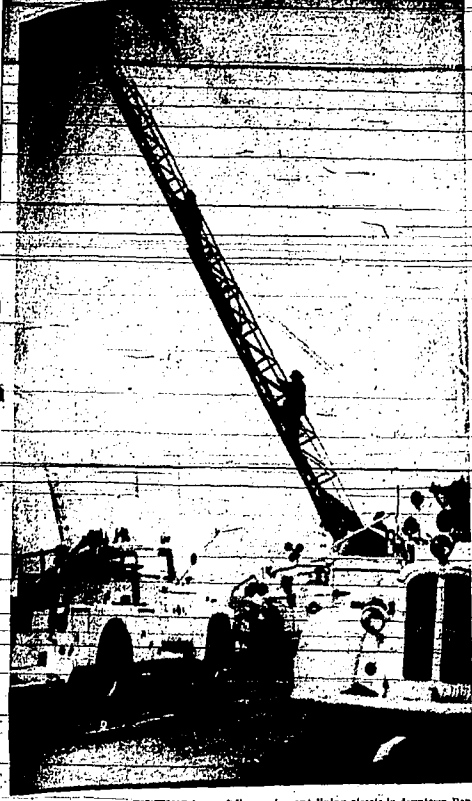

Deputy Kills Dove Hunters After Threat

YUCA, Alta., Sept. 3 (AP) — South Deputy Dale Visaland says he thought to be a dove hunter call Saturday morning in dove hunters shooting on public property. Visaland says the hunters were dead.

Visaland, a father of five and owner of 13 years with the sheriff's department arrived at a 41-acre ranch and found the men shooting doves in the open on the ranch house.

Visaland pulled aside the hunter, John Robert Sackett, 40, and told him to stop. Sackett, who is the owner of the property, said he was of Irvine's farm and had just had a heart attack. Visaland said he was recuperating in the ranch house.

The deputy said the men were not representative and asked, "Did anybody do you have to be more of?"

Visaland said he wanted to talk and again asked them to stop.

He said the elder Sackett then went around in back of him and pulled his shotgun into the open. Visaland said the younger man, who is also a hunter, pulled his shotgun at him from behind.

Visaland said the men then went to the ranch house. He said he pushed the younger man and barrel handle and pulled on the older Sackett, taking his gun and firing.

At the time the man dropped he turned and opened fire on the men.

Both men were killed.

A coroner's jury assembled here at the scene of the killing said Visaland had fired in self defense.

Party Chiefs Agree on Big Voting Issue

NEW YORK, Sept. 3 (AP) — National chairman of the Democratic and Republican parties agreed yesterday that President Kennedy's legislative program will be the main issue in the November congressional election.

Both John Bailey of the Democratic party and Rep. William Miller of the GOP forecast victory for their own camp on the basis of the President's record.

Miller said that the Democrats control congress but "you can't run the country... you can't do anything."

"Since 1961," Bailey replied, "the country has been run pretty well under President Kennedy."

"That is a purely personal opinion," Miller said.

"I think that will be decided in the 1962 elections," Bailey said.

"I am sure it will," Miller answered.

Miller also said he believes Massachusetts voters would disapprove of the President's brother, Edward (Ted) Kennedy in his campaign for the U.S. senate.

"It is very unfortunate that Mr. Kennedy is campaigning in Massachusetts and conducting his campaign on the premise that if elected he will be running in Washington because his brother is President," Miller said.

Bailey replied, "I think very frankly that merely because a man is the President's brother that he shouldn't be denied the right to run."

Smylie Cites Idaho Labor Achievements

BOISE, Sept. 3 (AP) — Gov. Robert F. Smylie paid tribute to Idaho's work force Sunday and said the last eight years have been the best for working people in terms of legislation in the state's history.

"The strength of Idaho is the strength and talent of her work force," said the governor in a Labor day statement.

He cited what he described as a "check list of progress" for working people in the state.

Smylie said there are 40,000 more jobs available than in 1953, that the average per-capita tax burden for workers remains the lowest in the west and that the state's per capita income has increased nearly 30 per cent.

"Idaho led the nation in enacting laws designed to make unemployment benefits available when recessions take in," he said.

"Unemployment benefits have increased from 20 per week in 1953 to \$42 per week in 1962. Workers' compensation benefits have increased nearly 40 per cent."

Smylie said Idaho enacted the first wage minimum law in its history in 1955, payment of the prevailing wage was made mandatory on state contracts, unemployment benefits were extended to city and county workers, social security benefits were extended to teachers and safety inspectors by the labor department have increased four times since 1955.

He said the back check law was amended to give wage checks added protection.

"No harmful legislation prejudicial to the best interests of Idaho working people has been enacted into law," he said.

"This is a record of real concern for the problems of Idaho's working people. It represents in terms of legislation enacted the best eight years in Idaho's history."
