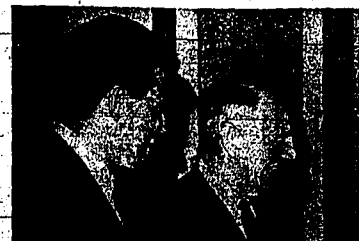

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UPI)—Republican congressional leaders fired a new salvo today at President Kennedy's proposal for standby public works authority as they predicted defeat for much of the administration's program. Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana, the house GOP leader, read to a news conference a statement asserting that the standby public works bill "is nothing more than a 300-million-dollar political slush fund."

Kennedy, Business at Odds Despite Attempts to Appease

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—President Kennedy is trying to convince businessmen that he is not "anti-business."

He meets them in groups. He exchanges letters with David Rockefeller, president of Chase National Bank, on economic policy and philosophy. Or he invites the industrial businessmen to the White House, asks them to the long sofa in his office, and says, "I'd like to hear what you think about this."

But the impact on the business community as a whole has not been notably deep. In fact, reports the belief persists that he is "anti-business."

In some cases, the motivation is a general an instinctive feeling that Democratic presidents are unpropitious to business. The more specific reasons are in conversations with businessmen go like this:

1. "I don't have any confidence in him. He says one thing but does another."

2. "He never had to meet a payroll, so he doesn't know the value of the dollar."

3. "Kennedy may be all right, but I'm scared stiff by some of the wild-eyed theorists around him."

4. "I don't hold any brief for the way Roger Blough (chairman of the board of U.S. Steel) handled the price increase. But Kennedy's reaction was bound to frighten business."

5. "He played mighty rough with management in the steel case, but I don't believe he will play rough with labor."

6. "He says a budget deficit is not a 'nightmare' a reference to the President's speech in Yale last June 11."

And these are the answers of government officers:

1. Business had confidence in Dwight D. Eisenhower, but four proposals developed during his administration. Business confidence is based on the feasibility of the economy to invest, produce and consume.

2. Kennedy expresses concern over the outflow of gold and deficits in the balance of payments. He says the dollar will not be devaluated. And he recently gave business a tax break—long in the works—both are estimated at one and one-half billion dollars, and depreciation of plant equipment. A cabinet officer points out that tax breaks would have been given at any time in the past year.

3. Policy advisers advise, but policy is made in the deliberations of many men who would not be described as "wild-eyed."

4. In the steel case, Kennedy

6. "At Yale, Kennedy spoke of several 'myths.' He said one was that 'federal deficits create inflation and budget surpluses prevent it.' He noted that the post-war boom is not our basic price stability."

The President also called for a "serious dialogue" in all sectors of the American society on these questions. It has not developed and he is disappointed today.





Jerome's School Board and Citizens Back 5-Mill Levy

JEROME, Aug. 8.—Plans to back the five-mill levy election next Tuesday were discussed at a special meeting of the school board and citizens committee Monday evening at the school.

A report from the state on the building survey also was read and discussed. This year the levy was pointed out that each year the school board has budgeted \$20,000 for building and maintenance. This year the board gave teachers a token raise. If the five-mill levy is not passed, the teachers will receive their raise and the maintenance expense of the school will be met out of emergency fund this year. Next year there would be no money for emergency fund and the emergency reserve fund would be exhausted.

Questions were asked about several of the needed items. It was pointed out that desks are needed at Jefferson school because they are of the old-fashioned type in 19 rooms. The desks were not new when the school was built, but were taken from Sugarland school and other places.

Members of the board mentioned they had been criticized for asking for a television set. Eric S. Shaffer, superintendent, explained that if the school had had a set last year, the government could have been utilized. Shaffer explained there wasn't time for the students to get home to watch it. He also mentioned the educational programs in the morning that could benefit teachers. He said he felt these programs would increase.

All board members and members of the citizens committee who were present felt the five-mill levy was needed urgently. Several said if citizens who were backing the election would turn their minds quickly.

Shaffer explained some of the items for which the five-mill levy could be used, including purchase of school atlas, construction of new buildings, enlargement or major remodeling of existing buildings, purchase of school buses and major repair of them.

The levy would be effective for five years. It would be up to the school trustees how much of the levy they used but the maximum would be five mills.

Shaffer released a list of items needed by the school totaling \$80,000. He emphasized that the latest survey merely updates a list of district requirements.

He added, "I fear this particular branch of mythology will be around the corner for a long while, for it is constantly re-invented, not by the communists, but by devotees of the nine-foot-tall cliché, a b o u t them."

Hoover, he said, "is as responsible as any person living in the Red posterity for lowering in the national consciousness."

China, Russ Balance of Trade Tips

BOISE, Aug. 8 (AP)— Communist China shipped almost 1 million dollars more worth of goods to the Soviet Union in 1951 than it received from the official Soviet publication revealed tonight.

The China association, a trade group representing British firms doing business with the Chinese, said this was a surprising figure, quoted by a publication entitled "The Department of Economics of the Society Democrats."

Exports to Communist China last year were worth about 10 million dollars against 861.8 million dollars received from the Chinese, leaving a trade balance in Beijing's favor of 284.8 million dollars.

The total two-way trade between the two countries in 1951 was less than half the \$2,000,000 reported for their peak year of 1949, however.

The China association said the "logical explanation" is the "shift in the reasons for the surplus in Chinese exports to the Soviet Union. The trade deficit between the two countries recognized that China, in view of crop disasters, was not able to export foodstuffs and that shipments of cotton, kangaroo and bristles would be reduced.

Since China had reduced its exports of capital equipment, the deficit of 45.8 million dollars of Soviet exports to China in 1951 could be explained, the association added.

"But it does not explain why China should have a trade deficit, particularly at a time when her needs are so great," the "investor from the West," the association added.

Credit terms have been granted for grain purchases of some western countries.

"The only logical explanation is a highly political," the association statement continued. "These are either that China decided to pay for outstanding debts earlier than called for, or that she has called in shipping goods by the value accrued to in the protocol."

The association said that while the trade with China in 1950 represented 60 per cent of the country's total, the 1951 figure represented only 39 per cent.

Treasurer Is Critical of Gaming Cash

BOISE, Aug. 8 (AP)— A cigarette tax produced more revenue for the general fund than the total amount derived from gambling, said today, Treasurer Rulon Swensen.

Swensen, a Republican candidate for election, said the cigarette tax was \$220,016.03, and a beer tax was \$176,000 a year. He said in comparison to a one cent cigarette tax the difference was "within a few thousand dollars of the gross amount derived from gambling."

"Taking the period from June 30, 1951, to June 30, 1952, as an example, Swensen produced these figures: Slot machine licensing produced \$482,214 that year. The cigarette tax produced \$1,650,783.43. Punch board licensing produced \$817,242.41 for the general fund.

Gambling was legal in Idaho from 1947 to 1954. "One can see that gambling does not bring in a lot of money to the state," Swensen said. "But it does cost a lot extra to administer it."

Religious Organization Wants Prayer

PARIS, Aug. 8 (AP)—The executive committee of the World Council of Churches Tuesday called for prayers for the success of the Roman Catholic Ecumenical council later this year and expressed the hope that it might lead to closer unity between the churches.

The call was made in the report of the executive committee to the policy-making central committee which met at the University City here to begin its annual session.

The executive committee's report said observers from the world council will attend the ecumenical council meeting which begins at the Vatican in Rome in October "to become better acquainted with developments inside the Roman Catholic church and not to act as official spokesmen for the Protestant churches."

The committee meeting here is composed of 100 archbishops, bishops, pastors and laymen representing 107 Protestant and orthodox churches from 68 countries.

The report was read to the central committee by Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, New York, chairman of both the executive and central committees. It recommended that the central committee accept the invitation from Pope John XXIII last month to send two observers for the Ecumenical Council meeting.

After calling for prayers for the success of the Vatican meeting the report said:

"We should make it very clear to our constituency what the present position is regarding relations between the Roman Catholic church and ourselves. That position is simply that we are seeking to be well-informed about each other and to let each other know about our various concerns. There is no question of any negotiations about organizational links and of course even less of the World Council of Churches acting for any or all of its member churches in this relationship."

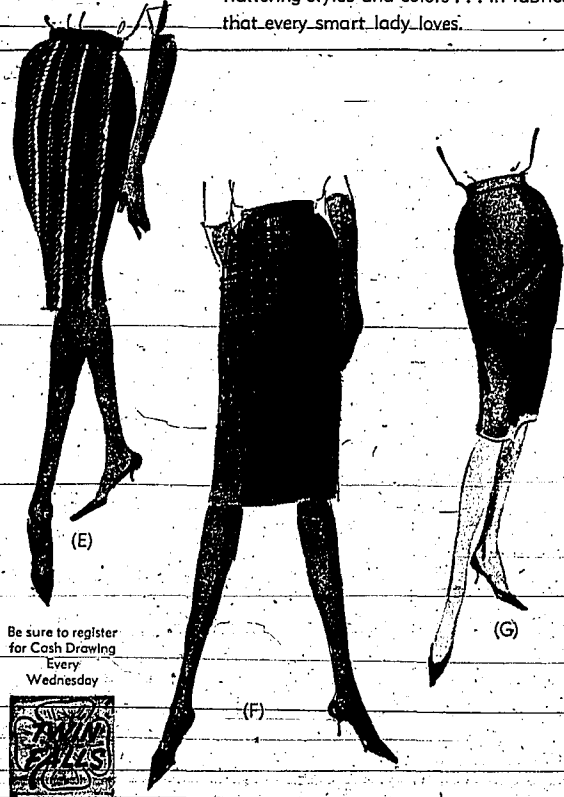
