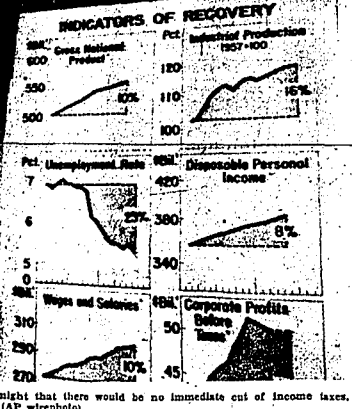

# Kennedy Rejects Slash In Tax Now, Sets Sights On Reduction in 1963

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—President Kennedy, rejecting an immediate tax cut as an economic weapon that might boomerang, has set his sights on multibillion-dollar reductions and tax reform for 1963. But he told a nationwide television-radio audience Monday night that if the unexpected happens—that if the nation slides toward recession later this year—he will call congress into special session to lighten the "far too heavy" tax burden.

# Senate Makes Historic Move, Chokes Filibuster

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—The senate chieled a page in history today by voting a debate limitation to break the back of a filibuster against the administration's communications satellite bill. The vote was 63 for cloture and 27 against. Thus, for the first time in more than 35 years, the required two-thirds majority of those participating approved a bipartisan leadership motion to invoke the 46-year-old cloture rule. Under it each senator will be limited to one of one hour's further talk.

### Papers Hint Russ System Is Practical

LONDON, Aug. 14 (UPI)—Europe's newspapers today praised the state-controlled press of the Soviet Union as having a critical advantage over that of the West.

The Danish government paper, *Politikens*, said the Russian press has become an important example that the end of the free press is near. The end is here to convince the Soviet people that the best of all human beings is the Soviet of all human beings.

It is a new matter of space, as they say, and the special form of government—directed by the state—gives the tasks where the party gives the editorial and confers awards, is the only good and effective one.

"We suppose the Russian press is the way in which a nation slowly but surely gains a 'master' race mentality," *Politikens* wrote. "If you want to compare the political systems of the world, the Russian system has better possibilities to keep the people living standards down than a democracy."

The Dutch *Algemeen Handelsblad* warned the space race would bring new problems to a world in which "organizing power" is the technical revolution. The paper also said the United States would soon catch up with the Russians because "U. S. ambition to shoot a man into space" and "military obligations, intensifying the space race" demand it.

An American daily mentioned the Soviet space flights, with the Berlin wall taking precedence in the morning's editorial columns.

Aurore in Paris said the Soviets have regained the space lead, and then scored the United States for continued refusal to share nuclear secrets with France.

"Are the Americans still going to refuse their allies the secrets which are at open sea in Munich and Judy show to Moscow?" *Aurore* asked.

### Paratroopers Land in West New Guinea Area

HOLLANDIA, West New Guinea, Aug. 14 (UPI)—Dutch authorities reported today that between 400 and 500 Indonesian paratroopers were dropped near four major military centers in West New Guinea before dawn. A communique issued by the Dutch military command described the air drop as the largest in the Indonesian drive to gain control of the Dutch-administered territory.

The reported landing came just a few hours before Dutch and Indonesian negotiators at the United Nations in New York were to begin final talks on an agreement to end the long dispute.

### Car Safety Bill Okayed by House

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (UPI)—The House approved by voice vote and sent to the Senate yesterday a bill which would authorize the commerce secretary to establish "reasonable" safety standards for passenger vehicles bought by the federal government.

Rep. Kenneth A. Roberts, D., Ala., said the standards undoubtedly would affect automobiles sold to the public.

He mentioned such safety items as padded dashboards and dash-mounted steering wheels, as well as safety belts.

### Idaho Youth Leader Dies After Crash

POCATELLO, Aug. 14 (UPI)—Marvin E. Brown, 18, outstanding student and athlete, died late last night in a local hospital of injuries received in a three-wheeled crash Saturday night.

Brown was the first Negro in Idaho history to be elected governor of Idaho's Gem Boys State.

His parents, the Rev. and Mrs. George Brown, live in Colusa, Calif.

Brown suffered a crushed chest, punctured lungs, a fractured skull and both his arms and legs were broken in the crash.

He was considered an outstanding youth by community leaders. He had been honored since he was 14 and lived in the Pocatello YMCA.

He was rated an outstanding scholar.

Brown, 6-feet, 2-inches, weighed 210 pounds, and had planned to try out for the U.S. Olympic boxing team.

His death brought Idaho's tribute toll for the year to 147 compared with 138 a year ago.

### Private Use Of Atomic Power Hit

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Aug. 14 (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman, the man who helped the North win the war, said yesterday he strongly opposed the United States giving its peacetime atomic energy program to private industry.

Truman ordered the first atomic bomb drop on Japan, and he recalled yesterday—the eve of the anniversary of V-J day—that the bomb brought about the end of the war and saved thousands of American lives.

"The government of the United States has furnished between 25 and 30 billion dollars to develop its (atomic energy) without incurring so-called private enterprise," Truman said.

"Why tie it up in a way so the so-called special interests can tax future generations? The people have a whole field for development. They should have the benefit."

He said "special interests" have been trying to ruin the Tennessee valley authority and the Northwest power pool which Truman said "helped develop atomic energy."

"How could we have proceeded in the development of atomic power if there had been no TVA or power pool in the Northwest?"

"It is my opinion that the government of the United States should keep the ownership and control of this great discovery, financed and proved practically by the government of the United States," he said.

### Weather Taming Plan Is Launched

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (UPI)—The navy and weather bureau yesterday announced a three-year joint program aimed at taming hurricanes.

Using new devices for making and dispersing silver iodide crystals, Navy A3D jet bombers will seed hurricanes in an effort to diminish their intensity. A similar experiment last year reduced a hurricane's maximum winds by 10 per cent.

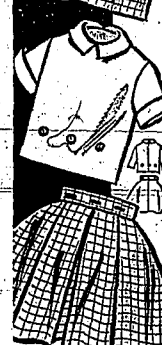

### Tokyo Woman Enjoys Work on Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, Aug. 14 (UPI)—Japanese women, like their American counterparts, are increasing their investing in the stock market.

Before World War II, the number of Japanese women investors was "just about nil," reports a woman broker with the New York branch of a Japanese securities house.

Now, 40 per cent of Japanese stocks are held by women, said Sachiko Yoshizawa, a registered representative with Nikko Securities company, Ltd., one of Japan's big four securities houses.

Just how much capital is involved in that 40 per cent she didn't know. "But securities, housewives, everybody investing."

One of every 5 Japanese families is a shareholder, she said. There are between 4 and 5 million shareholders in a country with a population of 90 million. In the United States, there are an estimated 17 million shareholders in a population of 130 million.

She has spot check by the New York Stock Exchange showed women accounting for 26 per cent of the total shares purchased and sold... for public individuals.

The exchange annually does a "public transaction study" by selecting one day to check who traded. This percentage of American women in the market has climbed steadily, but not as rapidly as it has in Japan.

Miss Yoshizawa believes the Japanese woman's interest is spurred by the country's changing family pattern. Today's young woman gets out of school gets a job and works for a few years before marriage. During pre-war years, such was unthinkable.

Many working girls continue to live with their parents, and so have added money to invest. Stocks are cheaper than in America—in Tokyo with \$100 or \$400, I can purchase a thousand shares in a company," she explained.

Purchasing power of the average family is on the rise—in the school missions it is much more the average income group than here," she said. And investing is made so convenient a housewife can purchase stock as she's out doing other shopping—from brokerage house branches in department stores.

Miss Yoshizawa was graduated in 1951 with a degree in business administration from Tsuda university, a women's school in Tokyo.

The daughter of a banker, she was continuing her studies in economics and English at Columbia university when she heard the securities firm was opening a New York branch. She joined it from the start in 1954, as a secretary whose job among other things, she recalled, "was making tea for the staff."

But the responsibilities grew. Now, Miss Yoshizawa holds executive rank and is charged with clearing prices on the Tokyo exchange for Wall Street firms, compiling the Dow Jones average on 225 Japanese stocks, making orders and keeping customers generally informed on what's doing in the Tokyo market.

"The Tokyo exchange is the world's largest in volume or at least in the number of transactions," she said. It is second to New York in monetary value of trading.

In private life, the woman broker is married to Austrian-born H. F. Stroh de Rothermann, now an American citizen. He has just completed a seven months assignment as a UN administrative officer at Eliza, Bolivia, the Congo.

"I tell the truth," she laughed. "I make a better schizel or goulash than I do tempura (a traditional Japanese cooking). I never cooked a day of my life in Tokyo."

This is nine per cent more than forecast a month ago.

The prospective crop of 2,315,000 hundredweight compares with 2,174,000 hundredweight produced in 1961 and the ten-year average of 2,178,000 hundredweight. Below normal temperatures during the first three weeks of July retarded development but were favorable for good quality, the USDA stated.

Shipments of round reds started July 20, followed by long whites. By Aug. 1, growers were ready to start digging early gems.

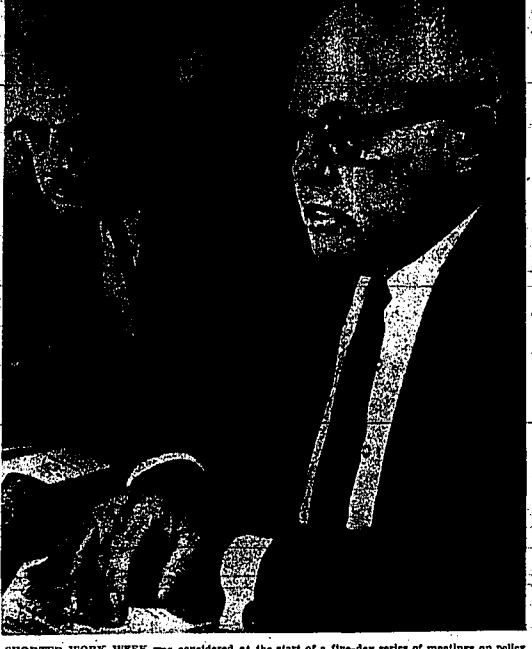
Production in the fall area of Idaho is forecast at 49,800,000 hundredweight, compared to the 1961 crop of 45,000,000 and the 10-year average of 32,249,000 hundredweight.

Expected yield per harvested acre of 200 hundredweight compares with last year's average of 210 and the 1961-60 average of 190 hundredweight, the USDA stated.

The Common Market attack, if confirmed by Churchill, would be his first public political act since the 1956 general election and would be a major break with his own conservative party's government policy.

Montgomery is a frequent public critic of Britain's efforts to join the continental trade group.

### U.S. Plan to Exceed Russian Tandem Space Flight Record

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 14 (AP)—A Burtin company rocket expert said today that a manned rendezvous in space mission is a need for launching from Cape Canaveral, Fla., will be a much greater achievement than the tandem orbits by the Soviet cosmonauts.

Bastian Hello, who is directing the phase of Project Gemini that the Martin company is developing here, said the national aeronautics and space administration could have stepped tandem orbits in the current Mercury program if the agency had wanted to.

"Provided that we had another launching pad, we could achieve this on the next launch," Hello said, "we could have two capsules orbiting simultaneously."

Martin is engaged now in modifying the Titan II intercontinental ballistic missile, making it suitable for launching the Gemini capsule which carries two astronauts.

Gemini, if all goes well, will make contact in orbit with the unmanned Agena space vehicle. The Gemini flights may last as long as two weeks.

Hello said the Gemini launching was planned for late next year.

At Houston, Tex., however, officials of the manned spacecraft center gave the time as early 1964.

Informed of this, the Martin company said it had not been informed of any change by the government officials and was going ahead on the basis of a launching date in 1963.

Hello said NASA needed only about a six-month advance notice to launch two one-man capsules which would pass very close to each other in orbit.

Although he said the United States could have done the same thing, Hello hailed the Soviet space flights as an achievement in timing.
