### Postoffice Bids at Paul Are Planned

SEATTLE, Aug. 9 (Special)—Postmaster General J. Edward Feltzer announced today that during the period Aug. 9 to Sept. 1 the postoffice department will accept bids to build and operate a new postoffice building at Paul.

Specifications call for a structure containing approximately 1,775 square feet of interior floor space, a 548 square foot plant room and approximately 4,719 square feet of paved area. The building should be situated to the rear of the existing postoffice building (Broadway and 4th St.) and be located on Idaho street, 15 feet east of Fourth street, containing 6,400 square feet of land held by the government. The bid will be prepared by the postoffice department and will be successful bidder will purchase the property, construct the building to government specifications and lease it to the postoffice department. Terms of the agreement provide for a 10 year base term with two five-year renewal options. Feltzer is acting postmaster at Paul.

### X15 Rocket Has "Red Hot" Flight

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Aug. 9 (AP)—An X-15 rocket plane streaked through the sky yesterday in a pain-staking "hot flight" that will affect the design of future space ships.

Air Force Maj. Robert Rutledge put the sub-orbiting Sky Dart through a series of maneuvers that kept temperature on its skin from rising above 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit. Conventional aluminum planes would begin to melt at 400 degrees.

The X15 previously has withstood up to 1,200 degrees re-turning it from re-entry scorching flights as high as 314,760 feet.

Today's mission was to record high-temperature beneath the X15's black skin—the pattern of hot spots created by air friction.

# State Report on Jerome Schools Is Reviewed by Board, Citizen Committee

JEROME, Aug. 9.—The state report on Jerome school buildings was reviewed at the sixth grade, work under him will be Mrs. C. W. Haines, fifth grade; Mrs. Lloyd Martin, fourth grade; Mrs. George Franka, second grade; Mrs. Jesse Beckwith, first grade; and Mrs. Robert Gray, remedial class.

The survey team said, "It is our opinion that the Junior High school is the greatest single problem in this school and because of its location and condition it is the most difficult to correct. Only a few of the deficiencies listed, we recommend construction of a new building to house the Junior High."

The report adds the Junior High school has an enrollment of 400 pupils and is adequate for 200.

Some 200 seventh graders also were housed at Lincoln school. The report lists several rooms that had twice the number of desks for which they were designed. Almost all of the rooms are overcrowded. Only two, one in the study hall, were considered standard size classrooms, having a minimum of 500 square feet of usable space.

The rooms have no electrical outlets. There are no facilities for a varied educational program, such as Junior High school students should be having. The report says remodeling is not feasible. It recommended a new building house 500 square feet of usable space.

The grade schools in the Jerome district include Canyonville with 100 pupils; Fairview, City with 100 pupils; Pleasant Plains, 60 pupils; Appleton, 114 pupils and three elementary schools within the city limits with an enrollment of 1,100 pupils.

The Pleasant Plains school is in poor condition internally and the least attractive externally of the schools, primarily because of considerable abuse and poor maintenance over the years, the report states. The floors are in poor condition and attention to prevent pollution is the well by surface water. The floors are in poor condition in both upstairs classroom and halls. Rooms are not well equipped with instructional equipment.

The recommendations include a thorough cleaning of the building and grounds with only necessary maintenance thereafter. Drainage in the pump house, concrete well collar and floor must be installed.

The Fairview school, a building of native stone, shows a great deal of care and maintenance over the years and is in good condition. The furniture is modern and comfortable. However, lighting is inadequate because fluorescent lights are next to the ceiling and too high above desks. There are no shades on the windows on the west rooms where both the venetian blinds and shade screens have darkened the room too much. One should be removed.

The Canyon Side school, a four-room structure of stone is

The Jefferson school, the newest building, is well-planned and well-lighted. Classroom, although below the minimum in area, are well planned, providing work counters and sink and some storage space for instructional materials and supplies.

The furniture, however, is the old Panama type which does not permit full use of all teaching possibilities which the classrooms offer and for which they were designed. The interior is drab and depressing, partly because of paint colors.

Exits from Lincoln building do not help safe and rapid exit. The shelter construction at both the east and west exits also serve to impede easy and rapid egress, the report states. The stairway leading from the middle floor to the front entrance is steep. The stairs leading at the front door is too narrow to safely accommodate children leaving the building under fire or fire drill conditions. In case of fire or during fire drills, the height of this building requires that evacuated children would be forced into the street to be safe from falling walls.

Heating the building must be difficult and costly. The survey team recommended that "plans to abandon and demolish this

Others, including the library, biology and commercial, are too overcrowded but in general are so deficient in space as to preclude installation of sufficient equipment necessary for the rooms housing these subjects and services. The site is much too small for a school of this size. Matters are further complicated by the joint use of the athletic field by Lincoln and the Junior High school.

Some of the recommendations included extending the library facilities into the study hall to correct the crowded library situation; remove the superintendent's office to other quarters to make space for another classroom to house biology or commercial, preferably biology; remove the partition in existing commerce room and increase the number of electric typewriters. A further recommendation, which would make the first three classrooms to the building.

General recommendations included "plan to erect a new elementary school in Jerome which would enable the district to abandon and demolish the Lincoln building and to abandon the rural units."

At 8:30 a. m. the wave extended south from Puerto Rico into the eastern Caribbean sea. The northernmost fringes, was 1,100 miles southeast of Miami.

The wave, with maximum winds of about 25 miles an hour, was moving westward at 12 to 15 knots. The weather bureau said "it was not expected to change intensity today."

The weather bureau reported last night that the wave showed some evidence of closed wind circulation. The barometer fell yesterday over the lesser Antilles, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico, with lowest pressure readings reported in the northern windward islands, the weather bureau said.

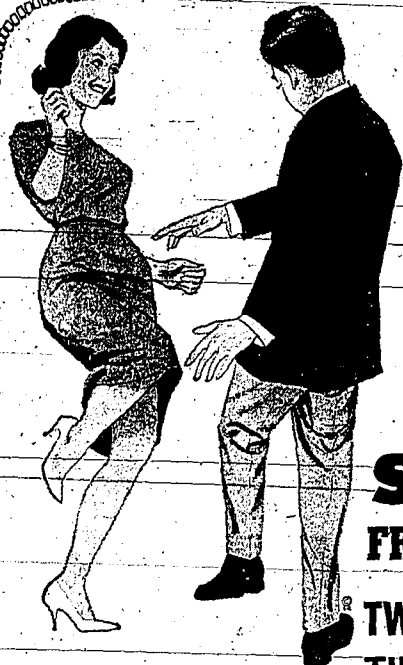

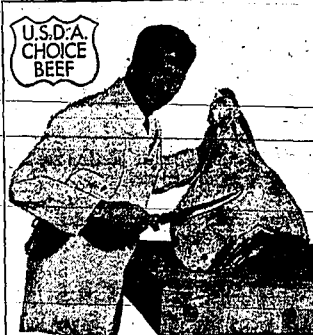

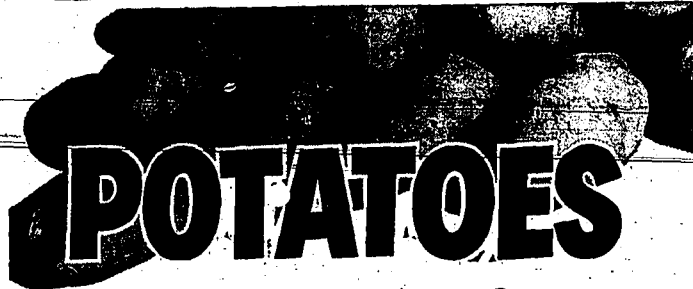

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 9 (AP) — Inmates of Maricopa county jail came to the aid of a jailer when he received a \$450 bill for blood transfusions. Deputy Sheriff Charles Tweedy's son, Randall, 9, recently underwent successful surgery for repair of a leaky heart valve. Tweedy received a bill for 15 pints of blood. World went out through the jail greynose and a petition signed by 165 inmates wanting to replace the blood so Tweedy wouldn't have to pay for it. Nurses from the Southwest blood bank visited the jail Monday and the inmates gave three pints of blood were replaced for every one used.

**Idaho Professor Takes LDS Post**

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 9 (AP) — Dr. Joe L. Christiansen will be the new director of the LDS church Institute of Religion at the University of Utah. Dr. Christiansen has held the same post at the Idaho school in Moscow. The appointment was announced Wednesday by Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson, chancellor of the unified church school system of the Mormon church. He said Christiansen will succeed Dr. Lowell L. Bennion. Dr. Bennion has resigned to accept a position with the University of Utah as assistant dean of students.

**Timber Industry Help Is Sought**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP) — Congress was told Wednesday that the timber industry in Idaho needs help in the form of forest roads. Sen. Frank Church, D. Idaho, urged the senate public roads subcommittee to approve a bond issue of 10 million dollars to 50 million dollars in the authorization for access roads in the year ending next June 30. The Idaho industry depends on national forests for much of its timber, he said, and therefore needs all the help it can get to improve its competitive position.

**Radio Equipment Stolen at Bases**

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9 (AP) — A federal official says that 2 million dollars worth of air force radio equipment was stolen from aircraft at two Arizona air bases and much of it reportedly sold to communist nations. Asst. U.S. Atty. Thomas R. Sheridan says that a federal grand jury here is investigating two Los Angeles surplus dealers believed to have been involved in the ring. Sheridan said that nine persons—all present or former air force personnel—have been charged with theft in connection with the case.

**Aide Says Russ May Attend U.N.**

MADRID, Spain, Aug. 9 (AP) — A Russian aide said yesterday he has been informed Soviet Premier Khrushchev will attend the United Nations general assembly in October and if he comes we can look forward to another three-year absence. Khrushchev was interviewed as he boarded a jet plane for his return to New York from a European tour, the aide said. The information came from official sources in Rome. Eisenhower, chief U.S. delegate to the United Nations, said the report may "not necessarily be correct." "It seems logical that Khrushchev will appear at the U.N. assembly," the aide said, "but the Soviet Union is getting because of the possibility of Khrushchev's being there," Khrushchev explained.

# AP Writer Assesses Kennedy Scores on Foreign Affairs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—President John F. Kennedy's scores on foreign affairs in the White House were assessed by AP writer James M. Mori...  
 By JAMES MORIN  
 During the conference between President Kennedy and Nikita Khrushchev in Vienna last week, the Soviet premier suddenly broke out with a threat to start a nuclear war.  
 History does not record a more bold and threatening threat thrown out by one head of state by another.  
 Khrushchev's design may have been to shock Kennedy off-balance. The President replied: "It looks like a cold winter. The two men, sitting measured and calm, wait their separate ways."  
 Kennedy held firm on Berlin. Khrushchev set no new deadline for signing a treaty with East Germany. He told a delegation of American newspaper editors last July 18 he still intends to sign such a treaty, but he said: "When shall we do it? I will not set any time limit."  
 Some observers consider this a plus on the administration's credit-and-debit ledger for foreign affairs. For the moment, it may be the right one.  
 No formulas have been found for an agreement to disarm or to stop nuclear tests. When Kennedy decided the United States must resume nuclear testing, picket lines formed in front of the White House in protest. On the other hand, developments in Southeast Asia appear to warrant at least some cautious optimism.  
 An agreement was hammered out for a tripod coalition government in Laos. The question is whether it will hold.  
 Before this agreement, Kennedy ordered American forces, including nearly 3,000 marines, to Thailand to forestall a communist guerrilla move out of Laos. The marines were withdrawn as the tension lessened.  
 What are the pluses and minuses? Few developments in foreign affairs fit snugly in to this clear-cut definition.  
 Cuba, to be sure, was a disaster for the administration. The Berlin wall was a shocker. At home and abroad, people asked why the Western allies were not prepared for such a contingency. Some Americans criticized Kennedy for not having ordered American tanks to knock down the wall at the moment the communists were erecting it. Whether the other allied governments would have supported such a move, of course, still another question.  
 The Congo is still mangled. The United States, with money and other support, backs the United Nations effort to force Katanga province into the Leopoldville government. Some Americans bitterly criticize this policy. Only last week, the U. S. secretary-general termed the situation "particularly critical."  
 The problem with France, a hold-over from 1958, remains unsolved. The French are determined to develop their own nuclear weapons. The Kennedy administration refuses to provide technical assistance. Time alone will tell whether the pol-

But the highest office ever won by a woman in Idaho is United States representative.
