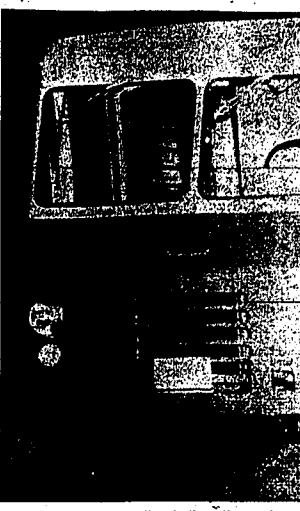

Buhl C. of C. Eyes Trade School Plans

BUHL, Aug. 15.—C. A. Strutz, president of the Idaho Technical Institute, met with the Buhl Chamber of Commerce today noon at the R and E cafe to discuss the possibility of establishing a newly-formed school here.

Strutz noted the Lincoln school building which was vacated upon the construction of the elementary school, although not suitable for youngsters, would be appropriate for a church. He added, however, rooms and housing facilities would be needed for faculty members and students.

Strutz said the ITI is a non-profit organization and the purchase of the school building is a four-year technical program in electronic engineering leading to a bachelor of arts degree.

He pointed out the ITI has a full staff of six professors, all have masters degrees and are reported to be the best in the state. He said the school already has 75 students enrolled for the first year of the school. He is expected to reach the 100 mark by the time the school is in operation. He said the school will serve as a co-educational institution.

Strutz pointed out the school now has the furniture and equipment and administrative personnel to set up classes as soon as a date is decided.

Following his talk members of the local chamber voted to assist the ITI in its move to Buhl in every way possible. A special committee appointed to assist the project will include: Roy Johnson, Anderson, Kent Giles, Ormond Smith and Dr. Garth Alwood.

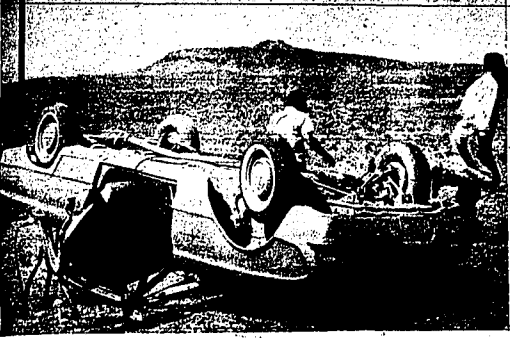

Bitter Fight Continues in South Pacific

HOLLANDIA, West New Guinea, Aug. 15 (AP)—"Bitter fighting" was reported in progress today on Misol island, with Dutch "Wagner" commandos blasting a beachhead established a week ago by Indonesian marines.
A Dutch spokesman said one Dutch marine was killed on Misol, increasing the known toll of sporadic warfare in New Guinea to eight Dutch and six New Guinea native soldiers killed since May 15. The extent of Indonesian casualties is unknown.
A flight of Indonesian Mustang fighters, apparently sent to provide air cover for the marines on Misol, attacked a Dutch warship near Serang Island, Antilaberal. It drove off the three planes, setting one of them on fire.
Dutch air patrols alighted paratroopers at four places in the jungle area where an estimated 400 to 500 Indonesian paratroopers were dropped last week-end.
Authorities here were flying reinforcements to Termination, Sorong, Kaimana and Merauke on the South coast to defend civilian residents of the towns.

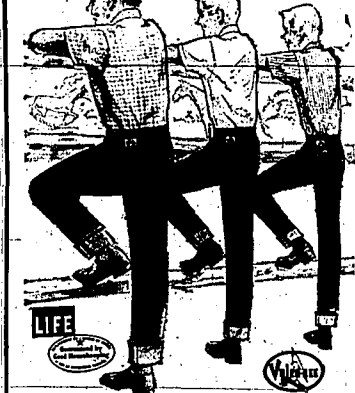

Six Projects Affected by Trades Strike

Von Braun to Speak During Lunar Confab

BLACKSBURG, Va., Aug. 15—Wernher Von Braun, director of the space agency's Huntsville, Ala. center, is expected to make a keynote address at a five-day lunar conference here.

The 250 scientists attending were scheduled to debate various phases of radio, optical and photographic studies of the Moon's surface.

Delegates at the conference yesterday speculated on what the Moon explorers would find.

—Elihu S. Baldwin, a Grand Rapids, Mich., astronomer, said he believed the Moon had a bulge facing the earth, a bulge of height from 8,000 feet to 15,000 feet.

—Prof. Zdenek Kopal, of the department of astronomy at the University of Manchester, England, disagreed. He said measurements supporting this idea were in error.

Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel prize-winning physicist and JPLA, Calif., said all controversies about the Moon's composition and terrain would be "solved" very quickly. "We will soon have observation from the Moon."

X15 "Brain" Goes Berserk During Flight

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Aug. 15—The X15 "brain" went berserk at 100,000 feet Tuesday, according to Joseph A. Walker, "wobbling around" like a wild animal, ship bounding in a wobbly sea.

The national aeronautics and space administration pilot switched to manual control, fought for stability, finally stabilized the research plane and landed safely.

He described the motion the plane went through after the guidance failure as a "Dutch roll"—a simultaneous rolling and yawing. That is, it veered right and left with the wings alternating rolling up and down.

After landing, Walker was asked if he plane's manual controls were adequate for such emergencies.

"Well," he grinned, "there I am."

The trouble came as Walker was descending from a 3,748 mile per hour flight to 197,000 feet.

He radioed to the ground: "The roll damper popped out and I was too busy flying to get to it."

By this he means that a part of the X15's autopilot, which is designed to control rolling motions automatically, had ceased functioning.

The roll damper can be reset in the cockpit, but Walker had no time to waste. He immediately began operating the plane's control levers by hand.

"It took a fair amount of doing," he said in an understatement. "It wasn't a real smooth flight."

"I'll bet the engineers are already going over the recorder data like flies around a honeycomb," Walker said. "As soon as they figure out what actually happened it should be comparatively simple to correct."

Tunnel Under Mont Blanc Is Completed

CHAMONIX, France, Aug. 15—They drank champagne and chianti Tuesday in the heart of Mont Blanc, Western Europe's highest peak.

Under the glare of television and newspaper spotlights, workers and officials from France and Italy joyously toasted their final junction at the halfway point of what will be one of the world's longest highway tunnels, a tube seven miles long blasted through solid rock.

Italians grinned indulgently as bottles after bottles of French champagne crossed unimpeded into Italy.

The day marked the culmination of months of drilling and blasting by teams that set out in January, 1959, from points near Chamonix and Courmayeur to pierce the Alpine barrier.

Several hundred feet back on the French side from the junction point, long tables covered with white linen glinted with glass bottles and piles of sandwiches. Waiters from the Chamonix Casino, wearing boots and military helmets—as regulations required—presided over a huge French-Italian treaty party.

Lines Chart Loss During Past 6 Months

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—The major U. S. domestic airlines lost nearly 1.5 billion dollars in the first half of 1962, the Air Transport Association (ATA) reported today.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 — Two important economic indicators—industrial production and housing starts—both showed increases in July.

The Federal reserve board reported Tuesday that the industrial production index rose one point to a record high level of 115 points in July, based on 100 points for average output in 1957.

The Federal housing administration reported a nine per cent gain in housing starts and a slight advance in requests for FHA mortgage insurance.

President Kennedy had cited industrial production as one of the economic indicators showing no need for an immediate tax cut.

The federal reserve board said the index, which measures the production of factories, mines and utilities, showed widespread increases. Auto production rose by 10 per cent following settlement of a strike against the Ford Motor Co. average output in 1957.

Production of iron and steel and consumer goods held about steady with June figures. Gains were registered in output of industries, commercial and farm machinery, freight and passenger equipment, and most durable and non-durable materials.

Uganda Women Move Forward in Old Way of Life

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (AP) — Bessie Little Barbara Gaben, mayor of Uganda's capital, Kampala, recalls a memo she saw in 1917.

"It was from a backward part of the country," she says, "warning that women should not be bothered like cows in the sun."

From this unenviable status women in Uganda are moving steadily forward. Mrs. Gaben said the other day, but they still have programs—rational, education, bringing up children.

She was in this country to collect her two sons, Hugh, graduating from McGill University in Toronto with a bachelor of science degree, and Timothy, a journalism major at the University of Oregon.

She also talked about farming. In the rural areas seven-tenths of the agricultural work is done by women.

"Unless you get women to appreciate better—agricultural methods you haven't achieved anything at all. A woman sitting at home on a shamba, a small peasant holding, may be like women in the world over, as soon as she turns her back she'll go back to doing the way she was for centuries."

Farm initiatives "don't take women, but the young women's Christian association in which she has been active for years, is pioneering an agricultural extension program and carrying the country to women in the villages."

It also is important to teach the women how to get better nutrition from their own food, she believes. "They don't know how to feed a child, she says, and teach the women to learn to learn, and through all classes is sweeping the urge for recognition of their rights. Women want to be heard."

She is going to independence this fall, but she says, "I don't progress unless you carry the men with you. You can't advance only in connection with men. They're only with you."

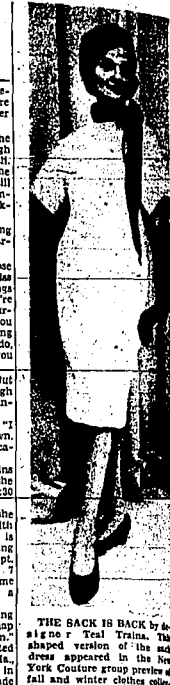
