

## U.S. and Britain Lower Demands in Nuclear Test Ban

GENEVA, Aug. 27 (UPI)—The United States and Britain today dropped their stance upon on-site inspection of nuclear tests in the atmosphere, in outer space or underwater. But the western powers maintained insistence upon inspection of underground blasts before agreeing to a treaty totally outlawing nuclear tests. The Soviet Union reacted coolly but did not reject the new Anglo-American proposal outright, said sources attending a 17-nation disarmament conference here.

The proposal was put before conference by U. S. Ambassador Arthur H. DeLoach. His statements issued by Press Secretary Kennedy and British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan, it was believed, were aimed at the probability that communist China will test a nuclear device soon. DeLoach said the draft of the treaty embodied a total ban on on-site inspection of underground blasts. The other proposal was an atmospheric, space and underwater test ban with on-site inspection of underground tests only. British Foreign Secretary DeLoach said that the position statement suggested that it was a move "designed to impose a total test ban on the world."

A treaty must ban all nuclear tests, conference sources quoted Macmillan as saying. "It is impossible to maintain a live and dead line between nuclear war and the threat of nuclear war. The U. S.-British proposal for limited on-site inspection of underground tests in Washington, its critics claim is a new backdoor by the Soviet administration. U. S. experts held that Washington is not able to agree to a complete test ban because of advanced detection techniques developed as a result of the recent successes of nuclear tests.

The joint statement by Kennedy and Macmillan said that the western powers want a comprehensive treaty. However," it said, "we are also anxious to reach an early agreement on the basis of the present document, that covering on-site inspection of underground tests in the widest area of agreement possible at this time."

## Area Flooded by Water of Broken Main

Leazer said the 20-inch iron pipe was installed about 1950. It was replaced by a 24-inch pipe at the intersection of Washington street south and Adams street.

## Titan Missile Base In Idaho Activated

ORCHARD, Aug. 27 (AP)—A fleet of huge white intercontinental missiles, tucked away under the southwestern Idaho desert, was formally added today to the nation's striking force. Three launching complexes, housing the 6,200-mile range Titan I missiles, were transferred to the control of the strategic air command. Col. John L. McCoy, director of Titan weapons systems for the air force, handed a symbolic key to Col. Burton H. Burns, commander of the 84th strategic aerospace division, to mark the transfer.

Sen. Len B. Jordan, R. Ida., headed a group of Idaho leaders who participated in the ceremonies and then toured the vast network of tunnels and equipment at the Orchard complex. Just off U.S. Highway 30 about 20 miles east of Boise.

Each complex houses three of the sleek missiles, poised for momentary service in the event of an enemy attack.

The three launch complexes required two and a half years to build at a cost of about 200 million dollars.

This is the third of five Titan missile bases activated in the United States this year.

Two others were activated earlier this year at Denver and Rapid City, S. D. Others will come into operation soon near Lake Wales, and Maryland, Calif.

## Rail Unions Oppose Early Hearing Move

CHICAGO, Aug. 27 (AP)—Five brotherhoods of on-train workers objected today to railroad union's move to bring an early hearing to the U.S. court of appeals on the carriers' plans to implement a "fast-track" work rule.

Union attorneys told the court a speedup of court procedure in the case would be to their benefit. They said they are already in court to prepare their briefs adequately.

In another railroad dispute, the Chicago committee plans to seek alternate methods of transportation if telegraphers strike for an early hearing in 8 a.m. Thursday against the Chicago and North Western railway.

A walkout by the AFL-CIO order of Railroad Telegraphers would cripple operations on three North Western commuter lines in the Chicago area. The strike would affect freight service in nine Midwestern states.

GENEVA, Aug. 27 (AP)—Negro pupils entered nine previously white schools today in the state. The desegregation was done quietly and no incidents were reported.

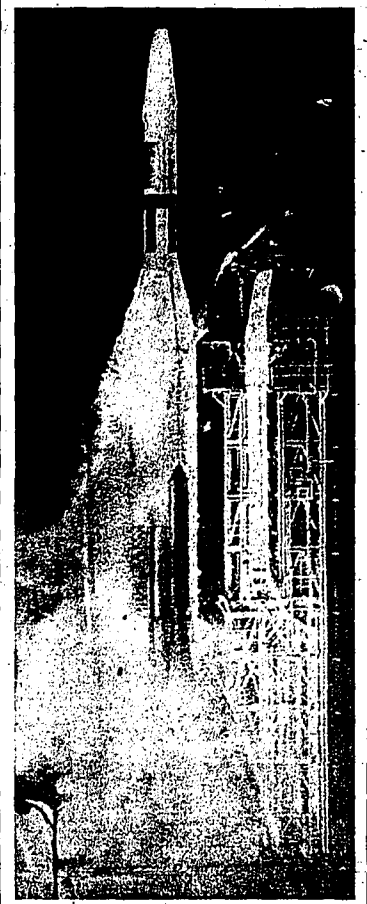

BERLIN, Aug. 27 (AP)—More than 300 East Berliners joined today at the funeral of a young man, the 18-year-old refugee whose killing by East German police touched off last week's rioting.

Those attending the ceremony in the cemetery of East Berlin's Evangelical Church of the Resurrection included young people and their parents and a sister and brother, who live in East Berlin. There was also a niece, Julia Mueller, 7, who played about the gravesites. Her mother, Lieselotte Mueller, 37, lives in West Berlin and has not been able to see her since the communists began to build a wall a year ago.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (AP)—A senior official of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission said today Communist China "probably will be able to test a nuclear explosion within a matter of months." He later retracted his statement.

## Space Shot Toward Venus Off Course; Correction Planned

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Aug. 27 (AP)—A Mariner 2 spacecraft rocketed into space today and scientists reported there is a possibility it will pass near the planet Venus as planned despite an early trajectory error. If the early line is followed the Mariner will miss the planet by more than 600,000 miles, but an effort will be made by remote control steering to put it back on course. The key to jockeying Mariner 2 back onto its proper path is a 50-thrust motor which is to be fired by ground signal eight days after launching when the spacecraft is more than a million miles away from Earth.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (UPI)—Postmaster General J. Edward Day today offered the biggest reward in post history—\$50,000—for solution of the nation's biggest cash robbery in Massachusetts two weeks ago. Appearing before house investigators, Day also denied that any laxity on his department's part led to the loss of 1.5 million dollars to a band of highway bandits. He expressed confidence that the case would be solved.

SHERMAN W. HUDSON, 59, Twin Falls business man, died at his home at 519 Lincoln street Sunday afternoon of a heart attack.

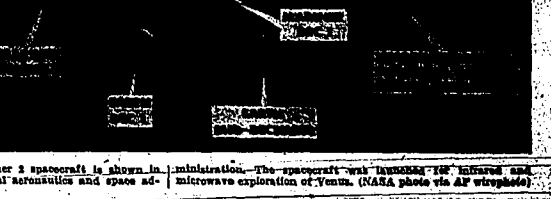

## Finland, Russ Working on Canal Plan

**TWIN FALLS, Aug. 27**—Finland and Russia are expected to agree in the next few weeks on a lease arrangement which will bring about the first change in the 10-year-old border between the two nations since World War I.

Informal sources said highly advanced negotiations are being conducted to permit Finland to lease the eastern half of the Gaimma canal for the next 50 years. The question of the canal lease has come up from time to time since the end of the war. Last year talks broke down on the issue of legal jurisdiction over the canal. This year has been worked out, with only details to be finished. When these are completed, both governments will submit a vote of approval of the plan.

## Efforts Made To Get Nun Named Saint

**COLOGNE, West Germany, Aug. 27**—Edman Catholic church authorities in West Germany have initiated canon law proceedings to elevate to sainthood Edith Stein, a Jewish-born nun who was slain by the Nazis in the Auschwitz concentration camp.

Joseph Cardinal Frings, archbishop of Cologne, issued an appeal to Catholics to submit letters, diaries or sermons by Stein in order to advance her case.

In his appeal, the cardinal said he has begun the proceedings for the beatification and canonization of God's servant Teresia Benedicta a Grace Edith Stein from the Carmelites of the Baroque Carmelites.

Church sources said the nun, born in 1891, was converted to the Catholic faith after studying philosophy in the early 1920's. For 10 years, she was a teacher at Catholic girls' schools and in 1933 joined the Carmelites.

She was arrested by Nazi secret police in August, 1942. In the same month, she died in an Auschwitz gas chamber.

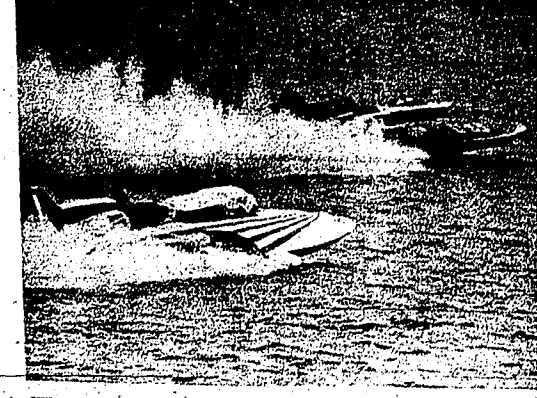

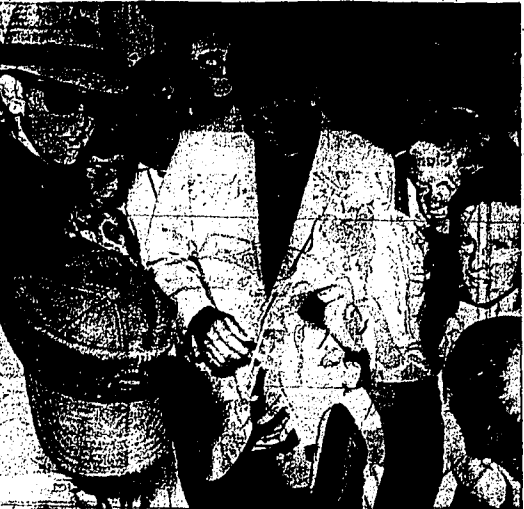
