

Contract for School Lunch Milk Awarded

Buhl, Aug. 16—The Buhl school board awarded the contract for the school's lunch program to a meeting held here today. The contract was awarded to Don and Deane's dairy and the Jerome Cooperative creamery for five years.

Trustees voted to present a resolution to the state board of education requesting endorsement by the association of the state re-education committee report as set up by the legislature to re-codify the school laws.

G. A. Strutz, president of the school board, met with the board requesting endorsement of the school building for the purpose of establishing the ITI institute in Buhl, after training in engineering, commercial art, radio and television and applied sciences.

The school board took no action on the matter. It was announced schools will open on September 27. Buses will run on the regularly scheduled routes and school will operate as of Sept. 27.

Students selected for the open house at the new elementary school building were opened on the school bus insurance for the year. Separate buses were scheduled for summer trips and also on the school bus.

Lloyd Byrnes representing the Great American insurance company \$600,000 on the driver training car, was accepted. Other bids were submitted by Robert B. New Survey of Occupations in Four Counties Is Scheduled to Start Soon

Four surveys of occupations in Twin Falls, Jerome, Minidoka and Cassia counties will be started soon under the joint sponsorship of the Idaho state employment security agency, Idaho State college department of business and the Idaho state department of vocational education.

The surveys will be prepared without cost to any city or county and will be made during the next six weeks with the cooperation of employers.

"We plan to send out a form to each employer—nothing complicated," said Earl Davis of the employment security agency after a meeting Tuesday night in Kimberly with business leaders from the counties.

William Grange, manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, stressed how important an updated survey can be to employers, as well as to people counseling youngsters on future vocations. It also is an excellent bit of "sales talk" for industrialists planning to move into the area to be able to show them just what area people are trained to do, he adds.

Davis said two of the improvements in the survey will be:

Former U2 Pilot Sues For Divorce

MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga., Aug. 16 (AP)—Six months after a dramatic release from a Soviet prison, former U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers sued his wife for divorce on grounds of cruelty and intoxication.

The petition was filed Tuesday in superior court at this middle Georgia city, hometown of the 28-year-old brunette Powers married in 1955. The couple has no children.

Powers said in the petition he had been separated from his dark-eyed wife since May 27. He charged she was "guilty of habitual intoxication" and that she cursed and abused him without cause.

The petition also alleged her "acts of cruelty were willfully inflicted" and caused Powers to become highly nervous and endangered his health.

Mrs. Powers had no comment when she was served with a writ, Sheriff Buford T. Lingard said.

Sixteen co-defendants will stand trial with Chang, the junta said.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The frightened people of Washington, with that President Kennedy's Attorney General would pay as much attention to the summer crime wave now sweeping the nation as they have to relatively peaceful disturbances in Albany, Ga., and other cities.

While showing no great awareness or concern over criminal conditions here, they are elsewhere under less provocation, according to charges on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives. "JUNGLE CITY"—Although most of Washington's 600,000 Negroes are law-abiding and hard-working—64 per cent of the population—Southern members of congress, police and newspaper accounts substantiate this statement.

Attorney General Kennedy, in this fact which he has not refuted, and jobs, which are more true. There has been a tremendous influx of colored people into Washington since the federal government, and industry here and elsewhere, have recruited Negroes to occupy minor and important positions.

Wednesday the radio signal was relayed directly into AP's North American wirephoto network and was received instantaneously by more than 600 member newspapers and television stations.

The photograph and the caption beneath it came through West and Sharp.

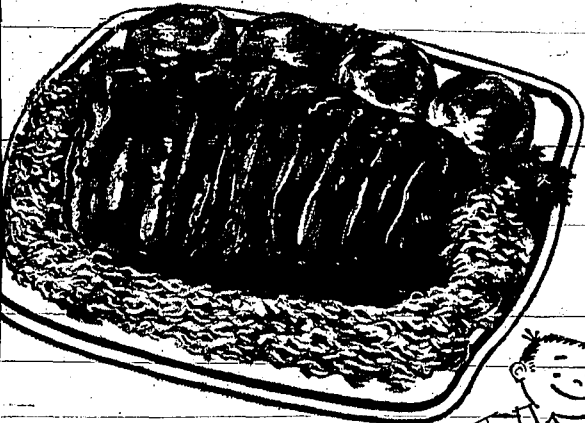

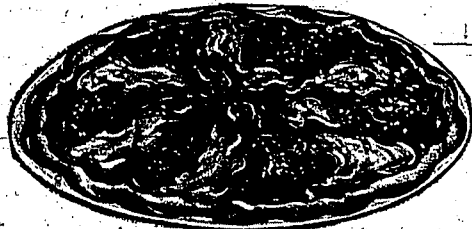

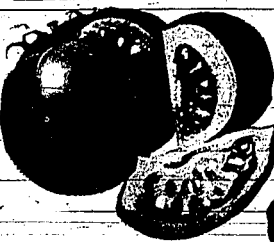

Hoop, Track Stars Are Trying To Start Pro Football Careers

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 (AP)—A sudden influx of top-drawer performers in sports other than college football has invaded the training camps of American and National Football League teams this year. "The jury" still is out as to whether these non-football heroes can make it. The two biggest names are Frank Budd, former Villanova sprint star who shares the world record of 9.2 seconds for the 100-yard dash, and John (Hondo) Havlicek, the Ohio State basketball star.

Budd, with the Philadelphia Eagles, tries to make it as a flanker back after having been an all-state halfback for Astbury Park High school before going to Villanova. Havlicek, who turned down lucrative professional basketball offers, was an all-state quarterback at Bridgport, N.J. high school. He was picked No. 7 in the last NFL draft. He is being groomed as a defensive back or possibly a flanker back by the Cleveland Browns.

Will these two make it? Budd's own coaches are at odds over his chances. They admit to his great speed but point out it takes more than speed to get the job done in the NFL. He must be able to take the punishment of getting hit and must know how to cope with the savagery of opposing defensive backs. He has yet to pass that test.

Conch Paul Brown has pronounced Havlicek a long, hard look, and feels he is big enough and strong enough to make the pros. But Paul says he acquires the experience and know-how soon enough to survive final squad tryouts. The same question was posed recently by Houston Oilers coach Frank Tompa Jr. in referring to the Ohio cornerback, who was an outstanding basketball player the past three years at Loyola of Chicago but did not play football because his college had no team. Cromaker, who helped Loyola win the berth in the National Invitation tournament in New York City this past March, 16-3, enough to get the post at 6 feet 11 inches, 221 pounds. He played high school football in Gary, Ind. Now Brown is trying to catch on with the Dallas Cowboys of the NFL. One Cornell College of Utah State University player, who has played football, is also being considered. He is 6 feet, 4 inches, 210 pounds. The other player is Charley Sells, who was also a miler and high jumper at Washington State. He is 6 feet, 7 inches, 240, and is trying to hook on with the Washington Redskins.

Road Repair Job Blamed For Mishaps

Since road repairs along highway 30 near Hansen and Murtaugh began a couple of weeks ago, there have been three accidents on that 10 mile stretch of road, all of them from the same cause—following too closely.

Twin Falls County Sheriff James Benham noted there were accidents Aug. 10, 11 and 13 and suggested that the situation is due to people following too closely behind each other as the pilot car takes strings of cars over a single lane of the highway which is open to traffic.

The pilot car is provided by Hoops Construction company, which has the contract to oil the 10-mile stretch. In a situation when the car at the front of the line must slow or stop because of the workers who are oiling the other lane, each car following has a little less chance of stopping because reaction time for applying brakes gets to be cumulative.

Drivers in the rear of the line can't see objects that are at the front the first indication they have that something is in the way is when the brake lights of the car immediately in front of them go on.

Sheriff Benham pointed out that most cases of cars hitting other cars from behind are assumed to be the fault of the car in the rear. This is because all drivers have an obligation not to follow too closely. A driver must be able to stop his car if there is something in the way.

Monday's accident at 2:20 p.m. was like the two preceding it on August 10 and 11 near Hansen. A 1959 Chrysler driven by Norma Shouse, Murtaugh, had the front end damaged when it hit the rear of a 1953 Dodge truck driven by Raymond R. Burton, also of Murtaugh. Burton's truck was damaged in the rear.

So far there has only been one person hurt on the highway 30 road repair area. Pearl Marsh, Murtaugh, was hurt Aug. 11, but not seriously.
