# Utah Areas Badly Shaken by Quake; Idaho Feels Shock

An earthquake shook northern Utah early today causing considerable damage to buildings and homes in the lush Cache valley about 80 miles north of Salt Lake City. There were no reports of injuries. A Lewiston, Utah, a drugstore collapsed onto a cafe, demolishing both buildings. One wall of the Crystal Furniture company building in Logan, a city of 18,000, fell onto a used car lot. At least one vehicle was reported damaged.

Several schools in the Cache valley area were closed because of damage. They included schools in Logan and Richmond. A slide blocked one lane of highway near Richwood.

# Philosophies of New Justice Not Known

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UPI)—The supreme court has lost its chief conservative and will get a labor specialist whose judicial philosophy has yet to reveal itself.

At age 79, on the advice of his doctors, Felix Frankfurter is retiring after nearly 24 years on the high court. President Kennedy has named as his replacement Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg, 54-year-old lawyer whose public service began on the new frontier. Hardly a dissenting voice was raised in the political arena after the President announced the selection at his news conference yesterday.

# Wirth Named Labor Chief By Kennedy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UPI)—President Kennedy today named Undersecretary of Labor W. Willard Wirth to succeed Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter as secretary of labor.

The President said Wirth, 50, has served with distinction as undersecretary since the beginning of his administration.

Wirth has had long experience in the labor-management field. He was chairman of the Federal Labor Relations Board.

**October May Be Earliest Quitting Date**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—Polls, which usually precede congress to adjournment, may keep it in session beyond the end of September this year.

Two many members are vitally interested in primary elections and nominating conventions in the next few weeks to permit any action, at least in the house, on major controversial legislation.

The house has an unwritten but never-broken rule that it will not vote on days on which members are involved in primary elections.

There are two such days next week, and leaders plan to schedule no bills controversial enough to require roll call votes. The house may meet only next Tuesday and next Thursday, as many members have earlier day speaking engagements.

The following week finds legislators busily preparing, with the succeeding week New York has a convention and Massachusetts a primary.

The threat of abandonment of plans for adjournment in September came Wednesday when Sen. Otto Passmore, D., Ind., told the house the annual foreign aid appropriation bill will not be called up until Sept. 10.

House Republican leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana said he is "hoping" for an Oct. 5 adjournment.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, assistant senate Democratic leader, is expected to announce at the adjournment but conceded that legislators might be held up as long as Oct. 3.

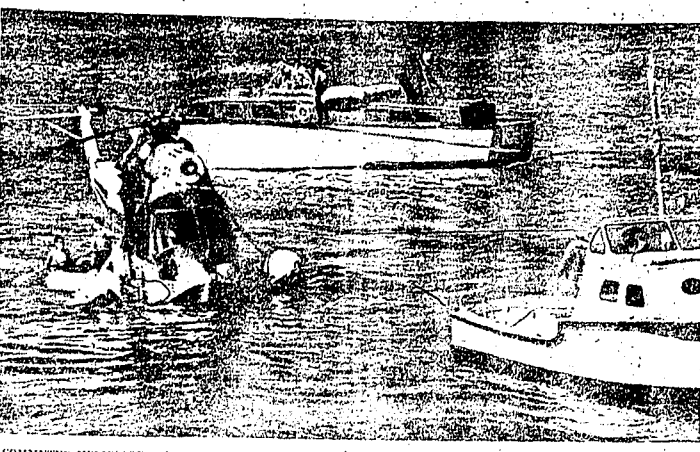

# Still Traveling by Ox Cart

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's political stock has received an unexpected boost from the honors which have been accorded his political record.

At the aggressively liberal and vocal Sen. Jacob J. Javits, R-N.Y., also enjoys an exalted position. Another Rockefeller leader, Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., also enjoys an exalted position.

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**THANK SIX YEARS**—The political importance of the Javits recognition is that, despite his off-beat performance as a liberal and independent spirit, he was made possible only through the support of the conservative Republican leadership. But it took six years for him to make the grade.

Previously, he had been a conservative on Capitol Hill, but also Republicans of that stripe in upstate New York. Like Rockefeller, he was an outcast of the party.

He had taken part in negotiations designed to meet the needs of the Rockefeller Foundation Insurance Bill, which was sponsored by Rockefeller. He was one of only five Republican senators to vote for the measure. It was defeated by a slim margin.

**WILL HELP IN ELECTION**—The general assumption is that Sen. Javits was advanced because of his Republican conservatism. He holds the 1964 presidential nomination. If so, it is obviously a political move to bring Javits and the man in Albany.

Javits' political position at this particular time is also intended as an aid to his reelection this fall. He can now argue that a Democratic nominee in his place would not raise such a high ranking of support.

Senator Javits is also a member of the Joint Congressional Economic Committee. In its current study of business and industry, he has issued a demand that has helped him politically.

**WOOLING SMALL BUSINESS**—Pointing out that only five per cent of all American jobs and those only the great corporations that sell in the foreign market, he asked anti-trust legislation to be passed to pool their resources so that they could capture some of this trade and help to meet business competition abroad.

Plans for small business interests, together with the anti-trust legislation, are being considered as a possible economic offensive, could be a reelection asset, especially as it was brushed aside as "inopportune" by the Democrats.

**FUSHING MARSHALL APPOINTMENT**—New York's other senator, Keating, has also used his position on the nomination of Thurgood Marshall to the federal bench. The former counsel to the late Sen. Javits, Keating, has been named to the court last October. He now serves under a recess appointment that will expire when the senate convenes next month.

Senator Keating's persistent prodding provoked a return from President Kennedy. At a recent press conference, he announced that he had seven vacancies on the circuit court during the Eisenhower administration, but that Senator Keating had shown no interest in sponsoring Marshall then.

## No New Prospects

Seldom has a president had the opportunity to appoint two justices to the U.S. supreme court in less than two years after taking office. But President Kennedy's two appointments to the high court have just about exhausted his possibilities short of unexpected circumstances.

A former description of the supreme court as "nine old men" is far from reality today. A justice can retire at the age of 70 if he has served for 10 years and eight more months of the term.

Justice Douglas could be the next candidate for retirement. He is 75 years old and has served for 15 years of service, but supreme court justices aren't noted for retiring.

It would seem that any talk now of further court changes would be premature, to say the least. Anyway, some of those youngsters among the associate justices might laugh at retirement talk.

**WELCOME SWITCH**  
There has been a welcome change in aviation news of late, but it has hardly had enough power to sneak into the news. Within the last month or so there have been at least three crashes that were largely ignored by newspapers across the nation, perhaps the principal reason for ignoring them is that no lives were lost, yet here is the very reason the crashes were important.

The latest was a crash in San Francisco Bay and none of the 10 passengers was injured. That's one of the features common to all three of the crashes in flight. The other common feature is that all three planes were helicopters.

All three of the helicopters were ferrying passengers over water at the time of a motor failure. All three spiraled down to hit the water rather gently and then floated until some boat arrived to tow the disabled helicopter to a dock.

What with continually increasing congestion, there's bound to be more and more use of helicopters. It's quite comforting to realize that the choppers, which are particularly useful for ferrying passengers in metropolitan areas, have a safety factor missing from conventional planes.

## Interpreting the News

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30—Thurgood Marshall, Negro lawyer, who led the step-by-step fight of Negroes against segregation in America, got a lot of practice in waiting.

Almost a year ago President Kennedy, electing Marshall to appoint him to the federal court of appeals, was the first nomination to the senate for a Negro.

Neither the delay with Marshall in the speed with which he was named to the court with the senate.

The responsibility in both cases rested with the senate judiciary committee headed by James O. Eastland, Mississippi Democrat, and with another Southern Democrat, Olin D. Johnston of South Carolina, head of a subcommittee.

The 64-year-old Marshall, an chief counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, started in 1938 to argue before the supreme court, in case after case, against segregation of Negroes.

He won all but three. His crowning achievement was in the supreme court decision of May 17, 1954, outlawing segregation in public schools.

Last Sept. 22 Kennedy nominated him to the second circuit court of appeals which handles cases from Vermont, Connecticut and New York and sent his name to the senate. Johnston quit before any action was taken.

On Oct. 23, 1961, Kennedy gave him a recess appointment. When Congress returned this year, Kennedy sent his name to the senate again, this time on Jan. 15.

As usual the nomination was referred to Eastland's committee and adjourned.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—There seems little doubt that President Kennedy is the most popular President in the history of the United States.

The public opinion polls show that he is more popular than any other President has been in the history of the United States.

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**SAME OLD TRAP**  
It's gratifying that Western negotiators for a nuclear test ban have not fallen again for a Russian boobytrap. In the face of many concessions by the West, the Soviet apparently bought some sort of gesture was needed. So the communist minister said Russia is willing to accept Jan. 1 as a cut-off date, for all nuclear tests pending agreement on a foolproof agreement to ban all tests. That was the same boobytrap used before by Russia.

The Soviet communists technicians were ready, the agreement went by the way-side.

By now even the most skeptical observers should be convinced of the Russians' lack of sincerity and lack of good faith. The communists do not want any treaty banning nuclear tests, except on their own terms. And that constitutes no treaty at all.

## Wheat Quota Voting Held In 39 States

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—Wheat farmers vote in 39 states today to decide whether marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1963 crop.

The agriculture department said about a million farmers are eligible to vote in the referendum. Not more than 25 percent of them are expected to cast ballots.

Two-thirds of those voting must approve quotas if they are to be applied to the 1963 crop.

If quotas are approved, "Producers who plant within their acreage allotments may market all the wheat they produce without penalty."

Growers in the commercial area who stay within their acreage allotments will be eligible for price support on wheat for the 1963 crop. The price support rate has been set at a minimum national average of 22 cents a bushel. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments will not be eligible for price support and will be liable for a penalty of 15 percent if they have more than 25 acres of wheat for harvest.

## Withholding On Interest Is Defeated

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—The senate has turned down President Kennedy's proposal for a withholding system to wipe out tax evasion on dividend and interest income.

The defeat had been conceded in advance by administration leaders struggling to win the so-called "tax" revision bill through the senate.

But the tide of the vote Wednesday against withholding—60-25—was a surprise even to the little group of Democrats who tried to keep it in the bill. Only 19 Democrats and one Republican, John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky, supported the President; 34 Democrats and 22 Republicans opposed the provision.

There's a chance the proposal will be salvaged in conference because the house included it in passing the measure in March. But the strongest advocates of the plan said their hope is slim.

The treasury estimated the dividend and interest withholding plan would bring in about \$60 million dollars a year in tax now evaded by failure to report about five billion dollars of such income.

This was to be the biggest item in paying for the major feature of the bill—an investment credit to spur U. S. business to buy new machinery and equipment.

Without withholding, the bill is estimated to mean a substantial amount deficit to the treasury.

### Food for Americans

**TAMALE PIE.** A fleshless picnic does not always have to mean cold chicken, potato salad and deviled eggs. How does this picture menu sound as a change — Texas tamale pie, green vegetable, tomato bars and canty?

The tamale pie can be kept piping hot for that picnic in the park or forest preserve by wrapping it in many thicknesses of newspaper. Newspapers, you see, are very important in more ways than one.

A tossed salad is a good traveler, too. Keep vegetables in a plastic bag until serving time. Then toss with your favorite dressing.

Beans teamed with fresh fruit complete our picnic menu without benefit of campfire.

**Texas Tamale Pie** (Makes 6 servings)

Chili Base  
1 pound ground beef  
1 cup chopped onion  
1 1/2-pound can kidney beans  
1 1/2-pound, 4-ounce can tomatoes  
1 1/2 tablespoons chili powder  
1 1/2 teaspoons oregano  
1 1/2 cups tomato sauce  
2 tablespoons water

Toppings:  
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup enriched corn meal  
1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons baking powder.

2 tablespoons sugar, 1 c. oil,  
1/2 cup milk,  
2 tablespoons shortening, soft.  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper.  
Heat oven to 375° (±25 degrees).  
For the base, brown ground beef and onion in small amount of fat in large frying pan. Add kidney beans, tomatoes, chili powder, salt and oregano.  
Combine flour and water; stir slowly into meat mixture. Cook over medium heat until mixture thickens slightly. Transfer to a 2-quart casserole.  
For the topping, sift together flour, corn meal, salt, baking powder and sugar into a bowl. Add egg, milk and shortening. Beat with rotary beater until smooth, about 1 minute, do not overbeat. Stir in green pepper.  
Drop, topping by spoonfuls, onto chili base. Bake in preheated oven (±25 deg. F.) 15 to 20 minutes.

The department of agriculture reports the big bird is featured at Northwestern meat counters, attractively priced in the Southeast and low-priced in the Southwest. In other areas it is also abundant.

One large chain is featuring turkey in its New York outlets at 39 cents a pound for 4-to-14-pound birds, and 39 cents a pound for heavier birds.

Accompanying turkey on the special counters in the Northeast are smoked hams, fivers and broilers.

In the Southeast, ground beef is reported to be attractively priced, as are broilers and fivers.

Round, sirloin and porterhouse steaks are featured in some Chicago markets.

Fresh pork, asparagus and beans are slightly lower in some Western markets and some beef cuts are lower in the Los Angeles area.

In several areas red meats are slightly higher. Rib roasts and over-ready roasts are quoted eight cents a pound higher than last week at New York outlets of a national chain.

On the produce output, green beans, cabbage, celery, corn, eggplants, lettuce, onions, peppers, potatoes, radishes, squash and tomatoes are lower.

The most plentiful fruits are apples, grapes, pears, plums and melons.
