

Officials Labor Against Deadline On Vaccinations

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Health officials of two states today are racing against an awesome deadline to find and vaccinate all persons who may have come in contact with a young Canadian smallpox victim. The stricken boy, James William Orr, 14, flew here from Sao Paulo, Brazil, Aug. 11 on a plane with more than 20 other persons, including his parents and a brother and sister. He passed through Idlewild airport, traveled by cab to Grand Central terminal and sat in the Metropolitan's waiting room for 8 1/2 hours before boarding a train for Toronto.

First Racial Charge Set By U.S. Board

Rothman said the complaint will be lodged against Local 1, Independent Metal Workers Union, an unaffiliated union. He said Local 1 made up of white workers while Local 2 is composed of Negro employees. The two locals are the joint bargaining unit for the Hughes Tool company employees.

The basis of the complaint, Rothman said, is that Local 1 has refused to process a grievance in behalf of Ivory M. Davis, a metal handler employed by the company since 1942 and treasurer of Local 2.

West Berliners have been stirred to hot anger by the shooting of a refugee at the wall Friday and the fact that he lay dying in plain sight just out of reach of the West.

Reds Set Off New Nuclear Test Blast

UPPSALA, Sweden, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Russians set off another nuclear test blast today in the atmosphere over the Norway-Zemlya region in northern Russia. Swedish scientists reported. The explosion was recorded simultaneously at Uppsala University Geophysical Institute and at the Stockholm Geodetic Institute.

Uppsala scientists set the strength of the explosion at 12 megatons while Prof. Arne Blerstedt, director of the Geophysical Institute, estimated it to be around 10 megatons. A megaton is equivalent to a million tons of TNT. Today's explosion was the fourth to be recorded here in the current series.

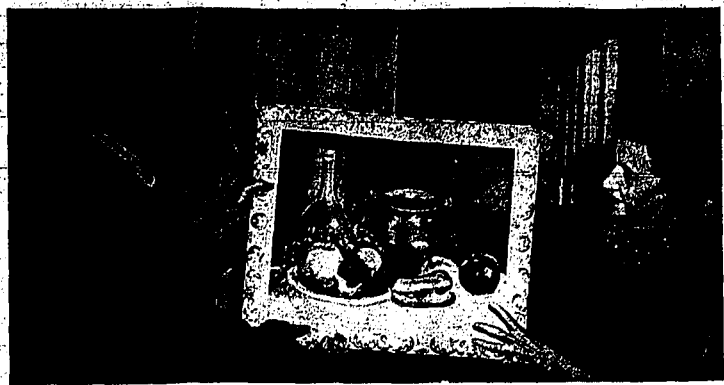

WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 — The Republican leadership on Capitol Hill has taken the Kennedy approach to the administration's proposal to reduce the number of nuclear testing sites within the United States. Behind the Rockefeller-Dickens charge that our new nuclear program is a "nuclear testing site within the United States" is a more effective vote-getting appeal.

Hoover's new proposal represents a radical change in his attitude. It was only a few years ago that he was warning of a "nuclear testing site within the United States" as a danger to the democracy when the United Nations failed to act against communist aggression or refused to take the necessary steps to reduce a growing dependence on the U.S.

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Even Democrats Doubt — The same disenchantment toward the existing international body known as the United Nations and its puppet leadership is shared by many Democrats. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee, headed by Sen. J. William Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, has expressed a lack of faith and reliance on the United Nations derives from the fact that it is now dominated by the communist bloc of Afro-Asian republics.

President Kennedy, on the other hand, reiterates his belief that it is helpful to have such a forum for the expression of world opinion and the reds. For the same reason, he favors continued conversations between Secretary Rusk and Russian Ambassador Dobrynin and with the Chinese Premier, Liu Shao-chi.

In their onslaught on the administration's foreign policy, the Republicans are encouraged by the big game warden who will carry on Capitol Hill, Congress appropriated funds for nations like Poland and Yugoslavia on condition that the money not be used for the purchase of arms. But in 1950, only in the amount that other members subscribed, although accepted by the White House, they were criticized for not having any conditions of Mar-Leninist regime.

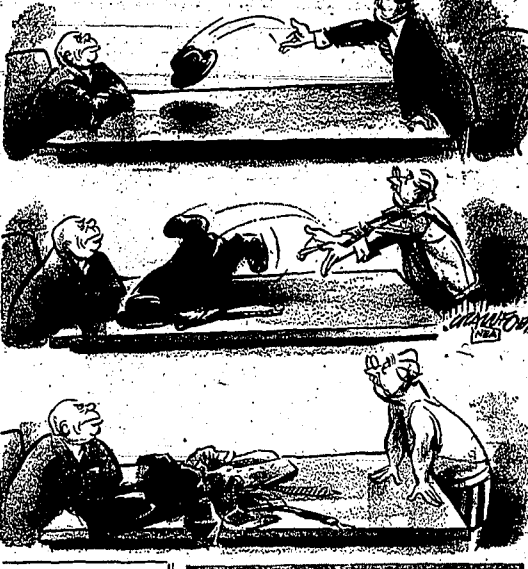

The opposition feels that the administration has surrendered or compromised its principles. They have weakened our ties with such allies as France and Germany.

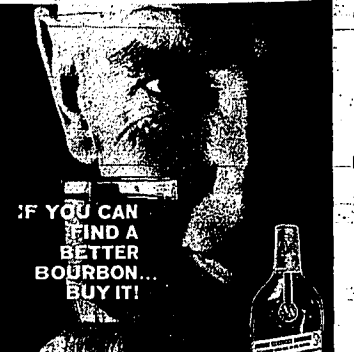

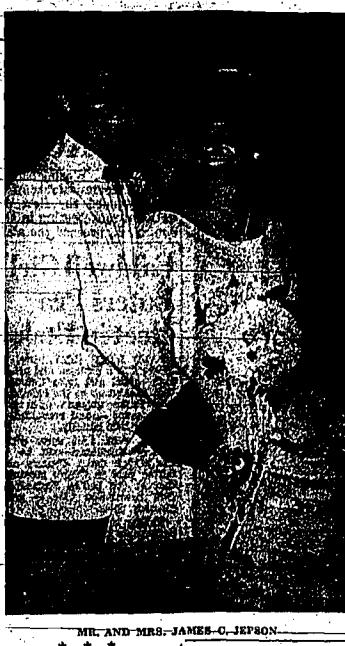

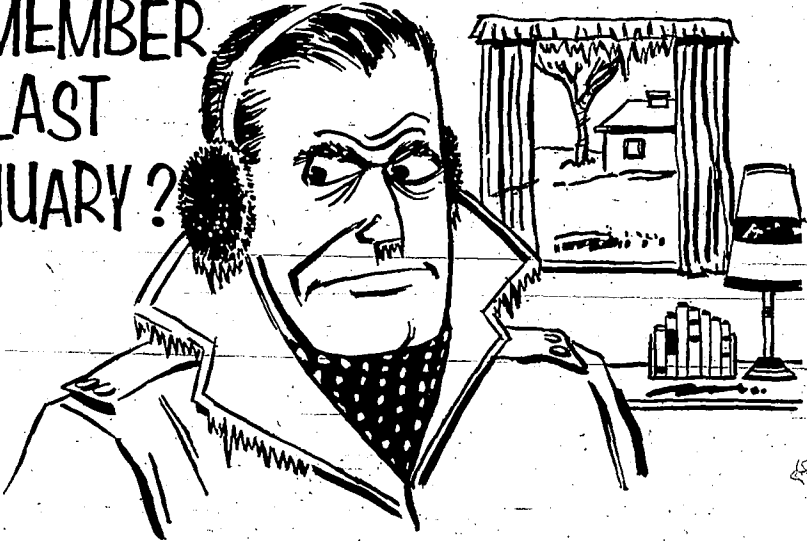

"That painful walk down the hospital corridor with Ben Hogan was the start of Shirley's golfing comeback. She had to wear a back brace for seven months, but after that her recovery was rapid."
