

California Brush Fires Jump Lines

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29 (AP)—One of two major brush fires burning north of the populous San Fernando valley burst through fire-fighting lines early today and burned within four miles of the other blaze. Flames spilled into Wilson canyon and forced crews to take a new stand midway between the already damaged Olive View sanitarium and a veterans hospital in the Sylmar area. The breakthrough occurred in the Los Pinos area.

The twin blazes were among the brush and timber fires burning in California which have blackened 20,000 acres in recent days. Six aerial tankers began dropping fire-retarding borate solution on the Southern California blaze this morning as 1300 men fought the 75 acre blaze. More than 110 fire trucks and 110 bulldozers were being used in battling the California blazes.

The two fires broke out within a mile of each other Tuesday, 10 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles. Within a few hours they had consumed a hospital, buildings, oil storage tanks and a nearby cowboys' ranch. Flames advanced on two vital Nike missile sites and a powder works containing an estimated 20 tons of explosives and were only a narrow margin. Fire raged to within 10 feet of the plant.

One blaze had a perimeter of 25 miles and had blackened 8,500 acres. The other—currently retarded as the more troublesome—had consumed 8,000 acres and increased its perimeter to 22 miles. Humidity in the area was only 20 per cent at daybreak and a turbulent north wind was blowing from the Los Angeles area.

Los Angeles county fire chief Keith Klingler said the fires were the worst in the county since the deadly Air-Brenwood fire last November. 15 miles to the west.

75 in Albany Jail After Prayer Vigil

ALBANY, Ga., Aug. 29 (UPI)—Segregated jail cells in three south Georgia cities were filled today with 75 demonstrators and church members from 10 states after an attempted prayer vigil protest against racial bias in Albany, Ga. Jews, Catholics and Protestants, men and women, Negro and white persons, young and old, went to jail after refusing three times to move from the sidewalk in front of city hall.

"We have come to offer prayers to God," said a clergyman. "Go back and preach to your own congregations. We are here for your own cities," said Police Chief Laurie Pritchett who ordered the arrests after three warnings of the group to disperse.

Separated by race and sex, groups were sent to jails in need, by Letsburg and Newton and others were lodged at the county jail in Albany.

Bonds were set at \$200 on charges of disorderly conduct, creating a disturbance, congregating on the sidewalk and refusing to obey an officer.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (UPI)—President Kennedy today welcomed Russia's goal of Jan. 1 for an end to nuclear testing but said this country still insists on effective controls. Replying at his news conference to Russia's proposal in Geneva for an unannounced testing moratorium at the end of this year, Kennedy said "gentlemen's agreements" and "moratoriums" do not give adequate assurance against secret tests.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (UPI)—President Kennedy today announced the retirement of Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter and the selection of Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg to replace him. The President made the announcement in an opening statement at his news conference. His appointment of Goldberg in the second cabinet-making office, Frankfurter, who will be 80 in November, was appointed from Massachusetts by President Franklin D. Roosevelt and took his seat Jan. 30, 1939.

H-Bomb Blast Radiation Is Delay Cause

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The hydrogen-bomb explosion in the Pacific has damaged solar cell power plants and has delayed the launch of the civilian space program, the national space administration insisted today.

The national space administration insisted that the radiation is no menace to the man-made satellite. It will not delay the earth-orbiting launch of six or seven satellites planned for the autumn, Walter M. Schirra, NASA said.

Many satellites, including the television picture relay satellite, showed no signs of damage, the agency said. However, the navy ordered equipment, possibly for two or three months, of the launching of the Project Anna machine satellite which initially had been scheduled for two weeks ago.

The action reportedly was the result of early reports on results of the H-bomb explosion over Johnston Island. The reports, and the possible effect on the costly and delicate instruments aboard Anna.

The H-bomb radiation, believed already to have dissipated by about 50 per cent, still extends down to within 20 miles of the earth at some points. Some 700 miles above the earth it merges into the Van Allen radiation belt that perpetually embraces the earth, scientists believe.

Energetic particles left by the bomb explosion damage the silicon solar cells of man-made satellites, reducing their ability to convert sunlight into electricity.

A NASA spokesman said power output of the U. S.-launched British scientific satellite Ariel dropped rapidly after the H-bomb blast, but later regained strength when the vehicle moved into full sunlight. The signals from the most part have been weakening steadily, however.

It had been under study for about a year to determine if the college meets standards of other universities around the country. The board conducted its meeting by telephone.

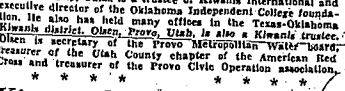

Mutual Fund Regulations Advised in College's Report

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29—A voluminous, statistics-packed report on the mutual fund industry suggested Thursday that some regulatory changes may be in order—but should be applied only with extreme caution.

The report was prepared by the Wharton School of Commerce and Finance of the University of Pennsylvania for the securities and exchange commission.

An SEC spokesman said the commission's permanent investigating staff will seek out the potential dangers and possibly recommend action.

William L. Cary, chairman of the SEC, said last week that such a study is under way and whatever recommendations are made will be given to congress by next April 3.

The Wharton report said the main problems affecting mutual funds "appeared to be those which involve potential conflicts of interest between fund management and shareholders, the possible absence of arm's-length bargaining between fund management and investment advisers, and the impact of fund growth and stock purchases on stock prices."

"This is the gist of the letter of transmittal which Cary wrote in forwarding the report to the house commerce committee.

In New York a spokesman for the fund industry disputed the findings, saying the report contained "numerous misleading, incorrect and highly speculative comments."

Charles H. Schimpff, president of the Investment Company Institute, speaking for the industry, told a news conference it was evident that the study had serious deficiencies.

He said the study was a radical departure from its intended purpose, representing a sharp challenge to the basic structure of the fund industry which is

Italy Surveys Damage From Earthquakes

NAPLES, Italy, Aug. 29 (AP)—Southern Italy today surveyed damage caused by a series of earthquakes within a week. Life returned to normal in Naples and in most of the towns this morning after yesterday's two shocks, centered in Greece but felt throughout southern Italy and Sicily and as far north as Trento in the Alps. The tremors claimed no casualties in Italy, but added considerably to the damage from heavy earthquakes, estimated at 100 million dollars. Last week's shocks caused 18 deaths. In the mountainous interior, the worst hit area last week, authorities ruled 174 houses in 15 villages must be torn down as unsafe. Another 44 houses were repaired. In Nocera Inferiore, 30 miles east of here, yesterday's shocks damaged the postoffice, the prison, two schools, a market, church and 10 houses.

Kennedy Has Tax Revision Bill Victory

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The senate turned today to fight over expense account deductions after handing President Kennedy a major victory in a fight on the tax revision bill. The senate voted 52 to 30 Tuesday to retain the measure's major provisions—\$1-billion-a-year investment credit to spur American industry to buy modern machinery and equipment. The quick action raised senate leaders' hopes they could push the 50-page bill to final passage by Friday. The senate continued in session Tuesday night to debate the next items on the agenda and an attempt to fix a time for a vote on the provision failed. The investment credit was retained with 37 Democrats and 15 Republicans voting for it, and 17 Democrats and 12 Republicans against it—an unusual lineup, as both conservatives and liberals were widely split. The provision now is virtually certain to become law since it passed the house and has been approved by the cabinet. Under it, most companies can deduct from their taxes up to seven per cent of their cost of spend on new equipment. Public utilities would be allowed three per cent.

Nampa Youth Is Hurt in Crash West of Burley

BURLEY, Aug. 29 (AP)—A boy, 16, was hurt in a crash today at Castle Memorial hospital Wednesday after a spectacular high-speed race and one-fourth mile west of Burley on U.S. 30 Tuesday morning. His grandmother, Mrs. Colla Cummings Payne, 66, Brigham City, Utah, said she lost control of a new pickup truck she was driving Tuesday morning and smashed into a power pole. Mrs. Payne, who was treated for minor injuries, told emergency files the sun shining in her rearview mirror temporarily blinded her. The impact snapped the pole in two, and caused extensive damage to the vehicle. Mrs. Payne was returning her grandson to Nampa. The 12-year-old boy had a head, leg and body lacerations.

Return of Cuba Prisoners Hoped

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—James B. Donovan, the lawyer who arranged the release of U.S. pilot Francis Gary Powers, said he would leave for Cuba today to negotiate the return of all prisoners captured during the Bay of Pigs invasion. Donovan will go as a representative of the Cuban Families Committee for Liberation of Prisoners of War, Inc. He said permission for his trip had been granted by the United States and Cuban governments. He said the time and place of the departure for Cuba would not be disclosed. "Our mission is humanitarian and we are confident of its success," Donovan said. "All we ask is your prayers."

False Claim Is Reason for FDA Seizure

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The federal food and drug administration Tuesday announced it had seized a batch of "softener" which the FDA said was promoted by false claims of its effectiveness in health and disease. And Dr. Kenneth L. Millsted, deputy director of FDA's bureau of enforcement, said the administration was now engaged in a survey to determine whether labels on products such as also make similar claims for preventing heart disease because of unsaturated fat content or low in cholesterol. In 1949 the FDA issued a policy statement advising manufacturers and distributors of unsaturated fats and oils that they should be careful not to claim that they promote such products for the prevention of heart and artery disease. Dr. Millsted said the seizure of softener in Salt Lake City is a chain grocery store in that city. The softener was found to contain hydrogenated cottonseed oil. And the promotional literature, the FDA said, falsely represented the softener, shortening as effective in the prevention of atherosclerosis, heart attacks and strokes; effective in controlling blood cholesterol, reducing body weight and improving health.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 29 (AP)—A cold front dropped the temperature at Chadron, Neb., from 102 Monday afternoon to 31 degrees Tuesday morning—a 65-degree fall. At Valentine the drop was from 104 to 44, at Alliance from 99 to 34 and at other points in western and northwestern Nebraska almost as much.

Investigating sheriff's deputies said the boy was making a left-hand turn from the road into his driveway when he struck the 1950 Corvair driven by Myers. The car was undamaged, but the front bicycle wheel and handlebars were bent. Alfred was only scraped.

RAVELLO, Italy, Aug. 29 (AP)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, fresh from a personal triumph in the Democratic primary election, left nearly a dozen family members, including her youngest daughter, 10-year-old Princess Irene Galtzine, four-year-old Caroline Kennedy and two-year-old Arthur. The group was expected to stay at Princess Galtzine's Capri villa and to return to Ravello by this evening.

No Danger From Fall When Abo Pupils Playing

ARTEAGA, N. M., Aug. 29 (AP)—When the 460 atomic-age youngsters at Abo elementary school take a recess, they play on the roof. Classes started Tuesday at the school under Robert E. Smith, principal. The only dangers in playing on the roof are the usual kitchen knife, blunt pencil and cut-throat thumbtack. The roof is at ground level.

Space System For Weather Year Behind

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The projected Nimbus system of weather observation satellites has slipped about a year behind schedule first set up in 1959, sources were told Tuesday.

Lt. Col. Leslie W. Cowan, director of the air force's national aeronautics and space administration meteorological program, said the system would be operational in 1964.

But he told the house space committee, "Military operational needs of the complete Nimbus system will be delayed until 1965 or unless an intensive effort in modification in plans is initiated."

Nimbus is the satellite weathering system planned to follow the experimental series of three weather satellites now being used.

A NASA spokesman confirmed that there have been postponements in the Nimbus program in the present outlook, he said, is for the launching of two research satellites in 1963 and two operational ones in 1963 and one each in 1964 and 1965.

In addition, he said, two operational Nimbus satellites will be launched in 1964 and two more in 1965.

The original plan was to launch this year.

A more complex and workable satellite than the three satellites which have been provided weather data for months, Nimbus will be a 550-pound dumbbell-shaped space vehicle mounting three television cameras and orbiting about 600 miles above the earth's surface.

The fifth Tiro is now in orbit and the sixth is scheduled for launching next month.

Russian Aid Key to China Atomic Force

LONDON, Aug. 29 (UPI)—Communist affairs experts in London believe Russia still holds the key to China's nuclear program and is in no hurry to let Japan ally develop an atomic bomb.

Expert opinion based on information that has seeped through the iron and bamboo curtains holds that Peking has been making some progress but it is slow. The reports suggest that China has good scientists but lacks the "ingredients" which the Russians would supply.

There is little concrete information from Peking but what is available leads experts here to believe that red China might complete its first nuclear device in the next year or two.

Even then the huge Asian country would be a long way from producing the plutonium and rockery required to place it in the ranks of the nuclear power.

Earlier this month red Chinese Foreign Minister Marshal Chen Yi was quoted as saying "We have some more time before the country has an atomic bomb although it was making 'great progress'."

The first hint that Peking was working on such a project came from the marshal early in 1959. In June, 1960, North Viet Nam Communist Leader Ho Chi Minh claimed after a visit to Peking that communist China would have atomic bombs "in the not distant future."

There have been similar statements by other Chinese and Asian communist leaders in the past few years but it is difficult to separate boast from fact.

Significantly, none of the statements has contained any reference to "fraternal assistance" from Russia.

It would appear that the atomic program affected a severe setback in the collapse of the "great leap forward" policy which has crippled every ambitious plan of the Chinese communists.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (UPI)—The tapping of foreign aid funds for birthday gifts to new countries and a road to an athletic stadium has been disclosed in a house hearing.

The information was brought out by a subcommittee in a scrutiny of the \$18-million-dollar contingency account controlled by the President but actually spent by the state department and the agency for international development.

Chairman Otto E. Passman, D. Ia., commented that the law governing the fund is broad enough to permit the President to open a saloon every two miles across some foreign country.

In testimony released today, Fowler Hamilton, AID director, agreed that the fund was supposed to take care of unforeseen developments and to deal with a real crisis.

Hamilton testified that through April, the fund had been tapped for \$23,423,000 for situations "like aid to Greece when the Berlin situation got hot."

NEW YORK (UPI)—The silver market has moved in on the silver market again along with many industrial users fearing shortages or soaring prices during their big season just ahead.

But all hands are keeping a watchful eye on the Mexican dollar which has replaced the U. S. treasury dollar as a potential arbiter of world silver prices.

Speculators sent the price up earlier this month. Then when the world's largest silver producer, offered to sell all the price reached a fraction higher than the current market one, and thus hit the rise.

Now it is climbing again. The price went above \$1.10 an ounce in London. European speculators were credited with sparking some of the demand. The price is expected to come from industrial users preparing for fall production schedules.

Prices have risen in the United States too, as American manufacturers of silver items for the Christmas trade go into full swing. Also, the price trend closely are the burgeoning photographic and electronic industries.

It is their growing demand for silver, added to the traditional silverware and coinage uses, that demand for the metal for above current world production.

The gap between production and demand is expected to reach 140 million ounces. Production runs at better than 230 million ounces a year.

Silver held off the market by speculators is now estimated as high as 20 million ounces.

The U. S. treasury for several years controlled the price of silver by standing ready to sell it at around 91 1/2 cents an ounce. But the rising industrial demand used up the treasury's reserve stocks, and last November it stopped selling. Since then the price on the open market has risen by 40 cents.

Mexico, with a large supply on hand and more coming steadily from its mines, has acted occasionally to steady the price.

The U. S. treasury's remaining stocks used up back 81 and 82 bills. It also minted silver coins, for which there is a growing demand in this era of vending machines and turnstiles.

The current silver price is the

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Cuban News Hard to Find For Reporter

Facts about what goes on in Cuba are hard to come by these days.

An important factor is that the press in Cuba is fully controlled by the Fidel Castro regime. A newspaperman working for a Cuban paper knows what he must and must not write. The result is a sterile press that usually throws little light on what goes on.

Even so, statements in Havana newspapers often provide indications of basic situations existing in such problems as housing and the food supply, and U.S. reporters can follow up those leads to some extent.

The number of such reporters is strictly limited. The Associated Press, for example, has only one non-Cuban reporter working in Cuba. Applications for visas to go in other reporters are turned down or ignored.

Only a token number of visiting correspondents are allowed each month—usually one or two. Most of these represent newspapers or radio and television networks.

The correspondents able to work in Cuba find most official doors closed to them. When they do have news to report, they often cannot get it out of Havana. Long distance calls are frequently cut off with the explanation, "I'm sorry, sir, the New York party hung up." Cables often disappear if they displease a supervisor checking and incoming and outgoing messages at the telegraph office. Wording is sometimes changed in cables that clear Havana.

An exception to these circumstances arises when the government wants to exploit some kind of news.

Despite the Cuban censorship, many of the details of the fighting have been fully reported to the outside world. Some of the facts come out of diplomatic reports, which are not subject to scrutiny before transmission. The thousands of refugees leaving Cuba also provide much information. But often this is colored by wishful thinking, so it must be weighed carefully.

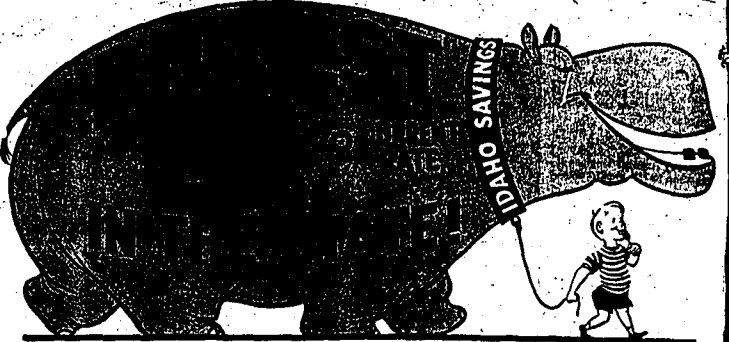

German Assured Of Europe Unity

LONDON, Aug. 28 (U.P.)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan revealed today previous assurances to Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of Britain's wholehearted interest in working for European political unity after the West German leader had expressed some doubts.

Macmillan ordered publication of part of a private letter he wrote Adenauer last month. Adenauer, in a television interview Tuesday night, had criticized reservations about British participation in a West European political union.

The publication of Macmillan's private letter, described here as unprecedented, underlined a growing coolness between the two statesmen on the issue of Britain's future role in the continent. French President Charles de Gaulle also has been described as privately cool to British entry in the Common Market, although both he and Adenauer have stated publicly they want Britain in.
