homes with Swiss color scheme and design—this new structure is really something natives agree.

Called a "geospace dome," the structure might be termed alike to half a basketball sitting on the ground—but with the sides standing in and out.

Actually, these domes have been used throughout the world in large structures, but the sample erected here is one of the original small applications and the first in the state.

The pre-cut dome displayed here can be erected in a short time—by one man and in 22 feet in diameter. It can be used with interior appointments, as a cabin, garage, livestock shelter, construction shed or home. If you really are in a hurry to move in—these men can get it all ready for you in one day.

They are light enough to be lifted and carried by several men and are made of aluminum.

A local company has been formed to distribute the new structures in southern Idaho with headquarters in Ketchikan. The concern is the J.M.C. Construction company.

agement." "It shows what can happen when good management comes into play," he declared. "It was pointed out that the cost per head per month to associate members for the hauling and management comes to an estimated 85 cents, while the forest service charge is an additional 57 cents per head per month based on the selling price the past year and in the base year of 1931.

In accepting the additional time on the range, Wake said that calves "are doing much better than in past years and so are the cows."

Under the project the forest service has built the roads up the various gulches, permitting the tanker to move about.

After the grazing period comes to an end, owners of the cattle have to make their own arrangements for additional feeding.
