

# Reds Start New Series of Nuclear Tests With Blast Estimated at 40 Megatons

UPSALA, Sweden, Aug. 6 (AP)—The Soviet Union has launched a new nuclear series with a superbomb blast which Swedish scientists placed in the 40-megaton range, second only to the 60-megaton blast the Russians set off last October. The new blast Sunday, apparently touched off in Siberia, came as no surprise to the West. Premier Khrushchev had announced this force would have to resume testing because of the U.S.-Soviet tests now being conducted.

# Reds Shun Proposal For Test Ban Treaty

GENEVA, Aug. 6 (AP)—The Soviet Union cold-shouldered today a Western compromise proposal designed to break the deadlock on a treaty for banning nuclear weapons. Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin told the 17-nation disarmament conference the new Western formula for test ban controls does not look promising. Zorin thus chilled the Western ideas ever before they were formally presented. He told delegates that U. S. Ambassador Arthur H. Dean discussed the Soviet proposals in London with him Sunday and that as far as he could make out, the Western position on the test ban had not changed in principle.

# Embassy Says Soblen Might Fly to Israel

LONDON, Aug. 6 (AP)—The British embassy in Moscow today said Israel is willing to take back Soviet spy Dr. Robert A. Soblen temporarily until he finds a country which will accept him. Communist Czechoslovakia is reported to have offered him asylum.

The British government has ordered Israel's El Al airlines to continue flying to New York. Israeli cabinet told the airline yesterday not to obey the order. We are prepared to take him back to Israel and relieve the British government of the problem, said an Israeli embassy spokesman. "But once back in Israel he would have to look for a country to take him in."

A home office spokesman, commenting on the Israeli statements, said Britain had ordered El Al to publish on American-bound planes and the airline had to comply. "The American Embassy in London," the spokesman said, "and they are bound by the law of the land to carry it out. They have given until Wednesday to do it, and we expect them to do it."

# Opal Claims Many Lives On Formosa

TAIPEI, Formosa, Aug. 6 (AP)—The United States Coast Guard today said 178 miles an hour winds, spreading death and destruction in the northern coastal town of Yilan.

The howling wind, the worst in 20 years, struck across Formosa today. It slammed into Yilan just before midnight.

Through the early hours of the day, the wind raged across Formosa, pulling a 4,000-ton American freighter loose from its anchor and sweeping a number of fishing boats.

By mid-morning it had passed into the Formosa Strait heading for the Chinese mainland with winds reduced to 75 miles an hour.

Taipei was sidestepped by 110 miles an hour winds which injured 38 persons, but no deaths were reported. Police said 4,000 persons were moved to high ground.

Thirty-five houses were destroyed and 192 persons were killed by flooding waters. Telegraph and electric wires were knocked out.

# Vote-Delayed On Insurance For Veterans

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (UPI)—House leaders today temporarily delayed a vote on legislation to repeal national health insurance for veterans of World War I and Korea. They said unexpected developments were expected over the week-end.

The bill, approved only last Thursday, had been held up since it had called for up to \$1 billion under a hurry-up procedure requiring a two-thirds vote for approval and bearing amendment.

However, veterans committee chairman Olin E. Pearson, Democrat, said many veterans' aid insurance interests opposing the bill are in the ground in opposition with private enterprise.

# Congress Plans Bill to Increase Total Outdoor Recreation Resources in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (UPI)—House legislation aimed at increasing outdoor recreation resources is expected to move through Congress this week. A house interior subcommittee on its agenda for today a bill to set up an outdoor recreation program, including grants to states in federal grants to state parks.

# Mystery Surrounds Death of Film Star

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 6 (AP)—A doctor smashed his way into a locked bedroom—and found Marilyn Monroe dead in bed, nude, a telephone clutched in her hand, an empty pill bottle nearby. It was her psychiatrist who found the body early Sunday. The mysterious death brought a tragic end, at 36, to the trouble-scared life of Norma Jean Baker—the frightened waif who became the world's most famous blonde—as Marilyn Monroe.

Was she suicide? Had she called someone before she died? A coroner's investigation, under way today, is seeking the answers to these questions today. Evidence uncovered so far is conflicting.

Dr. Ralph Greenson, her psychiatrist, said she called him at 10 p.m. Saturday, distraught seeking reassurance. They talked an hour. He told her to take a dose of her barbiturates. It was a hit she never took. Instead, she retired at 3 p.m., in what her housekeeper Mrs. Juanita Murray, thought to be good spirits.

"She was one of the sweetest people we ever met in our lives. She was just wonderful, so friendly and sweet," commented Mrs. Reimold.

The North Fork store was changed specifically for the film and a false stairway built for the film is still attached to the store.

Many holiday residents commented Monday morning that Miss Monroe was "likeable and cooperative" and that she was a pleasure to have in the store.
