The action started at a general meeting to hear representatives of candidates for the party to fill the senate seat of Sen. Henry Dworshak. George Bever, a committee member, attempted to make a motion to change the candidate to be chosen and backed by the committee.

In Buenos Aires, the seismological department of the national observatory said it recorded earth tremors early today, in a northern direction. The observatory at the northern city of Mendoza, Argentina, also recorded an earth shock but said it was not felt in that city.

Military Cut Is Urged by Alaska Solon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Sen. Ernest Gruening, D., Alaska, said yesterday military aid to Latin America should be cut because it plays "no meaningful role in modern intercontinental warfare."

In a senate speech, Gruening said the strategy of building up the military might of Latin American countries to help in defense of the western hemisphere was obsolete.

Despite other provisions of the mutual security act that would not be a security program in Latin America, Gruening said, "a number of Latin American tyrants, when faced with military arms against their own people."

He cited Peru as an example of this and noted that a member of the ruling party in Lima, Gen. Nicolas Lindley, attended U. S. military schools and was awarded the Legion of Merit medal.

He said a reexamination of the program was "urgently overdue" in light of modern conditions.

He said the United States spends \$600-million dollars in military assistance to the Latin American governments.

He said "None of the goals of the program have been achieved."

AMA Okays Modifying of Fat in Diets

CHICAGO, Aug. 3 (AP)—The American Medical Association approved Thursday the idea of modifying the type and amount of fat in the diet as an experimental means of treating hardening of the arteries.

It was the first stand by the AMA on the controversial question of diet and heart disease. The AMA's council on foods and nutrition said its report is not a recommendation to the general public, but is directed to physicians as a guide in treating the patients.

The report said the treatment of hypercholesterolemia—a high level of cholesterol in the blood—by a low-fat diet is not effective. The effect of simply reducing fat intake is to lower blood cholesterol concentration but raise blood triglyceride concentration, the report said.

Triglycerides are the most prevalent groups of fats in plant and animal liquids consumed by humans as food. The council said that increasing the ratio of polyunsaturated to saturated fat in the diet is the preferred method for treating the usual hypercholesterolemia.

It is not yet possible to state what fat intake should be for the best promotion of health, the report said.

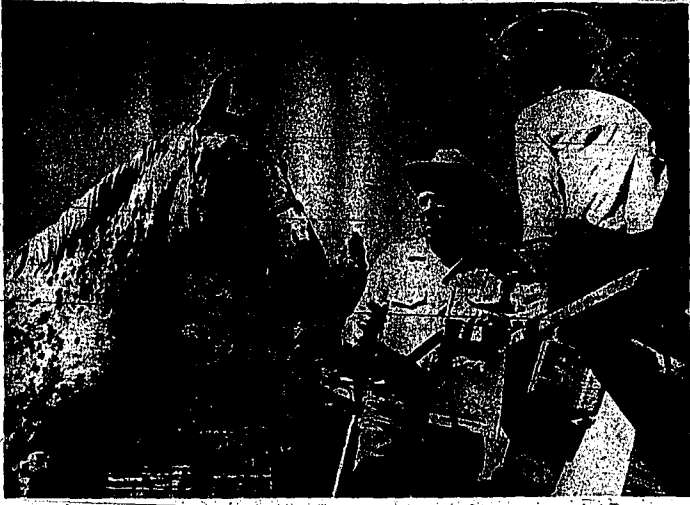

Costs Stable While Farm Prices Rise

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—Farm prices rose a per cent while farm costs remained stationary in the month ended July 16, the agriculture department reports.

Both farm prices and farm costs were two per cent above those of a year ago. Higher prices for most livestock and livestock products, notably wholesale milk and hogs, were primarily responsible for the increase in prices farmers received. Crop prices were generally lower, especially for commercial vegetables and fruit.

With farm prices rising and costs remaining stable, the parity ratio for the month rose from 76 to 79. Parity is the price received to the value of commodities sold by farmers on a par with the cost of things they must buy, theoretically a fair return for their products.

The mid-July index of prices received was 240 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 239 per cent in mid-June and 235 per cent in mid-July, 1961.

The mid-July index of prices paid was 100 per cent of the base period, the same as in mid-June. The index in mid-July last year was 100 per cent.

Average hog prices for the month were \$1.90 per hundredweight, up 30 cents from mid-June and 30 cents higher than in mid-July, 1961.

Average beef cattle prices for the month were \$1.90 per hundredweight, up 20 cents from the previous month and up \$1.80 cents from mid-July last year.

Corn was \$1.04 in mid-June and mid-July, compared with \$1.03 in mid-June and in mid-July a year ago.

Vegetable Fiber Crop Decreases

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—Vegetable fibers, except cotton, imported into the United States last year totaled 194,555 tons and were valued at \$42.6 million, compared with 169,231 tons valued at \$43.3 million in 1960, and continued the general downward trend of a decade.

The decrease in 1961 was largely the result of a sizeable drop in jute. There were gains in palm-type fibers, but gains in kapok and most of the hard fibers.

Agriculture Secretary Hits Plan to Move Farm Families

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Secretary of agriculture Orville L. Freeman takes vitaminis. He said to a "news conference" recently.

Freeman started off the news session in a calm, quiet manner. He announced that John A. Baker would become the new secretary of agriculture for rural development and conservation.

Then he issued a biting statement critical of the new program for agriculture advanced by the committee for economic development. He said the CED's proposals to move two million farmers off the farm, cut farm price levels sharply and end all government controls on agriculture within five years. He

Co-op Bank Lists Farm Credit Rise

SPOKANE, Aug. 3—Farmers' cooperative associations in the four Northwest states use upwards of \$20,000,000 of credit from the Spokane Bank for Co-Operatives in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962.

This fiscal year volume represents an increase of \$2,000,000 over the preceding 12-month period. M. J. Carter, president, said that the bank's total assets are \$100,000,000. Washington, \$1,000,000; Idaho, \$2,000,000; and Montana, \$400,000.

Payments during the fiscal year totaled \$20,000,000. As of June 30, the bank had \$20,000,000 in outstanding loans.

Freeman said borrowing patterns of the bank now own 41 per cent of its capital stock. He explained that the co-ops are buying out the government's investment in the bank through the investment of their own funds and through private returns and other allocations from the bank's net earnings.

At the month of the Spokane bank stood at \$13,287,000 on June 30, represented by \$1,390,000 of government capital, \$3,700 of co-op-owned stock, \$8,014,000 of surplus reserved, and \$815,000 of surplus allocated to patrons.

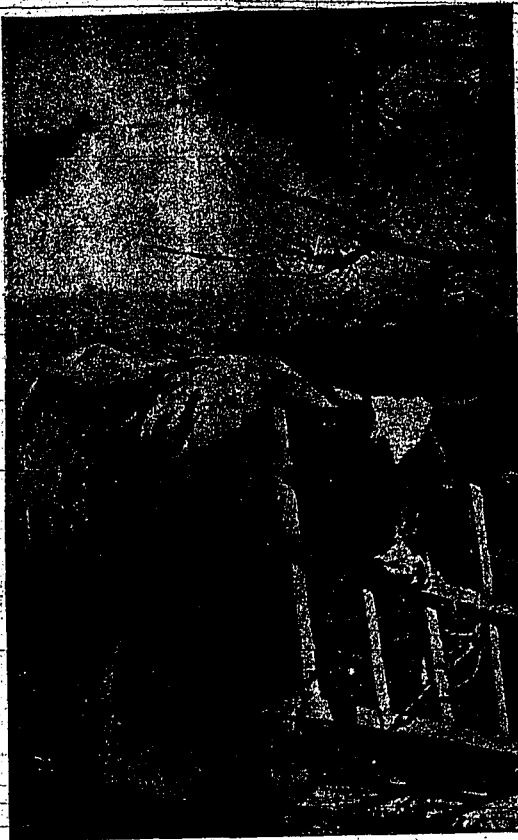

Milker Tests Reveal Many Dairy Faults

JEROME, Aug. 3—W. G. Priest reports results of the milker testing conducted in Jerome. Some 40 milking machines were tested, including 11 pipelines and 27 buckets.

Several types of errors were discovered. Nine pipelines and 16 buckets or a total of 25 per cent had a low vacuum supply. Twenty-three per cent, including two pipelines and nine buckets, had worn pulsators. Some 17 per cent, including three pipelines and five buckets, had leaky lines. There was excess plumbing in 27 per cent, including four pipelines and 10 buckets. Worn initiators were causing trouble in 19 per cent, including one pipeline and nine buckets.

Faulty arrangement was found in 41 per cent tested, including six pipelines and 19 buckets. Two pipelines and seven buckets were dirty. Inadequate power was at fault in eight per cent of the cases, including one pipeline and three buckets.

There were 11 per cent with pulsators out of time including one pipeline and seven buckets. Four pipelines had excessive filters.

Priest said the testing was well received and all but one farmer had made the necessary corrections. Priest noted corrections were helping. He said several more farmers had expressed interest in having equipment tested.

The testing equipment was borrowed from Lincoln county. The testing was done by Priest, L. W. Sanberg, county FFA representative and Kenneth Hester, Ida-Gem Dairyman representative.

Northside Hay Hit by Aphids

JEROME, Aug. 3—W. G. Priest, Jerome county extension agent, says aphids are increasing in hay fields.

Priest points out the increase is partly because cool nights bring dew and this is also the peak wheat season.

A high humidity is conducive to a large growth of aphids. Priest said they are doing the most damage in the hay. The grain is far enough along and won't be damaged.

New Spray Has Deadly Effect on Pesky Flies

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—A new spray developed by the University of California at Davis has been found to be deadly to house flies. The spray, called "Fly-Kill," is a mixture of a chemical called "cyfluthrin" and a natural product called "pyrethrin."

The spray is highly effective against house flies and is safe for humans and other animals. It is being tested for use in agricultural areas.

New Tax Guides Are Published

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—More liberal depreciation allowances for machinery and equipment were made effective for income tax returns due on and after July 1, 1961, under the treasury department's new depreciation guidelines and rules issued this month.

The guidelines cut from 30 to 40 percent the useful lives for machinery and equipment—newly established in Bulletin 2. Hailed by secretary of the treasury Dillon as a benefit to all American business, agriculture and mining, the more liberal depreciation allowances were expected to cut tax liability by one and a half billion dollars a year.

Weather and Crop Bulletin Indicates 1962 Corn Growth Is Above Average

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (UPI)—The government's weather and crop bulletin for the week ended July 30 indicates the 1962 corn crop has developed ahead of average and is sharply advanced over a year ago.

About seven-eighths of the corn acreage in the Corn Belt has tasseled. In the Gulf region early corn is maturing rapidly, and in Kentucky one-tenth of the acreage is in the dent stage. In the Southeast and Atlantic States, moisture supplies are variable but tend to be short.

In Illinois, moisture supplies are on the short side in two-fifths of the state, but generally in the corn belt moisture conditions are satisfactory. Most western portions of the belt have rather abundant moisture supplies.

Harvesting of winter wheat in the northern Great Plains has made good progress and is virtually complete in the lower elevations. In the far Northwest warm, dry weather has stopped up the harvesting pace consider-

ably. Spring wheat harvest in South Dakota is 15 per cent complete.

The oat harvest is about seven-eighths complete in the Corn Belt. Soybeans have shown excellent progress from Nebraska and

Development of cotton plants was excellent in the western half of the cotton belt and boll setting was heavy. Cotton bolls are generally clean in all areas and insects are under control. The harvesting pace increased in Texas and a few bales were ginned in Arizona and Louisiana.

The soybean crop is making good progress in the Great Plains area as moisture supplies remain favorable.

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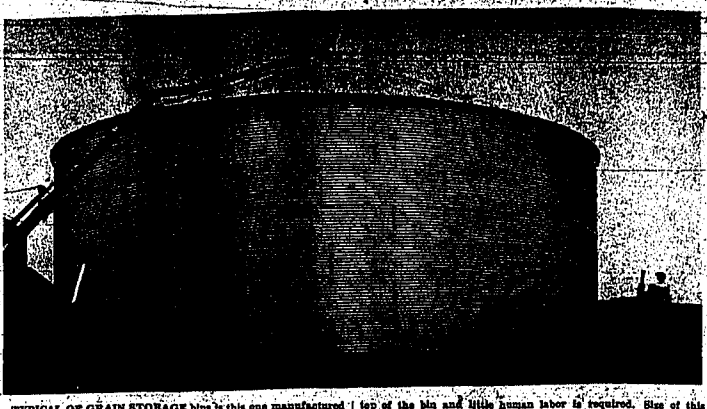

Corn stocks on July 1 were down 12 per cent from a year earlier, barley 10 per cent, and one per cent. The department said reduced production, under the emergency feed grain plan, and increased use of grain by major factors.

Stocks of wheat on July 1 were down eight per cent from the record level of a year ago. They totaled 1,304,275,000 bushels, or about 107 million from a year ago.
