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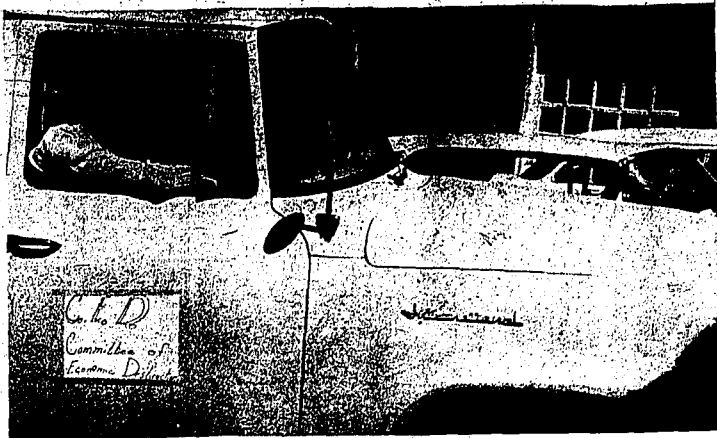

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23—Mrs. John F. Kennedy and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson are repaying the heavy political debt which they owe to the economically depressed state of West Virginia. They are also repaying the debt which they owe to the state's white and black citizens who are suffering from the economic depression which has afflicted the state since the end of World War II.

It was in West Virginia that President Kennedy's victory was extraordinarily impressive because the population is predominantly Protestant and the state is predominantly white. The President scored heavily over Richard M. Nixon in their only televised debate.

Although generally regarded as a region where coal is the principal product, which accounts for the current economic difficulties, West Virginia is a state with 20 mills providing employment. But its prominence and prospects in this line were not generally known until they bought their official glassware in the upper Monongahela valley, not in such more renowned places as Belgium and Italy.

Samuel K. Hazen, president of the Morgantown Glassware Guild, reported that the industry of West Virginia is now being "swamped" by the industry with orders for the same kind of glassware from which the state is suffering. He stated that the industry is not to be outdone, Ladybird Johnson then disclosed that she also "adores her table" with the glassware produced by the Morgantown state glassware as gifts for her friends, which undoubtedly, naturally, has been relayed by the industry's publicists and by newspaper articles.

**BOON TOURISM, TOO**—These official advertisements have benefited West Virginia in another way. They have brought a "flood of tourists" to the state and the money which is used to obtain the delicate process required in the manufacture of tableware.

"People drive hundreds of miles out of their homes," said Hazen, "to visit our glass plants. Due to Mrs. Kennedy's effort, the flow of visitors has increased appreciably. It is a good thing for West Virginia. Kennedy recently raised the tariff on imports of glass from European countries, chiefly from Italy and France, and made the market to retaliate by increasing the duties on several American products."

It provides that mining shall be permitted in all of these areas for the next 10 years, and that the land shall be reopened to prospecting every 25 years. Does this mean that recently forbidden heavy equipment and roads would be permitted on wilderness mining prospects? If so, the bill would be a disaster for the wilderness. The wilderness by definition must be roadless and undeveloped by man.

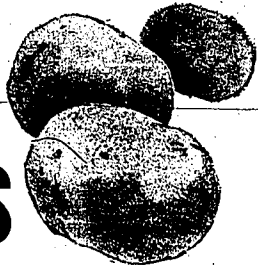

### Big Savings From Cut in Rates Cited

POCATELLO, Aug. 23 (AP)—Savings of two to two and a half million dollars yearly are in immediate prospect for growers of Idaho potatoes if the freight savings will result if another freight rate reduction is made, a Union Pacific railroad official said here Wednesday.

New rates now in effect are scheduled to take effect Sept. 23 and a proposed third reduction on potato-hauling charges is expected to be effective beneficial results to the Idaho economy, Richard Anderson, general director of the Union Pacific, said.

Grain growers also are reaping benefits from the freight rate reductions, he added, and on file with rate bureaus is a proposal to reduce lumber rates from eastern Idaho.

Together the rates will mean new millions in the pockets of potato growers, Anderson said.

"The position of Union Pacific is that agriculture must be strong in the West and we are hopeful that an increase in volume of freight handled will offset the rate reductions," he declared.

"We are interested at all times in bettering the Idaho economy and position, and freight rate reductions, bringing direct savings to growers, will be generally reflected in earnings for all."

In effect since Aug. 9, the rate reduction of 10 to 14 1/2 cents a hundredweight on potatoes shipped to West Coast states, the reduction dependent on the point of destination.

Scheduled for Sept. 23 is a reduction in potato shipping rates from Idaho to Missouri river points, with savings amounting to 2 1/2 cents per hundredweight.

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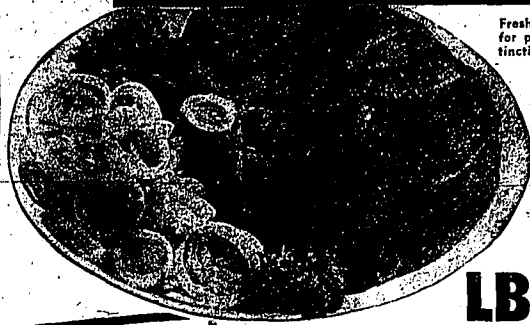

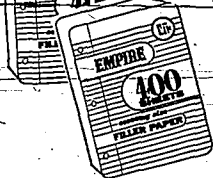

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# Dick and Jane May Have to See More Than Spot if They Want to Keep up

BOISE, Aug. 23 (AP)—Dick and Jane may have to do more than just "see Spot" in the next generation if they want to keep up with their young readers.

A department of education spokesman says in the next couple of years Idaho first graders will be studying calculus to prepare themselves for nuclear physics in the fourth grade.

"The school children are learning things in the fourth grade now that their parents studied in the eighth and eighth grades," said the department director of curriculum told UPI in an interview.

"Kids today are exposed to these things at an earlier age," he said. "This is due to the scientific advances that are always in the news, and especially television, which has opened up a whole new concept in education."

To keep things up to date, each school district in Idaho is constantly "inspecting its school textbooks to insure they don't become obsolete."

The district recommends texts on a five year cycle for groups of subjects, Bishop explained.

"For example, this year, books on the subjects of music and social studies will come under the scrutiny of administrators and teachers. In November and December, district committees will review current texts and present their recommendations to the board of education in January."

If the board decides it's time for a change, more modern texts will be ordered for the fall of 1963 in those subjects.

Bishop said the schedule calls for text revisions in handwriting, vocational education and business education in the winter of 1963, mathematics, science and health in 1964, reading, literature and speech in 1965.

With all the time, research money spent, the texts bought by the state still fail to satisfy the thirst for knowledge of a few.

Then they more than satisfy the needs of the vast majority of books with "bored of elementary school" or "in case of fire throw this book away" inscriptions.

Smylie said he is "especially gratified at the increase in the valuation of the energy distributing utilities because consumption of energy by our economy is the best evidence of growth."

The commission said the increase in utilities is over and above a drop of \$1,573,550 in assessed valuation for railroads.

### Coal Miners Ignore Ban On Walkout

MADRID, Aug. 23 (AP)—The number of Spanish coal miners ignoring a government ban on strikes rose today to about 7,000 at scattered points in the country's chief coal-producing region.

The striking workers, seeking a five-day work week and a solution to labor grievances, doubled in number yesterday when 3,000 men walked off the job in Asturias.

The government issued a statement here in which it lamented the fact that such incidents had occurred. It warned that it would not hesitate to take "direct measures" if necessary.

The walkouts began last Saturday at four mines and had spread to other points in coal-rich Asturias since that time.

A wave of strikes in the Asturias region last spring eventually led up 150,000 mining and industrial workers, confronting the regime of Generalissimo Francisco Franco with the worst labor crisis in his history.

A delegation of workers from the Duron coal fields near Oviedo yesterday asked civil authorities to call a halt to the strikes.

As a result of last spring's work stoppages, the miners received pay increases bringing their daily wage to \$2.50.

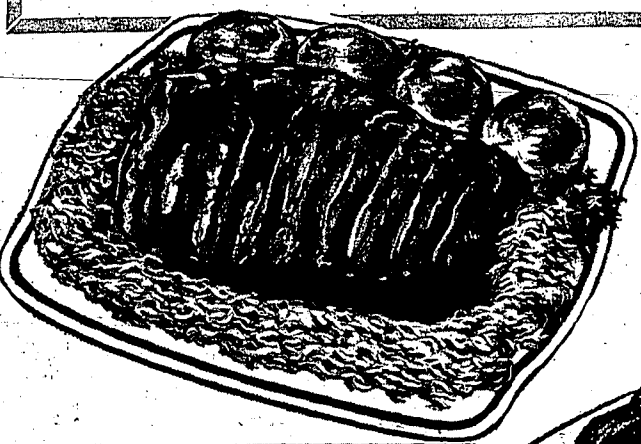

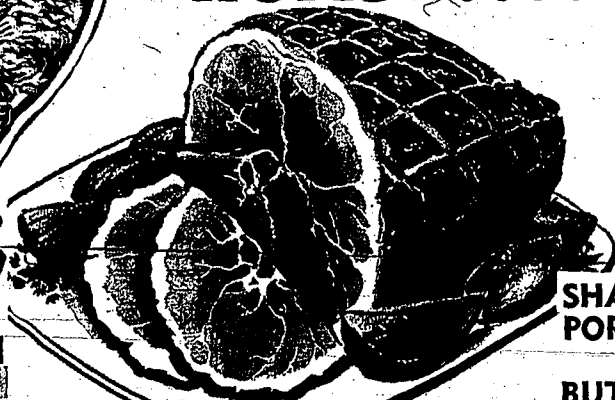

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**Diamonds Are Scarce, Reports Jewelry Council**

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—A report from the Jewelry Industry Council will take the sparkle out of your day. There is a scarcity of diamonds.

The market supply of two-carat diamonds and larger is thin. "The way Albert Heise (pronounced 'High-See'), council president, put it.

Heise's organization represents some 3,000 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in the precious and costume jewelry fields.

Heise information is based on talks with four of the largest diamond buyers in the United States.

Heise listed these reasons for the scarcity of the large stones, which were sold at \$250,000 by the time they are in the 20-carat size.

The demand from western Europe buyers has increased sharply in recent months, because of growing prosperity.

Europeans regard the diamond as stable in value, while the currency of a country might be subject to sudden devaluation and fears of war have increased purchases because diamonds are an easy way to transport to any other part of the world.

Heise said the marriage rate abroad was only a minor factor in the demand—the American custom of a girl getting an engagement ring from her fiance is just beginning to catch on.

In the United States, however, more brides are getting engagement rings. Heise said 83 per cent of 1951 marriages were engagements, compared with 76 per cent in 1949—a post-war year "he picked at random."

Engagement rings use 53 per cent of the diamond supply in the United States. Other rings account for 34 per cent; diamond-set watches account for another 14, and earrings, clips and incidental jewelry use the rest.

"The larger diamond has become the engaged girl's status symbol," Heise said, "in modern times she can't very well show him off. But there's nothing to stop her from flaunting that diamond."

USE FRESH PEACHES  
Peaches are the darlings of the teen-age set. In fact, they seem to be everybody's darling—especially now when they are fresh, plump and blushing.

We asked some of our teenage friends to give us their favorite peach recipes. Here are two of them:

**Coconut Peach Melba**  
(Makes 4 servings)  
1 package (10-ounces) quick-frozen red raspberries, thawed.  
2 teaspoons cornstarch.  
1 tablespoon sugar.  
dash of salt.  
8 fresh peach halves  
1 cup flaked coconut.  
Drain raspberries, reserving juice. Combine cornstarch, sugar, and 2/3 cup raspberry juice in a saucepan. Bring to a boil slowly, stirring constantly.

Cook until mixture is clear, about 2 minutes. Cool slightly. Then fold in the drained raspberries. Chill. Serve over the peach halves and sprinkle with coconut of the Fresh Peach Betty

(Yield: 6 to 6 servings)  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup soft bread crumbs  
4 cups sliced fresh peaches  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Combine first 4 ingredients and set aside. Arrange half the peaches in a one-quart casserole. Top with half the bread crumb mixture. Dot with one tablespoon butter or margarine.
