WASHINGTON, July 29.—Military coups and political disturbances throughout South America pose such a threat to President Truman's policy of progress that it may not be given a chance to solve these recurrent problems.

The administration's immediate reaction to the military's overthrow of the Peruvian government in Lima has placed a new strain on our relationship with the country.

The question now arises as to how the Peruvian junta and other South American ruling classes will regard Washington's get-tough policy.

A logical step would be to present the Peruvian question before the Organization of American States. But it is almost certain that such an internal problem.

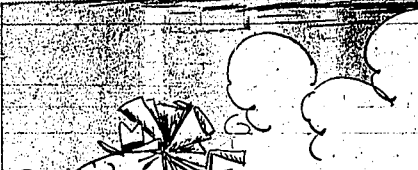

Many behavior disorders of childhood are due to disease. Others are caused by psychological disturbances, such as an emotionally charged interaction between the child and another person.

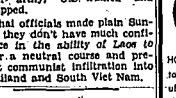
