Crash of Jet Aired Result Of Dynamite

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (UP)—The civil aeronautics board ruled today that the May 27 crash of a Continental Airlines jet which took 45 lives near Unionville, Mo., was the result of a dynamite plot.

Two weeks of investigation by the CAB said "evaluation of all evidence leads logically to the conclusion that a dynamite device was placed in the used jet by one of the flight crew members who had direct reference to the airplane."

The CAB merely said that the federal bureau of investigation was still investigating.

It was reported some weeks ago that the FBI had learned that Thomas G. Doby, 34, Kansas City, Mo., one of the crash victims, bought some dynamite and paid \$500.00 for it.

He also faced possible charges of armed robbery and concealment of a dangerous weapon. Friends said they talked of killing himself rather than face the criminal charges.

James Greenwood Praley, 34, a doctor as one of Doby's associates, also was among the victims.

The Continental flight, a Boeing 707 jet, left Chicago for Kansas City and, en route, decontrolled slightly from its planned route to skirt a belt of severe thunderstorms.

However, the CAB report said that at the time of the crash the plane was flying through clear skies. It concluded the weather was not a factor.

Among the evidence of an explosion were deposits of a gray-black material in the lavatories. The fact that the skin of the aircraft was puffed straight out over its ribs in the area around the wreckage was performance of metal fragments. The board clinched the question by reporting that these findings were caused by dynamite.

Four Men Are Sentenced on Stock Fraud

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 1 (UP)—Four men convicted of mail and stock fraud and a fifth who pleaded guilty were sentenced Tuesday by U. S. District Judge George H. Boldt.

James E. Calne, Vancouver, Wash., former president of States, Inc., and Estates Life of Washington—two delinquent insurance companies—was given concurrent 18-month terms on each of six counts. The terms will also be concurrent with an 18-month term he is serving in McNeil Island federal prison, Wash., for another fraud conviction. Calne pleaded guilty June 6 to seven counts. Sentence was deferred on the seventh count and Calne was put on five years probation.

"Hi Daddy" Signals Girl Has Awakened From Year's Sleep

PINE BLUFF, Ark., Aug. 1.—"Hi daddy,"

Those were the first words of a 16-year-old sleeping beauty, Linda Sue Calvert, when she woke up from a 13-month sleep.

Linda, a native of Pine Bluff, was injured critically in an automobile accident last year on Father's Day. She had been in a coma since June 18, 1950.

She and her mother, Mrs. Harry Calvert, were visiting Mrs. Calvert's parents in Pine Bluff and decided to return home a day earlier than planned, to surprise Linda's father.

"On a curve about 17 miles south of Shreveport, La., their car and a large oil transport truck collided during a rain storm."

Linda's mother and an aunt were killed.

Linda was taken to a Shreveport hospital. Twenty-four days later she was moved to the Texas Medical center at the Methodist hospital in Houston. A blood clot was removed from her brain, but she remained unconscious.

About a month ago, Linda was brought to a Pine Bluff hospital, where friends and relatives visited her regularly.

Finally, after 13 months of giving no sign she recognized anyone, she awoke a week ago and said, "Hi Daddy."

She has now learned to speak several words at a time.

"Of course, there is no guarantee that she'll ever be completely well, but we can't still hope and pray," her father said.

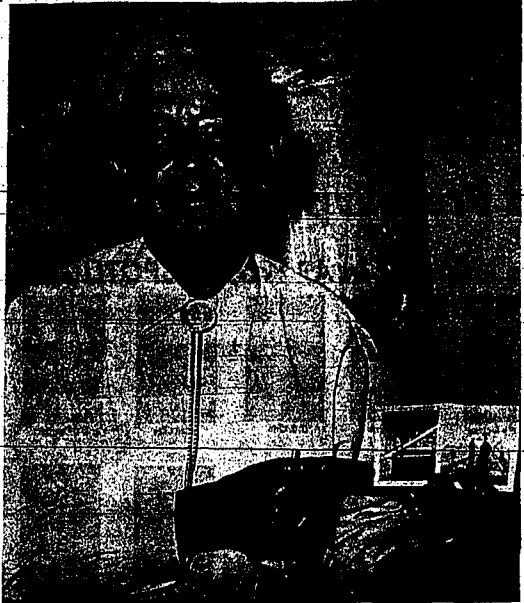

Hansen Bridge Construction Pioneer Visits Valley Area

The Hansen bridge which crosses Snake river canyon on highway 10 has been termed "the old Hansen bridge" for several years by area residents and many, figuring it past its usefulness, are urging it be dismantled and a new one constructed.

Reapportionment Issue on Last Legs in State

MADISON, Wis., July 31 (UPI)—Reapportionment in Wisconsin today was on its last legs as the state legislature passed a resolution to adjourn until Jan. 9, 1963, an hour before the 1962 legislative session is to begin.

The adjournment measure, passed 49 along party lines in the GOP controlled assembly, closed the curtain on any legislative action to redistrict congressional and legislative boundaries.

The resolution was sent to the senate, where the Republican majority there quickly put the bills in it, 18-8. One Democrat crossed over.

The reapportionment session began June 18. It was called by Democratic Gov. Gaylord Nelson who had been asked by a panel of three federal judges to bring the legislature back to order.

Democratic Atty. Gen. John Reynolds, a candidate for governor, took reapportionment to the federal court soon after the U. S. supreme court ruled in a Tennessee case that federal courts

have jurisdiction in suits to force equal representation. Court action is still in the air. However, with the primary election set for Sept. 11, little time is left for reapportionment in 1962.

The legislature passed three measures to reshape the state — one for legislative reapportionment and two for congressional redistricting. All were vetoed by Nelson. Each measure tended to favor the GOP.

The Republican adjournment resolution established a committee of assemblymen and senators, to further study reapportionment of the state and the developments in this field.



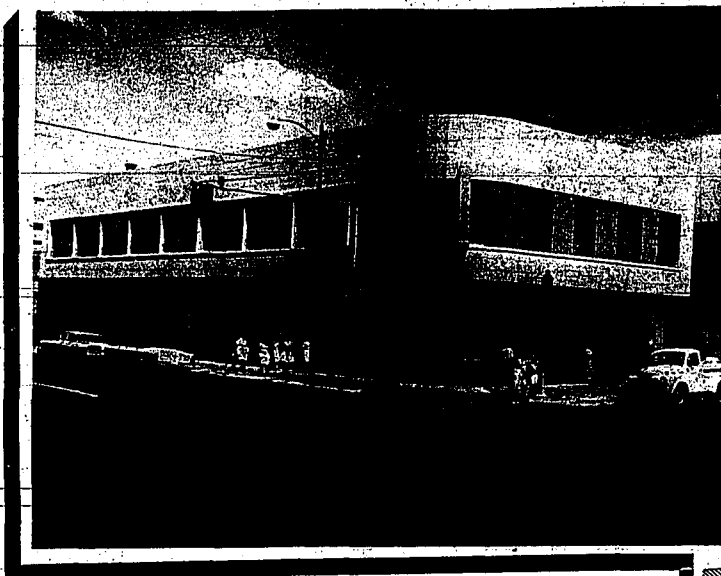
