Jetliner With 102 Aboard Dives in Bay

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 21 (AP)—A Brazilian jetliner with 102 persons aboard skidded off the runway on itself Monday night, plowed through a thick concrete seawall and dived in flames into Guanabara bay.

Officials said at least 12 persons were killed and 11 hospitalized with shock, burns and other injuries in Brazil's fourth major air disaster in 10 months.

The big DC-8 stayed afloat for 15 minutes after hitting the water and then sank to the bottom in 15 feet of water.

Some bodies may still be in the plane, a fire department official said.

Officials said 11 passengers were missing but none were believed to have survived and left the airport without notifying anyone.

A stewardess, Fernanda Fortunata, was the only crewmember killed.

Not All Success

The world may never know how many failures Russia has experienced during its extensive space experiments with rockets. So far as the full story on communist successes in the field, information is divided by the Russians is confined to the fragments that serve the Russian purpose and nothing more.

Now Rep. Walter H. Moeller, D. O., says there is evidence the Russians have lost personnel in their attempts at manned flights.

Not only is there an excellent possibility of such losses, but Representative Moeller should know what he's talking about. He's a member of the house aerospace and astronautics committee and is such an expert on the subject that he is not general knowledge.

Using the U. S. program as a yardstick, it's possible to guess at Russian success or lack of them. No one is willing to concede that the Russians have any better technology in the fields than the U. S. So grant that the Russians have at least equal know-how.

The inevitable conclusion is that Russian progress of failures is at least equal to the U. S. percentage, with a greater possibility for loss of human life.

TOUGH ASSIGNMENT

The U. S. secret service has a tough assignment in the Kennedy family. It would be a large task for any president, but when the chief executive and his family are as active as the Kennedys, the assignment becomes unbelievably complicated.

President Kennedy's Sunday swim provided an excellent example. Apparently, he made up his mind on the spur of the moment that he would like a dip in the Pacific ocean.

Then he proceeded to swim out from the beach, with a good portion of the crowd trailing him. As he swam, he took a dip with the President.

Finally the panicky secret service had a life guard patrol boat as a sort of escort for Mr. Kennedy, not that he was expected to drown, but just as a precaution.

One secret service agent remarked, "This fellow's so unpredictable and there's nothing we can do but stand here and watch."

JUST BUDDIES

Idaho's candidates for governor keep calling each other "friend," a term that the words do not back up.

There doesn't figure to be much hedging in Idaho's elections, particularly where basic issues are concerned.

Proposed Tax Amendment Faces House

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The house leadership will try next Monday for a vote on a proposed amendment to the constitution prohibiting the poll tax as a requirement for voting in federal elections.

Speaker John W. McCormack, D. Mass., said Monday the proposed amendment will be called up under a procedure requiring a favorable vote of two-thirds of the house members present.

The bill has been lodged in the house rules committee since the senate passed it March 27.

Five states now impose taxes on registered voters. They are Virginia, Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi and Texas. If passed by congress the amendment would have to be ratified by 38 of the 50 states to become effective.

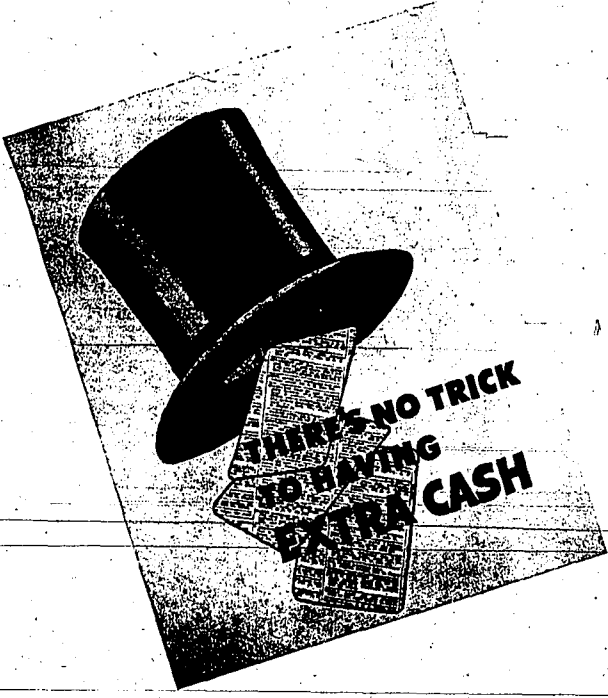

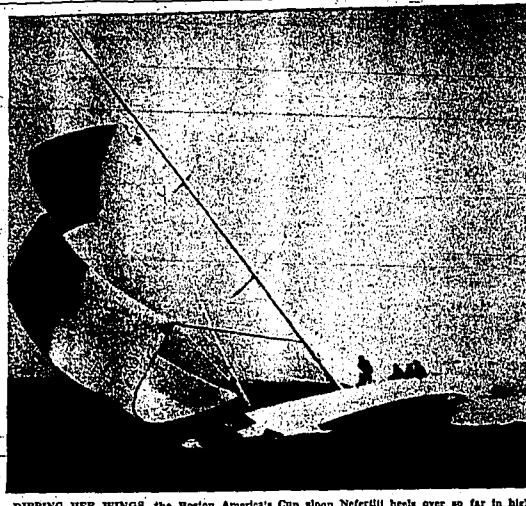

Improvement in Fishing At Reservoirs in Valley Is Forecast by Biologist

Fishermen in Magic Valley can look forward to increasingly better fishing in open irrigation reservoirs as the season progresses, Stacey Gebhardt, area fishing biologist, reports. The reason for this has been good water conditions and extremely fast growth of fingerling trout planted early in the spring. Many of these fish that were planted at two to three inches are presently running six to nine inches in length. One of the outstanding reservoirs in terms of fish growth this year has been Magic, he declares. During April and May some two and one-half million fingerlings (two to three inches long) and 30,000 catchable size rainbow (averaging 10 inches) were planted in the reservoir. Currently the fingerlings are making up 60 percent of the crop and some have grown to almost 10 inches in length.

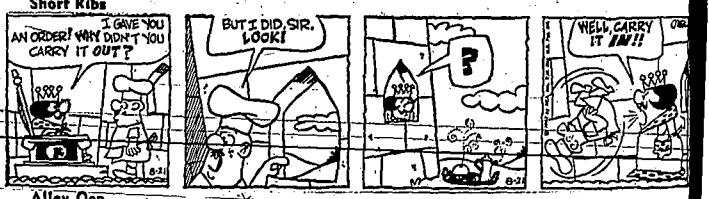
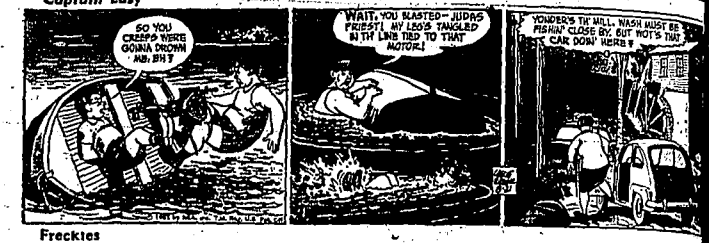

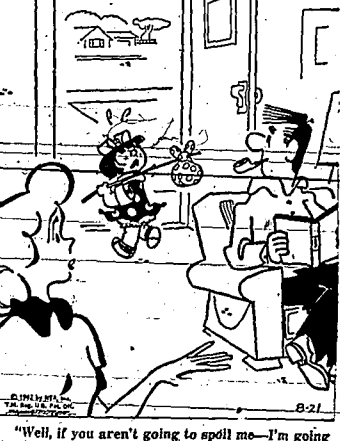

The Russian at first laughingly fended off reporters who tried to pin him down as to his reasons. "Excuse me, gentlemen," he said and walked off.

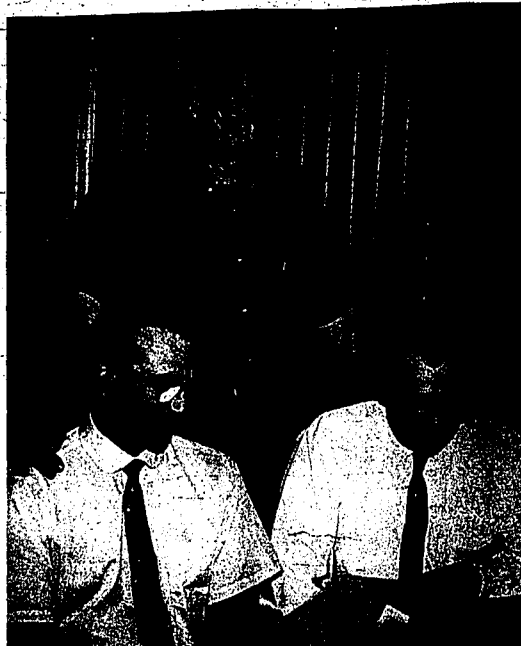
Later he said he didn't want to get involved in American politics.
